*William M. Fillingim (1841-1934) and
Caroline Levonia Adams (1853-1931)*

In 1869, Caroline's father sold the homeplace and some of the land near Epworth to her brother, John Allen, and moved the family to Belcher (Sandy Point) a few miles to the south in Barbour County and built a home there.

On March 9, 1871, seventeen year old Caroline married William M. Fillingim -- known by all as Billy Billingham -- and would be married for the next 60 years. They were married at Caroline's parents' home in Belcher (Sandy Point). William M. Fillingim was almost two years older than Caroline, being born on New Year's day 1852 in Barbour County, Alabama. He was a farmer and owned 80 acres of land in the Texasville-Adams Chapel area of Barbour County, where he and Caroline made their home and raised their six children.

Their first child, Margaret Alice Fillingim, was born December 29, 1871. She would later marry Jordan Gilbert, by whom she had one son, Willie Gilbert. She later married John Quitman Watson; they had twelve children: John Quitman Watson, Jr., Mamie Levonia, Dolphus Jepsey, James Ollis, Porter, Bessie Mae, Annie Bell, Henry D., Ludie Irene, Eugene, Ponnie B., and Jack Clearence Watson.

The next child of Billy and Caroline Fillingim was Ella V. Fillingim, who was

born September 27, 1873. She later married Robert W. Zorn. They had the following children: Bell, Clemmie, George, (Johnsie), Eva, Clyde, Nick and Cora.

The third child was a son, Clarence Luther Fillingim, who was born October 27, 1875. He later married Sarah Lenora Woodham and they had the following children: William Robert Fillingim, Alice M. Fillingim, Mary L. Fillingim, Nellie B. Fillingim, Ouida L. Fillingim, and Walter C. Fillingim.

The fourth child was a daughter, Mittie L. Fillingim, who was born on April 13, 1879. Mittie later married James D. Gilford and they had a daughter, Foy Gilford (1902-1979), and a son, Roy Gilford, who was born September 19, 1913.

The fifth child was a son, William Ren Fillingim, who was born on April 24, 1881. Ren later married Alice D. Creel and they had the following children: Nitia Levonia, Thelma Nina, Vera Amanda, Era Gladys, Buford Cecil, Hilma Inez and Ren Deleon.

The sixth youngest child was a son, Oza Fillingim, who was born on April 12, 1885. Oza later married Cassie Wright and they had the following children: Annie Estelle Strickland, Willie Naoma Roney, Georgia Zorn, and Alma Lenora Barnett. Oza Fillingim was a farmer and

He took part in community affairs, voted, served on the Jury at times and apparently got along well with people. He gave the land for a school, cut the lumber and built the school which had only one room for a long while. He also served as a trustee of the school. He lived a life of service for his fellow-men.

DAISY CLIFTER ADAMS WOODHAM
(1879-1968)

Daisy C. Adams, the oldest child and oldest daughter of Arthur Gilbert Adams and Mary Jane Creel Adams was born on the 14th of February 1879 in the Edgefield-Adams Chapel Community in Barbour County, Alabama. While this area had been open to settlement for nearly fifty years, it still had many wooded areas, the roads were poor and there was much hard work to be done. This child did her share in her early childhood and after she reached adulthood, hoeing and picking cotton and doing other farm chores.

She attended school at the Adams Chapel School which was built by her father on land donated by him. In the summer she attended "Singing School" at Adams Chapel. This was a very important part of life in that era. These "Singing Schools" lasted two-three weeks with day of singing at the end to which the community people were invited.

Along with the farm work there were household jobs to be done as she grew up and she did her part in these -- cooking, cleaning, yard work, looking after the younger children and many other things.

She married Asa J. Woodham on July 16, 1899. The ceremony was performed by J. D. Williams. The marriage license was issued on the 15th of July by W. H. Pruett, Judge of the Probate Court of Barbour County, Alabama. The couple set up housekeeping in a log house about one and one-half mile East of her parent's home. Later frame additions were made to the home. Here most of the children were born. Tragedy struck the family in 1915 when the oldest daughter and oldest child Annie Bell, died on March 12th.

