For years, members of the Family has asked for ANY kind of information on the family as a whole. Finally, as a direct result of creation of the Woodham Family Association, we will have the first publications ever issued on the Woodham family, covering all of us.

We plan to have not one but three publications ready for issue at the National Reunion in May. These will be a booklet giving a (Continued on page 2)

Woodham Association Will Be Incorporated

The Woodham Family Association will become fully established as a permanent, incorporated organization in order to give us legal status through plans now underway.

At the same time, we are also moving to establish the Woodham Foundation, a non-profit, tax-exempt organization. The Foundation will be able to provide research and protect family records for decades to come.

Initial steps to incorporate the Association and to establish the foundation were made at the first business meeting of the Woodham Family Association, held last fall in Atlanta. At the urging of everyone present, it was decided to form a committee to take over responsibility of incorporating the Association and (Continued on page 5)

Woodhams Will Hold Second National Reunion

If you think the First Woodham National Reunion was big, then just wait until this Memorial Day weekend! We are now working on plans to make it the biggest and best family reunion in the South.

The Second National Reunion will again be held in Eufaula, Ala. We have reserved the Lodge at Lakepoint State Park and will have use of its convention facilities as well as a pavillion in the picnic area.

This year, only the cookout Saturday night and the big picnic Sunday will be held in the picnic area. All other activities will be held in the Lodge's airconditioned convention rooms. The family records will be displayed in a conference room and formal lectures on family history will also be held there Saturday and Sunday.

The Woodham family Association will hold its formal meeting also in the Lodge immediately after the Sunday picnic along with other activities.

South Carolina Reunion A Success

BISHOPVILLE, S.C.- A statewide reunion of South Carolina Woodhams was held near here last August, with more than 200 people attending. It was the first time ever that a reunion has been held for the entire Family in the state.

The gathering was held in Lee State Park on Lynch's River, the heartland of the ancestral home for most of the Family.

The reunion created a great deal of enthusiasm and family members called for making it an annual event. Woodhams and descendants from South Carolina's (continued on page 4

The Index is our pride and joy. This will be a printed and updated version of the index which you saw at the National Reunion. More than 4,000 Woodhams are listed. It is not just an index, however. In fact, no other similar index exists on any family. Robert Earl has worked on this for over two years.

The <u>Woodham Index</u> will help you trace any Woodham's direct line back 325 years to the founder of our family in America, Thomas Woodham (I) -- in just five minutes!

The Woodham Photo Album is a collection of about 150 photos of family members from throughout the nation. The pictures will range in age from 102 years old to the present and will represent a broad section of the Family. One of these will be published every year from now on.

So far, we have only about 60 orders for the Family History. We had announced the booklet would be printed for two purposes: to raise funds for research (buy more records, etc.) and to provide a publication to answer some of the many questions everyone has about our family's past. With only 60 requests, we failed to meet this goal.

Although we did not take orders ahead of time on the Index and Photo Album, we are going to take a chance and print them anyway. We are negotiating with a printer to get them done on credit.

Edward Woodham Jr. ...

Revolutionary War Soldier

At least six Woodhams are known to have served as soldiers when the American Colonies fought for their independence from Britain during the Revolutionary War. Two of these, George and Richard, were from Virginia. Robert was living in Maryland and was killed. The others were brothers from Dobbs Co., N. C.: Edward Junior, Etheldred and Frederick.

Only one of these six, Edward Woodham Jr., is known to have had male descendants. Edward Jr. was born in Surrey County, Va. about 1746, son of Edward Woodham Senior and his wife, Eleanor. He was the grandson of Thomas (II).

Shortly after he was born, the family moved to North Carolina, where they settled on the Tar River in Granville County. Land deeds confirm this. The family stayed there until Edward Sr. obtained a land grant during 1756 for land in what was then Johnston County. This area later became part of Dobbs County and is today part of Lenoir Co., N.C.

During Colonial times, every able-bodied man was obligated to serve in the local militia. Edward Sr. and his three sons were members of the militia from the time they were of age. Several documents prove their loyal service to America during the Revolutionary War.

Many Woodhams have attempted in the past to find an ancestor who served during the War but failed because they loob for sources in Washington, D.C. However, the records are the North Carolina State Archives at Raleigh, N.C. because they are state records. They include an original roster of the Dobbs County Regiment of Militia dated 1781 with the name of Edward Sr. listed among those men "too old or infirm" to serve on active duty. Edward Jr. was among the active soldiers.

In addition, several pay receipts are on file in the Archives. Two of these are for Edward Jr., dated 1777 and 1781. Another roster of men who volunteered for duty in the Continental Army is also on file, listing Edward Jr.

Loyd Lee bodham and Lester Clyde Woodham Sr. ("Buddy"), both of Albertville, Ala. and Francis L. Woodham of Lugoff, S.C. are among the members named to the committee.

Incorporation of the Association is a necessary action as many family members have pointed out. Since operation of the Association involves collection and expenditure of funds and we must deal with businesses (printing our family magazine and other publications and other activities), we must have legal status.

In addition, the Association will be able in the future to acquire and own real estate and other property as a corporation. This will allow us to acquire and preserve family cemeteries as well as develop a permanent headquarters for the Association and the Woodham Library and Archives.

The Committee will draw up a Constitution for the Association and draft a charter for the Foundation. These will be submitted for Family approval at the National Reunion.

The business meeting was very productive with good ideas being brought up. Several people from Georgia, Alabama and South Carolina attended.

Association President Robert Earl Woodham told the group "I'm going to just sit back and keep quite. I want to hear our ideas and your suggestions for the Association."

Woodham Photo Album Planned

One of the most important projects we will ever undertake is the preservation of our family's treasured old photographs. We first had in mind to copy and make a negative of every photo of every member of the family.

However, after a year and a half of this, we can easily see this method is simply too expensive for our limited budget.

We therefore came up with the idea of printing a photo album periodically. This project will allow us to preserve our photos and the cost can then be shared by us all.

The photo albums will be notebook size, 82" X 11" and will contain about 40 pages. All pictures will be printed in black and white, since the cost of full color is several hundred dollars extra.

From three to four photos will be reproduced on each page for a total of about 160 pictures. We are including both very old and recent pictures. The oldest will be 102 years old. Some will be group pictures and others will be of individuals.

With the printing of these photo albums, all the family can now share these precious pictures of our ancestors. No longer need we fear that a picture of our parents or grandparents will be lost, since there will be many other copies available. We plan to place copies of the album in several state archives for safe-keeping.

Only a limited number of the Woodham Photo Album.

Volume I. can be printed since we do not have any idea of how many will be taken by the Family. The cost will depend upon our final layout which has not been determined yet.

We realize the gasoline situation is going to cause problems so PLEASE start planning early and save up that traveling money so you can attend.

To make the National Reunion a success, we are going to need the help of a lot of people. We need volunteers to help on several reunion committees. These will include a Reception Committee whose duties will be registration of the family and registration of members of the Association. We need people to serve on Saturday and others for Sunday.



Each person present got a chance to find out how they are related to anyone else in the family. "I have always wanted to know how we were related," has been heard many times.

Using a big chalkboard, Robert Earl wrote out the facts and diagramed it so everyone could understand easily how they were related and how they were descended from the first Woodham in America. He told something about each generation. Those attending left with a better understanding that we are kinfolks and all part of the same family.

We will do the same thing this year on Saturday afternoon. Robert Earl will answer any questions and use family records to help show and explain about the family. He will bring as many Woodham family records as possible to the reunion.

Be sure and bring along your family Bible, photo albums, old farm tools, large framed pictures, old quilts, antiques, pictures of Woodham homes, old deeds, handmade items, old clothes (Grandma's shawl or Grandpa's old coat), military records, old letters, marriage licenses, newspaper articles and other items to show during the reunion. Many folks brought these for the first reunion and that is what helped make it so exciting. Many of us saw pictures of our grandparents or great grandparents for the first time. Let's share these again.

The gathering at the Holiday Inn Saturday will last all day, breaking at noon for dinner and 6 PM for supper. The Inn has a good resturant and others are located along US 90, including steakhouses and hamburger spots. Research

WHAT IT MEANS TO YOU

Too many of us think "family research" is ju-

st about the past--our ancestors and the facts about them. Wrong! It takes research to learn something "new" also. Look at the problem for instance, if you wanted to organize a national reunion. Before you can invite your relatives, you must find out who and where they are. This requires research. To locate more than 3,000 Woodhams and descendants who we now have addresses for, it took years of very hard work. Through hundreds of letters and phone calls over the years we finally created a mailing list of a few hundred families. Next came hundreds of hours work in libraries all over the South. We made xerox copies of hundreds of telephone books and city directories to get addresses. Since people move often, we must repeat this every year when new books come out. We collected an entire "book" with about 1,000 phone and directory book copies, costing an average 15¢ to 20¢ a page and up to \$2.00 a page if we had to write an out-of-town library to get a copy--not to mention the cost of trips to all those libraries.

All this work means you know only about the Woodhams who are listed--mostly men. To get addresses for married women, you must go to courthouse records and learn who they married; that could take a lifetime of work! By now, you may have guessed it takes far more research to learn about our living relatives than about family history.

What does all this research on living relatives mean to you? It means you are able to have a <u>national</u> reunion and celebrate an event few families are privileged to enjoy; we are blessed with the chance to share our kinship through a <u>national</u> family club and a <u>national</u> family newsletter. Without such research, we could never have held a truly national reunion nor set up a national club and newsletter.

There are still Hundreds of Woodham families across the nation who we have not been able to contact yet. They have never heard of the reunion nor our family club, much less about our family history. Why? It takes money-plain and simple. Postage or phone calls to reach them would take a lot of money and we don't have it to spend. Just to get word to the 3,000 Woodham families we already know of about the reunion every year has become too expensive for us to handle. We are having to send word to fewer and fewer people. And the less who know, the less "national" the reunion will become.

Why spend all this space explaining research? Because we have been criticised in the past for devoting time, effort and money to "research". "We're not going to spend money on research about dead folks. The money's going on the reunion and what's left over, A the newsletter," I was told. When I tried to explain "research" also was for living relatives, so they could be located and told about the national reunion and our family organization, I was told "We already have enough people coming to the reunion anyway." Until I die or am disabled, it will always be my goal to keep on locating and contacting Woodhams and descendants to tell them about our Woodham National Reunion, our heritage and to learn more about our family.

OLDEST WOODHAM DEED RECORDS ARE IN N. C.

The oldest deed records we have located on our Woodham ancestors in America are in North Carolina. Although the Woodhams lived in Virginia for many years before moving to N.C., most of the earliest records for the 1600's have been destroyed. We know they owned land in Virginia but haven't located any deeds there yet. Edward Woodham Senior apparently acquired land in Granville County, NC sometime in the 1740's. He witnessed a deed there, 6 Apr., 1748, in which John Rackley sold land to James McCattens.

A deed dated 6 Dec., 1756, in which Joseph Bridges sold land to James Wilson, mentions that the land joined "Woodhams and Cooks" lines on Tar River".

We have never located a deed or a land grant where Edward bought or was granted this farm in Granville County, nor when he sold it. We hope some day to be able to do more research on this and possibly locate some deeds. However, it now appears that Edward never registered his deed, something early pioneers often failed to do when they did not remain on the land very long.

Unfortunately, all the records with but a few exceptions of Dobbs County, NC have been lost. Edward moved from Granville County to Dobbs about 1757, where he obtained a land grant of 104 acres. A survey of this farm, dated 2 Sept., 1757, is the first we have for our Woodham ancestors in America. In 1757, this area was part of Johnston County but soon became part of the new Dobbs Co. Later Dobbs was split and the area where Edward Jr. livelis part of Lenoir County.today.

A few land grant records are all we have left today to show the Woodhams owned land in Lenoir Co. We hope to do more research on their neighbors there and their land records to learn more about the Woodhams themselves.

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OLDEST WOODHAM MILITARY RECORD IN AMERICA FOUND

The oldest military record ever found on any of our Woodham ancestors was recently located by Robert Earl. The document is a mustor roll of Colonial Militia from Edgecombe County, N. C. It is not dated but is for about the year 1755 or earlier. One of the man listed is Edward Woodham. This is Edward Senior. ancestor of about 99 per cent of the Woodhams from the South. Until now, I had no idea Fdward Sr. had lived Fdgecombe Co., NC Wa tion about this in a later issua. Prior to the 1760's, the number of records on our Woodham ancestors can just about be counted on one hand, they are so few. Finding a "new" record dating from the colonial pariod bafora Amarican independence is a real cause for calabration!

I cannot afford to get a xerox copy of this document right now, so please don't ask for copies yet. We will get a copy as soon as we can. It is one of the most important records ever discovered on our family.

National Family Club

What does a national family club for all members of the Woodham family in America mean to you? A family club is the one and only thing that even has a chance of bringing our family together. When you have hundreds of relatives scattered from coast to coast, it is hard just to locate them all. Certainly it isn't easy to bring us all together. When most of the Woodhams in one county do not even know each other, much less understand we are all relatives, a family club is the only answer. One person surely can't do it alone. Robert Farl spends about 60 to 70 hours a week on all this family "work" but that is not enough. And it is just a hobby for Robert Earl—he is a volunteer and is not paid one cent for his work.

Robert Farl was criticized a few years ago for wanting to spend money on "research". It came from folks who thought that meant looking for dead relatives. We have several thousand families on our mailing list. There are many others waiting to be added to this list as soon as we get a mailing address for them. Right now, if we sent a letter to every Woodham and descendant in the country that we have addresses for, several hundred would be returned because of address changes. All those returned newsletters and mail mean wasted money on postage, printing, etc. Any time we send out large numbers of newsletters, we can expect 10 to 20 per cent will be returned. Yes, it takes research just to have a mailing list. It must be updated often but it something we cannot afford now. Nor can we spend money we don't have to write the hundreds of relatives whom we have never contacted before. It would take several hundred dollars for postage, envolopes, paper, etc. just to contact the ones we haven't reachad bafore. With fawer and fawer contacts, it is only pradictable that fewer and fewer relatives will show up each year at the annual National Reunion.

As we get ready to go into our sixth year, we need to seriously ask ourselves this question: "What does a national family club mean to you?" It is time to take stock in ourselves and in our family club. It is your family and YOUR family club!

CONTACT MADE WITH ANOTHER "LOST TRIBE" OF WOODHAMS

As soon as I finished the story on page 2 about a "Mystery Woodham", I received a long distance call from Wanda Lee Woodham Williams of Arkansas-one of the very same "lost tribe" of Woodhams I was writing about! She is a daughter of Oscar L. Woodham, son of Francis Marion Woodham. Oscar moved from Alabama to Arkansas with his father in the 1890's.

This branch of the Woodhams lost contact with most of the rest of the family over the years and have no idea there are hundreds of other relatives around the country. Nor had they heard of the Woodham National Reunion and nothing about their history. Another lost tribe returns to our Woodham family fold!

"MYSTERY" WOODHAM IDENTIFY REVEALED BY MEMBER OF ONE "LOST TRIBE" OF WOODHAMS By Robert Earl Woodham

Over the years, there have been many cases where trying to identify a particular Woodham has proved an aggravating probme, both for our ancestors and for living relatives. Some of these puzzles can be solved just by calling or writing an unidentified Woodham. That isn't as easy as it sounds, especially when you consider there are hundreds in our family who I still have not contacted. I had to stop making long distance calls years ago because of the expense. For others, we simply cannot get a complete mailing address. For the rest, it would take several hundred dollars for postage, envelopes, etc. to reach them by mail.

Occasionally I do have a major streak of luck. Many branches of our family have spread all over the country. Over the years, they lost contact with other Woodham relatives and today know nothing about their history or other living Woodhams. Many are in isolated rural parts of Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Texas and other areas.

Back in the mid-1970's, I called a family of Woodhams in rural Arkansas who are part of one of our "lost tribes". Unfortunately, I forgot to get mailing addresses, so I could never get back in touch. One of the stories they told me was that a Woodham who was not a member of their immediate family had left Cleburne County, Ark. many years ago and gone to the delta cotton country of Missouri. They could not remember a name.

In 1981, William Fugene ("Gene") Woodham of Parma, Missouri attended the Woodham National Reunion and I again talked to him about this puzzle. I had told him of this earlier by phone and letter but he said he had never known another family of Woodhams in Missouri.

After Gene's death last year, I corresponded with his son Milton Fugene Woodham of Colorado Springs and told him the story.

A few months ago, I finally made contact by letter with another member of the "lost tribe" from Cleburne Co., Eben Winford Woodham. Eben and his wife Helen have been very helpful in providing information on this branch. In one of their letters, an after-thought was added at the bottom of a page: the William Fugene Woodham, whose obituary had been in "THE WOODHAM JOURNAL" had once lived with Fben's father when Gene was a teenager but left and went to the cotton region of Missouri.

After all those years puzzling over the "other" Woodham in Missouri, it turned out to be Gene! Neither Gene nor I ever thought they were talking about him.

Another family "mystery" solved!

The paper turns yellow after about three years.

VARIETY OF RECORDS BECOME IMPORTANT TOOLS FOR KNOWING OUR WOODHAM FAMILY

A carpenter cannot build a house without tools nor can a musician create music without the "tools" of his trade. To know and understand a family, we must also have tools. A large variety of public documents and personal records are the tools of trade for a family historian.

When personal membory of a generation dies out, the only way to learn details about them is from public documents and written personal records. Without some kind of record, there is no way of even knowing whether they are White or nagro, much lass whether they are part of our family.

To know an entire family such as the Woodhams, we must collect many different types of records. Unless someone tells you, the only way to discover who a Woodham married is to find a marriage license. Very often however, marriage licenses simply do not exist: many courthouses have been burned and public records lost for other reasons. In South Carolina, we face the problem that marriage licenses were not required until the turn of this century. In South Alabama, where the largest number of our family have been concentrated now for 150 years, three of the counties have lost all their early records in fires.

When a marriage license does not exist, sometime we can learn who the spouse and children were from a public document such as a deed or will. When a person died, the records of his estate often list the surviving family. Surprisingly, deeds have been one of our best sources of information on the family. Before they die, many people divide their property among their heirs and generations later, this deed becomes the only record of all the members of their immediate family. In many cases, children are given land or other property through doods and were not mentioned in their parent's later wills because they had already received their portion of the estate.

Military records have proved a very valuable source of information. For the 1700's and 1800's, land records (deeds, wills, etc.) and military records are the only public records which still exist today for most of our ancestors. The recent discovery of a military record is the first and only clue so far that our ancestor lived in Edgecombe County, N.C. for a brief time. Pension records of veterans often name members of their families. Muster rolls of army and militia units sometime give age, where born, occupation, physical description and other information.

Since 1900, we are blassed with a much bigger variety of records. Birth and death records began about the time of World War I in most states. These tell us the name of parents, when and where born and when and where died. If your great grandparents died about 1914 and no one alive today knows where they are buried, get a death certificate: it names the cemetery and location. More people acquired Bibles after 1900 and recorded family information in them. Newspapers changed tramendously after WW I and started printing obituaries on most people who died in their community. These may tell you who their parents were, when they were born and where and their spouse and children and other relatives. Papers also started printing wedding notices and births, other good sources of information.

Various clubs (Masons, etc.) and churches also can have records that help us. Another source of "printed" info is your relatives' tombstones. It can be the only place you will find their birth and death dates.

All these records are merely pieces of a bigger puzzle. Alone, they mean little. Together, they form an overall picture showing a single family--spanning more than 325 years of American history.

Have you ever stopped to wonder what all it takes to keep your family club working? Or what it takes to put on your Woodham National Raunion avery year? 
We use a typewriter ribbon once a week (\$2.59), typing corraction fluid (\$1.20), piles of typing paper, stationery, heavy duty paper to tape historical documents and records on to put into notabooks, anvalopas, razor blades to cut out items, scotch tape, notabooks (\$3-\$6), photo albums, pans and pancils, plastic coverings, folders, staples, glue, spray glue, typesetting, postage, rubber bands, xerox copies, paper hole reinforcers, printing, pencil sharpener and a zillion other little and big things. A few people can't shoulder the burden of all this cost alone.

Here is an idea of just some of our basic Deeds:

copying machine (\$1,500 to \$2,400), our most urgent need. A used, reconditioned Xerox of the type we desparately need would be about \$2,200. With our own copier, we could print the newsletter on it and much more often. We could also print (continued on page 4)

Family Donation Makes Possible New Picnic Shelter At Lifsey Springs

On Tuesday, April 5 a dream came true for the descendants of Aris and Amanda Wilson Woodham, That was the day a check was presented to the Pike County Lions Club for the construction of a family picnic shelter at the Club's Lifsey Springs recreation facility so that a reunion could be held there

each year. On September 3, 1840, Aris Woodham and Amanda Melvina Wilson were united in marriage in Pike County with Judge Lifsey officiating. Aris and Amanda lived in the Eppinger's community and raised a family there. Today there are more than forty different surnames of the descendants, names including Gibson, Salter, Butler, Townsend, Drake, Kent, Vessel, Skipper, and many more. They come to

attend the reunion first Sunday of June. from South Carolina, Alabama, and as far away as lowa and

Washington. In 1978, one hundred

years after the death of Amanda Wilson Woodham these descendants held their first reunion at the Lions Club recreation facility at Lifsey Springs. The reunion was so successful that the family decided to try to find a permanent place for the annual gathering. In talking with members of the Pike County Lions Club an agreement was reached that the family would raise the necessary funds to build a picnic shelter such as those that are afready at the site. It would be donated to the Lions Club with the provision that the shelter would be reserved for the Woodham Family Reunion each year on the

The family began formulating plans to raise the necessary funds. Every avenue of fund raising was explored and tested: the sale of kitchen knives. raffting of quilts, and donations from family members. The one plan that got the ball rolling was conducting yard sales. Yard sales were held twice each year at the home of one of the members in LaGrange.

The goal was reached on this last Easter weekend. The family will now have a permanent place to gather so that they may honor their ancestors and share love and respect for one another. The family prays that this deed will help to perpetuate the cause of family unity and restore the moral fiber that helps everyone to recognize and appreciate their heritage.

WORLD WAR I SELECTIVE SERVICE RECORDS

Military records of every kind are important items to preserve on our family. Until World War I, few records were kept on men in military service and much of those that were written have been lost over the years.

Conscription, or drafting men into military service, has been practiced by nations since civilization began. Drafts were used during the War Between the States (1861-1865) by both the Confederate States and the northern government. However, World War I was the first time in our nation's history that every able-bodied man was required by law to actually register for the draft and complete records kept. A Selective Service law was passed 18 May, 1917 and registration began soon. All men between ages 18 and 45 had to sign up. More than 24,234,021 men registered during the war.

Not all these men served in the armed forces but the fact every man had to register means today we have records on more of our accestors than for any other previous period in our history. Each man had to fill out a Selective Service card. I even found one card on a young man who was in a come and dying. His doctor filled out the card. Each card listed the man's name, date of birth, age and address.

The cards varied in style during the war and some had more information than others. Most give the man's occupation, next of kin, marital status, number of dependents, employer and where born.

It is remarkable for many of us to learn from these SS cards that some of our grand-fathers or great grandfathers, who we know only as elderly, grey haired men, actually had blond, red or dark black hair. I never know my mother's father was red headed until I found his SS card!

These WW I SS cards are valuable to us today for many reasons. First, they are records from an important period in our Nation's history. They are also precious to us for giving us rare information on so many of our ancestors. For many Woodhams, they are the only public document remaining today which show this information.

Many of these Selective Service cards are for men born in the 1870's and today represent ancestors born well over a hundred years ago.

The cards are the only clue as to when many of our ancestors were born.

The draft cards for the entire nation are stored at the National Archives and Records Center in Atlanta. The cards have been microfilmed and now officials say the originals may be destroyed to "save space."

The Family Club is trying to make xerox copies of the original cards before they are destroyed because the microfilm turned out bad and copies cannot be made from much of it.

small booklots and books on it, such as the "WOODHAM FAMILY INDEX". This would be the best "tool" we could have to help reunite our family. As a bonus, we could use it to copy important historical documents in courthouses around the nation. office typewriter (used, \$600 to \$800). We need a good, used IBM office typewriter or equivalent type brand. We do about twice the amount of typing in a week as the average business office typist. We critically need a sturdy, business office typewriter to handle this load of typing and to make our newsletter and permanent records look half decent.

notabooks (wa could use 50 right now) Many of our practicus family records from all over the nation must now be stored in boxes because we just don't have the money to spare for notabooks, scrapbooks and photo albums.

odds and ands We need heavy duty paper, scotch tape and paper hole reinforcers, typing paper, stationery, envelopes, typewriter ribbons to keep working.

bookcases, filing cabinets and desk (used office desk, \$75 to \$100; used filing cabinets, \$45-\$65) We are in dire need of a used office desk to work on. Right now, all your work is done for you on an old 1950's dresser that's way too small; we need more bookcases to store our family records as well as one or two more filing cabinets.

IS THERE SOMEONE AMONG ALL THE WOODHAM FAMILY WHO CAN BUY US A COPYING MACHINE?

We do not ask for a gift--maraly a loan. If you can afford to buy us a used copier, the family club will repay you over the next five years or so with annual payments.

Our need for a copying machine is so great that it can very well mean the difference of survival or death of our family club and the Woodham National Reunion. Our future, good or bad, depends on having the basic tools to work with. With good tools we can reunite our family. Without them, our hands are tied.

Robert Earl is more than willing to supply all the work. But he needs the "tools" to work with. You must supply them.

Woodham Heritage... OUR NAMES...

Considering the fact there have been less than 12,000 Woodham and Woodhams (with an S) in America since the 1600's (a "small" family compared to most), we have an uncommon family na I grew up in Southwest Georgia knowing few Woodhams. Even after I did learn of a few other Robert Woodhams, I was still confident there couldn't be another Robert Earl. Imagine my shock to learn there were three others, one of whom married in Seminole County, Ga.--where I was born! To date, I have found 83 Robert Woodhams! And that doesn't include middle names.

The most popular names in our family are John ("Johnny") (123 known) and Mary (179). Others include (first names only) James ("Jim", "Jimmy") 99, William ("Will", "Willie") 98, Ann ("Annie") 63, Martha 55, Elizabeth 48, Thomas 41, Frances ("Fannie") and Francis (male) 35, Charles 34, Margaret ("Maggie") 32, Nancy 32, Susan 30 and 28 Edward and 4 Edwin.

The popularity of names changes with time. Thus, Minnia (20) was popular in the 1880's but none are known born since the 1920's. All 29 Michaels were born since 1940. Many Woodhams have been named for popular leaders, entertainment figures, etc.: Woodrow Wilson 2, Benjamin Tillman 3, George Washington 4, John Wayne 3, Calvin Coolidge 2, William Cody 3, Dewey 3, Robert Lee 5, John Wesley 13, Andrew Jackson, Chester Arthur, Ulysses Grant, Buster Brown, Johnny Mack, Martin Van Buren and Grover Cleveland.

We also have our share of unusual names: Talitha Cumi, Vacubi, Acwen Eulene, Beacher Foney, Athanasius, Pliney Othel, Aradoria, Fonzer Lee, Evitus Mylus, Shofner Alfonsa, Reedus Ozias, Hessie Joshua, Mallie Maxaline, Hoyt Lathaniel, Cora Juanzetta, Wright Pleasant, Elzie Vadis, Pryor Zemri, Zada Belzonia, Emma Buena Vista, Houghlon Mildridge, Veto Clinton, Pilly Outher, Zenobia Aurora, Blunia, Pheriba Lazinia, Hiram Dellon Sweeny, Zinnamon Sollie, Loujeania Vadella, Leotis, Zelma Una, Reaola and Veetus Lenwood, to name a few. The longest name I know of is Asa Flinn Wilson Q. Beaty-known as "Beaty W." Woodham.

We are just as bad about nicknames as other families. We have the usual Bill, Jimmy, Joe, Betty, Katie and Charley and a lot of unusual ones: Eck (Escar Verbie), Atha (Athanasius), Doll Baby, C. C. (Edward Christopher), Topper, Zee, Skeet, Beat, Happy, Woody (many), Pinch-Bunk, Berry (Asbury and Emberry), Dego and Boo. We have badly corrupted some names: Billy Joe (William Joseph), Acey, Acie, Auzy, Ezzie (Asa), Billy Auzy (William Asa), Garley Ozies (Isaiah), Lizzie, Liza (Elizabeth), Causel (Caswell), Ollon (Allen), Hurlie, Hollie (Hillary & Harley), Oph, Olphy (Theophilus), Joe Annie (Joanna), Orris (Aeis), Yuel, Euel (Ewell), Cage (Micajah), Laurie Ace (Asa Lorenzo), Athan Nathan Gehu (Athanatius Jehu), Laney (Elaine), Alston (Austin), Mode (Moses) and many others.

There are 10 known James Edward Woodhams. Six of these have fathers named Bill Edward, John Edward, James Edward (2) and Jesse Edward. There have been 22 John Edward, 5 with fathers named John. In 1913, two John Henry were born; in 1929, two Jack were born, both in Covington Co., Ala.! There have been at least 8 named John Thomas. In the 1970's, I made many long-distance calls to get family information. I was faced with chaos trying to "identify" many of them or ancestors who had similar names. I needed to straighten them out fast to save expensive phone time. I started to make an ordinary list of all Woodhams that might someday be the index of a book on our family. So many relatives with the same first name eventually led me to add more and more information.

What resulted is a totally unique type of index, different from any other ever published on any family. The system I invented lists every person with the same family name, giving full names, nicknames and maiden names of wives. Since many of us go by middle names or nicknames, it is cross-referenced with all those I know of. The year and place born is listed and the father or husband. With this index, you can trace any Woodham's direct family line all the way back to our first ancestor in America. You can also learn how you are related to every other Woodham.