Soon thereafter, the family moved to Dale County, Alabama where the last child, Annie Grace was born. In this area several of the children had the Mumps and were seriously ill for a while. The family after a stay of about two years

in Dale County moved back to Barbour County.

Ten children were born in this family. One son, Samuel Ellis, died at a very early age in 1915. Thus the parents lost two children in the space of about two months in 1915. Eight of the children reached adulthood and six are living at the present writing.

In 1927 after her father died, Daisy and the other children received shares of the estate in land. Her part was very near where she had grown up, but by this time, it had been farmed so long without proper care, the land was very poor. However, the new owners by proper care and fertilizing restored the land to a more productive capacity.

Mrs. Woodham broke her hip in a fall in 1958 and never walked again. She used a wheel chair for four years or so to do her work around the house. This was a very hard life. Her husband also broke his hip in a fall. These two lived with some of the children in Henry County for a short while. After her husband died July 30, 1961, she went to live with her youngest daughter. She needed more care and went to live in a nursing home in Montgomery, Alabama, where she died on October 25, 1968. She was buried along side of her husband in the Adams Chapel Cemetery, Barbour County, Alabama.

ANNIE ADAMS
(1882-1972)

Annie Adams, the third child and third daughter of Arthur Gilbert Adams and Mary Jane Creel Adams was born October 16, 1882 in the rural community of Edgefield in South Barbour County, Alabama which included Adams Chapel Church and later Adams Chapel School. She died June 4, 1972 and was buried in the Creel Cemetery which is about one and one-half miles Northeast of Adams Chapel Church. She spent her life in Barbour County, Alabama. She was the second daughter to grow to womanhood from this family as the daughter just older died in infancy.

The community in which she was born and grew up was in 1882 still a sort of new country in that there was a great deal of woods and timber. Land was being cleared for farming. There were other families in the area but they were some distance away. Her grandparents on her mother's side lived about two miles away. The grandfather was born in South Carolina probably in the Orangeburgh District. The grandmother was probably born in North Carolina.

There was plenty to be done to make a living; crops and gardens to be planted and cultivated; livestock to be cared for; housework to be done and likely she worked in planting and harvesting the crops in her youth. She certainly did later after her marriage and the children were growing up. She attended schools, sometimes in the summer, and in winter sessions as they were held in walking distance. She learned to read, write and spell well, and of course there was some arithmetic. Most of her life she was interested in reading, books, magazines, newspapers, etc. She knew about Webster's famous Blue-Back Speller. She had a remarkable knowledge of the Bible. Apparently she got along well in school and had no discipline problems.

etc. Love had a cane mill and always made sure that he made enough syrup for the whole year. It was stored in barrels, five gallon jugs, and in later years syrup cans.

Love was always buying a few more acres of land, until finally he was able to buy the farm with the big house on the hill. This was a dream come true for him.

Farming was always their main source of income but at one time Love had a sawmill where all the boys worked. He also had a gristmill. This was his individual project. He ground the meal.

Mabel and Love were Methodists. Everybody got up early on Sunday mornings, got a bath, got dressed and loaded on the wagon to go to church. They were usually gone all day. Later they got a surrey. That was a little faster traveling. Love was also one of the first men in the community to buy a car. They owned a Model T Ford. When the car wasn't cranked for days, it wouldn't crank. There was a hill close to their house. They would push the old Ford to the top of the hill, push it down the hill, and it would crank. Then they would ride back to the house.

One of the most unusual things about the Woodham family is the fact that they have always lived within a few miles of each other. Not a single one drifted off and stayed. Barbour County has always been their world.

The following poem was copied and kept for many years by Maezelle Woodham Boyd. It symbolized to her the values her parents held and taught their children. They taught them to their children by living them as much as by talking them.