The Index (about 120 pages) has some 7,000 listings, including cross references. It does not include every Woodham. There are still many scattered around the nation that I have not been able to contact yet and some who are too stuck up or lazy to bother sending family information. However, it is still the most comprehensive family index ever compiled on an entire family.

The "WOODHAM FAMILY INDEX" will be printed just as soon as we are able to buy the copying machine. Any profit from this project will be used to buy more family records, supplies, etc. The price of \$25 per copy was set by family vote at a South Carolina reunion.

Adrian also found Robert Earl working up to 16 hours a day on "family work" on a 2 foot high chest of drawers, not big enough for a typewriter and open book. She told her daughter, Mrs. Sandra Lombardi. Sandra located a desk and she and her husband devoted hours to refurbish it. They took a full sized door, covered it with formica and turned it into a large desk top. For the past 25 years, Robert Earl has used borrowed desks, dressers, apple crates, the tiny chest and the floor to work on. This is the first time in his life we have ever had a desk to call our own.

Now, your family work--answering mail, typing records, putting together and addressing newsletters and other work, can be done much faster and far more comfortably!

Last but not least, someone came by Robert Earl's mother's home in Columbus and donate a boxful of notebooks and file folders. His mother was in the hospital and his stepfather failed to get the name of the person. So all we know is that "someone from way off" brought them by.

Moodham Heritage

By Robert Earl Woodham The Woodham Family Historian

Many Woodhams and descendants today are living on land acquired in the 1800's as a state land grant or a federal homestead. Most of us have no idea how these farms and home sites came into the family.

Originally, all the land in Alabama was owned by the State of Georgia. Georgia ceded her western territory to the federal government. After that, the land was distributed by the government to settlers as homesteads or outright cash sales. These were sold at very low cost to encourage settlers to move to the frontier.

We know that Woodhams received state land grants in North Carolina, Georgia and Texas. Some won their land in Georgia in lotteries held to distribute land taken from the Indians. Woodhams also received federal homesteads in Florida, Alabama and perhaps other states.

The oldest Woodham land grant record we have found is a survey plat for 104 acres of land in the Colony of North Carolina, dated 2 Sept., 1757, when Edward Woodham Senior filed an application for a land grant. The land was in Dobbs (now Lenoir) County.

The first homestead in Alabama for our family was made by Aris Woodham Jr. He filed for a homestead in Dale County on 23 Mar., 1836. His uncle, Edward Harley Woodham Sr., filed for one in Dale Co. on 14 Apr., 1836 and Aris' brother, Athanasius, filed on 12 Nov. in Henry County.

In Alabama and some other states, Federal Land Offices disposed of public land through cash sales and low-priced homesteads. Aris Jr. paid \$105 for his 80 acres. The price of federal homesteads varied over the years, from as low as 25 cents an acre to about \$1.25 an acre. By knowing when they acquired the land, it halps us learn when our ancestors first settled in an area. Pioneers would move into an area, locate vacant land and settle on it. It might be several months or over a year before they finally bought or actually obtained legal title to the land.

Unfortunately, federal land records of Arkansas, Louisiana and some other states are not listed alphabetically. The only way to locate the records is to know the section, range and township numbers of the land. So we have not been able to locate any in those or any Western states so far.

When we mail a newsletter to every Woodham relative we have an address for, it cost about \$525 in 1979. Next month, it will cost about \$770—a whopping increase of \$245 just for one issue. Needless to say, we can't send a newsletter to everybody every time.

Add to that, postage for regular correspondence and you have one heck of a postage bill. If we cut down the letters we write to just 100 a month, that would still be \$264 a year.

Please, in the future, when you write us, send along a long, self-addressed, stamped envelope. This will certainly help us cut down on our postage bill.

CLUB MEMBERSHIP GROWS

Membership in the Woodham Family Club has reached the largest number this year since 1981. As of December, we now have 54 paid members and one life honorary member. Our fiscal year begins at each National Reunion held every Memorial Day in May. Since we still have five more months, the outlook is good for the family club becoming a healthy, growing organization again.

In 1981, when the club split up, we had to start all over again—without funds to work with. Lack of funds cut the frequency of newsletters down severely as well as the number of copies we could print. Without enough newsletters, many relatives did not renew memberships and very few new ones were added.

In 1984, we sent out two mass mailings of newsletters to more than 2,500 relatives and it sure has helped. It was expensive but it has made the difference.

As of now, we have members for 1984-85 who live in Alabama (26), Georgia (9), Florida (5), South Carolina (3), New Jersey (1), Kansas (1), Arkansas (3), Texas (2), Pennsylvania (1), Arizona (1) and California (1). We are also counting as members those relatives who have sent in donations to buy the copying machine.



Arabella Woodham

One of the many "missing" family groups of the Woodham family is that of Arabella Woodham. This is a classical situation whereby relatives move to different parts of the country and their descendants lose contact with the rest of the family.

Arabella was born in 1868 in Chambers County, Ala., daughter of Aris and Amanda Wilson Woodham. Aris was the son of Edward and Clarissa Woodham. Aris lived most of his li e in S.C., Upson Co., Ga. and Heard Co., Ga.

The courthouse in Heard Co., where Arabella grew up, burned in the 1890's and all records were lost. Because of this, we know very little about the daughters of Aris.

Fannie Belle Woodham Kendrick, a daughter of E.D. Woodham and granddaughter of Aris, said Arabella married Joe Mc-Whorter and lived at Bowdon, Ga.

If you are aware of any living descendants of Arabella and Joe McWhorter, please let us know. We do not know any of her children.

Moodham Heritage

To most folks today, Edward Christ-Lopher ("E.C.", "C.C.", "Chris") Woodham would not seem a very noteworthy person. He probably wasn't.

He did not accumulate great wealth. He never accomplished anything extraordinary. He never gained fame. He was illiterate. He was a farmer on a modest scale and a typical Southerner of his time...what you might call the "average Joe".

Yet were it not for Chris Woodham, several hundred descendants would not exist today. He was born about 1824 in what is no Lee County, SC, son of Aris Woodham Jr. When just a boy, Chris came with his father and family to the frontier of Southeast Alabama. He grew up in Dale County.

He married Joanna ("Jody", "Jodie", "Joe Annie") Riley, daughter of John and Mary Riley. They had at least ten children:

Cynthia (born 1845); John Wesley (b. 1847), married Eliza A.; Moses ("Mode") (1848-1907), m Elizabeth V. Peacock; William (1850); Ira Edward (1854-1938) m Millie Ann Enfinger; Thomas L. (1856-1891) m Nellie E. Enfinger; Joseph Christopher ("Joe") (1858-1945) m Rhoda Mae Andrews; Uriah Daniel (1861-), m Sarah Frances Woodham, daughter of Presley Nelson Woodham; Jasper Richard (1863-1936) m Laura F. Woodham, daughter of Edward Harley Woodham Jr.; and Carrie Elizabeth (1864-), m J. B. Andrews.

Nothing else is known of Cynthia, William and Carrie. John Wesley died young in the 1870's I believe. The remaining six sons produced a large number of descendants, scattered throughout the nation today. Joe moved to Rapides Parish, La. in the 1890's and has many descendants today in Louisiana and Texas. The other children of Chris remained in Alabama. Chris and Joanna had at least 64 known grandchildren and more than 200 great grandchildren. And therein lies Chris' claim to destiny. By sheer numbers, the descendants of Chris have ensured continuation of the family name.

Chris moved to frontier Cherokee Co., Tex. in the early 1850's and later to Anderson Co., Tex. before moving back to Dale Co. about 1860.

He was drafted into the Confederate Army in 1863 and on 11 Oct., at age 40, was enlisted in the "Henry Pioneers", Company G, 15th Alabama Regiment of Infantry. During the War Between the States, a man could pay someone else to take their place. On 15 Aug., 1864, Chris' son John Wesley enlisted as a substitute for his father. John's age was first listed as 16, then struck through and listed as 17. The Army kept Chris anyway. He served in Tennessee and Virginia. Chris' brother, Ira Aris, enlisted as a substitute for Chris and died in a yankee prison at Elmira, NY.

After the war, Joanna and Chris separated. He turned over their farm to her and his children. On 30 Oct., 1867 at Bainbridge, Ga., he married Louesta Kennedy and moved to central Florida.

My great uncle, Lon Woodham, told me that when he was about 6 or 7 years old, he went with his father Ira Edward to visit his grandfather Chris at Arcadia, Fla. This would have been about 1907-8. Lon said he could remember that Chris had "two boys".

To date, I have not been able to learn any more information about his children by his second marriage.

No one has been able to tell me when or where Chris died nor where he is buried. Since I have never been able to visit that area of Florida to do research, Chris' later years still remain a mystery.

Apparently the shock of divorce and remarriage caused a complete severance of most relations by the family.

Joanna remained in Dale Co. with her children. One of the oldest deeds on record in Dale Co. is one dated 1876, when Chris signed over the farm to Joanna. The Dale courthouse burned the 1880's and all records were destroyed. This deed was re-recorded after the fire. Jodie is buried at the Woodham Cemetery at Newton.

One of the major got als of the Woodham Family Club is to gather and preserve a copy of every type record we can find on our family, including newspaper and magazine articles. PLEASE help us in this effort. Clip out articles you see in your hometown paper which even mention a Woodham or descendant and send to us. If you have old articles you have saved over the years, PLEASE make xerox copies and send these to the Family Club.

These newspaper articles are preserved in our Woodham Family National Library along with our other family records. We now have more than 30 notebooks and scrapbooks full of news articles. They are arranged bu subject: books of marriage notices, engagements, two on society news, military news, the Woodham National Reunion, three on school news, three on sports, two of obituaries and many on regular news.

Over the years, Woodham Family Historian Robert Earl Woodham has spent hundreds of dollars to buy copies of newspaper articles from courthouses, libraries and archives. Some copies cost \$5 a page. These articles can be used by fut-

ure generations to remember and learn more about us today.

We consider newspaper obituaries to be one of the most important kind of record we preserve on the Family. We want to get copies of every obituary ever written on every Woodham in the nation. Most obituaries include a person's age and sometimes their date of birth; this may be the only record we can find about when and where a person was born. From obituaries, we can also learn what church relatives were members, organizations and clubs they belonged to, if they were a veteran, employment and most important of all, a list of their sur-The passing of time fades memory and who a relative's sisters and brothers and chidren were and who they married can be forgotten. preserves this information.

In the good old days, families helped each other with quilting parties, corn huskings, pea shellings, house and barn raisings. We still have barbecues, showers, block parties, fund raisers and lots of wonderful occasions to help each other.

Well, kinfolks, we are proud to announce THE bridal shower, corn husking and fish fry of all time for the Woodham family! A strong effort has begun to raise money for a copying machine to print our newsletters, books and copy family records. This is the most important step taken by our family since the National Reunion was founded in 1979.

Our "party" has already begun, thanks to cousin Adrian Hundley Roper, daughter of the late Tessie Inez Woodham. Adrian wanted to do something as a memorial to her mother and a tribute to the family. She visited Robert Tarl and saw the mountain of records he has

collected and saw he urgently needed decent "tools"--a copying machine and typewriter--to use in his volunteer work for the family. Woodham Heritage... OUR NAMES.

Considering the fact there have been less than 12,000 Woodham and Woodhams (with an S) in Amorica since the 1600's (a "small" family compared to most), we have an uncommon family na I grow up in Southwest Georgia knowing few Woodhams. Even after I did learn of a few other Robert Woodhams, I was still confident there couldn't be another Robert Earl. Imagine my shock to learn there were three others, one of whom married in Seminole County, Ga.--where I was born! To date, I have found 83 Robert Woodhams! And that doesn't include middle names.

The most popular names in our family are John ("Johnny") (123 known) and Mary (179). Others include (first names only) James ("Jim", "Jimmy") 99, William ("Will", "Willie") 98, Ann ("Annia") 63, Martha 55, Elizabeth 48, Thomas 41, Frances ("Fannia") and Francis (mala) 35,

Charles 34, Margaret ("Maggie") 32, Nancy 32, Susan 30 and 28 Edward and 4 Edwin.

The popularity of names changes with time. Thus, Minnie (20) was popular in the 1880's but none are known born since the 1920's. All 29 Michaels were born since 1940. Many Woodhams have been named for popular leaders, entertainment figures, etc.: Woodrow Wilson 2, Benjamin Tillman 3, George Washington 4, John Wayne 3, Calvin Coolidge 2, William Cody 3, Dewey 3, Robert Lee 5, John Wesley 13, Andrew Jackson, Chester Arthur, Ulysses Grant, Buster Brown, Johnny Mack, Martin Van Buren and Grover Claveland.

We also have our share of unusual names: Talitha Cumi, Vacubi, Acwen Eulene, Beacher Foney, Athanasius, Pliney Othel, Aradoria, Fonzer Lee, Evitus Mylus, Shofner Alfonsa, Reedus Ozias, Hassia Joshua, Mallia Maxalina, Hoyt Lathanial, Cora Juanzatta, Wright Plassant, Elzie Vadis, Pryor Zemri, Zada Belzonia, Emma Buena Vista, Houghlon Mildridge, Veto Clinton, Pilly Outher, Zenobia Aurora, Blunia, Pheriba Lazinia, Hiram Dellon Sweeny, Zinnamon Sollie, Loujeania Vadella, Leotis, Zelma Una, Reaola and Vestus Lenwood, to name a few. The longest name I know of is Asa Flinn Wilson Q. Boaty-known as "Boaty W." Woodham.

We are just as bad about nicknames as other families. We have the usual Bill, Jimmy, Joe, Betty, Katie and Charley and a lot of unusual ones: Eck (Escar Verbie), Atha (Athanasius), Doll Baby, C. C. (Edward Christopher), Topper, Zee, Skeet, Beat, Happy, Woody (many), Pinch, Bunk, Berry (Asbury and Emberry), Dego and Boo. We have badly corrupted some names: Billy Joe (William Joseph), Acey, Acie, Auzy, Ezzie (Asa), Billy Auzy (William Asa), Garley Ozies (Isaiah), Lizzia, Liza (Elizabeth), Causal (Caswall), Ollon (Allan), Hurlia, Hollia (Hillary & Harley), Oph, Olphy (Theophilus), Jos Annis (Joanna), Orris (Asis), Yual, Euel (Ewell), Cage (Micajah), Laurie Ace (Asa Lorenzo), Athan Nathan Gehu (Athanatius Jehu), Laney (Elaine), Alston (Austin), Mode (Moses) and many others.

There are 10 known James Edward Woodhams. Six of these have fathers named Bill Edward, John Edward, James Edward (2) and Jesse Edward. There have been 22 John Edward, 5 with fathers named John. In 1913, two John Henry were born; in 1929, two Jack were born, both in Covington Co., Ala.! There have been at least 8 named John Thomas. In the 1970's, I made many longdistance calls to get family information. I was faced with chaos trying to "identify" many of them or ancestors who had similar names. I needed to straighten them out fast to save expensive phone time. I started to make an ordinary list of all Woodhams that might someday be the index of a book on our family. So many relatives with the same first name eventually led me to add more and more information.

What resulted is a totally unique type of index, different from any other ever published on any family. The system I invented lists every person with the same family name, giving full names, nicknames and maiden names of wives. Since many of us go by middle names or nicknames, it is cross-referenced with all those I know of. The year and place born is listed and the father or husband. With this index, you can trace any Woodham's direct family line all the way back to our first ancestor in America. You can also learn how you are related to every other Woodham.

The Index (about 120 pages) has some 7,000 listings, including cross references. not include every Woodham. There are still many scattered around the nation that I have not been able to contact yet and some who are too stuck up or lazy to bother sending family information. However, it is still the most comprehensive family index ever compiled on an entir family.

The "WOODHAM FAMILY INDEX" will be printed just as soon as we are able to buy the copying machine. Any profit from this project will be used to buy more family records, supplies, etc. The price of \$25 per copy was set by family vote at a South Carolina reunion.



Editorial

It isn't right

There comes a time in every person's life when you must stand up for what
is right and speak out against wrong. Families must stick together—this is
what I have been preaching for years. But when some kinsmen wrong other kinfolk, then we must denounce such acts lest the wrong fester and its corrupting influence further divide our family.

Such a time has now come. I must take a stand along with many others who voice their strong complaints against the actions of those kinfolks who met at Eufaula, Ala. in May and gave away hundreds of dollars donated to the Woodham family. The small number of kinfolk attending voted to turn over all the money in their treasury—well over one thousand dollars—to the

Gideon Bible Society.

This was announced in a letter sent to some Woodham relatives. I have not seen the letter and have been told only its highlights which are: the remainder of a small group of relatives who broke away from the rest of the family back in 1981 decided to dissolve what was left of their group, the Woodham Family Association Inc. (Ala.). That group took control of the treasury in 1980 and refused to allow any funds for family research, to buy more family records, to print the family newsletter, for postage or anything else. They retained control of the treasury funds when most of us walked out and started all over. That group printed a few newsletters. They sponsored a family cookbook with a lot of hoopla over their proposal to offer scholarships with the profits. They sold advertisements and took donations.

No scholarships were ever awarded. The people who paid for the cookbooks

thought they were giving money to benefit the WOODHAM family.

Those folks who paid cash to advertise in the cookbooks also thought they were doing something good for the WOODHAM family.

Those of you who donated funds for a family reunion thought you were help

ing your family.

All the hundreds of dollars that group collected "for the Woodham family" has never bought one single family record to be preserved; all that money has never copied one single family photo to preserve for future generations; the money you gave will never be used for another Woodham family reunion; the money will never be used to sponsor books about our family; nor will it ever help restore a single Woodham cemetery or grave. In fact, not one cent of all that money you gave will ever benefit our Woodham family.

The handful of relatives responsible for this act have shocked the rest of the family. Everyone we have heard from has questioned their motives. There were no "good" intentions on their part when they took this large amount of money-given by Woodhams for the Woodham family-and turned it over to anoth-

er organization. I frankly believe this was done out of pure spite.

This group did accomplish something: they destroyed the first national family club ever founded for our family. They also succeeded in dividing the Woodham Family; and they disgraced themselves and brought shame on all our family.

Woodhams have reacted so far with expressions ranging from shock, disgust, outrage and several who said they were just plain "mad as hell". Right is right and wrong is wrong. No amount of sugar syrup can cover up the foulness of this deed. The Woodham family has been lied to and ripped off: in legal parlance, it's called "theft by deception".

If you have given money to that group in the past, intending it to be used for the benefit of the Woodham family, you have the right to demand your money be returned to you: if you gave them money to join the Association; if you gave money for a cookbook; if you advertised in the cookbook; if you donated money for a reunion; or any other kind of donation, you have the right to protest this deceitful use of your money.

The last officers of this group that we know of were Marjorie Johnson, Pat

Woodham and Cupidean Dubose, all of Opp, Alabama.



Moodham Heritage

Robert Earl Woodham Woodham Family Historian

EVERAL hundred descendants of the Woodham family can trace their ancestry to Asa Woodham, one of only two male Woodhams to stay in South Carolina when the rest of the family moved to the "western frontier" in Alabama during the 1830's.

Asa and his brother Stephen remained in the Stokes Bridge Community throughout their lives. They were later joined by their nephew, John Edward ("John Alabama") who was the only Woodham to move back to S.C. from Alabama.

Asa was a son of Aris Woodham Senior and Rachel Beasley. He was born 3 July, 1795 in that part of Darlington County which later became part of Lee County. When Aris Sr. died, he willed his wife and son Asa the homeplace and another tract of land totaling 234 acres; Aris also left Rachel and Asa the Woodham grist mill and cotton gin, two very profitable businesses in that age. His grandfather Edward Woodham Junior also helped Asa get started with gifts, including several slaves.

Asa married Elaine Elizabeth ("Laney", "Lanie") Dubose about 1820. She was a daughter of Peter Dubose Jr. and Elaine Worthington. Asa and Laney had at least 10 children (see family sheet). Their oldest child, Mahalia, died in childbirth at age 16. A son Jehu, also apparently died young; daughter

Marjorie Ann ("Marjary") also died 📏 Asa's son Jarrett (Jarot, Jaret, Jared) had only one son. Nothing is known of Asa's daughter Mary except that she married a Mixon. Pheriba Jane (Fereby) married Simpson Skinner and had at least 7 children (sons Asa Edward, Thomas and William Skinner). Hugh Middleton and his wife had no surviving children. They raised his nephew Jehu Middleton Woodham. Johnathan Edward and Sarah Martin Bruce had at least 12 children with two dying as infants and another daughter dying young. Harriett S. ("Hattie") and her husband William E. Hearon had 4 children (Nancy Elaine married Charles Welborn Woodham).

Asa left a considerable estate to his family. On the 1860 US Census, he is shown with real estate valued at \$5,250 and personal property worth \$11,980--well above average for that time in Darlington County (average real estate was less than \$1,000 and most people had less than \$500 worth of property).

Asa is buried in the historic Wood-ham Family Cemetery, located on land willed to him by his father. His tombstone has been destroyed along with most others so we do not know when he died. From his estate records, we know he died about Dec., 1870 or Jan., 1871. From the existing records I have found on Asa, he appears to have been a highly respected member of his community. An ancestor we can all be proud of.

- sponsor publication of books and photo albums to preserve our family history and make it available to all who want to know about their heritage.



Moodham Heritage

by Robert Earl Woodham Woodham Family Historian

Very often, the only remains of a person's life is their grave marker. This is especially true of many ancestors during the 1800's and of relatives who died young. As a result, a tombstone may be the only evidence of the life and death of our kinfolks.

Since one of the main goals of the Family Association is to preserve memory of our relatives, we must therefore gather information from every source. Not only must we gather this information but we must make sure it is passed on to future generations.

Birth and death records were not begun in the South until well after World War I; many people died or were born without a death or birth certificate being filed. If they never married, owned land or left an estate, no courthouse record may have been left by them. Many courthouse records have been destroyed by fire and thus records that did exist may have been lost. Dale County, Alabama has the largest concentration of Woodhams in the nation. All courthouse records there prior to 1880 were destroyed; the oldest records in Covington, Coffee, Geneva and Randolph counties, Alabama have also been destroyed.

All too often, our ancestors were buried in graves with only simple wooden crosses or stakes to mark the site. I recall a few years ago when some unthinking folks called themselves "cleaning up" a cemetery in Covington County, Ala. They removed all the rotting wooden crosses—dozens of them because they didn't look "pretty", I suppose. Later, the church tried to make a survey of all the lots where someone was buried but could not because so many wooden markers had been removed.

Even stone or cement tombstones are not "permanent". I have seen thousands of tombstones so worn that inscriptions can no longer be read, not even the names. As if the natural elements wearing down tombstones were not enough, we also have to contend with largescale destruction of entire cemeteries today. The oldest marked Woodham graves in America were destroyed a few years ago when someone leasing the property removed all the historic grave markers and plowed over the cemetery. Only parts of two tombstones have been preserved. Developers throughout the nation are wiping out cemeteries every day in spite of laws against this desecration.

You can help us preserve cemetery records on your relatives by visiting graveyards in your area and copying down inscriptions to be preserved in the Woodham Family National Library. Do not copy such phrases as "Rest in Peace", etc. but do copy everything else. Copy the tombstones of every Woodham and descendant of a Woodham in the cemetery, including Woodham women, their husbands and children. Please give directions to the cemetery from the nearest town, what county it is in, the full name of the cemetery or church and the date you took the census (or list of burials).

From time to time in the future, we will print lists of burials in the family newsletter. Although most of the cemeteries in Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina with large numbers of Woodham relatives have already been copied by Robert Earl, there is still much to be done. There is no way we can afford to visit Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi and other states to get cemetery records; and one person couldn't do this in one lifetime anyway, even if the money were available. We must have your

help or information on Woodham burials will be lost--every day.

HOW WE DO IT: all the work that goes into the annual reunion, gathering family records, printing the newsletters and other projects is donated. No one gets paid—we are all volunteers who work for love of our family. The cost of the reunion, newsletters, office supplies, buying copies of family records, correspondence and a host of other expenses is paid for with your annual family club membership dues and donations.

You will find the old-fashioned spelling and language of the records sounding strang but you will also find they help bring our fathers and mothers of long ago alive for us today. We hope the book will give you a greater understanding of our past and a better insight into our future, while instilling a sense of pride in you for your Woodham heritage.


Letters

All these organizations are fine and worthy of attention. But none are more important than your own family.

Both the Dale County Woodham Cemetery at Newton, Alabama and the Woodham Cemetery near Bishopville, South Carolina became all but forgotten because no recent burials have been held at either one. As a result, even most of the grandchildren of those buried there have died and thus relatives today no longer remember these ancestors. The Dale County Woodham Cemetery became overgrown while the South Carolina Woodham Cemetery was plowed over.

Restoration work began in Noy., 1987 on the Alabama cemetery which was founded in the 1840's or earlier by the Woodham family on Woodham land. A permanent Cemetery Committee was formed to sponsor restoration and provide future maintenance.

Restoring the cemetery was not easy. A small but devoted group of Woodham relatives and descendants of friends and neighbors buried here worked very hard, donating their labor and funds.

Among the accomplishments so far:
Cleanup. Numerous organized
cleanings were held with up to 30
or 40 people (some as old as 91)
taking up tools to chop down undergrowth, weeds and vines that choked
the site. Although some graves were
surrounded by bricks, they could
not be seen because of years of
accumulated dead leaves and vines.

Fence. A chain link fence was erected around the cemetery with all labor donated by descendants of folks buried here. Cost: about \$2,000.

Sign. A beautiful wrought metal sign was manufactured at a cost of \$750. It states "Woodham Cemetery, Founded 1847". This forms an arch over the gateway entrance.

Water well. A water well was drilled and a pump installed to provide water for the lawn and flowers as well as drinking water.

Picnic shed. A picnic pavillion was constructed this spring so that gatherings of the family and friends can be held on the site. It was completed just in time for the second Decoration Day. This is an annual event now, sponsored by the Cemetery Committee to honor our relatives buried here; graves are marked with flowers and an old-fashioned picnic is held. The picnic shed has a cement foundation and was constructed by relatives with their donated labor.

Rest rooms. Two rest rooms and a septic tank were installed. They are part of the picnic shed and help make public gatherings such as Decoration Day possible and help accommodate out of town visitors.

Tombstones. Ten new tombstones have been erected on graves which had none. Three of these mark the graves of Aris Woodham Jr., Athanasius Woodham and their uncle, Edward H. Woodham Sr. Every Woodham descendant with ties to south Alabama is a descendant of one of these three men. Unknown graves have been marked temporarily with painted cement blocks.

Landscaping. A nice grass lawn has replaced the jungle of weeds and vines. It took three plantings due to drought and a flood. Fifty azaleas and numerous other shrubs and ornamental trees have been planted. Many more are planned now that water is available.

A few kinfolks have said they were not interested in taking part in restoring the Woodham cemeteries. Most of these used the feeble excuse they did not know the people buried there. Sadly, there are a lot of Woodham relatives who don't know who their ancestors were—and don't give a hoot. If they don't give a confound who their great grandparents were, they certainly don't care whether their graves are kept decent.

The next time a Woodham relative dies, remember the FAMILY first and memorialize their memory with a donation to the two Woodham cemeteries.

No work has been done yet on the Woodham Cemetery near Bishopville, SC. A chain link fence will be needed, tombstones for all graves, including the "mother" and "father" of all the Woodhams from the South, signs, flowers and other basic necessities to get the site restored.

There are only a small number of Woodhams left in Lee County: they cannot do this job alone. If you are a descendant of a Woodham, this is YOUR family cemetery. We need your help to make this a respectable cemetery once again.

NOTICE

BEWARE!! Another shyster outfit has sprung up to prey upon the public's hunger for owledge about their family heritage for news of their living relatives. This time it is a "pickpocket" organization called "The Family News" and operating out of Midvale, Utah.

They are selling subscriptions to a new newsletter called "The Woodham Family News" which they claimed would contain Woodham news, obituaries, weddings, family history, etc. They are also selling "The National Registry of Living Woodhams, 1991 Edition".

Well, their first newsletter which we have just received doesn't have a single word about any Woodham. Dated "Summer, 1991" at Midvale, Utah, this publication turns out to be a worthless piece of trash. There isn't a single obituary; not one wedding announcement; nor one word of fact about our family history.

And their "National Registry of Living Woodhams" turns out to contain a lot of dead, not living, Woodhams. It is merely

a list of names and addresses they got from telephone books and nothing else. As for it being a "1991 Edition", this too, is misleading. Our Woodham family Historian, Robert Earl Woodham, is listed in this Registry, with an address he moved from back in early 1987. He has lived in Dothan, Alabama since February, 1989. Several dozen of the "Living" Woodhams listed have been dead for up to 10 years or more.

This kind of ripoff has been going on for many years, starting back in the 1960's. One of the most notorious and probably the worst has been Beatrice Bailey Inc. of Pennsylvania. This organization sold "Family Heritage" books purporting to be your family history but which actually contained nothing more about your family than a list of names and address from telephone books. These "heritage" books were being sold for \$29.95. The company has been ordered to cease operations by several states. They have changed names several times.

This new outfit in Utah is made of the same cloth. They are not related to the Woodham family and should be regared as crooked.

NOTICE

nobert Earl Woodham has suffered a series of heart attacks which almost cost him his life this past spring. Robert Earl is our Woodham family Historian and Woodham Family Association President.

Robert Earl, a resident of Dothan, Ala., was rushed by ambulance to Southeast Alabama Medical Center where he remained in the emergency center for 13 hours before he was finally stabilized enough to be transferred to the hospital's intensive care unit. He stayed in intensive care for about two weeks. He underwent a cardiac angioplasty operation to relieve the heart attack's cause: collapsed blood vessels in the heart.

His doctor would not allow him to return to work for 11 weeks after he was released from the hospital. His hospital bills have reached \$44,000 and his doctor bills are just under \$6,000.

Robert Earl "retired" from his journalism career several years ago so he could
devote more time to his hobby of family
istory. To support himself while he
bes this hobby "work", he has worked as
a security officer in Atlanta, Georgia
where he lived several years and in

Dothan where he has lived since 1989. The security work allows him to take his "homework" to the job and work on it there. He can get a lot of family work done while earnaliving.

However, the doctor said Robert Earl has been "pushing" himself too much and too hard. In order to save money that could be spent on our family history and the Association, Robert Earl has lived several years on two sandwiches a day, as well as gone without things most people consider necessary.

As a result of all this, Robert Earl won't be able to spend nearly as much of his own money on Woodham Family Association efforts in the future. Such things as the newsletter will have to be cut back. In the past, he has spent much of his own money on printing and postage to send newsletters to as many relatives as he could afford. That was the only way to get word to them about the national reunion every year. You can't have a "national" reunion if kinfolks scattered around the nation don't know about it.

In the future, the success of the Woodham Family Association will have to depend upon the entire family and not just upon the work of one person. One person can't do it all alone. A heart attack which almost killed Robert Earl has proved that.

Moodham Heritage

THOMAS L. WOODHAM, DALE COUNTY, ALABAMA FARMER

homas L. Woodham lived to be only 35 years old but his legacy will be felt by the Woodham family for generations to come. He became a prominent Dale County, Alabama farmer with hundreds of descendants living today in about half of the states in the nation.

Thomas L. Woodham was born 4 Apr., 1856 in Cherokee County, Texas. He was the son of Edward Christopher ("Chris", "C.C.") Woodham and Joanna ("Joe Annie", "Jodie") Riley. Both Chris and Joanna were natives of Old Darlington County, SC (the area which is today part of Stokes Bridge Community of Lee County). Chris moved his family to Cherokee County, Texas during the 1850s where Tom and his brother Ira Edward were born and later moved to nearby Anderson County, Texas where their son Joseph Christopher was born. They later moved back to Dale County.

Thomas L. was a grandson of Aris Woodham Junior and his first wife Rachel Richardson, both born in Stokes Bridge Community, SC. Aris Jr. was the son of Aris Woodham Senior and Rachel Beasley.

Tom's mother Joanna was the daughter of John and Mary ("Polly") Riley. In 1867, Chris left Joanna and his family when Thomas was only 11 years old. Chris married Louesta Kennedy and moved to south Florida. Joanna raised her children and lived on their farm until her death in 1890. Joanna is buried at the Woodham Cemetery near Newton in Dale County.

Thomas L. grew up in the "Woodham community" on his mama's farm along Woodham Road where the Woodhams had first settled in the early 1830s. To married Nellie E. Enfinger on 13 July, 1873 in Dale County. She was born 1 Aug., 1856 in Dale County, daughter of Ellis Enfinger and Matilda Tiller. Nellie was a granddaughter of Cornelius Enfinger.

Thomas was a farmer all his life. He applied for a US homestead on 7 July, 1879. This was for the northeast quarter of Section 23, Township Five, Range 25, located north of Corinth Baptist Church and southwest of Mt. Carmel Methodist Church. He moved onto this 160 acre farm on 1 Jan., 1880. On 5 Dec., 1886, Thomas bought a US homestead in the west fork of Choctawhatchee River in the northeast quarter of the southwest quarter of Section 22, T5, R25. Thomas also bought several other tracts of land on the north and south sides of Woodham Road (Dale County Highway 20). At one time or other, he owned several hundred acres of land.

After his father Chris left Joanna and the children and married another woman, Chris turned over their farm to Joanna. Thomas L. also acquired much of this farm, located south of Woodham Road. Part of Chris and Joanna's farm is still owned today by their grandchildren.

Nellie and Thomas L. had 11 known children, all born in Dale County.

Lucy Jane, the oldest child, was born 3 May, 1874. She married William Simeon ("Sim") Smith 22 May (also as 24 July), 1892. Their children were: Sherman, Nellie Beatrice, Mittie, Viola Isabelle, Minnie Mabell, Willie Dell, Tera, Corn, Spurgeon, Talmadge and Naomi. Lucy died in 1933 and Sim in 1942. They are buried at Mt. Carmel Methodist Church Cemetery.

Elizabeth ("Lizzie"), the second child of Thomas L., was born 17 Feb., 1876. She married Robert Edward Bull about 1896. They had 10 children: the first was an infant, born and died in 1897, Sarah Ann, Alma Alpheus, Cody Jackson, John Thomas, Raymond, Nellie Mae, Noah and Robert. Most of

Lizzie's children changed their names from Bull to Marshall. Lizzie died 1 July, 1924; she and her husband are buried at Mt. Carmel Church.

William Aris, the third child, was born 23 Nov., 1878. He married Josephine ("Josie") Beverett, 17 July, 1904. Their children were: Flosie, Dewey (died as an infant), Flowers, George Allen Sr., Helen, Ben Hill and Mignonette R. William Aris died 19 Sept., 1954 and is buried at Mt. Carmel.

John Franklin, the fourth child, was born 30 Oct., 1879. He married Willie Mae Bull, daughter of William B. Bull and Lucetta Parmer. Their children: James Ople ("Jim"), Myra Nell, William Franklin, Franklin Dee, Elnor, Thelma, Oval, Vir finia, Rex Edward, Johnnie Mae and Mary Ouida. John Franklin died 7 Apr., 1964 and is buried at Corinth Free Will Baptist Church Cemetery in Dale County.

Jasper Richard Woodham Senior, 5th child, was born 12 Sept., 1881. He married first to Essie Myers 17 Dec., 1910. They had a child who died as an infant. Essie died not long afterward and both are buried at the Woodham Cemetery. Jasper married second to Mary Alice Bull on 5 Dec., 1917. Alice was the daughter of Henry Bull and Sarah Emeline Enfinger. Their children were Edna Florence, Roy Talmadge, Wanda Wilma, Jasper Richard Jr., Joseph Earl (Earl), Richard Thomas (Thomas), Betty Sue, Nellie Ruth (Ruth) and Billy Charles. Jasper Sr. died 23 May, 1943 and is buried at Midland City Cemetery.

Thomas Daniel, the sixth child, was born 26 Dec., 1883 and died 2 Nov. 1884. This child was buried at Mt. Carmel.

Minnie Anzilla, seventh child, was born 8 Sept., 1885. She married General Noah Parmer on 27 Apr., 1904. Their children: Jewel Mae, Delphis Jacob, Ruby Nell, Henry Wilson, John Houston, Edna Pearl, Marjorie Woodham, James Porter, Joseph Davie and Minnie Florine. Minnie died 18 July, 1938 and is buried at Hillcrest Cemetery, Quincy, Florida.

James Edward ("Jim") Woodham Senior, the eighth child, was born 27 Oct., 1887. Jim married Lucille Collins 14 Oct., 1917. Their children: James Edward Jr., John Clinton (died child), Robert Douglas (Douglas) and two daughters whose names are unknown to us. Jim died 11 Mar., 1955 and is buried at Campbellton Cemetery in Jackson County, Florida.

Lottie, the minth child, was born 27 Jan., 1889. She married Henry Jacob Parmer 26 Jan., 1908. Her children are unknown. She died 12 Nov., 1915 and is buried at Mt. Carmel.

Estelle Camilla (Camilla, "Carmela") and her twin sister, Della, were the last children, born 3 Oct., 1890. Camilla married William Joseph ("Joe") Bond. Their children: Dexter Delmus, Edna Earl, Queen Evelyn, Joseph J. ("Joe"), John Oakley and Jimmy Frank. Camilla died 16 Apr., 1963 and was buried at Bay Springs Baptist Church southwest of Dothan in Houston County.

Della ("Dell") married Kimber Tee Garner on 22 Apr., 1906. Children: Thomas Abram ("Tom"), Will Leon, T. J., Lottie, Ruth and Woodrow Wilson. Dell died 2 Sept., 1959 and is buried at Headland Baptist Church Cemetery in Henry County, Alabama.

Thomas L. Woodham died 19 Aug., 1890 and was buried at Mt. Carmel Cemetery. Nellie died 11 Jan., 1925 and was buried beside her husband.

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Woodham National Reunion

Lack of interest and family support caused cancellation of the Woodham National keunion this year.

Only a handful of relatives turned out last year; two car loads came from Jacksonville and south Florida and others came from Georgia. Only two people from Alabama showed up.

Our president, Robert Earl Woodham, suffered a heart attack (life threatening) in April and was not released from the hospital until two weeks before the normal date of the reunion this year (Memorial Day weekend, usually the last weekend in the month of May).

As a result, there was not enough time nor did he have the money, to hold a national reunion this year.

The lack of support for a national reunion and other Family projects appears to be a symptom of an insidious illness that has infected our nation now for more than 10 years. As families have spread apart all over the country, so have our family ties been lost. A dark cloud of greed for money and personal interest has invaded our nation and with it has come a degeneration of love and respect for our parents, our grandparents and our sisters and brothers..

The vast majority of the large number of Woodham relatives over age 65 who attended the first National Reunion in 1979 have died since then. Unfortunately, their children and grandchildren are not interested in getting together any more, now that Mama and Daddy are gone.

No one can force you to come to a family reunion nor to love your family. We won't try to have another Woodham National Reunion until at least four years from now. If the next one is successful, then we might try holding one every five years or so after that. That is, if we are living them.

We also hope to publish a second volume of the "Woodham Family Photo Album" soon.



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Don't let family memories die

For many of us, a walk through a cemetery is full of memories, of Mama and Daddy and grandmothers and grandfathers. A visit to their graves brings back fond memories of granny in the kitchen cooking our favorite food; of Mama always there to take care of us; Daddy ready when we needed a shoulder (or money or the car); those fishing trips and tall tales with granddaddy. Yes, for those who still love, the tombstones are not just stones and slabs but the resting place of our loved ones.

Sadly, our grandchildren have no memory of our grandparents. Nor will their grandchildren have any memory of us. For them, the graves won't even be "real" people--just names on stones (IF there are stones!). As the sense of "family" dims in this high-tech age, each new generation cares less for their relatives and ancestors while family values, like our ancestors,

are becoming a thing of the past.

Unfortunately, too many people today are more concerned about trips to the beach, a new car or boat than about whether their grandparents have a simple tombstone to mark their resting place. Even less concern is shown for ancestors we never knew--the parents of our grandparents--without whom we wouldn't be here.

For those who have worked so hard to restore and preserve the Woodham Family Cemetery near Newton, Alabama, these ugly truths are all too real. Dozens of people in the Wiregrass area of Alabama, Florida and Georgia have been contacted personally or otherwise to inform them of the restoration work on THEIR family cemetery and seek their help. All too often, a feeble

promise is the only response.

However, for a handful of black sheep, there is even an outright rejection. One reputed Woodham (a well-to-do owner of a Dothan plumbing company) stated flatly "I don't know any of those people and I don't really care. I'm not interested." Another Woodham (who drives a Cadillac) said she would rather spend money on the living rather than repair her grandparent's graves. Some kinfolks who "aren't interested" show up in church every Sunday--pillars of their church. When reminded of God's Law given to Moses to "Honor thy father(s) and thy mother(s)" and numerous Biblical commandments to "know thy fathers and honor their memory", one such relative quickly stated "That's from the Old Testament. The coming of Christ made it all irrelevant." I had never thought of God like a human being who changed his mind from day to day. If there is no love of family in the heart of a person, no amount of effort will persuade them to take care of their own family graves--not even the Bible.

Being part of a family carries with it certain responsibilities: a father and mother have obligations for their children. Likewise, children have responsibilities for their parents; brother for brother and sister; grand-children for grandparents. Those of us who still cling to old-fashioned family values don't have to be asked for help when it comes time to tend our ancestor's graves. Those who shirk this family duty don't deserve the

right to bear the family name.

May God have mercy on their heartless souls and may their mothers and fathers of generations past forgive them. (continued on page 2)

Whether these mothers and fathers have been dead 100 years or more, we still must respect their memory--and their resting places.

The Woodham Cemetery at Newton, Alabama is the resting place of three couples (among many others) who just happen to be the Founding "Mothers" and "Fathers" of ALL the Woodham descendants from South Alabama (including all Woodham relatives from Houston, Dale, Geneva, Henry, Barbour, Coffee and Covington counties), panhandle Florida and Southwest Georgia. If your ancestors are from this area, one of these three couples are your ancestors.

The couples, Edward Harley Woodham Sr. and his wife Sarah Dowling; Aris Woodham Jr. and his second wife Caron Riley; and Athanasius Woodham and his second wife, are the founders of our family in this region. Few Woodham descendants today are even aware they existed, much less that we share their blood and enjoy life as a result of their labor and love.

Even more importantly, the Woodham Cemetery near Bishopville, South Carolina contain the graves of Edward Woodham Junior and his wife Mary. Edward Jr. and Mary are the Founding Father and Mother of some 99 per cent of the Woodham family from the South, including hundreds of kinfolks living up north and out west whose parents or grandparents were born in the South.

This pioneer hero and his wife no longer have a tombstone on their graves. Not only are their graves unmarked but their graves and those of other relatives at the cemetery near Bishopville are being desecrated. The cemetery is plowed over and crops grown there every year.

It is sad enough to believe the founders of such a large family could be forgotten, yet they haven't so much as a simple gravestone to memorialize them. Our whole family must bear this awful shame. No descendant of the Woodham family can hold their head high until this humiliating disgrace has been ended.

The Woodham Cemetery at Newton now has a chain link fence for protection; it has been thoroughly cleaned and a nice grass lawn now grows; a handsome sign has been placed over the gate. A water well is being added so we can plant flowers and shrubs; before long it will be a garden paradise we can all be proud of!

Our attention now must focus upon putting forth equal efforts to restore and preserve our Woodham Cemetery at Bishopville. Even more of an effort will be required here than at Newton, for almost all the tombstones at the cemetery have disappeared. These must be replaced. We must erect a chain link fence for protection also. This will be more costly than at Newton because we won't have relatives to put up the fence for us, meaning the cost will be several hundred dollars more. The fence alone could cost \$3,000 or more. Two tombstones, for Edward Jr. and Mary and for Aris Sr. and his wife Rachel, will probably cost \$1,500 or more.

What does the future hold for the Woodham family? Is the love of family lost for us-only to be replaced by lust for money? Are the blood ties of family to be replaced by computer numbers? Is this our destiny? Only you can decide this. Would you rather be a WOODHAM or a number?

We ceased to be a "family" long ago when our relatives drifted apart and lost knowledge that we are all part of one family. We were given another chance in 1979 when we came together for a National Reunion--the first in our history--after being scattered apart for more than 300 years.

Let us not lose this second chance to be a real Family. Stand up with dignity; take pride in the fact your are part of the Woodham Family and honor it!

It took the Association about four years to raise enough money to print the first two books we sponsored, the "Woodham Family Index" and "Woodham Family Photo Album Volume I".. Revolutionary War Soldier

If you find a Woodham today whose roots are in the South, the chances are they will be a descendant of Edward Woodham Junior and his wife Mary. This is fantastically mind-boggling when you consider there are literally thousands of Woodhams and Woodham descendants today scattered throughout the United States and many foreign countries.

About 99 per cent of all Woodhams in America today are descendants of Edward Jr., including ALL the Woodhams in Alabama, South Carolina, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, Arkansas and most of those in Georgia and Florida as well as hundreds more scattered from Connecticut to California. Excluded are a handful of others, descendants of Woodhams who came to America much later than our ancestor and who settled in Illinois and other northern states; and the Woodhams's (with an "S" on the end) who settled in Michigan.

Since we are all descended from this couple, it makes us all part of one family--hard to believe when you look at the sheer numbers just in the Wiregrass region alone (Alabama-Georgia-Florida). This area is full of Woodhams, Woodham women and their descendants.

Edward Woodham Junior was no ordinary man. He was something very special—one of the rare breed of men who occasionally change the destiny of the world. He was one of those special men who actually made the United States an independent nation. School kids learn about George Washington and his efforts to win American independence but it was the pioneer patriots like Edward Jr. who fought on the front lines, giving their blood and sweat to create the world's first true democracy.

We honor the memory of George Washington as the Founding Father of our nation. Sadly, very few Woodham relatives even know who Edward Woodham Jr. was--much less honor his memory as the Founding Father of our family.

Edward Woodham Jr. was born 1746 in Prince George County, Virginia along the historic James River near Richmond. This county was formerly part of Charles City County. Our first Woodham ancestor in America settled in the area during the mid-1600's. Edward Jr. was the son of Edward Woodham Senior and Eleanor (Lockett?).

Edward Senior moved his family from Virginia to the frontier of North Carolina and settled first on the Tar River during the 1740's. By the 1750's, he had settled in what was then part of Dobbs County. Where he lived is today part of Lenoir County, near LaGrange, NC.

As he reached manhood, Edward Jr. acquired a land grant in 1766 from the Royal Colonial government; his grant was near his father's farm on Falling Creek near LaGrange and Institute.

When the Revolutionary War for Independence broke out in 1775, Edward Jr. was a living participant in one of our nation's most dramatic historical periods. He became a member of the Dobbs County Regiment of the North Carolina Militia. In 1781, Edward Jr. became one of the handful of men who served in the Continental Army--our nation's first "national" army, commanded by General George Washington.

After the Revolutionary War and after the death of his father, Edward Jr. moved his family and mother to the sparsely settled frontier region of Darlington County, South Carolina. Today, this area is part of the Stokes Bridge Community of Lee County near Bishopville. It took years of hard work to clear the virgin forests and drain swamps for crop land.

Unfortunately, most of the early public records of old Darlington County were destroyed, including the earliest deeds. However, a list

of deeds recorded in 1794 shows that Edward Jr. bought and sold land in 1793. In 1797, he sold 100 acres to his son-in-law John Alexander who married his daughter Mary. Numerous other deeds recorded show Edward Jr. owned several small plantations and slaves. Edward became prominent in the business life of the community as well as a leading farmer when he built a grist mill on a small stream on one of his farms Grist mills were vital then so people could grind corn and other grain for meal and flour.

Very little is known of Edward's wife Mary: so far, I have been unable to discover who her parents were nor even her maiden name. Nor do we know all the children of Edward Jr. and Mary. The first census of the US taken in 1790 listed only names of heads of households. The census showed two males over age 16, two males under age 16 and seven females as well as 8 slaves in the household of Edward.

Only two sons are known: Aris Woodham Senior and Edward Harley Woodham Senior. Only three daughters are known: Louisa, Mary ("Polly") and Eleanor. The census therefore indicates at least two daughters, possibly three, and perhaps one son who have not yet been identified. The name Edward has been in our family ever since the 1600's. When Edward H. reached manhood, his father was often called Edward "Senior" and Edward H. sometime listed as "Junior", creating some confusion.

Aris Sr. was apparently the oldest child of Edward Jr. and Mary. He was also probably the first to marry (1791). Louisa married first to Andrew Caten (Cotton, Cawton, etc.) and after his death to a Wiggins. Mary ("Polly") married John Alexander about 1795; she had several children, including some who moved to Wiregrass Alabama. Eleanor moved with her husband Daniel Hearon to Louisiana and died there.

Edward bought a plantation across Lynches River in 1807 and moved there. He then sold three small plantations to his son Aris Sr. in 1808, including his homeplace and grist mill. Both his original homeplace and his new farm were located in present Lee County. He lived there until his death.

Edward gave several of his grandchildren property and slaves to get them started in life, including children of Aris and Mary. Edward Senior and his wife Eleanor (Lockett?) had a daughter Mary, born 7 May, 1741 in Virginia. This may very well be Mary Wiggins to whom Edward Jr. gave a slave in his will dated 1820. Mary Wiggins was a widow at the time and lived near Edward. However, she died not long after Edward and the slave was subsequently returned to his estate as per his will. Mary had one son, Daniel Wiggins who moved to Alabama with the Woodhams.

Aris Sr. had 11 children: Louisa Dupree died young and nothing is known yet of John. Asa, Stephen and Margaret remained at Stokes Bridge Community and have many descendants there today. Edward (Aris' third son) was the first to leave home and moved to Washington County, Ga. where he died young leaving three or four orphans. His descendants settled in Georgia, north Alabama and Arkansas. Ira and Pheriba ("Fereby") settled in Conecuh County, Ala. Rachel moved to Butler County, Ala. Athanasius and Aris Junior moved to Southeast Alabama (the Wiregrass) with their uncle, Edward H. Sr. and other relatives: surprisingly, the vast majority of people with the Woodham name today are descended from these two brothers and their uncle who settled near Dothan, Alabama. This region has the largest concentration of Woodhams in the nation today.

in the nation today.

Edward Junior's mother Eleanor was probably the first member of the family to be buried at the Woodham Family Cemetery, established on his farm between 1800 and 1810. His son Aris Sr. died in 1818 and was buried there also. Edward Jr. was buried there in:1820 and his wife

Mary sometime between 1826 and 1830.


Golden Anniversary Celebrated



Only quick support can save

Woodham Cemetery

For Sale: one used family cemetery. Price: \$10,000.

Sound like a weird story from one of those supermarket magazines? Not really; no matter how bizaare the idea, it's all true. In those dumb stories, the crazy things always happen to people no one ever heard of. This time, the horrible reality has come home to haunt our own family.

Land around the Woodham Family Lemetery near Newton, Dale County, Alabama was recently sold by the Crooks family who had owned it for many years. The buyer is Wade Keller, an Ozark accountant.

We received a letter from Keller which appeared to offer the Cemetery for sale. We sent a four page letter to him asking for clarification and more information. To date, we have not had a reply.

We published a story about this in our last newsletter. The day after she got her newsletter, Mrs. Ruby Woodham Knight of Ozark called Keller to talk about the cemetery. Keller asked Ruby if she wanted to buy the Cemetery.

"What is your asking price?" Ruby asked him. "Well, I haven't set a price but James Woodham bought some land in the area...I think I did make him a price of \$10,000," cont. on pg 2

Keller answered.

"TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS!", Ruby said unbelievably. "Yes", Keller replied.

We are now confronted with a person unrelated to our family who claims to "own" the sacred burial ground of our Woodham mothers and fathers. He is openly and actively trying to "sell" the Cemetery. His opening asking price (to Ruby) is \$10,000.

The next thing is: what do we as a family do?

The first steps have already been taken; a committee of local relatives was formed in November at a meeting of descendants of people buried at Woodham Cemetery. The second meeting on 19 Nov. brought together 32 people. The third meeting in December attracted only 14 people.

The committee decided upon an immediate cleanup of the Cemetery. According to J. B. Daughtry of Dothan, about 25 men, women and children met on 5 Dec. and began work on cleaning the site. (MANY THANKS!)

However, we cannot stop our efforts with a cleanup. Much more must be done to preserve our family's cemetery; we must act <u>now</u> to make sure our family graveyard will be safe for generations to come.

James Crooks and his sister, Mrs. Gaynell Crooks Dildy, whose father bought the 130 acres surrounding the cemetery many years ago, stated their father never believed he "owned" the cemetery. They told Ruby they did not believe they owned it either and had not intended for it to be included in the deed.

We will hold discussions at the Woodham National Reunion in Eufaula on Memorial Day weekend on this problem, both Saturday and Sunday.

We will consider such questions as permanent ownership of the Dale County Woodham Cemetery, acquisition and restoration of the South Carolina Woodham Cemetery and a permanent maintenance fund for both cemeteries. Please try to attend these talks on the cemeteries.

Woodhams Organize

A call to arms to save our Woodham Family Cemetery has proudly reapits first reward: a group of concerndescendants has begun an intensive effort to clean the graveyard of grass, underbrush and small trees that had overtaken the area.

According to cousin J. B. Daughtry, the "point man" who got things going is James O. Woodham. He was elected chairman of the group. There are two James O. Woodhams in the area, so we don't know yet which one he is.

Mrs. Ben H. (Juanita Carroll) Woodham was elected secretary-treasurer and Edsel Woodham was named co-chairman. Juanita is the daughter of the late Ada Elizabeth Woodham.

Woodham Cemetery includes several burials of other families who may or may not be related to Woodhams. They include Enfinger, Stevens, Bagwell, Brackin, Baldree, Glover and others.

Several of these may have been just friends and neighbors—not actually related to us. Several descendants of the Bagwell and Stevens families have participated in the meetings an cleanings. Strong support has come from descendants of Nellie Woodham and her husband Major Holland ("Fox") Daughtry, both buried here.

Descendants at the last two meetings have come from Midland City, Hartford, Ozark, Dothan, Enterprise and nearby communities to show their support.

The committee has voted to erect a new fence around the cemetery. According to Mrs. Florence ("Hettie") Woodham Andrews, the present fence was built several decades ago. The builder was unaware at that time of several graves not marked with tombstones and when putting up the fence, left these graves outside the enclosed area. Hettie recalled "a mother and her two babies" and others who are buried north of the present fence.

If you are a Woodham descendant, it is your responsibility to help maintain this cemetery. You should not have to be asked.

Letter

(EDITOR'S NOTE: the following is excerpted from a letter by Mrs. Ruby Woodham Knight, Ozark, Alabama; 14 Nov., 1987)

"When I got your newsletter (same day) I called Wade Keller to inquire about the cemetery down here. He did have it for sale—He asked if I wanted it for myself and I said "no" but I was interested to know about it. I asked "What is your asking price?" He said, "Well, I haven't set a price but James Woodham bought some land in the area——I think maybe I did make him a price of \$10,000." I said, "TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS!" He said "yes". I could not believe I had heard him correctly but I had. I told him there was no Woodham that I knew of that had that kind of money nor would they spend it that way. He said two or three times——"What do you think they would pay. Would they make me an offer, what about the Woodham organization?" I assured him I could not answer his questions but I did not think anybody would make an offer because his price was so high nobody could or would even think about that. Wade is in my church and seems like a real smooth operator——I was surprised that he would even be involved in trying to "sell" a cemetery much less trying to hijack the prospective buyers.

The next night, J. B. Daughtry from Dothan called me. He had talked to maybe Edsel, Rex and Ben (I think). He suggested offering Wade \$1,500 for the one acre cemetery and one additional acre to make Woodham Park. I told him I was not interested in making any offer at all--First, the cemetery would be all that anybody could keep up and I thought if no offer was made to buy--the cemetery would still belong to the Woodham family--you don't sell cemeteries. I think Wade got the impression from somebody that the Association maybe had money and would pay a big price for the cemetery--he'd make enough off the sale to pay for some of the acreage he bought. I assured him the Assn. had no money and would not be buying that.

When the Star came out this week this notice was in it. I called Juanita Woodham and she said nobody was going to pay Wade anything but they were going to clean it up and fence it and that was that.

James Crooks and his sister Gaynell Dildy sold Wade the land and they are both my friends. I had dinner with them last night and they said their Daddy bought the land many, many years ago (they are my age and grew up next door to the cemetery). The cemetery was there all the time and their Daddy did not consider that he owned the cemetery nor did they consider that they sold Wade the cemetery because they did not own it. Wade can't sell something he does not have a title to. Gaynell said her Daddy had 130 acres of land. U.S. Govt. took 100 acres that they wanted for a landing field. She was almost sure the deed they gave to Wade read "29 acres, more or less—she said we always thought the "more or less" allowed for the one acre cemetery to be deleted from the 130 acres. Anyway, I don't think he will do anything to the cemetery but Juanita says they are going to clean it up."

EDITORIAL

The Woodham family now faces one of its toughest crises ever. One Woodham family cemetery has already been destroyed and the remaining fam-

ily cemetery now faces a similar danger.

The Woodham Family Cemetery in Dale County, Alabama is in the midst of a controversy because Wade Keller (not a relative) has bought land around the cemetery and now claims to "own" the cemetery itself. He is trying to sell the cemetery to the highest bidder and has asked for \$10,000. This shyster is out to make a sleazy profit from the resting bodies of our relatives.

This family cemetery was founded well over 100 years ago. The Woodham Family Cemetery in Lee County, South Carolina was founded more than 175 years ago. Both these cemeteries were founded by Woodhams on Woodham farm land as private, family burying grounds.

The South Carolina cemetery was founded just before or just after 1800, on the farm of Edward Woodham Junior (father of about 95 per cent of our family). Edward sold the farm to his son, Aris Woodham Senior who died in 1818 and was buried in the cemetery. Edward was laid to rest there in 1820; both their wives also lie there. The land has been in the Woodham ever since and is today owned by a daughter of Charles Ray Woodham. Burials were held there for more than 100 years.

We printed a story about this crisis in our last newsletter. At that time, we had less than 20 members (with current dues paid) of the family club and an almost empty treasury. In spite of that, copies of that newsletter were sent to 800 families (that is all I could afford to print and mail) all over America. We asked relatives to please contact us about the cemetery.

Only three people wrote us and one other tried to telephone us so far about this urgent problem. There have been three local meetings on the cemetery. We have reports on the last two: only 32 people turned out for the second gathering and just 14 for the last one. Almost half those were from the Stevens and Bagwell families--not the Woodhams.

That leaves a heck of a lot of Woodham relatives who found some kind of excuse not to take part. What kind of excuse can hide the shame and disgrace of anyone who will not stand and fight for their mother's and father's graves? There is nothing more sacred to us as a whole family than the burial sites of our ancestors and relatives. Since the beginning of civilization, the living have held these holy grounds as a sacred trust for the next generation, preserving and protecting them. Until now.

This is a new age, an age of greed, lust for money and quest for power. No longer does "family" come first. Today, a new car, expensive vacation or anything else is more important than family. Once, Americans looked forward to family gatherings with happiness and cherished memories of those reunions with warm joy. Now, people would rather go to the beach or use any kind of excuse ("I can't spoil my attendance at church.") rather than attend a family reunion.