MABEL AND LOVE WOODHAM'S CHILDREN

JOSEPH LEVIN WOODHAM

Levin was born on June 14, 1902 in Texasville, Alabama.

Levin, the oldest, always looked after the younger children. They all looked up to him and accepted his decisions. He usually led the games they played and also led them in the work they did. Once while picking cotton, their Papa told them that if they didn't pick a certain amount that afternoon they would be punished. Now his brother Everette could do a lot of things but he couldn't pick cotton. When night came he had not picked the specified amount. Levin just told him to go over to his basket and get enough to bring it up to the requirement. This saved Everette being punished. It was things like this that made them love and respect him.

Levin married Tera Aline Adams, the daughter of Samuel Elvin and Maggie Lee Walker Adams, on September 27, 1924. Tera had been born in Spio, Alabama on March 19, 1905.

They had two children. Mary Anis Woodham was born on October 15, 1925, and Billy Joe Woodham was born on December 13, 1932. Both children were born in Texasville, Alabama.

In later life, Levin was a farmer and a good one. After he retired from farming, he worked at Sam K. Adams' peanut house in the fall for a few years. Levin died on May 18, 1974. He was buried in Texasville.

Mary Anis Woodham, Levin's daughter, married J. D. Shine on February 4, 1975. Levin's son, Billy Joe, married Carol Hedger. They had one son, Joseph Edward Woodham who was born on September 23, 1958 in Atlanta, Georgia, where he still lives.

ELVIN CLYDE WOODHAM

Clyde Woodham was born on September 9, 1903 in Texasville, Alabama. Clyde wasn't as wise as Levin, in the opinion of his brothers and sisters, but he was good to them. He liked farming and that is the work he did most of his working years. He was a hard worker but he was always so slow. Now when the boys got large enough to plow, their Papa always got them a mule. It was each boy's responsibility to feed, water, curry comb and take care of that mule. Clyde had the choice mule, which he was proud of. One morning Clyde got up feeling bad but he knew he had to eat breakfast so that he could hold out until dinner time. One rule of their Mama's was that they had to eat what they took on their plate. There was always plenty of food but she taught them not to waste anything. This particular morning Clyde tried to finish his breakfast, but he had some syrup and gravy he just could not finish so he said to Dowling, "Dowling, I'll give you old Maude (the favorite mule) if you will

eat this syrup and gravy." They all had a good laugh and their Mama let Clyde by that time.

Clyde married Loraine Collins in 1924. They had two children. Clyde Jackson was born on October 24, 1926 in Texasville. He married Lula Mae Seaborn in 1945, and they had two children, Ronald Collins and Jacqueline. Ronald married Mary Cathryn Glover and they had four children. Their children are Cynthia Alicia, Christy Loraine, Caryn Louise, and Thomas Collin. Clyde Jackson Woodham died in 1965.

Jacqueline married Willie Mack Caraway in 1948. They had two children, John Frederick and Samuel Jack.

Clyde and Loraine's daughter Doris Jean was born on April 9, 1929. She married Robert Glover. They had two children James Clyde and Angela Lynn. James Clyde married Mary Alice Parks and they had one son, James Edward born in 1972. Angela Lynn married Charles Edward Brooks. They had one daughter, Chandra Kay who was born in 1977. Doris Jean died in 1978.

Clyde's health was bad and he retired from farming while he was still young. He died in 1980 and was buried in Texasville Methodist Cemetery.

LESLIE DOWLING WOODHAM

Dowling was born on December 2, 1904. He was a very hard worker, very industrious and the most ambitious of all the children. He could lead the crowd in chopping cotton, picking cotton, stripping cane, pulling fodder or whatever job they were doing. He always wanted to help raise the family standard of living. As soon as he was old enough, he got out and started doing public work. He worked with Supreme Ice Cream Company in Dothan, Alabama, did public work in Boliger, Alabama and worked at other places for two or three years.