If we can't find love among us for our living relatives, we sure aren't going to find any love for them when they are long dead. I had expected Woodham relatives to really unite for the first time and stand together; to make a holler heard across the country against such a shameful threat to a burying ground.

It is a crying shame when a family cannot unite and stand together at least in times of crisis. Make no bones about it; this is a crisis and there is a threat. This character wants to sell the cemetery. You can better believe it: if a wealthy Arab or Japanese (or American) developer wanted the land for any reason--our family's cemetery could "accidentally" disappear overnight.

It can't happen, you say? Hogwash, it happens every day. In fact, in growing areas (such as Atlanta), it happens several times a day! The small fines they might have to pay means nothing compared to the big fast bucks "developers" can make by getting rid of a cemetery.

We have already witnessed the total destruction of the Woodham Family Cemetery in our ancestral home in South Carolina. This sacred site was used as a hog pen! The tombstones were ripped up and thrown away. two tombstones survive--broken into small pieces. It can't happen? It HAS happened. The site was plowed over and is still being plowed over, with crops grown on the graves of our relatives.

This sacrilege must not be allowed to happen in Dale County and it must

be stopped in South Carolina!

WHAT CAN WEDO ?

We must acquire a clear and permanent title to both Woodham cemeteries; we must establish a permanent fund for their maintenance; local committees must take active roles in keeping both cemeteries cleaned and maintained; tombstones should be restored and new ones for unmarked graves erected. The South Carolina cemetery should be fully restored, with tombstones to replace those destroyed.

Local authorities (tax assessor and Probate Office) must be notified of the existance of these cemeteries. This will officially register them as

legally protected sites and remove them from taxation.

If you have any of that old-fashioned Woodham grit and gut left, now is the time to stand up and show it. Let's unite as one family and stand together and show the world we still have some of that pioneer family spirit,

A new series of books

Woodham Heritage...

Very little is known about Frederick Woodham and his descendants yet what we do know reveals a large number of relatives, spread all over the nation.

Frederick was born 6 June, 1806 in that part of Darlington County which is today part of Lee County, South Carolina. He was the first child of Edward Harley Woodham Senior and Sarah Dowling and a grandson of Edward Woodham Junior and Mary.

Frederick married about 1829-30 to Mary Ann Pollard. Their first three children were born in Darlington County. The family lived in the Stokes Bridge community (north of present Bishopville), along Lynch's River. The first record found on him is the 1830 US Census of Darlington County. The Census shows he and Mary were living near his father, Edward H. Sr.

When a large group of Woodhams and their relatives left South Carolina in late 1835 and headed for the frontier of Southeast Alabama, Frederick and Mary were among them. There must have been a large wagon train full of relatives and friends, for they included Frederick's family, his father Edward H. Sr. and his children, Edward's nephews Athanasius and Aris Woodham Jr., several Alexander cousins who were children of Mary Woodham and John Alexander as well as other relatives.

Most of Edward's family settled in Dale County, including Frederick. Unfortunately, the Dale County courthouse burned in the early 1880's and all public records were destroyed. As a result, I have never found any deeds, will or other public records on him. The only other record found so far is where he appears on the 1840 and 1850 US Census of Dale County.

Mary and Frederick had at least 10 children: Richard E.L., Hillary Hope-well, John Wesley, Sarah Ann Elizabeth, Eleanor Dupree ("Elende-"), Elisha R., Aris Athanasius, Hester Ann, Andrew Jackson ("Jack") and Wright Pleasant ("Right", "Writie"). I have found no records on Sarah nor Eleanor and do not know if they married or not.

Aris A. enlisted in the Confederate Army during the War Between the States and died as a soldier, 4 June, 1864.

Frederick's oldest child, Richard, became a Dale County Deputy Sheriff. A letter from Richard written 1 Oct., 1858 is the oldest letter from a Woodham that we have a copy of. It was written to his uncle, Calvin Rhodes in Darlington County, SC. Richard had two daughters who died as infants.

Hilliary's known children were Mary Jane, Susan S. and Clarissa C. John Wesley and Sarah Ward's children were: Albiner, Marietta ("Mary"), Johnathan Frederick, Hester Ann and Daniel Elie.

Elisha's children were: Ella, Martin Monroe, Henry Clayton Sr., Charles Wesley ("Bunk"), Tollie, Roberta Lee ("Bertie"), Forest and Lillie Estelle.

Andrew Jackson lived most of his life in Dale County but moved to Geneva County in the 1890's. Children: Mary ("Molly"), John Edward, Frances ("Doll") ("Doll"), Lucy, Sarah Ann ("Sally", "Sal"), Evitus Mylus ("Elve"), Daisy, Edward, William Earnest ("Will") and Claude Marvin.

Wright P. moved to Clarke County, Ala. and married Sarah Jane Coate there. Their children were: Simeon William R., Lenora Janette ("Nora Jane"), Cordelìa ("Delia"), Keener Jackson ("Kuner John"), Richard Agee, Jesse Carmichael Sr., Margaret Estell ("Maggie"), Leslie Raymond, Ruby Naomi, Hannis Taylor and Norman Frederick.

The sheriff of Henry County levied upon Frederick's farm and it was sold in Sept., 1853. He may have died that summer or was already sick. Where he is buried is unknown.

Mary Ann obtained a federal homestead of 40 acres on 17 Oct., 1854 and another homestead in 1855. She married John Golden in 1858.

(excerpts)

"You asked me once how my father and his sisters and brother came to live in Tennessee and Missouri. I have been talking to my aunt Billie and uncle Glen about that, and will pass on what I have found out.

My grandfather (James L. Woodham) was a coal miner in Alabama. At some point in the early 1920's, when the coal fields played out, he moved to Kentucky and took his wife and family with him. At that time, there were 4 kids; Dad (Gene), Opal, Billie, and Glen. In 1923, another one was born, my aunt Mildred. There was a twin also, who along with grandmother died in childbirth complications. With no one to care for the kids, Grandfather took them to grandmother's parents, who had a farm around Greenpond, Alabama. Dad apparently did not stay there too long, and took off on his own at about the age of 12. Dad's brother Glen was taken in by another family and he stayed with them for a number of years. Aunt Opal and Aunt Billie apparently stayed on with their grandparents and various uncles and aunts (all named Williams).

With no real home, Dad drifted around working at various jobs. wound up in Arkansas working in the cotton fields and in a cotton gin, for a rather wealthy family named Stillman. Sometime in the very early 1930's, about 1931 or 1932, the Stillmans moved to southern Missouri where lots of newly drained and cleared swamp land was being opened up for farming. Dad moved with them and continued to work for the Stillmans for a number of years. Sometime about 1934, he met and married Edith Byrd. I was born in 1936. In 1944, Dad bought 160 acres of farmland and started farming on his own. I believe that he had "sharecropped" for the Stillmans for a while too before that. After buying the farm, we never moved. Dad lived on the farm for the rest of his life, until he died in 1982.

Back to Glen, Dad's brother Sometime in the early 1930's, he followed Dad to Arkansas, looking for work. By that time, Dad was already in Missouri, but Glen found someone who knew where Dad was, and followed him to Missouri. Glen didn't stay long, and returned to Alabama for a while. A few years later, he went back to southern Missouri (Peach Orchard) to visit Dad again. This time he stayed. As he said, there was no other family ties, so he just stayed near Dad. He has lived in the near vicinity ever since and still farms a small plot of ground near Malden.

Back to the girls (Dad's sisters) Sometime in the early 1930's, grandfather (James L.) had a homestead on some ground somewhere in the Arkansas Ozarks. The two oldest girls (Opal & Billie) were young adults by this time, and were with their father in Arkansas. Something happened (I'm still researching what) and he lost the homestead and the girls started back to Alabama to one of their uncles. They stopped in Memphis to spend the night in a boarding house. The woman who ran the boarding house offered both of them jobs there in the borading house, cooking, serving food, etc. Since they had no real place to go, they stayed and just never left. I think it was about to time Glen moved to Missouri to stay that they all managed to reestablish contact and know where all their brothers and sisters were. I have not been able to learn a lot about my aunt Mildred (the youngest). I don't know who raised her or how she came to be separated from the other girls. If I have ever see her, I do not remember it...So far as I know, she still lives in Fort Walton Beach, Flo-

That is kind of a summary of what I have been able to dig up. I hope you found it worthwhile...

Robert Earl, this letter has been on my desk for some time now while I've been recovering from surgery...

It is my sad duty to tell you that Billie died. I have not been able to obtain a copy of the obituary. What I know: Billie M. (Woodham) Stanley, daughter of James L. Woodham (deceased) sister of Gene Woodham (deceased), died on Sept. 4, 1987 at Memphis, Tenn. following heart surgery complications. Buried at Munford, Tenn."

Don't put it off; it will take time to prepare all this.

- Help us help you...

On the way back home following the 1986 national reunion, Adrian Hundley Roper suggested that although we had finally raised enough money to buy a copying machine, we should continue our fund-raising campaign for other projects. Robert Earl couldn't stop thinking from that point on about the potential for our family club if we had a computer. Why a computer? Ask a business person or office worker and you can get a thousand reasons. Very few relatives understand what it means to deal with information on at least 250,000 people but that is just what Robert Earl does. He has a whole room full of records: several hundred notebooks and dozens of boxes and chests of drawers on Woodhams and his mother's family.

Imagine if you can, trying to keep information separate and "straightened out" on more than 130 different Woodhams named John! More than 100 different people named Robert Woodham. Then there are all the husbands and wives of Woodhams; children, grandchildren, etc. of Woodham girls who have other family names but are still just as much a part of the Woodham family. will ask Robert Earl "My mother was Mary Woodham. Do you have anything on her and her family?" He always replies "Which one?" We have records on more than 200 different Marys! They are shocked to learn we are so big a family and how so much information can be organized to find everything. This has led to a lot of paperwork.

Recently, Robert Earl had opportunity to use a personal computer for about three months. He learned to use the computer and began entering information from the "WOODHAM FAMILY INDEX". It was amazing what could be learned and done. He could ask for all Woodhams named John; all Johns born in Alabama from 1870 to 1880 who were children of a William Woodham and who married someone named Mary. Or simply ask for a John who married Mary Smith. Presto! A day's searching done in seconds! He could ask for a list of every Woodham ever born in a particular state or county; for everyone born in a certain year and much more. And that is just a sample of what we can do with family information. It could answer a lot of puzzling questions for us.

There are dozens of tasks we do for the family club that could be done faster and more efficiently by a computer. It could handle our mailing list and print mailing lables for newsletters. We do not keep copies of letters we write to you now because of a lack of room. We could keep copies of these letters we write on a small disk with a computer.

We could compose family newsletters on the computer, write headlines, correct spelling automatically, print, address and mail them in less time and effort than it now takes just to write them. All this time and effort could be better used on other projects for the family. We could do much more research on living relatives and our ancestors; write more letters and contact more kinfolks; produce more family newsletters; write more family books; "identify" for relatives; discover mistakes in our family information, mailing lists, etc. and correct them and much more.

As with the copier, it will be a joint effort with Robert Earl's mother's family. We will aim toward a desk top printing system: an IBM personal computer (or IBM compatible), a laser printer and computer programs.

This system will be one of the cheapest we can buy but "expensive" for a small family club: about \$2,000 or so for a computer, \$3,000 to \$5,000 for

a laser printer and \$1,000 for programs.

This is a big project with a costly goal, the biggest project we have ever undertaken. What it can accomplish for our family is well worth the price--and more! There comes a time in every person's life when we must look to an end and set a goal to accomplish before that end comes. If we and future generations are to benefit from the more than 35 years of research Robert Earl has devoted, that knowledge must not be lost but preserved. We ask your help again. Research May Change Theories

It takes many years of hard work digging up family history to appreciate the fact none of us can ever "know it all". Just when you think all the information is beginning to fall into its proper place and you have most of it "down pat", along comes new information that blows your mind.

Such is our case now. After more than 35 years of research, we now know that anyone named Woodham whose origin is in the South is going to be related to all the rest. So if you are a descendant of a Woodham and meet another preson who is also, you can count on their being kinfolks one way or another! Regardless of what kind or how old a record, sooner or later that Woodham will "fall into place" in the family tree. This has made our research efforts much easier—simply look for every Woodham you can find in every source possible. It means if we discover our family name in historic records from the 1700's or in a current telephone book, it is always a relative.

During the 1950's and 1960's, there were few county and state records indexed and fewer still were published as books. That meant very little information was available to us without going to every courthouse and state archives in the South and actually looking thourgh the original records. The cost of so many long trips just would not allow this. Until recently, what we knew about our earliest ancestors in America during the 1600's would not fill a single page. Now, thanks to indexes of local records from Virginia counties published in the last few years, we have discovered much more. We have learned about previously unknown Woodhams living in Virginia during the late 1600's and early 1700's.

We would like to obtain xerox copies of the old court records, deeds, wills and other documents on these earliest Woodham ancestors. However, this will cost money. Since a trip to Virginia for Robert Earl is not affordable, we must order copies from several courthouses and the Virginia archives. In most cases, this will cost from \$2 to \$5 per document (or per page), depending on the county. Some counties will not allow such very old and fragile records to be handled and xeroxed. They must be photographed with a camera only. In such cases, the cost of a copy can be \$10 or more per record (or per page).

We would like to get copies of these records to reproduce in the book on our family history we are working on now. It would be a shame not to have copies and the information from the oldest records in America on our family. But without money, it may just have to be so.

If we are fortunate in the next few months and some Woodham relatives who can afford to donate \$200 or so to purchase copies of these valuable old records, they will be reproduced in the history book and preserved in our Woodham Family National Library. Otherwise, they will remain just a dream for the future.

Several of these documents are on an Edward Woodham who is a "brand new" one to us--yes, another one! This Edward was living during the late 1600's. So far, I can't prove "who" he was but believe he was the son of the first Thomas Woodham in America. I have discovered several records on Thomas and obviously more than one. Now, I am trying to figure out whether they are on two or three different people named Thomas. I also discovered a "new" John, the first one in America with this name. The records indicate there may be two different Johns during the 1700's.

Woodham Heritage

f William Edward Woodham could come back today and see all his descendants, he would be shocked at their sheer numbers and amazed at the variety of people.

Since his death 100 years ago, "Bill" has become the father of of several hundred relatives. They are concentrated in Southeast Alabama (the "Wiregrass" area) and adjoining region and in South Carolina but also include others scattered throughout the United States.

This pioneer farmer, soldier and strong family man was born on the Southern frontier in Washington County, Georgia. He was the son of Edward Woodham and Clarissa ("Clary" or "Clory") (maiden name unknown); he was the grandson of Aris Woodham Senior and Rachel Beasley.

Edward was born in the Stokes Bridge Community of what is nwo part of Lee County, South Carolina (then part of Darlington County) in 1796. About 1818, he took his young bride Clarissa and headed westward, settling near the border of the Muscogee (Creek) Indian Nation. They had three children: Aris, Piety and William Edward. Edward died young not long after William Edward's birth in 1820. The widow Clarissa took the three orphaned children back home to South Carolina.

Clarissa, still young and reportedly beautiful, soon remarried. Grand-mother Rachel and other Woodhams begged her to allow the children to remain at home rather than face the frontier dangers again. She did so and the children were raised by their grandmother Rachel and uncles. William Edward grew very attached to the family of his "Uncle" (actually, a great uncle) Edward Harley Woodham Senior, his father's uncle.

Piety and Aris eventually moved back to Georgia, this time settling initially in Upson County; Aris lived briefly in Alabama then came back and settled in Heard County, Georgia and died in Carroll County, Georgia.

Bill stayed on in South Carolina where he married Mary Ann Martha Segars in 1843. They had two sons. Mary Ann died in 1848 giving birth to a third son who also died that day. She is buried in a remote family cemetery north of Stokes Bridge.

A few months later, Bill married Elizabeth Ann ("Betsy") Kelly. After birth of their third child, Bill and Betsy decided to make the long trek west and join other Woodham relatives who had migrated to Wiregrass Alabama about 1835. Bill made the journey in 1854 and stopped first in Barbour County. He soon moved to adjoining Henry County and then to Dale County.

Bill and Betsy lived the rest of their lives in the Echo Community near Mt. Carmel Methodist Church. They had a total of 10 children, one son died as a child.

When the War Between the States broke out in 1861, Bill and his two oldest sons, John Edward and Jarrett Washington ("Jarred") all joined the Alabama Militia and were mustered into the Confederate States Army. Jarrett died on active duty while stationed at Mobile, Ala. and is buried there.

Bill enlisted on 14 Sept., 1863 as a private in Company D, 57th Alabama Regiment of Infantry. Among the military campaigns Bill participated in was the defense of Georgia against the invading army of General Sherman whose yankee horde was pillaging, burning and laying waste to a swath 60 miles wide across Georgia. Bill wrote his wife a letter from Columbus, Ga. saying his company was leaving to march to Forsyth where they hoped to make a stand against Sherman. Although the letter carried a stamp, he said it was to be hand delivered by a friend who was coming home on leave.

At close of the war, his company surrendered to the yankees at Macon, Ga After the war, Bill's son John Edward decided to return to South Carolina where he had spent his childhood. The presence of two more John Edwards there led to relatives calling him "John Alabam" or "Alabama John" for the rest of his life (a reference to his having lived in Alabama).

~

Of the 13 children of Bill, two died as infants and one died as a young soldier. The other 10 all reached adulthood and married. The last of his children to survive died in 1955.

Bill bought a farm in Dale County in 1857. He later acquired a federal nomestead of 160 acres in Dale County in 1869. He was issued a final patent to this land on 6 Jan., 1876. Bill and Betsy are buried at Mt. Carmel Methodist Church Cemetery, north of Midland City, Alabama.

A granddaughter, Priscilla D. Woodham Griggs, wrote a nine page pamphlet, "More History of the Woodham Family in Dale County, Alabama" in 1970. She gave many personal memories of Bill related to her by her father, Gillum


David Woodham, Bill's son.

Two sons of Bill, William Asa and George Wiley, eventually settled in Geneva County, Ala.; both had large families. Another son, Stephen Ellison raised a family in Dale County and another one in Dixie County, Florida. I do not have any information on children of Bill's daughters Eliza Ann nor Catherine Lenorah. Of the other eight children, I know all had large families except Cumi; she had only two children but helped raise several step-children. Two of Bill's sons had 16 children each.

Although Bill was born in 1820, he has several grandchildren who are still living today. I know of at least 85 grandchildren of Bill (some of

them died as infants).

Neglected Old Cemetery A time to ask if we are a people of 'good will'

The oldest known Woodham family cemetery has already been destroyed. Now, the only other Woodham cemetery is in mortal danger. We received a letter in August from Wade Keller of Ozark, Ala. stating he had bought a tract of 72 acres in Dale County. This land adjoins the old Hunt Army Airfield within the city limits of Newton.

His brief letter said only:

"Dear Mr. Woodham,

Enclosed is a survey of a plot containing a Woodham Cemetery. The cemetery is in considerable disrepair in that the woods have taken over. However the tombstones appear to be intact. Most of the graves are around the turn of the century.

I had the cemetery surveyed out from the 72 acres I purchased in hopes of transferring it to a responsible organization that would maintain it.

If you are interested or can direct me to a responsible group that might be interested, I would be glad to entertain a reasonable offer."

The letter implies that Keller now claims to "own" the Woodham Cemetery and wants to "sell" it. I have worried about "ownership" of the cemetery for several years and dreaded the possibility some unscrupulous developer would acquire the surrounding land and lay claim to the cemetery. That possibility is now closer than I had imagined.

It is against the law in most states to disturb, damage or remove a cemetery. However, I do not know the specific laws on cemeteries in Alabama (in Georgia, it is a felony). I do know that in this day and age of profitering, it is common for developers and builders to bulldoze over graves. By the time relatives discover the descretation, it is too late--there may be a tract of houses or a shopping center built over the graves. The builder can pay a small fine and write if off on expenses. He is glad to "get rid of it" for such a small price!

This cemetery was established about the mid-1800's. It contains several marked graves, most dating from the late 1800's. However, there may be as many as 50 or more unmarked graves there, including several outside the present fence, according to older relatives.

Apparently Keller wants to "sell" the Woodham Cemetery. It is a sad day when we reach the point our relatives' and friends' graves can be bought and sold like cattle. We must not allow our family's burial grounds to be owned by other people, by strangers who don't know and could care less about the people buried there.

I firmly believe the cemetery was "set aside" in a deed during the 1880's. If we cannot prove this, then our only alternative is to raise funds and "buy" our family cemetery back from Keller.

The cemetery must must be restored, cleaned and a new fence and marker erected. A permanent committee of local relatives must also be established to ensure good maintenance and frequent cleaning.

We need volunteers who live within 50 miles of Newton. We should not have to beg for such help. The only excuse not to take care of your relatives graves is that you are too feeble to walk. Let it not be said that the Woodhams are too sorry to take care of their kinfolks' graves!

The time has come for the Woodham family to either stand up and be counted or to hang our heads in disgrace! Please contact us about this effort.

A new series of books

We are proud to announce work is underway on the first comprehensive

history book ever written on our Woodham family.

At our first national reunion in 1979, so many kinfolks asked for something in writing to tell them about our ancestors and to show how we were all part of one family. As a result, the Woodham Family Association sponsored publication in 1980 of a small booklet about our history. This gave a brief description of our history and was merely something to "fill in" until a complete book could be prepared.

Since then, we have also published the "Woodham Family Index" and "Woodham Family Photo Album, Volume I", two full-sized books. The "Index" contains the name of every known Woodham who is a descendant of the first

Woodham in America (99 per cent of the Woodhams in America).

Our new book will be a full-sized history, containing about 120 or more pages. It will be spiral bound and have a soft cover similar to the "Index". This first book will cover our earliest family history in America from the year 1655 up to the mid-1800's.

The "Woodham Family History, Volume I" will contain copies of numerous historic documents of many kinds dating back to the 1600's. You will be able to see copies of actual courthouse records from the year 1690, wills, deeds, court minutes, estate records and other items from the 1600's and early 1700's through the 1800's.

Some of these ancient records are not only valuable for their information but are themselves a work of art. They were written with a quill pen, often with elaborate flourish; remarkably beautiful compared to our henscratching of today, worthy of being framed for display. The language and spelling is "late Middle English" -- starkly different from today. spelling and language often represents a frontier people who had little formal education, combined with use of Middle English spelling accented by the London brogue and that of southeast England common in the Colonies.

Since mailing the last newsletter owever, we have had responses from some of our regular supporters as well as three new memberships from relatives who have never joined before. As of this writing, we now have 30 members who have paid their dues for the current 1989-90 year.

We ran out completely of typing paper, copying machine powder, typewriter ribbons, copier paper and scotch tape (to name a few).

Preparation is being made for the <u>first</u> comprehensive history book ever written on our Woodham family. <u>If you want to share in this pride and knowledge of your family, then you must order your copy now.</u>

We published the "Woodham Family Index" and "Woodham Family Photo Album, Volume II" in 1985 and printed a small booklet on our history in 1980 to "fill in" until we could get a comprehensive

history prepared.

This first family history will cover our Woodham family from its beginnings during the Middle Ages in England and trace our complete family in America from the first Woodham to come here about 1655. "Volume I" will close with our history up to the mid-1800's. The book will contain copies of historic documents of many kinds dating back to the 1600's. These will include copies of the records from the oldest Woodham family Bible in America; copies of deeds, wills and land grants dating back to the 1600's; military records, including some showing where our ancestor was a soldier during the Revolutionary War (1775-1783); family sheets with information on individual families; and more.

Some of these very old documents are valuable not only for the information they contain but also are works of art in themselves. They were written with a quill, often with very elaborate flourish--remarkably beautiful compared to our hen-scratching today and worthy of framing for display. The older records uses the language of "late Middle English" and is starkly different from modern American.

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Moodham Heritage

John Wesley Woodham was one of at least 13 Woodhams with that name. This John Wesley was born 17 Oct., 1857 in Dale County, Alabama, son of Steven Moses Woodham and Sarah Amanda Galloway. He was born on his daddy's farm located along what is today called Woodham Road near Bagwell Crossroads and Ozark.

John Wesley was the grandson of Aris Woodham Jr. and his second wife, Caron H. Riley. John Wesley's parents and grandparents Aris Jr. and Caron are all buried at the Woodham Cemetery near where John Wes was born.

John Wes married Almedia Ellen V. ("Medie") Hobbs about 1879. Almedia was born 5 Mar., 1862 in Dale County, daughter of J. O. and Elsa Hobbs. She was orphaned as a child and adopted by a Galloway family (descendants of Woodhams). Her sister, Mahulda Hobbs, married Stephen Ellison Woodham. John Wes bought 160 acres of land from his father Steven Moses in 1887. Steven Moses acquired the land through a defaulted mortage. John Wes and Medie raised their family on this farm.

John Wes and Medie had 12 children, the youngest of whom died as a child. One son, Moses Powell Woodham, was killed as a soldier in France during World War I. A daughter Evie C. married Robert Edward Andrews but I have no information on whether she had any children.

The ten other children of John Wes and Medie were Charles Mancil (Mancil), Jesse Alexander, James Henry (Henry), Carlton Odis (Odis), Lola, Lillie Albie, Moses Powell, Mallie Vera, Wesley Alver ("Alve"), Herman and Elmedia A. (died as child). (see family sheet)

John Wes died in 1935 and Medie in 1940. Both are buried at Chalkhead Baptist Church Cemetery near where their farm was.

the Woodham Cemetery near Newton (Dale County), Alabama. But our family pride is dimmed by the fact the oldest Woodham Family Cemetery near Bishopville (Lee County) South Carolina is still being plowed over.

A lot of work is yet to be done on the South Carolina cemetery before it can once again even be recognized as a cemetery. The condition of our two family cemeteries is a tragedy that should never have happened. But it did. The cemetery near Newton became an abandoned jungle. As memory waned of our loved ones buried there, cleaning and upkeep became less and less frequent. All signs of the Lee County cemetery were destroyed when it was plowed over many years ago. Relatives there continue to plow it.

This outrage will not stop until we erect a fence around the cemetery and restore the site.

We have heard a lot of folks say such things as "Well, I don't know any of the people buried there," or "My folks are from Georgia; we're not kin to any Woodham's from South Carolina (or Alabama." One relative couldn't understand why anyone would want to restore the cemetery. "All the tombstones are gone; you don't even know where those people are buried." That same person inherited land free that "those people" sweated and labored for so they could hand it down to her. But does it matter? You can plow over the graves of our ancestors for a thousand years but they will still be buried there and it will still be the Woodham Cemetery!

If you are a Woodham or descendant of a Woodham, your ancestors are buried at the Lee County Woodham Cemetery. This is the resting place of Edward Woodham Junior and his wife Mary. They are the "mother and father of more than 99 per cent of all Woodham descendants today. So none of us can say we are not related to those buried there. Edward Jr. was a soldier in the Revolutionary War and fought for American Independence. He owned the land where the cemetery is located. He is an ancestor we can all be proud of.

Edward's son Aris Woodham Sr. and his wife Rachel Beasley are also buried there. They are the "mother and father" of about 60-70 per cent of all Woodham descendants, including all the family in South Carolina. He later bought his father's farm and is the first one known to be buried in the Woodham Cemetery, on his own farm.

Restoring our family cemeteries is the responsibility of <u>every</u> Woodham descendant. If we cease to obey the Ten Commandments (to honor our fathers and mothers) and the numerous Biblical demands to honor them and keep their memory, then we cease to be a "family". The name WOODHAM no longer has any meaning and might as well be a number.

As long as these graves remain in this disgraceful condition, we must all hang our heads. Those who whine any excuse must bear this shame the rest of their lives and especially in the next life when they meet their maker and their ancestors.

Are we a bunch of spineless, uncaring wimps or are we a FAMILY to be proud of? Is it to be family pride or family shame?

The expense is going to be high. First, we need a permanent chain link fence. We spent more than \$2,000 on the fence at Newton but the labor of putting it up was free, since relatives did all the work. Next, we need funds to purchase tombstones for all the unmarked graves in both cemeteries, starting with the oldest ancestors. These are the most important tasks; when they are completed, we need to set up permanent trusts for future care and maintenance. Computer can help crunch

Two years ago, we started a campaign to raise funds to buy s computer: before we could get it going, a crisis developed over the Woodham Cemetery. We put the computer project on the "back burner" for a while.

In the meantime, our work load has continued to grow. Our family historian, Robert Earl Woodham, donates his time as an unpaid volunteer to do all the work for the Association (we don't have any "paid" workers). The time spent on family history, research, correspondence, newsletters, etc. now amounts to at least 80 hours a week. Robert Earl's hobby of family research is done by him on his Woodham family and his four grand-parents and each of his eight great grandparent's families. To date, he has information on at least 20,000 Woodham descendants. As if that weren't enough kinfolks to track down and gather records on, he also has records on at least half a million other relatives. He has several hundred notebooks full of records (about 300 on the Woodham family) and enough information to fill several hundred more but can't buy that many.

All this work is done the old-fashioned way with just a typewriter. A lot of hard work is simply wasted because it could be done in hundreds of less hours by a computer. A computer would allow us to contact many more relatives by mail than we now have time for. We could also write our newsletters and set headlines with it. Since we can no longer afford to hire a typesetting company for our headlines, it now must be done by cutting out words and phrases from newspapers and magazines, then paste them together. Once the newsletters are printed, they must be hand-addressed.

All this takes about three weeks of work for each issue of the newsletter. It could be done in two or three days with a computer and look a lot better. We could also store all our records on a few computer disks and donate these to local libraries and state archives to preserve them for future generations in case our original records were lost or damaged.

A computer and printer are expensive. We cannot think of such without your help. With a computer, we can do a lot more for YOU.