He finally came back to Barbour County and started farming for himself. To help out his farm income he would go to Panama City, Florida, buy a pick-up truck load of fresh and salt fish and peddle them out. Occasionally, he would take his sister Maezelle with him to get the fish and watch him sell them. She was always fascinated to watch the people come out with their money to meet him and get their fresh fish for Sunday and salt fish for the week. They were always looking for him and were happy to see him come by. Later he became, and still is, a minister and has served churches in Bar-

bour County and Dale County. He married Shellie Mae Warr in 1929, and they had seven children. The children were named Jewel Elaine, Leslie Dowling, Jr., Robert LaDon, Colon Dean, Rena Ann, Gerald C., and Mary Glynn.

Jewel Elaine married Joe R. McClenney. They had two children. Joseph R. was born in 1955 and Melainie was born in 1963. Joseph married Susan Williams. They had a daughter Amanda who was born in 1976.

Leslie Dowling, Jr. married Rachel Hartzog. They had two children. Leslie D. was born in 1957 and Deborah G. was born in 1959.

Robert LaDon married Laura Dickey. Colon Dean married Mary Horne in 1959. They had one son, Barry Dean, who was born in Birmingham, Alabama in 1961.

Rena Ann married Walter Jordan Henson in 1966. They had one son, Walter Jordan, Jr. who was born in Dothan in 1967.

Gerald C. Woodham married Peggy Mathis in 1962. Their two sons, Gerald C., Jr. and Phillip C. were both born in Eufaula. Gerald was born in 1962 and Phillip was born in 1965.

Mary Glynn married J. W. Payne in 1964. They had three sons, Jimmy Wendell born in 1965, Paul Lanier born in 1967, and Leslie David born in 1969.

EVERETTE WADE WOODHAM

Everette was born on April 6, 1906. He was the life of the family. He was always playing a trick or telling a joke on someone. His Papa lovingly nicknamed him "Monkey," a name that finally ended up "Monk" which still sticks with him. He could work the hardest, play the hardest and rest the quickest of any of the boys. That is why he always had time to make sling shots for his little sister, Maezelle. A sling shot is a homemade toy made from a hard carved handle with two pieces of rubber cut from a worn out inner tube. It took hours of work to make that handle for his sister's sling shot.

When they were growing up and their Papa farmed, all the children worked in the fields. He later bought a sawmill and all the boys worked at the sawmill. They all had a job. One day when Everette was sawing the lumber he got his hand in the saw and cut off two of his fingers. It was several weeks before he could work again.

The Woodham boys didn't go to the barber shop to get hair cuts. Their Papa cut thier hair in those days. One day, Everette needed a hair cut. His brother Clyde told him he could cut it. He started cutting on it, and got it in a mess. He told Everette to wait a few minutes. Levin got the mule shears and tried to straighten it out. He got it worse. Then his Papa found out about it. He tried but it was too far gone for him. They finally shaved Everette's head and Clyde, Levin, Everette and their Papa lost a half days work.

When Everette married Estelle Searcy, they started housekeeping and Everette continued to work on the farm and at the sawmill. His wife taught school for a few years.

He later bought his own farm and continued to farm for several years, but he

didn't like it too much. He wanted an easier job with better pay. He sold his farm, and bought a home in Texasville where he lives today. He went to work with the Soil Conservation Service and then with Barbour County Terracing Association. He worked with the two for thirty-two years. In 1978 he received a certificate of appreciation for a job well done.

In 1967 he was appointed to the Board of Registrars in Barbour County by George Wallace. He still serves on this board.

In 1932, his only son, Everette Wade, Jr., was born. He was very proud of Wade. Wade grew up on the farm and helped with the farming and the farm chores. He didn't like farming, especially picking cotton. One year he told Everette that he wished the boll weevils would eat up the cotton. They almost did.

Wade liked school and graduated from Auburn University in 1954 as a Civil Engineer. He married Minter Jean Glover just a few days after he graduated from college. They have three children, Jeannie Rebecca, Elizabeth Leigh, and Everette Wade, III.