Woodham sets singing record

sings out for cause

There have been a lot of singers in our family--a few who could sing like angels, a few mourning doves here and there, a lot of "shouters" and "moaners", yodelers and even a few who have sung professionally. However, nobody but nobody can sing like Gary L. Woodham of Mobile, Ala.

In fact, no one in the whole wide world can sing like Gary! He just broke the world's record for non-stop singing. The previous Guinness Book of World Records time was 200 hours and 20 minutes for continuous singing. Gary broke this record Labor Day weekend after singing continuously for 207 hours and will now enter the Guinness Book as the new world's champion non-stop singer.

This was not just a lark for Gary but very serious business. He put his vocal chords to work for nine days to help the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA) raise funds. The MDA sponsors a nationwide telethon (with Jerry Lewis) every year which raises funds to combat the dreaded muscular dystrophy disease.

Gary's son had heart surgery several times and he first wanted to help Crippled Children's Fund raise money but so much red tape with that organization led him to offer his aid to MDA.

A former professional singer, Gary came up with the idea of using his talent as a way to help raise funds for a good cause. In addition to the national telethon, many local organizations and television stations have area and local entertainers and special programs to bring attention to the problem posed by this disease.

Gary didn't just want to sing but to do something spectacular. And he did.

The rules set up by the Guinness Book of World Records required

that he sing continuously; he was given a five minute break every hour. He could save up the time, up to an hour, so he could have a longer period to shower, eat and relax. witnesses had to be present at all time to affirm he maintained his singing. The rules did not permit him to sleep during the entire nine days. The physical endurance of being awake and singing nine days all worked a tremendous hardship upon Gary. There were times when the room and people began to "swim about" him. Starting at 9 AM Sunday, 27 Aug., in the lounge of a Mobile, Alabama Holiday Inn, Gary crooned non-stop until the early hours of 5 Sept. -- a total of about 207 hours!!

You would think anyone who sang for that length of time would eventually run out of songs and have to repeat themselves a lot. Not Gary; he has a collection of music for 550 contemporary songs on tape. He accompanied the music: that gave him plenty of variety.

He decided not to just break the old record but to set a new one that would be harder to break. Now, he can proudly say he not only gave a big boost to ending a dreaded disease but that he is also the world's champ. Our congragulations to you Gary!

Gary's arduous efforts brought rewards to the MDA in the form of several thousand dollars pledged to the local organization as a result of his singing. The MDA uses the funds for medical research, children's and adult hospitals and clinics, wheelchairs and other equipment for those crippled by the disease. The money Gary helped raise will ease a lot of suffering.

Declining membership threatens

The Woodham Family Association suffered a series of major setbacks during the past year, leaving the family club without money and practically no members.

Breakdowns of equipment have plagued us for more than a year; we are no longer receiving mail from our Atlanta post office box; and we have started our new year with almost no members.

It started last year when our copying machine blew up. It took 3½ months and several hundred dollars to get repaired. Then the typewriter broke down-five times! It is now more than 25 years old and the repair bills in the past ear have cost about six times what it is worth. The time limit for forwarding mail from our old Atlanta address expired in December and we haven't received mail since then. This means we have not gotten any membership dues or donations to operate on this year.

Our fiscal year begins every May at the reunion and membership dues (\$10 yearly) should be paid then. Since we had no money to print and mail newsletters reminding folks about the reunion, no one came for this year's llth National Reunion: and since most relatives renew their memberships at the reunion, we thus ended up starting out a new year with no funds nor members.

This crisis comes at a time when we are embarked upon the most expensive efforts yet undertaken by the Association: restoration of our two Woodham Cemeteries and publication of the first history book on our amily. Needless to say, these are also the most important projects we have ever attempted.

It isn't hard to see that if we don't have membership dues and do-

nations to pay for newsletters, then we can't get word to relatives about these vital efforts.

We must make a determined effort to get relatives to renew their membership in the Association. We must also seek relatives who have never joined and convince them of the importance of our family club's goals and projects so that they too, will become members.

Every person has responsibilities to their family. Our parents raise us and we in turn have responsibilities for them--even after they are dead. When mothers and fathers are laid in their graves, it is YOUR duty to take care of their memory and graves. Our mothers and fathers must not be forgotten: those people who fail to preserve their memory and resting place are too sorry to be mentioned.

The Association is YOUR family club--we work (as volunteers) for YOUR family. If you do not join the Association every year, you are neglecting your family duties. Please renew your membership every year and help us help you.

The older records uses the language of "late Middle English" and is starkly different from modern American.

Just as we take pride in seeing one of our children make the school honor roll, so too do we take pride when they achieve honors as an adult; especially when they reach world renown.

One of the latest achievements of Jean was the dedication of her new sculpture "Interchange" on the campus of Central Connecticut State University. The sculpture was commissioned by ARA Services as a gift to the university.

The university also held a twoweek exhibit of Jean's work.

In the arts, a sculptor or painter is "commissioned" (or paid) by someone or a company to produce a piece of artwork. Jean's major commissions include sculptures for the Genral Electric Credit Corp.; General relephone and Electronics headquarters; Texas Eastern Transmission, Houston Center; Westport, Conn. Town Hall; Electrolux Corp.; New York Board of Education; Flintcote Co. corporate headquarters; Auburn University Architecture and Fine Arts Center; Montgomery Temple Beth-Or; International Bank for Reconstruction and Development; and Westport, Conn. Temple Israel.

Among her 33 awards are the Medal of Honor, National Association of Women Artists, 1966 & 1974; Audubon Medal for Creative Sculpture; Olivetti Award for Modern Sculpture; United Nations Association of Connecticut citation as Connecticut's Most Outstanding Woman; the Kate Neal Kinley Memorial Fellowship of the University of Illinois; the Connecticut Academy Prize for Sculpture.

Three of her sculptures were featured at the 1964 New York World's air by General Foods Corp.

Mildred Jean Woodham (she dropped the Mildred in later years) was born 16 Aug., 1925 in Midland City, Dale County, Alabama, daughter of Marcus Morton Woodham Sr. and Alma Clements. She grew up in Geneva County, where her father was a teacher and County Agricultural Agent for many years.

Jean graduated from Auburn University and did three years of study at New York Sculpture Center. Her career has also included a stint as a teacher at Auburn.

From the little village of Midland City, Jean's meteoric career has taken her far and wide. She has exhibited her artwork in England, Belgium, Mexico, Chile, Brazil, Bulgaria, Argentina and throughout the United States.

Among the museums and galleries that have exhibited Jean's work are the world famous Whitney Museum, New York; Museum of Modern Art, Rio de Janerio, Brazil; Museum of Modern Art, Mexico City; National Museum of Fine Arts, Santiago, Chile; Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts; Boston Museum of Fine Arts; National Academy Galleries, New York; Stuttman Gallery, Heller Gallery, Sculpture Center and Barone Gallery, New York; New Burlington Galleries, London; the Foreign Art Museum, Sophia, Bulgaria; and many more. Her work can also be seen at the General Electric permanent display at the Epcot Center, Disney World.

She specializes in welded modern art and works with arc and tungsten, inert gas welding tools and other tools not usually associated with an artist. She has two studios in Westport. Jean is the only artist today who produces all her work in her own studio; other artists working in large scale have their work done in foundaries.

Jean lives in Weston, Conn. She is the mother of two daughters, Melissa and Elizabeth Leigh. Both are by her first marriage to James L. Caraway. She married Harold Friedman, a noted attorney, in 1986.

Her sister Vadella is a retired nurse; her brother John Webster is a prominent Montgomery, Ala. architect; and her brother Marcus Jr. was last known to be a bank examiner for the Alabama Banking Dept.

Jean visited England two years ago and found numerous records on our family in Essex County dating from the 1500's and 1600's.

There will be a big fireworks display at the amphitheater at 9:30 PM. Please bring all the aerial fireworks you can for the show; the more the merrier! Rex Woodham is in charge of entertaiment—bring your fireworks to him.

There will be a teen party and weiner roast at Eufaula Inn's poolside Saturday night. Please bring grills, weiners and charcoal for this event; along with a record player, records and or tapes for your entertainment. Adults will eat at the Inn's resturant at 7:30 PM.

All Sunday activities will be held at the second picnic pavillion in Lakepoint's picnic area. Registration begins at 9 AM. The family picnic will be spread at n on. A special memorial program will begin about 1 PM (see page 3). A progress report on our (cont. on page 2)

current efforts to restore and preserve the two Woodham family cemeteries will be a main topic of discussion (see page 2).

Plans for publishing the first comprehensive history book ever written on the Woodham family will be discussed along with plans for our second family photo album. We need a lot of family support to accomplish publication of these two books. Without your support, we will not be able to purchase copies of the oldest records in America on our family. These records, daing from the 1680's to the 1740's, were recently recovered by the Virginia State Archives after being lost for 120 years. We hope to print copies of these old Woodham records in the history book but we must pay for expensive photographs of the records -- they cannot be xeroxed.

Bring your handcrafts, photo albums, old quilts, large framed pictures, antiques and heirlooms to display during the reunion.

Eufaula is a great place for a family reunion and you will fina a lot of sights to see and recreational facilities. Lake Eufaula offers plenty of water sports and fantastic fishing. There are numerous antebellum homes, many open for tours. Tom Mann's Fish World is one of the largest freshwater aquariums in America. Eufaula National Wildlife Refuge has beautiful scenic areas.

Lakepoint State Park is one of Alabama's resort state parks. It has a lodge with motel rooms overlooking the lake, golf course, tennis courts, indoor and outdoor swimming pools, a beach, boat marina (you can rent or bring your own boat for water skiing and fishing), cottages, campground, nature trails, game room, resturant and coffee shop and stables where you can go horseback riding.

Lakepoint was the site of our first Woodham National Reunion in 1979, when an estimated 1,600 relatives from these states attended: Alabama, Texas, Florida, Georgia, California, North Carolina, South Carolina, New Jersey, Connecticut, Virginia, Maryland, Kentucky, Indiana, Michigan, Tennessee, Arkansas, Mississippi, Louisiana.

Many kinfolks from long distances away have not been able to attend since the first one, especially the older ones. Let's make this our big gest NATIONAL reunion yet. Give you elderly relatives a ride and bring the teenagers and kids for a good time!

Preserve a slice of history

ring your family Bibles and other family records to the reunion so copies of these can be made to preserve in our Woodham National Library. We will have a copying machine available for this Saturday and Sunday.

Family Bibles are one of the most important sources of family records people commonly have in their homes but most people overlook. We finally managed to get copies last year of the oldest known Woodham family Bible in America. It was printed in 1815; birthdates written in it start in 1771. We also obtained good xerox copies of the second oldest Bible, printed in 1875. We will print copies of these in our history book.

Please bring old deeds, estate records, wills, tax receipts, school awards, club memberships and other family records you can find. We especially want to make copies of birth certificates, marriage licenses,

death certificates, obituaries, newspaper articles, etc.

If you have any old letters written by a Woodham or Woodham descendant, we want to make copies to preserve. Letters written by soldiers or sailors during World War I, World War II, the Korean War and other wars should be copied. Ww would also like to make copies of military discharges. This is one of the most important types of military records that we try to preserve. We now have several books full of such military records. Yours is important to us also.

The oldest letter we now have was written in 1859 by a Woodham in Dale County to a relative in South Carolina. Your letters today will be just as precious to our descendants 100 years from now.

We have so little left today on our ancestors--we should be more concerned about what we leave for the future.

A Matter Of Grave Concern

Restoration of our Woodham Family Cemetery in Dale County, Alabama is well underway and a chain link fence has been erected surrounding the site.

A small group of relatives have done a wonderful job on this major effort. This is the biggest and most expensive project the family has undertaken since the Woodham Family Association was founded.

James Ople ("Jim") Woodham is chairman of the Cemetery Committee. Mrs. Juanita Woodham is treasurer. Jim and his brother Rex have done a lot of back-breaking work to clean up the cemetery. The group has been holding monthly and special meetings since November. They have already raised enough funds to pay for the chain link fence but a lot more work still remains to be done that will require more money.

We will discuss plans for the Dale County cemetery and for the 200 year old Woodham Cemetery at Bishopville, SC during the reunion. A second Temetery Committee will be organized in Lee County in June. Each

committee will be in charge of future maintenance in their area. However, restoration and fundraising will be a project of the entire family.

Some of our plans include:

- pouring cement slabs on each identifiable grave; these slabs will be "temporary" until we can afford nicer tombstones.
- landscape both cemeteries with trees shrubs and flowers; we will spray weed killer chemicals this summer so this will delay planting until fall or next spring. We plan to turn each cemetery into a real "show place".
- erect signs with the name "Woodham Cemetery" and start efforts to have historical markers installed.
- restore all existing tombstones.
- perect tombstones for veterans in both cemeteries, including one for Edward Woodham Jr., a veteran of the Revolutionary War (1775-1783). He was the "father" of all Woodhams from the South. We will also erect tombstones for veterans of Indian Wars and the War Between the States. These tombstones are provided free by the federal government to all veterans.

Memorial Service Slated

A special Memorial Service will be held to honor all Woodhams, their husbands and wives and Woodham descendants who have died during the last ten years since our first National Reunion. The memorial will be part of the activities Sunday afternoon, 29 May, during the reunion.

We will literally "Speak their name, that they shall be remembered."

Everyone who has lost a loved one during this time is urged to be present so you can personally memorialize them. You will be asked to announce the full name of the deceased, when they were born, when they died and their parent's names. Members of their immediate families ould do this.

This memorial program will be filmed and tape recorded; copies will be preserved in our Family Library for future generations.

If you have obituaries on these relatives, please bring them with you.
Hopefully, the memorial program will become a traditional part of our annual reunions.

DOTHAN, Ala.--Bessie and J. B. Daughtry continue to surprise us with new information and records about our family. Since county records of Dale County, Ala. were destroyed in 1884, it is hard to learn anything about Woodham girls prior to then because there are no public records to tell us who they married.

J. B. has in his possession many records handed down from his grandfather, Major Holland ("Fox") Daughtry, husband of Nellie Woodham. Fox was a son-in-law of Aris Woodham Jr. and served as administrator of the estate when Aris died. To date, we did not know anything about one of Aris' daughter, Cynthia C. ("Sinthia", "Sentha") Woodham. J. B. found among his grandfather's papers a document from the estate records of Aris showing Cynthia married R. A. A. Wright and they were living in Escambia County, Fla. in 1882. The record is a power of attorney issued by Cynthia to William Dossett to act on her behalf. Dossett was another son-inlaw of Aris.

We hope to print this historic document in our first history book. Bessie and J. B. have turned into real experts in gathering family history—our thanks again!

COUSINS VISIT OUR ENGLISH HOMELAND

Several Woodham kinfolk made visits to England last year and two of them brought us back information on our English ancestors.

Visitors were treated to face painting, free prizes and gifts, free food, balloons, fireworks and a great festive atmosphere. It was a perfect event for a wonder-

ful family reunion!

Apparently, this is being planned as an annual event for Eufaula so we will have this to look forward to again at future family reunions. Let's hope so!

Relatives from such places as othan, Headland, Montgomery, Abbeville, Ozark, Midland City, Clayton, Eufaula, Enterprise in Alabama; and Columbus, Iron City, Albany, LaGrange, Marietta and At-

Atlanta, Georgia; Moody, Tex.; Orlando, Panama City, Lynn Haven, Chipley and Tallahassee, Fla. were represented at this year's National Reunion.

Progress on restoring our Woodham Family Cemetery at Newton, Alabama was discussed. Mrs. Juanita Carroll Woodham, wife of Ben H. Woodham and daughter of Ada Elizabeth Woodham, gave a preliminary financial report of the Cemetery Committee. To date, the Committee has raised more than \$3,000 from donations to pay for a chain link fence surrounding the slightly more than one acre cemetery, construction and erection of a metal archway over the gate and other expenses. way has metal letters reading: "Woodham Cemetery, Founded 1848". (see the separate story on cemetery)

Plans for the first complete book ever written on our Woodham family history were announced by our historian, Robert Earl Woodham. We announced this book last fall and so far, the Association has received less than 20 orders for it. (see story on book)

As always happens, some folks turned up without making plans or reservations for motel rooms and couldn't find one. A group from Orlando, Fla. came Saturday and discovered every room in town full up and returned home that day, very disappointed. We warn every year that Eufaula is a resort town and motels fill up on holiday weekends.

We always hold our Woodham National Reunion at Eufaula every Memorial Day weekend, so you should plan on this site and date every year. This is permanent: same time and place every year so that we don't have to wonder when and where. You should make your room or camping reservations well ahead of time. Since you know the same time & place every year—don't make conflicting plans for other events.

Cemeteries should be treasure ... not shame

Cemetery fund set up

hanks to a lot of hard work and generous donations by a small group of Woodham descendants, the sacred burial grounds of our mothers and fathers has been removed from the "forgotten" list and restored to a place of dignity and pride

The Woodham Cemetery near Newton and Ozark, in Dale County, Ala. had become such an overgrown jungle that many graves could not be seen. Now, weeds, brush and vines are gone. Azaleas, japonicas and other flowers will soon take their place as relatives strive to turn it into a garden spot of beauty.

The latest word from the Cemetery Committee is that the archway over the gate has been installed. It announces the name "Woodham Cemetery, founded 1848." The chain link fence which surrounds most of the land and the archway have been the biggest expenses of the committee thus far.

Our next major expense will be for marking graves of as many relatives buried there who we can identify. We will install cement slabs on a temporary basis until we can afford nicer marble or granite tombstones.

Mrs. Adrian Roper of Columbus, Ga. has already begun an effort to raise funds for a tombstone on the grave of her great great grandfather, Edward Harley Woodham Sr. and his wife, Sarah Dowling. We have asked Adrian to head a fund-raising campaign for both the family cemeteries. She was responsible for the campaign to buy our own copying machine.

The Association will sponsor several fund-raising projects in the future to help pay for improvements at the cemeteries. Next spring, we plan to hold yard sales at Newton and Bishop-ville. Kinfolks will be asked to donate saleable items (clean out your attics, barns & closets); ladies will be asked to give baked goods. We Will welcome all types of handcrafts, tools, paintings, quilts, potted plants, etc.

This will not be a one-time event; we hope to have several such sales. We also hope to turn them into real

extravaganza's as a combined crafts fair, yard sale, bake sale and perhaps with entertainment also.

We will have a raffle for a handmade quilt. Adrian sewed a very beautiful quilt and sold tickets for it to raise funds for our copier. She will do the same for the cemetery fund. (see story on raffle)

The Dale County Cemetery Committee has discussed purchase of additional land beside the cemetery for use as a park area. They propose building a picnic shelter where annual gatherings can be held during a "decoration day". Fresh flowers would be placed on each grave to commemorate our deceased relatives. If this is done, we would seriously consider holding our Woodham National Reunion at the park from now on.

We have done a wonderful job at the Alabama cemetery so far. Now, the same effort must be made to restore and preserve the oldest known Woodham burial site in America. The Woodham Cemetery at Stokes Bridge in Lee Cowas founded probably in the late 1790's. If you are a Woodham or descendant of a Woodham, then your ancestors are buried here: Edward Woodham Jr. and his wife Mary are the Mother and Father of almost all the Woodhams from the South.

Our most important task in Lee Co. must be to erect a chain link fence as we have done in Alabama. As soon as the cotton crop on the site is harvested, we will take steps to put up a temporary barricade around the cemetery until funds have been raised for the fence.

Robert Earl has done a tremendous amount of research this year to try and identify every person buried at the cemeteries. He has also tried to identify all the veterans so we can order tombstones for them from the federal government. These are your ancestors: YOU should help preserve and protect them.

Moodham Heritage

Aris Woodham Jr.

A literal gold mine of "new" information has been discovered on our family, bringing to light many facts previously unknown to us. The new information includes numerous obituaries (dating from the 1870's to the present), newspaper articles, court records, family data, cemetery records and more.

Thanks to one of those obituaries, published more than 115 years ago, we now have a better understanding of the family of Aris Woodham Junior. Aris Jr. was the son of Aris Woodham Senior and Rachel Beasley. He was born at Stokes Bridge in Darlington County (now part of Lee County), South Carolina on 2 June, 1801. Aris Jr. married first about 1818 to Rachel Richardson, daughter of Joseph Richardson.

Aris Jr. and Rachel had at least six children, according to census and other records. Their known children were Joseph Reddick, who died as a soldier during the War Between the States at Pensacola, Fla.; Edward Christopher ("Chris", "C.C."); Elemiah; Prudence Jane and a daughter reported to be Martha.

Rachel died about 1830. She was still living when the 1830 census was taken and that census shows she and Aris had six children living.

Aris married Caron H. ("Carrie", "Karen") Riley on 25 Dec., 1831. Carrie was born 1810 in Darlington Co., daughter of John and Mary Riley. Sometime during the fall of 1833, the big migration of Woodhams and many relatives and neighbors began, which took them to Southeast Alabama.

Carrie had at least 10 children: John Alexander was born in South Carolina, the rest in Alabama. As Edward apparently died as a child; the only other child I cannot find information on is a daughter, Ellen. All seven of Aris Junior's sons served as soldiers during the War Between the States (1861-65). Aris also had grandsons who served as soldiers. Ira Aris was never married; he died as a young man in the Confederate Army. John Alexander had one son before he went off to war and died.

Carrie died 16 March, 1873 in Dale County, Alabama. She was buried in the Woodham Family Cemetery near their home. Aris married about 1875 to a widow, Clarissa Elizabeth, whose maiden name is unknown. Aris had more than 70 grandchildren, including infants who died young. Aris Jr. died in 1880 and is buried at the Woodham Cemetery. He was a farmer throughout his life.

His descendants today are so numerous they could populate a small county. His oldest known son, Joseph Reddick, married Candice Riley. Candice was the niece of Caron. They had 11 known children: Aris, Pheriba, Martha Elizabeth, Reddick, Mary, Needham W., John Edward, Nancy Winifred ("Winnie") Nellie Josephine, Elizabeth Ann ("Betsy") and Sarah Ann.

Edward Christopher ("Chris") married first to Joanna Riley, a sister of Caron. They had 10 known children: Cynthia, John Wesley, Moses ("Mode"), William, Ira Edward, Thomas Latrell, Joseph Christoper, Uriah Daniel, Jasper Richard and Carrie Elizabeth. He married second to Louesta Kennedy and reportedly had two more sons.

Elemiah married Lewis Bowden in 1837 and died about 1843. No children are known of hers as yet.

Prudence Jane married John Wilson Dean in 1845 and moved to Tangipahoa Parisha, Louisiana. She had ll known children: Krisie, Jaisia or Gincey, William A., Matilda, Andrew, Mary, Charles F., Pascal W., Elizabeth, Minerva Chalnesy and Uriah Dean.

I cannot confirm the report of a daughter, Martha who married a Bagwell. John Alexander married Rebecca Barnes and had one son, John Webster. Stephen Moses ("Mode") married Sarah Amanda Jane Galloway in 1856 and had at least five children; only John Wesley and Perry Caswell Sr. lived to adulthood. Stephen Moses' wife Sarah Amanda was the daughter of Elizabeth Woodham, a daughter of Athanasius Woodham.

Stephen Moses, Sarah Amanda and their son Perry Caswell Sr. ("Cas") and his wife are all buried in the Woodham Cemetery.

Mary married first to Joseph Maund and after his death, to William J.

Dossett. I have no info on any of her children yet.

Nelly (Nellie) married Major Holland ("Fox") Daughtry and had 10 known children: Cynthia Almedia Ann, Mary H. ("Tissy"), Sarah Jane, Martin J., Albert O., Samuel Hilburn, James Wilburn, Ida, Cordelia ("Delie") and Pheribe Daughtry. Nelly and Fox are also buried at the Woodham Cemetery. Cynthia married R. A. A. Wright and moved to Escambia County, Florida.

We don't have any information on her family yet.

Uriah married Elizabeth Jane Graham and moved to Walton County, Florida. He had no children.

Daniel William married Martha Ann Enfinger in 1869. They had at least 10 children, including five infants who died very young. The five who reached adulthood were Walter Lewis, Bartow E., Marvin Bishop, Mattie and William Robertson.

Aris Jr. obtained a federal homestead in Barbour County when he first settled in Alabama. His brother Athanasius received a homestead in nearby Henry County and their uncle Edward Harley Woodham Sr. homesteaded near the forks of the Choctawhatchee River in Dale County. Aris later sold his homestead in Barbour County and moved near his uncle. His home was in the forks of the river along what is today "Woodham Road" near Bagwell's Crossroads. You can see his farmland from U.S. Highway 231 southeast of Ozark. He homesteaded several tracts and bought several others also from private individuals. He amassed land holdings totaling at least 1,500 and possibly more than 2,000 acres.

The recently discovered obituary of Caron was printed in the "Southern Christian Advocate", the official publication of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. It states she had been a faithful member of the Methodist Church throughout her life except forms few years when she attended a Missionary Baptist Church when no Methodist church was located nearby.

The obituary also states Caron and Aris Jr. moved from South Carolina in 1833 to Henry County, Alabama. However, this does not match with the fact Aris Jr. acquired his homestead in Barbour County. It further states they moved in 1834 to Dale County.

One personal item included in the obituary was a very tender agreement Aris Jr. and Caron made with each other five years before she died. They developed a signal for the first one who died to use. In the event they could not speak, the signal would show that "all was well" with them. As she lay dying, Caron gave Aris the signal and then passed on.

It isn't often that we can discover such intimate knowledge of our ancestors, especially those who died more than 100 years ago. That makes

this particular obituary a real family treasure.

When funds become available, we hope some day to acquire other Woodham family obituaries which have been printed in such church publications as printed by the Baptist and Methodist churches. Very likely, an obituary was printed on Aris Jr. when he died in 1880. If we can find one, this will give us a precise date of his death.

The graves of Aris Jr. and Caron at the Woodham Cemetery do not have tombstones. One of our major goals in restoration of the two Woodham Cemeteries is to erect a tombstone on Aris Jr. and Caron's graves. This obituary will give us dates to inscribe on it, which we did not have before. Their graves are marked with rocks and iron rods. Mrs. Mellona Woodham recalls helping Powell A. Woodham of Newton, Mississippi place the iron rods at the graves during the 1930's, when she was still a teenager.

We would like to locate the exact burial site of Aris Junior's son Stephen Moses and his wife Sarah Amanda. I believe they are the graves surrounded by bricks on the same row as Aris and Caron but I have no proof

of this.

The Meaning Of Christmas!

hanksgiving and Christmas holidays have always meant "family" to me. When I was a kid, it was traditional for all my Woodham aunts, uncles and cousins to gather each Thanksgiving and Christmas at Granny Woodham's (Mrs. John Wesley-Lillie-Woodham) home near Iron City, Georgia.

I could see Mama's family more often than Daddy's since I spent most of my childhood in an adjoining county. Therefore a visit to Granny's was always a treat in itself. During the holidays, the whole Woodham family gathered there, making this a real "family affair". There was a lot of visiting during the holidays. One of our favorite games as kids was to discover the hiding place for Santa's presents at each cousin's home. Parents could be downright smart sometimes in picking hiding places! One particular Christmas, the grownups were away and about nine of the grandchildren, ranging in age from about three to 12 or 13, formed a "search party". Of four homes, only one eluded us. We searched everywhere--even the outhouse! We were ready to give up when Darrell (who was still at the age when he did about as much crawling as walking) crawled under the bed and let out a squeal of delight. We knew right away what that squeal meant. I still to this day can't believe Aunt Lois put one over on us by hiding Santa in such an obvious place. Under the bed? That was so easy we didn't evey bother to look!!

The most exciting part of the holidays for me came after the presents were opened: then came the trip to Granny's. The holidays for us were a time for feasting. Growing up a country boy in the South during the 1940's -50's meant things such as oranges and apples were almost a luxury and found at the average table only during the holidays. All the exotic nuts, fruits, pies and cakes were much more dazzling to me than toys under the Christmas tree. Both Mama's and Daddy's folks had homes with fireplaces in every room. We roasted nuts in those cozy fireplaces.

I'll always remember Aunt Florence's specialty, ambrosia (no wonder the Greeks call it the "food of the Gods"). Granny had her own pecan trees so pecan pie and sweet potato souffle with pecans were always delicacies I looked foward to. And Granny's biscuits; Mama said Granny Woodham cooked more biscuits in her life than anyone she knew--and the best!

The holiday meals were truely worth waiting a whole year for. What a feast! It was like a cattle stampede when dinner was finally served. Afterward, you always heard the same thing, year after year: "I'll never eat that much again the rest of my life." The girls would take a walk-this was supposed to be "walking it off"--to get rid of all those rich calories. When it came time to wash dishes, Aunt Florence and Betty Ann hid in the outhouse. By mid-afternoon, we were back at the table again (never mind those vows never to eat again). Boy, could we eat!

Sometimes, the menfolks would cook up a big batch of that famous Seminole County jollop. It can be made with any type game, bird or fish.but my favorite is turkey jollop.

Our tradition of spending the holidays at Granny's continued until the old homeplace burned in the mid-1960's. Granny spent her last year in a nursing home and died in 1969. Our family has gathered for a holiday only one time since then: Thanksgiving, 1978. During the span of more than 10 years when we did not gather, the grandchildren grew up and had children of their own. When we met in 1978, we were surprised to see how our family had grown in numbers; some of us were saddened to realize there were those among us who did not know each other. Today, Granny's family has spread all over the country; now, the grandchildren are grandparents. I have not seen some of my first cousins in 20 years.

Those holidays I spent with my kinfolks were the fondest memories I have: I will always cherish them. Those were wonderful times. I hope your holidays this year will be as wonderful for you. Merry Christmas and a

happy New Year!

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Historic Landmark Escapes Destruction

Our Woodham Family Cemetery in Dale County, Alabama came very close to serious damage recently at the hands of a developer who wanted to make a big profit off the graves of our relatives.

This nightmare began last fall when Wade Keller (an Ozark CPA and developer) bought the land around the cemetery from James Crooks. Keller wrote to Robert Earl, claiming he "owned" the Woodham Cemetery and wanted to "sell" it back to the Woodham family. He made an offer of \$10,000 for what he claimed was only out one-half an acre--it is actuallarger than an acre.

Adrian Roper of Columbus, Ga. (daughter of the late Tessie Inez Woodham Hundley) dropped by Robert Earl's apartment in early February and found him worried and nervous about the cemetery. "I have one of those gut feelings of mine that the cemetery is in real danger," he told Adrian. He was agonizing over the fact his old car would not make the trip to Alabama to see about the danger. Adrian volunteered to take him down. The two spent most of the day at the Dale County courthouse in Ozark. Robert Earl did a title trace on the land around the cemetery and tracked down each sale of the land since 1986 when it was sold to Keller, all the way back to 1890.

He bought xerox copies of each deed when it was sold during those 96 years. The Dale County courthouse burned in 1884 and all public records were destroyed, so no deeds ist on this land prior to 1890.

Thank God that 1890 deed contained a "deed reservation" stating all the land was being sold "...except the one acre belonging to the Grave Yard."

That clause was all we needed. Robert Earl then went to the Tax Assessor's Office to make sure the cemetery was registered as a tax-exempt site. It was but their records were wrong. They had used an aerial photo to plot the cemetery onto a tax map and mistook a nearby 50 foot by 50 foot fish camp shed for the cemetery. When he showed them the 1890 deed, Tax Official David Rogers said "You're right, it is one acre; maybe more." He corrected it on an official tax map.

Adrian and Robert Earl left and went straight to James Ople ("Jim") Woodham's store-resturant on US 231 near the cemetery. Jim took Robert Earl down to the cemetery and they discovered Keller had just bulldozed a road through part of the cemetery.

The northern half of the graveyard has no tombstones but once had rocks and bricks marking many graves. Keller bulldozed this area clean and and made the first "cut" of a road through this part. He planned to come back and deepen the cut to a gradual slope. The cut was about 1½ feet deep.

The gut feeling of danger turned out to be very real!

We called Keller immediately. At first, he did not want to meet with Robert Earl, saying he had too many appointments that night. However Robert Earl said he would wait until midnight if necessary. Jim called a few relatives and told them "Robert Earl is here and he's found something on the cemetery." That was all it took; by the time Keller arrived, the place was full of kinfolks.

Robert Earl laid out the copies of deeds in front of Keller, along with a large tax map and aerial photo from the Tax Assessor's Office.

"You do not own our family cemetery," (continued on page 2)

Robert Earl told Keller, adding "It has never been sold to anyone."
Keller finally admitted he did not own the cemetery after seeing such overwhelming evidence.

As if this were not enough of a shock for a greedy developer, Robert Earl gave Keller another big shock. Keller had widened a narrow dirt lane on one side of the cemetery into a full-sized road. He had completed foundation work, put in ditches and was ready to pave the road leading into land he is going to sell of as lots.

Keller was dumbfounded when Robert Earl announced "This road isn't your private property. You are about to pave a public road. This is and always has been a public road." Robert Earl also informed Keller "You have committed a crime by bulldozing a road through this cemetery. Do not bring a bulldozer onto this property again," he warned.

Some relatives had visited the courthouse in hopes of finding any possible records to prove Keller did not own our cemetery. Some even hired some lawyers. No one was able to locate anything however, until Robert Earl discovered the 1890 deed and others.

"All it took was for the top man to be here and set things right," said Jim Woodham.

Sometimes it takes a crisis such as this to get folks to do something. A growing number of kinfolks have certainly rallied to face this danger. We owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to those who have labored to clean up the site and to those who have donated funds for its restoration.

This cemetery crisis is the best example for why we need a national family club; there is a strong possibility we could have lost our cemetery if it were not for the Woodham Family Association.

None of us acting alone can accomplish very much for our family. But we can do might things if we act together as a family.

When the Association was formed, we got off track and became divided before we had a chance to create a

real family club. For nine years,

a handful of us have worked very hard to build a strong organization for all of us to rally around.

Now, for the first time in many years (since our first and second National Reunions), we are experiencing a new unity among our relatives and a real feeling of FAMILY. This was a primary goal of the Association when it was founded. We have planted the seed of family unity once again. This time, we must ensure that it grows stronger.

The crisis we faced with our Woodham Family Cemetery has had a surprising but wonderful side effect in creating renewed interest in our Woodham National Reunion. It couldn't have come at a better time: this year, we celebrate our 10th Anniversary reunion.

We are planning two days of activities, beginning with a cookout at noon in Lakepoint State Park's picnic area on Saturday, 28 May. The rest of the day we will meet at Eufaula Inn (formerly the Holiday Inn) in downtown. We will eat together at the Inn Saturdanight and have a gathering at the amphitheater next to the motel overlooking the lake. We hope some of you will volunteer to provide entertainment that night. Bring your fireworks for our own fireworks display, to make this a real celebration.

We will have a lot of the Woodham family records on display at the motel Saturday afternoon. Throughout the reunion, we will have our own copying machine on hand, so please bring family Bibles, old letters, high school diplomas, birth and death certificates and other records for us to copy. Bring your pictures and photo albums to display.

On Sunday, 29 May, all activities will take place at the picnic area of Lakepoint State Park. Bring a picnic basket and spread together at noon.

Our family colors are red and white and our family symbol is the white rose. Please wear red and white all weekend. Woodham Books

he first complete history ever written about the Woodham family is now underway, sponsored by the Woodham Family Association. We printed a small booklet in 1980 with a brief history but that was just something to "tide us over" until a full sized, comprehensive history could be prepared.

The "WOODHAM FAMILY HISTORY, Volume I" will cover our beginnings in England and our American family since the year 1655 when our first American ancestor settled in Virginia, up through the 1800's. The "HISTORY" will be a full sized book, containing about 120 or more pages.

The "HISTORY" will contain copies of historic documents on Woodhams dating back to the 1600's. You will be able to see copies of actual courthouse records from the 1690's, military records, land grants, tax lists and other records from the 1600's and 1700's. We will have a copy of the receipt showing payment to our ancestor Edward Woodham Junior by the State of North Carolina for his service as a soldier during the Revolutionary War; a copy of his will dated 1820; copies of land surveys and land grants where Woodhams obtained land from the Royal government of the Colony of North Carolina during the 1700's.

The "HISTORY" is being compiled by Robert Earl Woodham, the Woodham Family Historian. His hobby for more than 35 years has been research on our Woodham family, both living relatives and our ancestors. When he decided to write a book or books about the family back in the 1970's, only three or four people had any idea whatsoever about our ancestors in the 1700's. Many relatives did not know who their Woodham grandparents were and the majority could not tell who their great grandparents were, much less anything about them.

Now, for the first time we and our children after us, will be able to know and understand our family heritage. This proud past was "lost" to generations of our family but our new book will preserve it for the future.

Moodham Family

Robert Earl Woodham announced in 1979 when he founded the Woodham Family Association that one of our primary goals would be to restore and preserve our Woodham family cemeteries near Bishopville, South Carolina and Ozark, Alabama. The recent crisis over the Woodham Family Cemetery at Ozark has forced us to treat this project with more urgency.

The hard lessons we have learned from what happened to both cemeteries has taught us we cannot sit idly and wait for someone else to do something. Our historic South Carolina Woodham Cemetery, site of the oldest marked Woodham graves in America and resting place of the "father" and "mother" of 99 per cent of the Woodhams in America, has been completely

destroyed and plowed over.

After we provide "protection" for both these cemeteries, the next most important task must be to identify all the people who are buried in each one. It will be even harder for the South Carolina cemetery since that graveyard is so old and all the tombstones have disappeared. There are several dozen relatives (including infants) buried at the Dale County, Alacemetery in graves without tombstones. It will take a lot of effort to identify these relatives before we can begin to erect tombstones for them.

There are now only a few relatives still living who can point out the unmarked graves and tell us who they are. We have already interviewed some elderly people in the area and hope to talk to more this summer.

In addition to personal interviews with living people, we will see information from obituaries in old newspapers and from death certificates to identify others who might be buried in both cemeteries. I have been looking for obituaries of people buried in the Alabama cemetery for years. I was told a long time ago that Perry Caswell ("Cas") Woodham and his wife Amanda Jane were buried here but had no proof. I have searched old Dale County newspapers at Alabama State Archives in Montgomery; I have looked for proof on Cas for more than 20 years. In March, I finally discovered an unlabeled volume of old newspapers in the courthouse at Ozark. I found his obituary and a front-page story about his son, Eustice Houston Woodham and his Wife May and May's sister all being killed in a car wreck on their way to attend Cas' funeral. I hope to be able to Montgomery this summer and search more old papers to look for other burials.

This cemetery was founded as a family graveyard probably in the 1840's on land owned by Edward Harley Woodham Senior. I have put together a notebook full of records on the cemetery containing everything I can find on

both cemeteries.

I have prepared a map showing land owned by Woodhams and relatives for several miles around the cemetery, for the period from 1836 to about 1900. This property map has helped tremendously to show who lived near the cemetery and who are likely buried there. I have also prepared a detailed map of the cemetery itself, showing all identifiable graves and showing the names of the known burials.

I have prepared a list of all people known to be buried here and also a list of those believed to be buried here but for whom we have no positive proof as yet. I have worked on this list of burials for many years. In 1986, we printed a list of tombstone inscriptions from the Alabama Cemetery. These inscriptions represent one of three categories: burials with tombstones; known burials which have no tombstones; and people believed to be buried here but for whom no positive proof has been found yet.

If you know of burials at the cemetery, we urge your help in identifying

their graves.

Historic site: join move for restoration

Family Cemetery in Lee County, South Carolina. Charles Ray's immediate family owns the land around the cemetery; he inherited the farm from his father, Charlie Woodham.

We were told several years ago that Charles Ray had deeded part of the farm to each of his three daughters; which one now actually owns the land around the cemetery, we do not know. We assume Charles Ray still runs it.

The historic Woodham Family Cemetery in Lee County is the site of the oldest known Woodham burials in America. It was founded by our Woodham family on a farm owned by Edward Woodham Jr. He later sold it to his son Aris Woodham Senior. Edward Woodham Jr. is the "father" of about 99 per cent of all the Woodhams in the United States today.

A list of people buried here reads like a history book: Edward Jr., his mother Eleanor, his wife Mary; his son Aris Woodham Sr. and wife Rachel Beasley; Aris' son Asa and wife Elaine Elizabeth Dubose; Asa's children Mahalia, Jarrett, Pheriba Jane, Hugh Middleton, Harriett and Jehu; many other Woodhams and their relatives are buried in these sacred grounds. Aris Sr. died in 1818, the oldest confirmed burial here. His father Edward Jr. was buried here in 1820. There were several other burials here in the 1820's.

This ancient graveyard was completely destroyed several years ago. All but two tombstones have disappeared; only the broken pieces of two tombstones survive. For more than a decade at least, the cemetery has been plowed over and crops planted on top of the graves.

We wrote Charles Ray more than three months ago and asked him to set up posts to mark off the one acre graveyard and string wire or twine around it temporarily. We want to get the cemetery marked off as quickly as we can to prevent any further plowing in the cemeteryuntil a permanent fence can be built. It is a crime in every state to desecrate, damage or destroy a cemetery: it is also a violation of everything we deem holy to disturb a grave.

We also told Charles Ray the Association will help organize a Cemetery Committee in Lee County soon which will be responsible for the restoration and maintenance of the Cemetery.

We can no longer delay this project. Since the Association was founded in 1979, we have already lost several elderly relatives who knew a great deal about the people buried at Woodham Family Cemetery, including Charles Ray's mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Woodham. These relatives could have pointed out exact locations of graves so they could be marked again. Further delay will only mean more relatives will die and the information dies with them.

The personal knowledge these living relatives have is desperately needed to identify every relative's grave. We have worked on a list of burials here for several years but exact location of their graves is needed to replace their destroyed tombstones.

As soon as we get a Cemetery Committee formed in South Carolina, we will begin efforts to put up a chain-link fence as we are doing in Alabama. It will surround the cemetery for protection. We have asked Charles Ray to donate one acre of land next to the cemetery for use as a Woodham Park. An old Woodham home was located across the public road from the cemetery; if it is still standing, we hope to restore it as a museum and make it the focal point of the park that will include a parking area, picnic tables and benches.

Beginning this summer, we will start landscaping the cemetery and plant azaleas, roses, japonicas, dogwoods, redbuds, crepe myrtles and other shrubs and flowers. We also want to plant oak trees and shrubs along the county road leading from the paved highway to the cemetery. We hope to turn our family's sacred resting place into a beautiful garden spot we can all be proud of. We also hope to erect a South Carolina historical marker on the site and have the cemetery declared a historical site by the state.

Robert Earl hopes to visit Bishopville in June. We will hold the first meeting of the Lee County Cemetery Committee at that time. We urge you to make plans to attend this gathering and support this project to restore our beloved ancestor's graves.

Public roads in Dale County, Ala. and Lee County, SC may be named in honor of Woodhams this year if county governments agree.

The Woodham Family Cemeteries near Ozark and Bishopville join county public roads; in both cases, the roads were narrow dirt lanes. A developer who bought land around the Dale County site believed he "owned" the road and recently widened and graded it as part of his development project. It is now ready for paving.

The land surrounding both roads has been owned by the Woodham family at one time. The land in Dale County was owned by the cemetery's founder, Edward Harley Woodham Sr. and later by his son, Presley Nelson Woodham. Both are buried here. The land in Lee County has been in the Woodham family for generations.

The Woodham Family Association will officially request the Dale County Commission name the road "EDWARD H. WOODHAM SR. ROAD". We will ask the Lee County Council to name that road the "EDWARD WOODHAM JR. ROAD". We will ask both county governments to erect official road signs on both roads.

We will also make an official request that Dale County name (or rename) the section of Dale Co. Highway 20 from Bagwell's Cross-roads to County Hwy. 59 as the "ARIS WOODHAM JR. ROAD". Aris was one of the first settlers in the area and owned most of the land along this road at one time during the 1800's. Woodhams still own land along it. Woodham Bridge on this road crosses the West Fork of Choctawhatchee River.

In addition, we will request the county name an intersection of two Dale County roads as "WOODHAM CROSSROADS". This is an intersection of U.S. Highway 231 (the Dothan-Montgomery four-lane highway) and Dale Co. Hwy. 18 (the

Newton-Echo Road). This intersection is just south of Bagwell's Crossroads. As far as we know, this crossroads is not named at present. James Ople Woodham has a resturant-convenience store on one corner. The Woodham Family Cemetery is about 300 yards from Jim's resturant. Stop in and sample some good food while you get directions to the cemetery.

A property map we have prepared shows Woodhams owned all the land at this intersection at one time. The Bagwell's for whom Bagwell Crossroads nearby is named bought the land from Woodhams.

We know of several city streets and rural roads around the country named for our family. There are streets or roads named "Woodham" in Dothan, Opp and Napier Field, Ala. There is a Woodham Road in Lee County, SC and Marshall County, Ala. and "Anna L. Peacock Woodham Road" in Dale County.

County Commissioner Edsel Woodham represents the district of Dale County which includes the two proposed Woodham Roads and Woodham Crossroads.

Restoration Project

few months ago, you could hardly find the Woodham Family Cemetery. The site had become overgrown with small trees, vines and weeds.

Thanks to the Cemetery Committee formed in November, our cemetery is becoming a place of beauty and a source of family pride. A hugh pile of small trees and brush has been cleared, stumps removed and an overall cleanup accomplished. Grading is being done along the banks in preparation for planting grass and flowers.

The cleaning was begun in November by brothers James Ople ("Jim") and Rex Woodham. Jim and Rex were quickly joined by THomas Latrel ("Tom") Woodham; they became the nucleus of the Committee. Jim was elected chairman at the first meeting 7 Nov. Several meetings have been held since then. So far, 32 people has been the largest number to attend a Cemetery Committee meeting. This is a very disappointingly small crowd compared to the hundreds of Woodham descendants who live within 50 miles of the cemetery. It is a shame that greed for material wealth in this "Me" generation has become so much more important than love and respect for our ancestors and relatives.

Probably 80 per cent of all the Woodhams whose roots are from southeast Alabama have ancestors buried at this Woodham Cemetery. In fact, well over half the Woodhams in America are descendants of just two men buried here. All the other Woodhams in America are at least related to them and others buried in the graveyard.

This means the restoration and protection of the Woodham Cemetery is the duty and responsibility of us all. Each of us should take part in actually working on the cemetery or at least contribute to the cemetery fund.

In spite of their small number, the Committee has already put in a lot of hard work and raised a fund for fencing and restoration. One of the first decisions made by the Committee was to erect a permanent chain-link fence around the cemetery. The fence will serve a multiple purpose: it will define the boundaries of the graveyard and establish a visual waring for developers, bulldozers and others to "stay out". It will let people know for years to come this is sacred, protected land.

We want to place cement slabs on each known grave in the cemetery and eventually erect tombstones for all known relatives buried there. We have already taken steps to order veteran's tombstones for several relatives. At present, some graves are not marked at all. Others are marked with only a rock or brick--not very much to remember our relatives by.

Tom and Robert Earl have discussed plans to beautify the cemetery with azaleas, japonicas, camellias, dogwood, roses, bulbs, shrubs and other flowers. This fall and next spring, we will ask relatives in the area to donate flowers and shrubs from your own yards to help beautify the cemetery. We hope to turn our family burying grounds into a garden spot we can all be proud of. When enough donations have been made, the Committee will also erect an arch over the entrance gate with a metal sign reading "Woodham Cemetery". We also plan to establish a parking area with benches and picnic tables. At its last meeting, the Committee voted to have an annual gathering at the cemetery. This will be a "decoration day" when we honor our relatives by placing wreaths and flowers on all graves there. It will also include a family picnic. Such an annual occasion will give living relcontinued on page 12

atives a chance to honor our ancestors and keep their memory alive.

Woodham Cemetery Committee Formed

200 Year Old Cemetery Will Be Restored & Preserved

BISHOPVILLE, SC-After many years of hope and a lot of talk, a Cemetery Committee has finally been established to restore and preserve the historic Woodham Family Cemetery located in the Stokes Bridge Community of Lee County, South Carolina.

This is the site of the graves of the "father" and "mother" of more than 95 per cent of all the Woodham descendants from the South. The "father" buried there is Edward Woodham Junior who served as a soldier who fought for the independence of our nation during the Revolutionary War in the 1770's.

The cemetery was destroyed several years ago, including all but two tombstones--which are broken into many pieces. Since hen, the site has been plowed over despite state laws and Christian tradition forbidding such desecration.


The primary purpose of the Cemetery Committee will be to fence the site, purchase new tombstones and provide future maintenance. The Committee will coordinate all these activities but the entire Woodham family will have to share the responsibility.

Committee Chairman Named

Alva Leslie Woodham Jr. of Columbia, SC has been named as temporary chairman of the Committee. Alva is a native of the area and a great great great grandson of Reverend Aris Woodham Senior and his wife Rachel Beasley who are buried at the Woodham Family Cemetery. Aris Senior lies near his parents, Edward Woodham Junior and his wife Mary.

The first step--and the most important task--in restoring our family cemetery will be to raise money. Comparing the cost of restoration for the Woodham Family Cemetery near Newton in Dale County, Alabama, we will need at least \$5,000. The chain-link fence there cost \$3,000. Volunteers who are descendants of people buried there donated their labor to erect the fence, saving a great deal in labor expense. We don't know anyone in South Carolina who can do this which will increase our cost on the fence at least \$1,000 for labor.

The Cemetery Committe in Dale County purchased two double tombstones for about \$1,600. We should start with two double stones in Lee County, for Edward Jr. and Mary and for Aris



Sr. and Rachel. All of us are descended from Edward Jr. All the family in South Carolina and about 75 per cent of the rest of the family from the South are descended from Aris Jr.

The jails of the nation are full of white trash but there are a lot more sitting in their comfortable homes--especially those who turn their backs on their ancestors who put us on earth. Family values have been distorted or totally lost by the "me generation": it is time to return to the basic family values of our ancestors--including the decency to keep their graves sacred.

Organize Fund Raisers

Each of us can help by organizing fund raisers in our local communities. Hold garage sales, bake sales, raffles, etc. Hold family get-togethers and sell quilts, handcrafts, cakes and pies to each other. Sew a quilt and sell raffle tickets for it. Contact brothers, sisters, grandchildren, and other relatives and personally ask them to send donations for the cemetery restoration. Stress importance of their own responsibility. This is OUR family cemetery--strangers aren't going to take care of it for us.

Memorials Should Remember Family First

Your Own Family Cemetery Deserves To Be Remembered In Memorials

An Editorial...

When a relative dies, who do you remember--the Cancer society, a church, flower club, the dog pound or some other worthwhile organization? How many times have you seen a newspaper obituary that calls for donations to be made to such charitable groups in lieu of flowers?

Many obituaries of Woodham kinfolks in the last 50 years have asked donations be made to a church cemetery rather than sending flowers for the funeral. But there has **NEVER** been a single obit asking for donations to our own two Woodham Family Cemeteries!

This really tells you something about what has happened to family values in America. When the "me generation" took over, family values went down the drain. Today we buy status in churches with donations; we look for honor from fellow members with donations to our flower club. There are members of our family who buy Cadillacs or fancy fishing boats and take vacations in Hawaii but who refuse to spend \$10 on their ancestor's graves.

When Mama and Daddy die they are soon forgotten: putting forth a little effort to care for their graves is the last thing we think of. Needless to say, the next generation could care less.

What Ever Happened To Famiy Duty?

What ever happened to love of family and the sense of family duty and responsibility? All my life, I have believed that the FAMILY comes first. I will never forget my college Georgia government class in which a yankee professor tried to tell us there was no such thing as being a "citizen" of a state or county. He questioned my American loyalty when I said I was a citizen of my state (under the state Constitution). I informed him that I was first a citizen of my home community and then of my state and only after that was I a citizen of the nation. I also informed him that my loyalty was first and foremost to my family, next to my neighborhood, then to my community, then to the section of my state and then to my state. Next my loyalty was to the South and finally to the nation. I am a Woodham first and next an Alabamian-then an American.

There is an old Arab proverb in part which relates that "the enemy of my enemy is my friend and the friend of my enemy is my enemy; my cousin before my friend and my brother before my cousin".

I have been reading newspaper obituaries since I was in the second grade and collecting copies of Woodham family obits now for more than 35 years. Not once in my life have I ever seen any mention of either of our Woodham family cemeteries. This is hard to understand, especially since memorial for relatives don't cost the immediate family anything out of their own pockets. In other words, it doesn't really cost anything for us to remember our own family first!

A Shame Upon Our Family

What happened to our two Woodham Family Cemeteries during the last several decades is a crying shame. In the case of the cemetery at Newton, Dale County, Alabama, it became an overgrown jungle. Most people in the area did not even know a cemetery was there, despite it being right next to a paved highway and 200 yards from a busy four-lane. The Woodham Cemetery in Stokes Bridge Community of Lee County. South Carolina was vandalized and destroyed by a Woodham who owned the surrounding land. Relatives discussed the horror at a church gathering but were too scared to do anything about it.

For those of us who believe in a hereafter or claim to be Christians, there can be no excuse for such a hideous neglect of our ancestors's graves. The Bible is full of admonitions for us to respect our ancestors.

"Honor thy father(s) and thy mother(s)..."

The Ten Commandments

"Remove not the landmarks thy grandfathers have set"

Proverbs

We could quote a lot of verses from the Bible and Christian tradition but all the verses in the Bible won't mean a hill of beans to some kinfolks such as the Woodham who flatly stated he "wasn't interested". That black mark will surely be remembered when he gets to the pearly gates.

The next one of your family dies, recall that you owe a debt of responsibility to those ancestors who put us here. Think of them and *your* family cemeteries when you mention memorial donations.

Let's restore family pride in America--starting with our family first!

We Have A New Face -- Hope You Like It



Family Newsletter, Books And Records Will Look Much Better

We have a new "face" with a better look. The appearance of your family newsletter has improved trenendously. It's like adding a great big smile to an ordinary face--eveyone knows a big smile makes everything look better.

Our new face was produced by a new computer and lazer printer. Almost everything in this newsletter was done on the computer, including setting all the headlines and type and drawing the lines.

To produce our first newsletter back in 1979, we had to pay a typesetting company almost \$42 a page for 16 pages--and that's 1979 dollars folks! That was before it ever got to the printer's.

By 1980, it was far cheaper for us to type the text myself on a typewriter and pay only for setting the headlines. As prices kept going up, the cost of just headlines eventually reached too much for our meager budget.

I began cutting out headlines and words from newspapers and magazines and pasting these in. I ended up with a large box and two filing cabinet drawers full of cutout heads and words. You wouldn't believe how much work all this was: I often had to reduce or enlarge the words on a copying machine to make them fit and then "clean" them up with white out liquid. We will save a lot of money in the future just on white out alone. Now with the computer, we will have more family newsletters more often. Our goal is one a month--with your help.

Woodham Books Will Look Better Too

The computer and lazer printer will also make it possible to produce books in the future with a more professional look, something we can all be proud of. I have already started writing our first Woodham history using the computer. This first one will start with our earliest known ancestors in England. I already have enough documents to print and information to fill more than one book so I won't wait to research for more.

The computer and lazer printer also mean we can produce more books and faster. When you make a typographical error, you don't have to stop and smear white out liquid over it and wait for it to dry. You can type a whole page, then look back over it and "clean it up" without making a mess. That saves a lot of effort!

In the next few years, you can look forward to books on Woodham men who served in the military during the War Between the States, World War I and World War II, books on Woodham marriage records, cemeteries, obituaries, census records and much more.

In addition, we will produce a series of books on our Wood-

ham family history, starting with our earliest known ancestors and bringing it up to the current time. Eventually, we hope to have books that will at least mention every Woodham who has ever lived that we can discover, as well as all the descendants of Woodham women that we can find. Some books can be produced with very little effort. For instance, if we had a computer back in the 1980's, we could have produced the Woodham Famliy Index as a book simply with the flick of a finger. With a computer, you can index large documents in seconds.

A Dream Come True

Our new computer and lazer printer is a long-time dream come true. For years now, we have had a lot of determination but little in the way of tools to work with. It was a lot of drudging work to produce a family newsletter not to mention all the other typing and indexing I have done over the years. The Woodham Index took almost a year of hard work to compile. I have spent literally thousands of hours of work on projects that can now be done in seconds. And the finished work will look far better than we ever imagined. It is absolutely amazing what we can do with this computer!

I first thought about a computer back in 1979 but there were just too many other more important projects that took priority. I came close to getting one back in 1982 but ended up spending the money I had saved on printing and mailing newsletters nad other items. I began seriously hoping again for a computer three or four years ago. Lack of money was always the problem. Almost two years ago, my old jalopy of a car broke down and I was forced to buy another one to get to work. I decided to buy a used one with bank financing rather than pay cash as in the past. By doing this, I hoped to established credit to buy a computer and lazer printer. Unfortunately, I suffered a series of heart attacks and was hospitalized, creating a huge hospital debt of \$52,000 and a doctor bill of \$6,000. Without insurance, I could not pay the hospital bill--I pay monthly on the doctor bill. This ruined the credit I to get and wasted a year and a half paying for an auto without achieving my goal.

Thanks to the generosity of a wonderful cousin who volunteered his credit and name, we now have a computer. He signed for it but I will be making the monthly payments. The cost is almost \$3,000, the largest expenditure I have undertaken in my life. I have already paid \$600 down.

It will take some time to get used to the computer since I have no real experience on one. I got off to a bad start with a bad games program with which I hoped to learn how to use the "mouse" control then the newsletter program I bought turned out bad also. Once those obstacles were behind, I began to catch on quickly. Now you can look forward to hearing from us a lot more often--with our big new smile!

Tom Woodham Retires to Life of Travel Now Writing and Lecturing Around Country

ATLANTA, Ga.—James Thomas ("Tom") Woodham hasn't even come close to retirement age but he decided to "retire" anyway and enjoy life.

After a business career as co-owner of The Cottage Garden, The Potted Plant and The Connoisseur's Garden, upscale shops specializing in potted plants and gifts located in Atlanta's posh Buckhead neighborhood, Tom has turned to traveling across the United States, England, Italy and probably a few other countries we haven't heard of yet, visiting the famous gardens of America and Europe. In the past two decades, he became one of Atlanta's best known horticulturists. He has had displays at numerous house and garden shows and at festivals and craft fairs in the area. For years, he had shows at Powers Ferry Crossroad Country Fair at Newnan, Ga., which draws several thousand people every year. Tom's reputation has spread well beyond Atlanta and he has become sought after as a lecturer and flower show judge. He recently judged a show in Missouri.

Tom's latest venture is writing: he has become a regular columnist for The Atlanta Constitution, the largest newspaper in the South (he is the third Woodham to write for this paper, including your Editor). Tom writes a column entitled "Fertile Ground" in the paper's Friday Home and Garden section. He often writes about folks and events in Bishopville, SC, his hometown. One recent article brought tears to our Editor's eyes as Tom wrote of a life-long family friend who had died and of her experience growing tulips from the same bulbs over a 25 year period. The Editor could not help recall his grandmother's love for flowers and her joy working with them. This is Tom's first stint at writing regularly: he has written articles previously for Southern Accents, American Horticulturist and Veranda magazines. Tom was instrumental inestablishing the Atlanta Botanical Gardens at Piedmont Park. He led a move to raise funds to build the impressive greenhouse, gardens and nature trails which are now a major Atlanta attraction.