Jeannie has finished college at Oklahoma State University. Beth is a student at Oklahoma State University. Little Wade is in school in Bartlesville, Oklahoma. Wade moved to Oklahoma with the U.S. Corps of Engineers in 1960. He is still living in Oklahoma and working with the Corps. He is Residential Engineerman building dams for flood control. He has a farm in Barbour County, Alabama and plans to retire on the farm.

Codie was born on September 8, 1907 in Texasville, Alabama.

Codie, the most conscientious of all the children was very like his Mama, which is a compliment. He always tried to see that his brothers and sisters did what they wanted to and the way they wanted to do it. He would give up his

wishes so that they could be happy, but he did not want any of them to worry their Mama.

In those days they went to town only twice during the year, once in the fall to buy winter clothes and once in the spring to buy summer clothes. Their Mama had to do all of the selecting. Imagine buying a six months supply for that many people--bolts of sheeting for bed clothes, bolts of blue chambray for work shirts, overalls, shoes--so many things their Mama had to remember.

On one of these trips to town, Maezelle saw a parasol in the store they were trading in. She kept bothering her mother about getting her that parasol. Finally, Codie called Maezelle and said, "Now sister, Mama can't get you that parasol. It is too high." To which Maezelle replied, "But Codie, there are some over here that are not high, they are on the floor." She didn't get the parasol, but it did make her value his advice. Over the years she learned to trust his judgement very much. Maezelle says that he has given her some advice which she was glad later that she heeded.

Codie farmed until he was in a bad car wreck and was hurt badly. After he got

better he rented a store in Texasville, Alabama and ran it.

After he married he bought a lot and built a home and a store which he still runs. He married Rubie Kate Bryan and they had two children, Joseph Cecil and Kathy June.

Joseph Cecil married Judy F. Puccio in 1969 and they had one son, John (Jay) David who was born on April 3, 1975 in Montgomery, Alabama.

BARNEY MCCOY WOODHAM

Barney was born on July 2, 1909 in Texasville, Alabama.

Barney was the one with the biggest heart. He was the brother nearest Maezelle in age and he always watched out for her. He always helped her catch the ball so that she could bat, helped her over the mud holes, saw that she got the best swing or anything else that she wanted. Maezelle has never forgotten those things!

Barney was a good farmer and being the youngest boy, his Papa favored him in any

way he could, hoping that he would stay on the farm with him. Like the other boys, however, he had to try other things. He started helping Mr. Bud Gary at the peanut picker every fall and went on to other jobs. At one time he went over in Georgia. While working with a contractor there, he started sanding floors. Now this was about the time hardwood floors were so popular. He learned to finish those floors like you couldn't believe. He was about the best. He did this work for a long time. Then, either the work was too hard or he just had too much Barbour County dust on his shoes. Anyway, he went back home and started farming again.

When his Papa died in 1948, he moved in the house with his Mama and he did a wonderful job taking care of her. He never let her need or want anything. There were things he gave up for his own family for her. When he finally built himself a new home, he moved her right on in with the family, where she stayed until her death in 1972. All of the other brothers and sisters appreciate so much every deed of love and every sacrifice he made for her. He married Eloise Warr, and they have one son, Wayne McCoy.

Wayne, who was born on January 27, 1947, married Annette Zorn on June 2, 1968. They have two sons. Daniel Wayne was born on November 9, 1971, and William Jason was born on March 15, 1975. Both boys were born in Dothan, Alabama.

LILLIAN MAEZELLE WOODHAM

Maezelle was next in the family. Imagine the surprise and excitement in the L. O. Woodham and Mabel Adams Woodham household on January 31, 1912. After six babies, all boys, a little girl came along in this home. She was welcomed by her parents and her six brothers who lovingly called her "Sister," a name they still call her. Of course her mother and daddy were thinking of another name. After years of searching for boys names it was hard to think of a girl's name. They finally came up with Lillian Maezelle, a big name for a little girl.

In the following years three more girls came into the family (no more boys) for a total of ten children, eight of whom grew up to adulthood. Maezelle's first memories are of a very busy, very kind and very loving family. She had small brothers and sisters to play with and older brothers to look after her and take care of her. She always had a very safe and secure feeling because she knew that wherever she was one of those brothers was close by to see that no harm came to her. They are still her source of security.

Maezelle says she was the most petted and the most spoiled child in the bunch, but she finished high school in 1928 at Blue Springs, Alabama. She went to Troy State for nine months, got a teachers certificate, and started teaching. If she remembers correctly her first pay check for a months work with the Barbour County Board of Education was \$56.00. She taught school during the school term and went to Troy State in the summer until she graduated there in 1936.

She married Bob Boyd in 1938. He was running a store at the time. She continued teaching. In 1945 they built a new home and a new store. In 1949 she quit teaching and worked in the store.

Their son, John, Jr., was born in 1940 and grew up helping in the store. When he finished high school in Baker Hill in 1958 he went to Troy State, but after a year and a half he decided to quit college and go into business with Bob. In 1967 they built another store. Their son had married Mittie Ruth Threatt in the meantime. They moved in the store in April of 1967 and Bob died in June 1967. She worked on in the business with Johnny, her son, until she retired in 1977.

Johnny and Mittie Ruth have one son, Bobby Lee, who was born on April 14, 1965.

HETTIE LOU WOODHAM

Hettie Lou was the next girl. She was born on August 18, 1914. She lived only two years, but long enough for them to love her dearly. She died on October 15, 1916 in Texasville, Alabama.

MARY LOUISE WOODHAM

Louise was born in Texasville on January 6, 1917. She was such a good and loving person. She could get along with anyone. She was also very smart, not only at home but at school also. During the last few years that she went to school at Texasville she was always called to fill in for any teacher who happened to be out.

Her Papa liked Sacred Harp singing. He taught Louise the notes and they sang the old Sacred Harp songs together many times. In later years she learned to pick the guitar and she would sing country ballads and Gospel songs.

She was very talented but she didn't go too far in music because she married young. She was a wonderful wife and mother. She married Homer Lee Walker in 1936, and they had four children. She

died on May 18, 1944 and was buried at Old Bethel, Alabama. At the time of her death she had three living children, Lucy Murrell, Jerry D., and Mary Jane.

Jerry D. Walker was born on November 1, 1939 in Texasville, Alabama. He married Lessie Jean Dixon on June 20, 1965. They had one son, Jeremiah W. Walker who was born on November 25, 1970.

Mary Jane Walker was born on October 24, 1942 in Texasville, Alabama. She never married.

RUBY GRACE WOODHAM

Ruby Grace was the last child. She was born on June 21, 1921 in Texasville, Alabama. She was their sunshine for such a short time. She died of pneumonia on February 21, 1922 at the age of eight months.

Joseph Decalve, Sr. and Lula Adams' second child and only son, Joseph Decalve, Jr., was born on February 3, 1885, seven months after the accidental death of this father. Everyone called him "Buddy" from the time he was just a little fellow. He was born across the road and about 100 yards west of Adams Chapel Church.

Mollie Hutto, Buddy's future wife, lived about the same distance up the road back of the Chapel. Her father, Mose Hutto, had bought the house and land from Fabian Adams. Mose Hutto and his wife, Elizabeth Catherine, had ten children, the youngest four children Ed, Hattie, Mark, and Luke being born there. They built a much larger house for their large and growing family. The house still stands.

Mose and Elizabeth ran a general store they built near the house. They also did some farming. Their house was on the main road to Clayton. When wagons came and went, they would stop there. The Hutto family kept two or three gallons of buttermilk which they let down in the deep well to keep cool. Whenever a wagon stopped there, they would pull up the buttermilk from the well and pour a big glass for each of the travelers.

The Huttos lived there until two years after Luke, their youngest child, was born in 1904. Mose had bought land and built another large house and larger store at the crossroad of Highway 67 (Texasville to Clayton) and Highway 22, where they moved in 1906.