Tom is a graduate of Bishopville High School and Clemson University where he received a bachelor's degree and a master's degree in ornamental horticulture. He served in the Clemson ROTC and was commissioned a lieutenant in the US Army. Tom is the son of Mrs. Ruth Hanvey Woodhamn of Stokes Bridge Community near Bishopville, SC and the late Harris Middleton ("Jack") Woodham. He is the grandson of Earnest Edward Woodham and Era Esther Moore and a great grandson of Johnathan Edward Woodham and Sarah Martin Bruce. Tom grew up on his family's Tococobe Farms in sight of land which has been in the Woodham family almost 200 years. He learned to love the soil and what it produces from his mother, Ruth, a retired Lee County teacher and an avid gardener. She is very proud of Tom and the mark he has made for himself.

Woodham History Book Coming Soon

First Woodham Family History Will Be Ready This Summer

We now have a computer and a laser printer, giving us the tools to work with in writing books and your family newsletter. This means we will be able to publish the first history book ever on our Woodham family this summer.

Just 10 years ago, we didn't have enough information about our Woodham ancestors in our ancient homeland of England to fill a small notebook. We didn't have a *single* xerox copy of any document on our English ancestors, despite more than 30 years of research by our family historian, Robert Earl Woodham.

As preparations began for the first history book ever written on our family, it appeared our history would have to "dead end" with the first Woodham who came to America about 1655. A trip to England for research and to buy copies of documents was simply not financially possible for Robert Earl.

Fortunately for thos of us who are proud of our Woodham blood, many old English records have been microflmed which can be ordered by mail and viewed at local libraries. For almost three years now, Robert Earl has been researching old public and church parish records from Essex County and other counties in England. these church books record marriages, christenings and deaths in the local parishes (church districts) of the Church of England and Roman Catholic Church, the only "legal" churches at that time. Some of these go back to the 1400's. Robert Earl has purchased dozens of copies of these old documents to print in the forthcoming book "Woodham Family History, Volume I". Instead of merely reading the information, you will be able to look at copies of the actual documents of our ancestors. Many of these are written in Latin, the language of the churches and learned folks up until the 1600's.

Unfortunately, we could not afford to buy xerox copies of all the records we have found so far but Robert Earl has hand-copied everything he finds. All this information and copies now fill about a dozen notebooks in our Woodham Family National Library, a proud new addition to our collection of family records.

Robert Earl has also spent a great deal of effort researching the origin and meaning of our Woodham family name. He has visited seven universities and colleges in the Southeast to locate every book he can find on the history of the English language, Middle English, Old English, Anglo-Saxon and further back to the Germanic "family" of languages (which includes English) and the Aryan (or Indo-European) group of languages, searching for the roots of particular words.

One of the important discoveries from all this research was the revelation that some "authority" back in the 1800's who said Woodham meant a "village in the wood" had simply not done his homework! This idea was picked up by some others when they published books and spread still futher by newspaper articles in the U. S. in recent years. They were right about the "family" name coming from the name of a place (a "place" name). You will read much more about this in the book.

There is a mountain of information, including ancient deeds, wills and other types of documents which haven't even been explored as yet. However, a lack of money will prevent us from getting these records and learning more about our ancestors. We will just have to settle for what we can afford to get.

Despite this, you will find our first history book full of information never before available to us. You can look forward to seeing xerox copies of the actual documents, many written in fascinatingly beautiful handwriting from the 1500's and 1600's. At first, it was extremely difficult to decipher many of the documents--especially those written in Latin (often as not, written by semi-literate priests who created their own spelling versions). The modern version of William appears as several versions of Quilliamus. The modern English John could be Johannes, Johanus, abbreviated as Jns. or many other versions. Robert Earl began researching the Old English and Saxon languages just to be able to translate these old documents.

You will not only learn who our ancestors were but discover where they came from and how and why the "family" names of Woodham, Woodhams, Wadham and Wadhams have spread throughout southern England. There doesn't appear to be any logical reason to add an S onto the name but the spelling Woodhams is probably more common today in England than without it. Several families with this spelling have immigrated to the United States, the first of whom settled in Michigan in the 1840's.

This will be the first of several books to be written on our family history. They won't end until we have brought our "history" up to now, with information about the children born in the 1990's included in the final volume.

This will make a wonderful gift for another relative and will become something to be handed down for generations to come in our family. Remember--it's YOUR family!


Becky In Beauty Contest

Woodham Family Cemetery Restoration Nears As Memorial Donations Come In

Restoration of our Woodham Family Cemetery in Lee County, South Carolina is a few steps closer to reality as word spreads about our efforts to restore and protect the site where the ancestors of <u>every</u> Woodham from the South.

Several kinfolks have made memorial donations since we announced the campaign to raise funds to put up a fence for protection and restore the historic 200 year old graveyard. Our April newsletter also announced that a Cemetery Committee is being formed to head up restoration efforts. Alva Leslie Woodham r. of Columbia, SC has been named temporary chairman of the Committee. Relatives who live in the area should contact Alva at 100 Running Fox Road, Columbia, SC 29206 to serve on the Committee or volunteer to work.

The Cemetery Committee will oversee restoration and act as a permanent organization to provide future maintenance.

If you are a Woodham or descendant of a Woodham, then this is **YOUR** family cemetery. It doesn't matter whether you know who your ancestors were or not. What does matter is that they *are* your ancestors and that makes it *your* responsibility to take care of their graves--not some stranger, the county or anyone else. This is a family duty that we can't dump on just any guy who comes along.

A meeting of the Cemetery Committee will be held 8 August at Hebron Methodist Church following the 15th annual South Carolina Woodham Reunion. All relatives are invited to attend and participate. We need volunteers.

Association Will Seek Status As National Historic Site For Woodham Family Cemetery

The Woodham Family Association will petition the National Historic Trust, an agency of the federal government, to designate the Woodham Family Cemetery located in Stokes Bridge Community of Lee County, South Carolina as a National Historic Site.

The 200 year old family cemetery is historically important because of its age and due to the fact a veteran of the Revolutionary War for Independence is buried there

If the cemetery is declared a National Historic Site,

it will not alter its status as a private family graveyard. Many different types of sites have been disignated as historic sites, including old private homes, churches, public buildings, forts, battlefields, etc.

Such sites do not become federal property. However, federal law does provide protection for such a site against destruction.

Our family cemetery is very important because if is the burial site of Edward Woodham Junior the ancestor of almost all our family.

Remember Your Family With A Memorial

Your Own Family Cemetery Deserves To Come First

We are proud to announce that Woodham relatives have begun making memorial donations to help restore and preserve our Woodham Family Cemetery in the Stokes Bridge Community of Lee County, South Carolina.

This is where the "mothers and fathers" of our family are buried. Two couples interred here, Edward Woodham Junior and his wife Mary and their son Aris Woodham Senior and his wife Rachel Beasley, are the direct ancestors of 99 per cent of the Woodham family from the South. Their descendants today number in the thousands and live in almost every state and several foreign countries. Edward Jr. was a soldier in both the North Carolina Militia and the federal Continental Army during the Revolutinary War (1775-83). His son Aris Sr. was one of the first Methodist Church ministers in America and was ordained by the first Methodist Bishop of South Carolina.

Alabama Woodham Cemetery Restored

This is one of only two known Woodham Family Cemeteries in America; the other is near Newton in Dale County, Alabama. The Alabama cemetery was abandoned and overgrown when it became endangered. It has been restored through the efforts of members of the Woodham family as well as descendants of other families buried there. It took a lot of hard work to clear the underbrush, thorny vines and debris that was so thick it had completely hidden numerous graves for several years. A chain-link fence has been put up at a cost of about \$2,000. Relatives of people buried here erected the fence themselves, saving more than \$1,000 in labor costs. A very nice archway over the gate with the name of the cemetery was erected at a cost of about \$750. A water well was dug and water lines have been run to provide water for flowers and the bathrooms. A picnic shed with two bathrooms was built, thanks to a generous contribution from Alto Junior Orr, son of Alto Woodham. Numerous flowers, shrubs and flowering trees have already been planted with more planned.

New Tombstones Now Mark Graves

James Burch ("J.B.") Daughtry, a grandson of Nellie Woodham and Major Holland ("Fox") Daughtry, started the drive that has dramatically increased the number of tombstones in the cemetery. J.B. personally donated the funds for a very nice double-wide tombstone for his great grandparents, Aris Woodham Junior and his second wife, Caron H. Riley. She died in 1872 and he in 1880. During the years since their deaths, their graves were marked only with rocks and iron rods. J. B. also donated a sizeable

portion of the cost of a double-wide tombstone for the graves of Edward Harley Woodham Senior and his wife, Sarah Dowling, uncle of Aris Woodham Jr. Veterans tombstones have been placed on several graves, including Athanasius Woodham (brother of Aris Jr. and nephew of Edward H. Sr.). Several other new tombstones have been erected, most of these for relatives who died in the 1800's.

Books On Both Woodham Cemeteries

Our Woodham Family Historian, Robert Earl Woodham, has written books on both our Woodham Family Cemeteries. These provide information about their location, history of the cemeteries and the land around the sites and description of the cemeteries and their current condition. Each book has at least one or more pages on every known person buried there, giving information and history of each person. Robert Earl prepared the books on our new computer, so they look very nice and will be a valuable addition to the home of every Woodham descendant—something you will be proud to hand down to your children and grandchildren.

A copy of the book on the Lee County Cemetery will be given to every relative who makes a donation of at least \$100 for its restoration. Relatives who have ancestors buried at both cemeteries will receive copies of both the Woodham Family Cemetery in Lee County, SC and the Woodham Family Cemetery in Dale County, Ala. We will start mailing your copies of the books in August.

Restoration Will Help Erase Family Shame

The restoration and preservation of our Woodham Family Cemetery in Lee County, SC will help erase the shame of its destruction. It is something that should never have happened. The fact it has been plowed over for several years does not mean we can simply forget our ancestors buried there nor ignore the sanctity of their graves. The desecration of our family graves is no less than if a church cemetery down the road were to be destroyed and plowed over.

The Woodham Family Cemetery *must* be restored along with the memory of our mothers and fathers buried there. Their souls cry in shame for their children who have deserted them.

They gave us life and much more. They were honorable people who lived their lives with dignity, loved by their friends, neighbors and children.

It is time to restore their dignity. It is time to restore their graves.

First Woodham History Book Coming Soon

Beginnings Of Our Family Will Be Related In Our First History

We are proud to announce that the first history book every written on our Woodham family will be ready sometime at the end of this summer. Thanks to our new computer and laser printer, we now have the tools to work with in writing books and a newsletter that look like the type was set by a typesetting company.

Just 10 years ago, we didn't have enough information about our Woodham ancestors in our ancient homeland of England to fill a small notebook. We didn't have a *single* xerox copy of any document on our English ancestors, despite more than 30 years of research by our family historian, Robert Earl Woodham.

As preparations began for the first history book ever written on our family, it appeared our history would have to "dead end" with the first Woodham who came to America about 1655. A trip to England for research and to buy copies of documents was simply not financially possible for Robert Earl.

Fortunately for those of us who are proud of our Woodham blood, many old English records have been microfilmed which can now be ordered by mail and viewed at local libraries. For almost three years now, Robert Earl has been researching old public and church parish records from Essex County and other counties in England. These church books recorded marriages, christenings, births and deaths in local parishes (church districts) of the Church of England and Roman Catholic Church. The only "legal" churches at the time. Some of these go back to the 1400's. Robert Earl has purchased dozens of copies of these old documents to print in the forthcoming book "Woodham Family History, Volume I". Instead of merely reading about the information, you will be able to look at copies of the actual documents on our ancestors. Many of these are written in Latin, the language of the churches, courts and learned folk up until the 1600's.

Unfortunately, we could not afford to buy xerox copies of all the records found so far but Robert Earl has hand-copied everything he finds. All this information and copies now fill about a dozen notebooks in our Woodham Family National Library, a proud new addition to our collection of family records.

Robert Earl has also spent a great deal of effort researching the origin and meaning of our Woodham family name. He has visited seven universities and colleges and several major city libraries in the Southeast to locate books on the history of the English language, Middle English, Old English, Anglo-Saxon and further back to the Germanic "family" of languages and the Aryan (or Indo-European) group of languages, searching for roots of particular words.

One of the important discoveries all this research has revealed is that some "authority" back in the 1800's who said "Woodham" meant a "village in the wood" simply did not do

his homework! This idea was picked up by some others when they published books and spread still further by newspaper articles in the U.S. in recent years. They were right about the "family" name coming from the name of a place (a "place" name). You will read much more about this in the book.

There is a mountain of information, including ancient deeds, wills and other types of documents which haven't even been explored yet. However, a lack of money will prevent us from getting these records and learning more about our ancestors. We will just have to settle for what we can afford to get.

Despite this, you will find our first history book full of information never before available to us. You can look forward to seeing xerox copies of the actual documents, many written in fascinatingly beautiful handwriting from the 1500's and 1600's. At first, it was extremely difficult to decipher many of the documents—especially those written in Latin (often as not, written by semi-literate priests who created their own spelling versions). The modern version of William appears as several versions of Quilliamus. The modern English John could be Johannes, Johanus, abbreviated as Jns. or many other versions. Robert Earl began researching the Old English and Saxon languages just to be able to translate these old documents.

You will not only learn who our ancestors were but discover where they came from and how and why the "family" names of Woodham, Woodhams, Wadham and Wadhams have spread throughout southern England. There doesn't appear to be any logical reason to add S onto the name but the spelling Woodhams is probably more common today in England than without it. Several families with this spelling have immigrated to the United States, the first of whom settled in Michigan in the 1840's.

This will be the first of several books to be written on our family history. They won't end until we have brought our "history" up to the present, with information about the children born in the 1990's included in the final volume.

This will make a wonderful heirloom for each member of our family. It will also make a special gift for another relative—something that can be handed down for generations to come in our family. Remember—it's YOUR family history!

Slowly--but surely--donations are coming in to restore our historic Woodham Family Cemetery in Lee County, South Carolina. This is where the ancestors of 99 per cent of *all* the Woodhams are buried (whose roots are in the South).

If you are a Woodham or descendant of a Woodham, this is *your* family cemetery! It doesn't belong to the Smith family, the Rockefellers or Jones families, it is not a publicly-owned cemetery nor a church burial grounds--it is *your* family cemetery. It was established by our Woodham ancestors as a family burial grounds: that means it is **YOUR** responsibility to maintain and preserve it--not anyone else's.

Ancestors Deserve Better

At present, the cemetery is being plowed over and crops grown there. All but two of the tombstones have been lost and these two are broken into small pieces. Our ancestors were good folks and don't deserve such treatment.

Your ancestors buried in the family cemetery were decent, honest and hard-working people. One of them, Edward Woodham Junior, was a true American hero, a soldier who fought for the independence of America in the Revolutionary War (1775-1783)—whose memory should be honored by the entire nation—while another, Aris Woodham Senior, was one of the first ministers of the Methodist Church in the South. Each of these men loved their children and provided well for them all. They helped their children and even grandchildren get started in life with land, money and slaves. The land these pioneers worked so hard to obtain and then clear has been handed down in the Woodham family to this day. Their lives set an example we should all try to emulate today.

They were the kind of ancestors we can all be proud of. Certainly, they don't deserve to have their tombstones destroyed and their graves plowed over!

There are literally hundreds of descendants of these ancestors living today, scattered all over the United States--more than enough relatives to be able to finance restoration of our cemetery--if we all do our part. Only extreme poverty can excuse any Woodham descendant from donating their share to restore and maintain our family cemetery. Those of you who refuse to face your responsibility will not only have to live with your shame in this life but will have to face your ancestor's in the next life.

Books On Two Woodham Family Cemeteries Will Be Printed

As a thank-you for those folks who are considerate enough to make at least a \$50 donation toward restoration of our Woodham Family Cemetery in Lee County, South Carolina, our President and Family Historian Robert Earl Woodham will present such donors with a copy of books which he has prepared on each cemetery.

Robert Earl has devoted a great deal of research and effort to this project. Renewed Faith

Midland City senior touched by recent showing of love from her grandchildren

MIDLAND CITY--At times, Merle Grice worries about today's youth. She can't help but shake her head in sorrow when she sees the few number of youth involved in church and the trouble many teenagers find for themselves.

Then, there are moments like a party held for Ms. Grice's 80th birthday this summer in the annex of the Midland City Methodist Church that enable her to see hope in America's youth.

Many of Ms. Grice's 16 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren, ranging in ages from 3 to 14, serenaded their "Me-Ma."

Audrey McGee of Pensacola also made the party. Before the party, Ms. McGee and Ms. Grice had seen each other once since both graduated from Slocomb High School in 1930.

The Grice children sang a version of the hymn, "Jesus, There's Something About That Name," but changed to name to "Me-"Ma."

"I just felt wonderful to have all of those beautiful children love me enough to sing to me and have a party like that for me," said Ms. Grice, an active member of the South Dale Senior Center since January 1985.

Gladys Ward, the senior center's director, said that Ms. Grice is probably the most living and helpful member in South Dale.

"She hugs everybody in here," Ms. Ward said. "She loves everybody and everybody loves her. If all the people who worked here do as good as Me-Ma, it would really be great."

When she was in high school, Ms. Grice won the honor of Miss Slocomb and represented her school at the dedication of the first football stadium in Dothan was built in the late 1920's. Shortly after graduation, Ms. Grice, a native of New Brockton, narried Edwin Grice, who died after more than 50 years of marriage at the age of 71 in 1985. They had known each other since childhood, both growing up in Hartford.

"The Depression had set in and we thought we'd solve all our

problems by getting married," Ms. Grice said.

The Grices had seven children, although the oldest son Steve died in a drowning accident at the age of 33. Ms. Grice's surviving chilren are: Edwin Jr. (Pete), a Methodist minister in Columbiana; Lenora Baker, a retired telephone company employee in Midland City; Robert Grice, a manager of Pike Manufacturing Company in Troy; Ms. Mickey Walker of Byron, Ga.; David Grice, assistant principal of Rehobeth School; and Nan Newton, who lives with her mother in Midland City.

The Grice family lived in Georgia as Edwin farmed tobacco before moving back to the land Ms. Grice's family owned at Brown's Crossroads in 1959.

"My daddy and my daddy's daddy homesteaded here, he had several hundred acres at Brown's Crossroads," she said. "We always called it the (Dale County) old place. It was where my daddy was born and reared and my child was born there."

In 1964, the Grices bought the Rev. Jeter Baldwin's home, one of the oldest houses in Midland City, on Fourth Street. The mother and daughter still live in the house today.

"They said several famous people have gotten married in my house," Ms. Grice "Virginia (Cunningham), one of the workers (senior center volunteer), got married here. She said 'It was just really hot.'

"Since he was a minister, they'd just come by and he'd marry them."

Although Ms. Grice's heart was warmed by the gift from her descendants, she said she is concerned about the direction of to-day's youth. The signal to the problem is the few numbers of teen-agers in the church, but she traces the cause back to the home.

Ms. Grice did try her hand working, but she would always return to her exclusive responsibility of taking care of her children.

"I blame it on the home breaking up," she said. "Mothers leaving the home and the children staying in day care hurts them. When they get home, they don't have time to spend with them.

"What's going on with our young people bothers me, that they're unconcerned in churches. The young people are not there."

Beaty Ethelbert Woodham was born 4 Mar., 1937 in Donalsonville, Ga. He married Ann Hunter 22 June, 1957 at Lanett, Ala. Ann was born 28 July, 1938 in Oglethorpe County, Ga. They have two children: Michael Todd Woodham, born 22 May, 1963 and Jennifer Anne Woodham, born 15 Jan., 1977, both born in Lanett.

Robert Tilton Woodham was born 5 Dec., 1947 in Lanett. As of 1977, he had not married. No further information.

Fred D. Woodham was the third child of Asa Flinn Wilson Q. Beaty ("Beaty W.") Woodham and his second wife, Viola Barnes. Fred was born 14 Oct., 1909 in Fitzgerald, Ga. and moved with his father to Donalsonville at an early age. He later lived in Bainbridge.

He married Thelma Doris Ingram on 15 Nov., 1936. Thelma was born 6 Sept., 1916 at Cyrene near Bainbridge. Like his father, Fred became a minister of the Church of God. In 1941, he was pastor of the First Church of God in Bainbridge. He has since pastored churches in Georgia, Florida and South Carolina (to our knowledge). As of the mid-1980's, Fred had retired from his active ministerial work and lived in Aiken, SC. We lost contact with him for some time but at last word, he was living in Summerville, SC near Charleston. He was a founding member of the Woodham Family Association.

Fred and Thelma had four children: Ethel Faye Woodham, Frederick Lee ("Fred") Woodham, Doris Christine Woodham and Phyllis Amanda Woodham.

Seaborn Tildon Woodham was the youngest child of Beaty W. and Viola Barnes Woodham. Seab was

born 14 Oct., 1912 in Fitzgerald, Ga. He married Bonnie Grace Gilbert 13 Oct., 1940 in Blakely, Ga. Bonnie was born 31 Jan., 1920 in Early County, Ga. They lived near Donalsonville. They had no children. Seab died at Blakely 16 Apr., 1982 and is buried at Friendship Cemetery in Donalsonville. Bonnie married Dennis M. Croft 25 Jan., 1990.

Asa Woodham and Laney Bubose's third child was Pheriba Jane ("Fereba") Woodham. She was born in 1825. Pheriba married about 1843 to Simpson Skinner. Simpson was born in 1824 in Darlington District and died in March, 1862 as a soldier in the Confederate States Army during the War Between the States. They had at least seven children: Sophronia Skinner, born 1844, married James S. Monroe Smith about 1860; Thomas C. Skinner, born 3 June, 1846, died 19 Oct., 1926, married Charity Mixon; William J. W. Skinner, born 1848, died 1933, married Sarah Frances Kelley; Harriett E. Skinner, born 1840; Asa Edward (Edward) Skinner Sr., born 24 May, 1852, died 9 Mar., 1927, married Elizabeth Elaine ("Laney") Woodham; Argent Amanda Skinner, born 13 Feb., 1854, died 2 May, 1880, married Joseph B. Stokes; Nicey Jane Skinner, born 1861, died 5 Oct., 1880, married J. Edward Wingate.

#heriba Jane later married William R. S. Lawson on 14 Nov., 1873. He was born 25 Dec., 1831 and died 22 Mar., 1899. Pheriba died 16 Apr., 1880. She and Simpson are both buried in the Woodham Family Cemetery in the Stokes Bridge Community.

Asa's fourth child was Emberry Woodham, born 28 Sept., 1826. Emberry married about 1848 to Megaron ("Marjorie Ann") Skinner. She was born 1831. The story of this immediate family is one of the saddest and most tragic in our entire Woodham family. Emberry moved his family to Pike County, Ala. in the 1850's, near where other Woodhams had settled earlier. He owned and operated a store there for several years before moving to Bullock County, Ala. where he also operated a store. Sometime in the 1870's, Emberry moved back to present Lee

Woodham Family Journal January, 1994 Page 11 County, SC.

Emberry and Megaron had three children: Wilbur Priestly (or Preston) Woodham, Frances J. J. ("Fannie") Woodham and Eliza Courtney B. Woodham.

In 1878, Emberry's youngest daughter, Courtney, was one of the most beautiful and most sought-after girls in the community. A prominent young physician, Dr. Josiah Dubose Huggins, jilted the daughter of John Edward Woodham and instead married the 16 year old Courtney. The jilted girl's brother, Willie Woodham, sought out and started a fight with Huggins. Later, he, Asa Edward Woodham and others came to the home of Emberry with a gun and opened fire on Huggins. Emberry's son, Wilbur, ran into his home and got a gun, along with Huggins and the two returned the fire against the crowd outside the home.

At the same time, Emberry came up from the field, carrying a watermelon. He was caught in the crossfire and mortally wounded. He cried out "Cousin, why have you shot me?" and died on his porch that day, 13 Aug., 1878. He was buried at Hebron Methodist Church.

Three of the attackers were arrested and tried for murder that attracted wide-spread attention. The jury acquitted all three men because they could not determine which one had fired the fatal shot.

Less than a year later, Emberry's wife and Courtney caught fever and both died on 10 July, 1879. Megaron was buried at Lake Swamp Church Cemetery near Lamar. Courtney was born 16 Oct. 1861 in Pike Co., Ala.; she had no known children.

Charles is a graduate of the Univ. of Alabama. He served in the Army as a missile commander from 1965 to 1968. He has practiced law in Henry County for 22 years before his appointment as Judge.

(Editor's note: this is a continuation of the article begun two issues past on the family and descendants of Asa Woodham, son of Aris Woodham Senior and Rachel Beasley of Old Darlington District, now Lee County, SC) An update since our last article: Beaty Scarborough Woodham has died (see obit). Mrs. Susan Adler Woodham, wife of Frederick Lee Woodham Sr. of Summerville, SC, has died (see obit). They had three children.

Hilbur Priestly (or Preston) Woodham's surviving children were Reginald Vivian, Chessie, Madge ("Maddie") and Mary Dorothy ("Polly"). All were born in what is now Lee County, SC.

Reginald Vivian (Vivian) Woodham was born 28 Nov., 1883. He shot and killed Tom Neal at St. Paul's, SC in 1904. He later left home and moved to South Georgia. He married Mary E. Nelson at Tifton, Georgia 20 Aug., 1911. She was born 25 July, 1892 at Isabella, Worth County, Ga. Vivian died at Fitzgerald, Ga. 3 Mar., 1972. Mary died 2 May, 1977 at Fitzgerald. Both are buried in Fitzgrald.

Vivian and Mary had two daughters: Vivian Marie and Mary Helen.

Bivian Marie Woodham was born 26 Jan., 1913 in Ty Ty, Tifton County, Ga. She married Douglas Gerald D. Henderson, a native of Ocilla, Ga., in Feb., 1940. Doug was born 16 Apr., 1910. He died 8 July, 1971 at Pensacola, Fla. and was buried at Ocilla.

∄ugh Middleton ("Mid") Woodham was the sixth child of Asa and Laney Woodham. Hugh Middleton ("Mid") was born in 1830 in the Stokes Bridge Communty. He married sometime in the 1850's to Charity Ann Kelly. She was the daughter of James Kelly. Her tombstone, broken into pieces, is one of only two which survive from our Woodham Family Cemetery. She was born 24 Sep., 1837 and died 29 Oct., 1871. They had no surviving children. they raised Mid's nephew, Jehu Middleton Woodham.

After Charity died, Mid married Mary Hill. She was born 21 June, 1846 and died 12 May 1882. She was the daughter of Eli and Catherine Hill. She was buried at the Woodham Cemetery. No children. Mid then married Sarah Elizabeth Peoples. She was the widow of Israel McKenzie. She had two children by her first marriage. Sarah was born 2 Nov., 1839 and died 14 July, 1914. She is buried at nearby Hebron Methodist Church. Mid died 14 Aug., 1899 and was buried at Woodham Cemetery.

Johnathan Edward Woodham was the seventh

John was born 11 Nov., 1832 and died 22 Feb., 1893. He is buried at Hebron Methodist Church. He was a farmer throughout life in the Stokes Bridge Community. He inherited part of his father's farm who Asa had in turn had inherited from his father Aris Senior.

He was very active in his community's affairs. In 1879, he was one of the founders of the Stokes Bridge Chapter of The Grange, a national farmer's organization. The Grange is still active in the Midwest today but was replaced in the South by the Farm Bureau organization. John was elected Secretary of the Grange Chapter at its founding. He was also very active in his church and was a life-long member of Hebron Methodist church. He was serving as a Trustee of Hebron in 1880.

John Edward married about 1855 to Sarah Martin W. Bruce. Sarah was born 2 Nov., 1842 and died 14 July, 1914. They are both buried at Hebron Cemetery. She was the daughter of Charles Bruce and Lurena V. Abernathy. They had 12 children, including two who died as an infants: Charles Welborn ("Wellie"), Elaine Elizabeth ("Laney"), Louella Cornelia ("Ella"), Lourenia Jane ("Lula"), Jehu Middleton ("John Geed"), Asa Lorenzo ("Laurie Ace"), Susan A. ("Sue", "Sudie"), Earnest Edward, Thomas Emberry ("Tommy"), Harold Lacy ("Harry"), Audrey Mittie and an unnamed infant. Audrey was born in 1885 and lived only a few months.

Charles Welborne ("Wellie") Woodham was born 23 Sept., 1856 and died 4 July, 1925. Wellie married his first cousin, Nancy Elaine ("Lanie") Hearon, daughter of Harriett S. Woodham and William E. Newsletter Delayed Because Of Second Heart Attack

This issue of our family newsletter was prepared last year but we could not get it printed until now due to a second heart attack suffered by our Editor and President of the Woodham Family Association, Robert Earl Woodham.

Anticipating another heart attack because of continued chest pains, Robert Earl moved last year from Dothan, Ala. to Columbus, Ga. to be near his sister and brother who live here. He suffered a near-fatal attack shortly after moving, on his third night at a new job. He died twice--once in the emergency room and again during open-heart surgery for a quadruple bypass. Just as in the case during his first heart attack, another red-haired nurse stayed with him the whole time he was in the emergency room. Both these nurses from Slocomb, Ala. very likely save his life each time by begging him not to give up--so he would have the chance to finish writing the Woodham family history. More about this later.

world war 11 anniversary special

"LEST WE FORGET"

On 7 Dec., 1941, the rest of the world had been enbroiled in World War II for over two years yet the United States had steadfastly refused to get involved. But on that infamous day, the Japs bombed Pearl Harbor, killing American civilians and military servicemen. At least one Woodham was there when Pearl Harbor was bombed--already on the front lines. Thank God he managed to survive the ordeal.

A call to arms went out to defend our nation against the barbaric and warmongering Japs and their allies the Nazis. Woodham relatives all over the country enswered the call. Country boys from small farms in Arkansas, little villages all over Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, South Carolina, Florida, and other states, Woodham boys and girls left their homes to join the military service to defend their people. They joined every branch of service: the Army, Navy, Army Air Corps, Marine Corps and Coast Guard.

In December, 1941, these kinfolks were working in cotton mills, as house painters, drug store clerks, driving teams of mules and tractors on small farms, soda fountain "jerks", truck drivers, surveyors, salesmen, high school principal and teachers, construction work and a wide variety of other occupations. Some were college students and many were still just teenage high school boys.

They left these civilian jobs to become machine gunners, tank drivers, air force bombardiers, mess hall cooks and managers, heavy artillery gunners, specialists and gunners aboard Navy ships; tough, hardighting men in special forces.

When World War II began in 1939, the US Army had only 178,000 men. By the end of the war, more than 16,000,000 men and women had served in our

combined armed forces. We had only a few military bases but new training bases went into action in a matter of weeks.

Our Woodham boys, many of whom had never been beyond their home states, learned how to be fighting men at such places like Camp Blanding, Fort Benning, San Diego, Camp Shelby, and other bases all over the nation, many of which no longer exist. They had to be trained well: the Japs and Nazis they faced were barbarians. This was a new kind of enemy, unlike any our people had ever faced before--a cruel enemy who wanted to conquer the entire world. The Japs and Nazis were willing and eager to kill, torture and maim millions of people to obtain their rule.

Our boys who became prisoners of war were systematically starved to death, tortured and very often murdered outright by the Japs and Nazis. The United States suffered at least 405,399 men and women killed during the war and more than 670,846

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WOODHAM'S IN WORLD WAR II, continued wounded; more than 8,000 of our boy's bodies were never found--including my own father.

A lot of Woodham boys left home as mere teenagers--peach fuzz still on their cheeks. Many others left wives and children, mothers, fathers and other relatives who loved them and prayed for their safe return.

From the little communities of Iron City, Midland City, Bonifay, Newton (both Ala. and Miss.), Echo, Bishopville and bigger towns like Dothan, they soon found themselves landing on the shores of North Africa, Italy, France and countless islands in the Pacific.

Our relatives (including husbands and children of Woodham women) fought in every theater of the war and in most of the major battles. Our Woodham relatives were in the invasion of North Africa, Sicily and in Italy. Many of us have seen a lot in the past year about the famous invasion of Europe at Normandy Beach, France in 1944. Woodhams were there on those bloody shores. They marched across France and were at the Ardennes Forest, the Rhone Valley, the Rhine and Germany. In the famous battles that took Guadalcanal, Tarawa, Kwajalein, Attu, New Guinea, the Phillipines, Iwo Jima, Guam, Leyte, Luzon and Okinawa--Woodham relatives were there. The next time you watch a John Wayne movie about these battles, remember that John Wayne stayed at home safe in Hollywood.

Woodham relatives were actually there--getting wounded and killed. It was real for them--no acting.

A yankee general once said "War is hell" while he burned thousands of homes in Georgia. No one knows this better than our Woodham relatives who suffered in the mudholes and jungle heat of the Pacific while facing Jap bullets and shells. Or tried to find a warm spot in a frozen foxhole in the fields of France as Nazi shells dropped round them. Or saw their best friends blown apart before them.

Most of our Woodham boys were lucky enough to come home unscathed but some still bear the scars of wounds. Others never made it home; they are buried in lonely graves scattered all across Europe and the Pacific.

The bodies of more than 8,000 of our boys were

never recovered, either blown apart or buried in "unknown" graves--including my own father.

The War and Navy departments (forerunners of the Defense Department) gave families with boys in the service small banners with a large star in the center to hang in their windows. A gold star on a white background meant the family had lost a loved one. Those banners became a symbol of both pride and hope---hope that the loved would return home safe.

Those lucky enough to come home were no longerboys but men, toughened and hardened by the terror and hardships of a horrible war. The ordeals these kinfolks went through can never be comprehended by the rest of us.

In America, things changed drastically for those left behind. Rationing of food, tires, gasoline and many other necessities became a way of life. You learned to patch a lot of old tires--if you were lucky enough to have a car. Before the war, the South was still a farm region with a few small cities. The war thrust Dixie into the industrial age. Still a small, minor-league town, Atlanta suddenly had the largest manufacturing building in America when Lockheed built its huge air plane factory there.

Housewives, and others not in the armed forces flooded into cities to work at new war plants making ammunition, airplanes, tanks and guns. Sleepy little coastal cities like Brunswick, Ga. and Gulfport, Miss. boomed with shipbuilding and other plants working round the clock. Women entered both the workforce and the military service for the first time in droves.

Before the war, most of our family had been born in rural areas and were primarily farmers. When our Woodham relatives finally came home after the war's end, these country boys had experienced sever hardships and death; they saw a lot of the country and the world. Now that they "had seen Paris", they wanted more than the simple life. They felt, after what they had been through, they deserved something better than plowing behind a mule; they wanted decent wages and a better life for their families.

President Harry Truman, a veteran who had gone through the jobless era after World War I, guaranteed our boys they would have it better with jobs, educa-

Pacific Area of War Wasn't All Tropic Islands: Many Suffered In Alaska Ice

In your last news letter you requested anybody who had been in the service to send in information on the military service you served in.

I served in the U. S. Navy from Nov 11, 1942-Oct 9, 1945. I took my basic boot camp in San Diego, California in company 42708. I was assigned to ship's company in San Diego for 10 months. I was transferred to Bremerton, Washington for a short period, then was assigned to the U. S. Naval Air Station Hospital in Attu, the topmost Aleution Islands [in Alaska] for the duration of the war. My rating was Ship Cook 2/C in the Commissary department. It was really cold-lots of wind most of the time 100 miles plus and lots of snow.

My Memories Of World War

I was born April 24, 1940 so it is amazing to me that I have such vivid memories of WWII. But I know why I have these memories...they are of an uncle who I never got to know...and uncle that I feel would have been very special to me had I had that opportunity to know him.

Rufus Woodham was the son of John Wesley and Lillie Sanders Woodham and the husband of Norma Turnage Woodham and the father of Robert Earl Woodham and the brother of my mother, Lois Woodham Cross.

I have one of those memories that I can just see...do you have those? Where you can 'see' the

happening as if it were yesterday. Robert Earl and I (he is seven months older than me) were on the back porch at Granny's and I can 'see' the shelf there with the wash pan where every one washed their hands before they went in to eat.

Uncle Rufus came out where we were, kidded with us, and then gave each of us a dollar bill.

Remember that was in the [mid] 40s. Another memory is when he left from the depot in Donalsonville. That depot is gone now but that is another memory I can 'see'...the train is leaving and he is waving at us from the train. Those are such vivid memories but then I remember just as well the night we got the message.

Granddaddy loved to go to the 'show' as well as anyone I've ever known. He had had a stroke and was pampered by us as much as a person could be pampered in those days. We lived in the little house below Granny and Granddaddy's that most all their children lived in at one time or another. Daddy would go up and help him shave and get ready to do to the show. Remember in those days it was not a movie theater but 'the show'. Anyway on this particular night we were going to the show but Granddaddy did not want to go so the rest of us went, Granny, too, and left Granddaddy at home which seemed very unusual to me. I have no memory of the show but very vividly I remember going in to Granny's house and Granddaddy telling us that the postmaster from Iron City had been out with the message that Uncle Rufus was missing. I guess the real memory I have of that is of Mama crying. In our house you did not hear Mama or Daddy cry so now as I, as an adult, try to 'figure out" why I remember these events from such a

young age, I know that Mama's terrible, heartwrenching sobs probably made such an impression that I've never been able to forget.

The next memory I have of this is when Mama's only sister and our 'bestest' aunt, Florence Woodham Jackson, talked about the box that had been sent to Uncle Rufus and how he would never get it and I remember that one of the things in it was a fruit cake so I know it must have been a box they hoped would reach him for Christmas.

He was never found and we've been told he was last seen at a bridge that was bombed so the assumption is that that is where it happened. But I know his family have wondered over the vears...what really happened? Was he killed or was he captured? The reason I know is that is I can remember another time when I heard my mother sobbing...it woke me and I could hear her telling Daddy about her dream...she was meeting the train in Iron City and Uncle Rufus was getting off and 'they had cut his tongue out'. So I know she heard and read of the torture being done to the prisoners of war and she wondered...could it be? I really don't remember much about WWII...I don't remember the rationing, I don't remember the shortages, I don't even remember that it was 'hard times'. But I know that war is terrible; I know that it can hurt a family forever; I know that it can rob parents of their child; wives or husbands of

Most of them sought work in cities. They de-

manded and got better from a grateful nation. Federally subsidized loans made it possible to own their own homes: whole new communities sprange up. For the first time in history, large numbers of our family were able to go to college--under the federal GI Bill of Rights.

They couldn't find those jobs and education in the rural areas, so for the first time, our Woodham family became city dwellers in large numbers. They left Echo, Iron City and Stokes Bridge to live in Dothan, Ozark, Montgomery and bigger cities. They and their children were no longer farmers; they became factory workers, policemen, nurses, doctors, lawyers, businessmen, insurance salesmen and a host of other efforts. The war had not only changed the faces of those peach-fuzz boys--it had changed the face of America.

For those still living today who served in the war, memories of those days are still strongly vivid. They deserve the eternal gratitude of our nation, more especially by their own descendants. Just consider the alternative if they had lost. For some of us, it is hard to understand why their deeds are so easily forgotten today. Many of these same veterans lost their jobs because their children and grandchildren are so eager to buy Jap and German cars TVs and Asian textiles.

While dozens of cities all over Europe held major events to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the end of the war, there were no parades, no major ceremonies in America until the last days when President Clinton spoke in Hawaii. I guess it is a sign of the times when we no longer offer deserved honor to our Woodham heroes who gave so much. History will judge this age and generation badly.

If your relative served in the war, make a point to tell them "Thanks". If they are dead, take the effort to put flowers and a flag on their grave and say a prayer of thanks for them.

Our united nation's battle cry during World War II was "Remember Pearl Harbor!". Today it might be "remember Pearl Harbor--buy a Jap car".



Lack of funds to purchase xerox copies of records from our ancestral homeland in England to print in the book is taking a lot of time because of research to find them and of lack of funds to buy them. Our historian Robert Earl earns \$135 a week as a security officer, which doesn't leave much to buy copies (after paying \$90 a month for computer/printer payments). We have to pay fees to two different banks to get international money orders in English pounds plus pay extra to have the English officials copy records for us--which ups the costs considerably more than we pay at a courthouse here. So far, we have copies of many records dating back to the 1500's that will appear in the book. Donations to buy these records will be appreciated. Order your book now. A Tale of Christmas Past...



Thanksgiving, Christmas At Granny's Were Big Tradition By Robert Earl Woodham, Woodham Family Historian

Christmas has been the most important annual holiday for our Woodham family since the Middle Ages when our ancestors still lived in England. To this holiday, Woodhams have added the strictly American celebration of Thanksgiving: during this century, the two holidays have become enmeshed into a monthlong and year-end celebration of giving thanks and nerrymaking.

For my granddaddy's family, it was no exception. From the time he moved to Seminole County, Georgia from Newville, Alabama, all his children and grandchildren would gather at the homeplace near Red Hill Church northwest of Iron City. Granddaddy was John Wesley Woodham, son of Ira Edward Woodham and Millie Ann Enfinger. His wife was Lillie Mae Sanders. Granddaddy died when I was a child and for the next twenty years, it remained a tradition for the family to gather during the holidays at Granny's.

My Daddy, Rufus Woodham, was killed in action during World War II but my mother still took me to Granny's during most of the holidays and it remained an important part of my life until Granny died.

For me, the excitement began to build days before Thanksgiving or Christmas. The trips to Granny's always seemed to last forever. By the time we turned off the main highway onto the dirt road, I was ready to holler for joy.

The homeplace sat at the peak of a small rise, surrounded by oaks and pecan trees and Granny's flow ers. Both the living and dining rooms had fireplaces and each were gathering places for family during the holidays.

The womenfolk filled the kitchen to prepare the big meal. The menfolk congregated on the porch or took off hunting in the mornings and Aunt Florence sometimes tagged along with the guys rather than cook. She could shoot as well as some of them and that was more fun for her than the labor of the kitchen.

We grandkids had the most fun! We played all day with only a few interruptions for eating. Games of hide-and-seek and tag, treks down to the "bottom", toys or "playing house" kept us occupied all day.

These were the most important and happiest times of my childhood. (continued on page 5)

A Tale of Christmas Past...

I will always treasure the memories of those days. I dearly loved all of my cousins. When I was very young, we lived near one another and saw each other often. After my mother remarried and we moved away, I still came "home" often throughout the year and during summers spent much time with Granny and my cousins. But during the holidays, we were all together at the same time.

One of the favorite things for the youngest kids to do was sneak under the porch and listen to the older girls talk about their boyfriends. I usually had to hit cousins Ronnie or Charles to keep them from laughing out loud (or put my hand over Kathryn's mouth). We were all trying our best to snicker as quietly as we could to keep from being detected. But there were times when Betty Ann got going that we just couldn't help ourselves and busted out laughing!

On a few rare occasions when it was too cold to play much outdoors, we gathered around the living room or dining room fireplaces. There was no TV and few board games back then so we had to make do on cold or rainy days. Fresh fruit and imported nuts were rare and expensive so during the holidays, these were a real treat for kids. Some of us would sneak into the kitchen to try and pilfer a few marshmallows (intended for melting over sweet potatoes or pies) to roast in the fireplace, along with niggertoes (brazil nuts), peanuts or Granny's pecans.

Most of the time, the weather in South Georgia was great during the holidays and we made the most of it outdoors with games and playing.

Although we managed to see each other often throughout the year, the holidays assured us we would all be together at the same time. For me, this was the fun of Thanksgiving and Christmas. Family. It meant something then--something that seems to have been lost over the decades.

The fantastic odors of the holiday foods coming from the kitchen were a major distraction and some of us were always trying to saunter in as innocently as we could fake it and try to grab a morsel or two or some delicacy. Naturally we were usually caught but Granny would often just wink and wave us out. The Mamas weren't as forgiving and getting run out with a broom was just part of the game.

The fantastic odors of the cooking meal permeate the whole house, overflowing to the yard. It kept a child's stomach churning in knots of expectation. The delicious smell of the cooking food mixed pleasantly with the smells of holly, homemade decorations and the Christmas tree to leave a memory of unique holiday smells.

The Aunts each had their specialty in desserts and other dishes. They would cook these ahead of time and bring them along. Granny's stove was kept busy from early light until noon. Aunt Florence's specialty was ambrosia (historically, ambrosia was the "food for the gods"). This was my favorite and it truly was fit for the gods.

The meal itself was a real feast! With the exception of Aunt Florence's exotic ambrosia (with all its fruits) and the cranberry sauce, it was a basic Southern feast. I dearly loved both and never could understand why we didn't eat these all the time. The table was dressed with a huge pan of dressing; the turkey, chicken and ham; plenty of homegrown vegetables; piles of Granny's biscuits (Mama said Granny cooked more biscuits in her lifetime than any other woman she knew of); cakes and pies galore--it all seemed enough to feed an army!

Everyone ate so much that you would have thought this Woodham clan fasted all year long--just waiting for the Thanksgiving and Christmas feasts! After the meal, some just lay around for awhile. In midafternoon, several of the womenfolk would take long walks--to "joggle it down" and make room for more. Then they raided the dining table again. By nightfall, everyone was groaning that they had eaten too much.

Of all the toys I got at Christmas time during child-hood, I can't recall but one--a cap pistol. But I still have dozens of warm memories of those wonderful times when my family gathered at Granny's during the holidays.

Sadly, after Granny died, the family drifted apart. We have all gotten together only one time since she died in 1968.

Books Completed Which Tells Story Of Our Historic Woodham Family Cemeteries

Two new books have just been completed which tell the story of our historic Woodham Family Cemeteries near Newton, Dale County, Alabama and in the Stokes Bridge Community of Lee County, South Carolina.

Our Woodham Family Cemetery in Dale County was restored between 1987 and 1990 by relatives who formed a Cemetery Committee and raised funds to install a fence, picnic shed, restrooms, water well, several new tombstones for the oldest ancestors buried there and much more.

We are working now to raise funds to restore the Family Cemetery in Lee County, SC where the ancestors of <u>ALL</u> our Southern Woodham family are buried.

The two books contain information on every known person buried at each of our Family Cemeteries: at least one page is devoted to each person. It includes a great deal of information on family history (names of parents, spouse, children, etc.), occupation, religion, obituaries, military records and other data.

The books were prepared by the Woodham Family Historian, Robert Earl Woodham, to be presented free to all relatives who contribute significant amounts toward the restoration of our Woodham Family Cemetry at Stokes Bridge. He has spent a great deal of time and effort to interview dozens of our oldest living relatives; researched old courthouse records, deeds, newspapers and church records to learn as much as possible about our ancestors buried at these two family burying grounds.

The book on the Woodham Family Cemetery in Dale County, Alabama contains 338 pages and that on the Cemetery in Lee County, SC contains 182 pages.

As part of his contribution for the restoration effort, Robert Earl is giving the books to every relative who makes a minimum contribution of at least \$50 for restoration of the Cemetery. So this valuable information on our ancestors will not be lost to future generations, copies of the books will also be given to several local libraries and the State Archives in Alabama and South Carolina.

EVERY descendant of the Woodham family is urged to help restore *Your* Woodham Family Cemetery. If you are a Woodham or descendant of a Woodham, these are <u>your</u> ancestors buried here. They include Edward Woodham Jr., who served as a soldier in the American Revolutionary War for Independence (1775-1783).



Continuing with Charles Welborne ("Wellie") Woodham, son of John Edward Woodham and Sarah Martin Bruce and grandson of Asa.

Guthrie W. ("Gus") Woodham died 20 Sept., 1985.

Æellie's next child was Edith Myra Woodham. Edith was born 23 May, 1891. She married James Clyde (Clyde) Kelly on 15 June. Clyde died 20 Dec., 1953. The date of Edith's death is unknown to the author. they had at least one child, a daughter, Dulcie, born in 1910. No other information known.

Floye Miriam Woodham was the next child of Wellie. Floye was born 7 Feb., 1896. She married Julian Hinds Kelly 19 Apr., 1920 at Bishopville. They had three children: Julia Flo Kelly, David Woodham Kelly and a daughter (name unknown) who married W. E. Brundage.

Julian was born 27 Mar., 1894. He owned and operated a Piggly Wiggly Grocery store in Charleston. Floye died 17 Nov., 1938 at Duke University Hospital, Durham, NC. After her death, Julian married Cleo Nesbitt.

Their daughter Julia married Francis Michael O'Keefe. In 1952, Julia was living in Massachusetts. At the same time, David was in the US Navy Air Corps stationed at Jacksonville.

milliam Edward ("Bert") Woodham was the next child of Wellie. Bert was born 2 May, 1898 and died 30 Apr., 1952 at Bishopville. He never married.

Wellie's youngest child was a son named Millece

and nicknamed "Pough", born 22 Sept., 1900. Pough died as a child, 22 July, 1902.

The next child of John Edward Woodham and Sarah Bruce was Elaine Elizabeth ("Laney"), born 1 July, 1858. Laney married Robert Sidney (Sidney) Kelley (Kelly) 13 Feb., 1879 at her father's home. Sidney was the son of James Kelly and grandson of Jacob Kelly Sr.

Taney and Sidney had seven children: Henry Asa Kelley (1886-June, 1955); Bettie, Letha, Geraldine, Jennie, Annie and Edward Simelton Kelley.

Sidney was born 22 Dec., 1856 and died 3 Dec., 1904. Laney died 7 May, 1944. They are buried at Hebron Methodist Church.

Bettie was born in 1889 and died 9 Mar., 1986. She married a Jackson. They had no children.

Annie married Harley Segars.

Geraldine was born 1 Sept., 1895 and died 12 Oct., 1914. She married F. G. Smith.

Louella Cornelia ("Ella") Woodham was the next child of John Edward Woodham and Sarah Bruce. Ella was born 28 Feb., 1861. She married first to John Edward (Edward) Woodham, her first cousin, on 26 Feb., 1880. Edward was born 20 Nov., 1861, the son of John Wesley Woodham and Mary Josey. He was the grandson of Stephen Woodham, brother of Asa Woodham.

Ella and Edward had seven children: Mary Ethel, Sarah Alma (Alma), Clelia Beacy, Ada Edward, Glenna H., Myrtle S. ("Mestie") and Edwardine P. ("Eddie") Woodham.

Edward died 29 Dec., 1891. Ella then married William H. Rhodes in 1894, who was born in May, 1866. They had three children: Eldridge C. Rhodes, Olivia E. Rhodes and Nina Onita Rhodes.

Ella died 17 July, 1954.

Mary Ethel was the first child of Ella and Edward. She was born 10 Nov., 1880 and died 29 June, 1904. She never married.

Their next child was Sarah Alma (Alma). Alma was born 11 Oct., 1882. She married a Bellamy. She died 28 Aug., 1942. No further information.

Clelia Beacy Woodham was born Sept., 1884. She married first to James Bernard Woodcliff 16 Feb., 1910 in Atlanta, Ga. She married second to Dr. John F. Miller. She died in 1918 during the great world-wide flu epidemic. She was buried at Hebron.

Ada Edward Woodham was the next child of Ella and Edward. Ada was born 6 Sept., 1886 and died 19 May as a child.

Glenna H. ("Glennie") was the next child of Ella. She was born 24 Sept., 1888. She married William S. Harris. They had one known child, William Burch Harris Sr. He became a colonel in the US Army.

Allyrtle S. ("Mestie") was born 6 June, 1890. She married Earle Raymond Britton. He was born in Gaffney, SC and died in Jan., 1967. Mestie died 14 Sept., 1972. They lived in Charleston and later in Columbia.

Ella and Edward's youngest child was Edwardine P. ("Eddie") Woodham. She was born in Mar., 1891. She married Thomas O'Neal 5 Feb., 1910 in Columbia.

Ella's oldest child by her second married was Eldridge C. ("Dusty") Rhodes, born in Aug., 1895. Eldridge became the State Comptroller General of South Carolina, an office he held for a quarter century. He worked in the Comptroller's office for 48 years until his retirement in 1967. Dusty was Deputy Comptroller for several years before he was elected to head the department in 1942. He served under 17 governors. Dusty married Mary Maxwell and had a daughter, Marcia Rhodes who married a Hall; and son, Eldridge C. Rhodes Jr.

At his death in 1976, Dusty had five grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Olivia E. Rhodes was the next child of Ella.

Olivia was born in Mar., 1897. She married A. L. Detwiler. They lived in Columbia.

Mina Onita Rhodes was the youngest child of Ella and William. Nina was born 7 July, 1899. She married first Fred Beck. She lived in Birmingham, Ala. for some time and then in Memphis, Tn. She later married Newell Zebrelon Andrews.

Tourenia Jane ("Lula") Woodham was the next child of John Edward Woodham and Sarah Bruce. Lula married her cousin, Early W. Woodham in 1882. Early was the son of John Wesley Woodham and Mary Josey.

Eula and Early had at least nine children, including an infant whose name I don't know; Bertha H., Neila Gretchen ("Grettie"), Charleton J., Hovie Coleman (Coleman), Murry Flemming, Irene, Sarah, and Sarah Louise (Louise).

Mertha H. was born in May, 1887. She married Samuel Lee ("Sam") Graddick. Bertha died 19 July, 1968. They had five children: James Edward Lee Graddick, born 13 Apr., 1909 and died 29 May; Evelyn Graddick, who married a Kirkland; Virginia Graddick, who married a Gaskins; Marian Graddick, who married a Hexson; and Ella Graddick, born in 1920. Ella married Albert Reid Shiplett. She died 19 Aug., 1983.

Neila Gretchen ("Grettie") was born 20 Jan., 1889. She was mentally retarded and never married. She died 20 Sept., 1956.

Charlton J. was born 18 Oct., 1892 and died as a child 1 Sep., 1893.

Hovie Coleman (Coleman) was born 30 Aug., 1893 (or May, 1892) and died 21 June, 1948. He never married.

Afturry Flemming Woodham Sr. was born 18 Oct., 1895 (or June, 1894). His first wife's name is unknown. He had three children by her: Arthur Lawton (Lawton), Kenneth Weldon and Murry Fleming Jr. Murry then married Bernice Gainey on 1 Sept., 1926. They had at least two children: Betty Lou and Thelma Ruth.

Murry moved to Bennettsville, SC, where he died 6 Aug., 1982. Bernice was born 14 Sept., 1907 and died in 1985. Continued in next issue...

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Woodham Family Gets Name On US Road Map

The addition of the emergency 911 telephone system in communities across the nation plus new regulations by the US Postal Service have helped add our family name to the road maps of America.

The 911 emergency telephone system requires all homes and businesses have an address with a number and street, regardless of whether the home is in a city or rural area. In emergencies, this allows a caller's complete address to be located exactly so fire trucks, ambulances or police can determine where to go.

Until now, rural residents had addresses supplied by the Postal System, with a route number and box number. Such an address system is familiar only to the postman but an ambulance driver could never find a home at "Route 5, Box 200". The Postal System is also calling upon rural counties to name all roads and number residences.

As a result of these two innovations, folks all over the nation are getting new mailing addresses. In fact, we can no longer reach many of our kinfolks because of this, since we don't know their "new" addresses and the Post Office won't deliver mail using the old rural route number system in a lot of cases.

Many counties and towns have named roads after a family living on it. As a result, our Woodham family name has been added to several communities all over the nation. Streets and roads in at least seven states now bear our name--and probably several more that we haven't learned of yet.

★ In Alabama, there are Woodham Roads in Dothan, Abbeville, Ashford, Newton; Woodham Drive in Albertville; and Woodham Circle in Opp. Rural Dale County has two different Woodham Roads.

Dothan has had a Woodham Road for several years but I don't know who it was named for. It is several miles long, running north from Ross Clark Circle. Several Woodham families have lived on it for decades. Woodham Drive in Albertville is probably named for Lelton Clyde Woodham Sr. who lives on it. Ashford's Woodham Road is probably named for John

Hugh Woodham. I think Woodham Road in Newton is named for Jesse Elton Woodham since a Jesse Woodham lives on the road. One of the rural roads in Dale County, Ala. is named "Myrtle Peacock Woodham Road", for the wife of Cammie Lee Woodham.

- In Arkansas, there are Woodham Lane in Mayflower; and Woodham Road in Harrisburg. Rusty Woodham is the only relative living on Woodham Lane in Mayflower, Ark. and I don't know "who" he is. Woodham Road in Harrisburg is probably named for Carl Wayne Woodham Sr. who lives on it.
- ★ In <u>California</u>, there are Woodham Avenue in Barstow; Woodham Carne Road in Sonora; and Woodhams Road (with an S) in Santa Clara. All these California streets are named for distant relatives who moved to America during the 1800's.
- ★ In Georgia, there is Woodham Way on the southeast side of Atlanta. This street in DeKalb County was apparently named for one of the children of William Marion ("Bud") Woodham, a son of Francis Marion Woodham.
- ★ In Louisiana, there is Woodham Road in Leesville. This road is probably named for Jesse Edward ("Ned") Woodham who lives on it with his sons.
- ★ In Michigan, there is Woodhams Avenue (with an S) in Kalamazoo. Irving T. Woodhams lives on it. He is descended from Woodhams (with an S) who settled in America during the 1840's.
- ★ In South Carolina, there is Woodham Road in the Stokes Bridge Community of Lee County. This community has been home of our family since the 1780's. The historic old Woodham Family Cemetery lies just around the corner of this Woodham Road.

In many of these communities, our Woodham family were pioneer settlers and in most cases, still live there. In other instances, they were living on the road when it was named. If you know of a Woodham street or road not included here, please write and tell us about it with any details about who it was named for.

Wellie's old homeplace was still standing in the 1980's in the Stokes Bridge community as pointed out to me by Marion Woodham.

Ealla Rookh Woodham was born 16 Feb., 1887 and died 1 Apr., 1965 at Bishopville. She is buried at Hebron Church. Lalla married her second cousin, Sullivan Marcoe Woodham (son of Asa Edward and grandson of Asa's brother, Stephen Woodham). They married 14 Feb., 1906 and had two daughters, Eleanor Rebecca and Sarah Martin (Martyn) Sullivan Woodham, born 17 Aug., 1887, died 10 Aug., 1947. Lalla then married James Harrison Skinner 1 Apr., 1950.

Eleanor Rebecca Woodham was born 15 Jan., 1915 at Stokes Bridge. She married Benjamin David Tomlinson. They lived at Florence, SC, then Georgetown, SC during the 1940's and in 1965, at Tallahassee, Fla. Eleanor had two children: David W. and Rebecca.

David W. Tomlinson, born 18 July, 1940 at Florence, married Marie Helen Bodewig 15 July, 1974 at Dothan, Ala.

Sarah Martin (Martyn) Woodham was born 16 Jan., 1921 at Bishopville. She married Benjamin Franlin Skinner Jr. 2 Dec., 1945. They had four daughters: Deborah Lane, Sarah Millicent, Lalla Suzanne and Nancy Rebecca.

Guthrie Welborn ("Gus") Woodham Senior, third child of Wellie and Lanie, was born 22 May, 1889 at Stokes Bridge community. Gus married Eva Esther ("Etta") Dowling 22 June, 1915. They had two sons: Guthrie Welborne ("Gus") Junior and Andrew Dowling (Dowling) Woodham Senior.

Gus settled in Bishopville, the county seat, where he founded an insurance agency known as G. W. Woodham & Sons, Inc. He later took his two sons into the business and after his retirement, they operated the agency until the death of Gus Junior. The firm occupied a historic old bank building for several years until a new site was opened. Then Dowling operated the business and eventually took in his two sons.