Buddy Adams and Mollie Hutto attended school together from the first grade until the spring of 1901. According to Mrs. Gussie Cleveland Mathison, who attended school with them the entire time they were in school, Buddy always had a good disposition and only got into one fight. Nobody knew exactly what caused the fight, but Buddy broke his slate over another boy's head. When he saw the

teacher coming, he jumped out of the window and ran. In those days the teacher whipped anybody who got into a fight without asking questions, and Buddy decided not to stick around to try to defend himself.

On July 4, 1901 Buddy Adams and Mollie Hutto had been engaged about a year. They went to a church picnic that day at Blue Springs. While they were there, Mollie dropped her engagement ring into the spring, and Buddy had to dive in and retrieve it. They decided to go ahead and get married that day, so they visited a nearby minister and were married.

FANNIE LAVONIA ADAMS

Fannie Lavonia Adams was born on October 9, 1900 in Spio, Alabama. She was the sixth child born to Samuel Elvin and Maggie Lee Adams. She married Wallace Carpenter, and they had one daughter.

Their daughter, Geraldine Carpenter, was born on December 27, 1924. She married George Earl Dansby on September 19, 1940. He was born April 26, 1923, the son of George Washington Dansby and Seay. Geraldine and George Earl had three children. The first, Geraldine Uyvone, was born on March 3, 1941 in Clio, Alabama. On June 14, 1969 she married Robert Bruce Green. The second, Earl Ladon, was born on August 13, 1946 in Eufaula, Alabama. He married Olivia Mills Dean on September 6, 1969. The third, Ronnie Dean, was born on December 29, 1949 in Montgomery, Alabama. On August 3, 1974 he married Rose Ann Elliott.

Fannie Lavonia died on July 14, 1927.

NANCY MARGARET "NAN" ADAMS HIGH

The seventh child born to Samuel Elvin and Maggie Lee Adams was Nancy Margaret. She was born on December 17, 1902 in Spio, Alabama. They called her Nan.

On July 15, 1929 Nan married Curry McCard High who was the son of George Thomas High and Mary Annie Wilson. Curry was from Anniston, Alabama, and that is where he and Nan made their home.

On October 1, 1931 their daughter Mary Nancy was born in Anniston, Alabama. Nancy was their only child.

Nan, Curry, and Nancy lived in Anniston until Curry's death in February of 1953. At that time Nancy had graduated from high school, and she and Nan left Anniston and moved to Jacksonville, Florida. Nancy who had always been quite intelligent, took a job with the State Department in Jacksonville, three years later entering the foreign service with the State Department. During the past twenty-three years Nancy has lived in ten different countries throughout the world, living wherever her job with the State

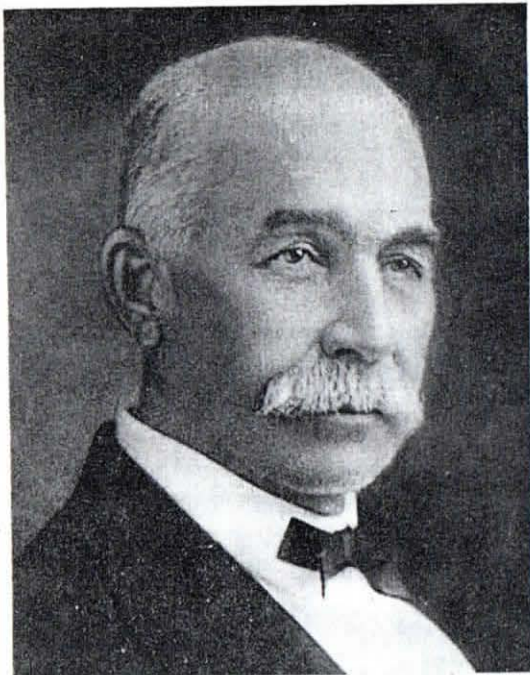

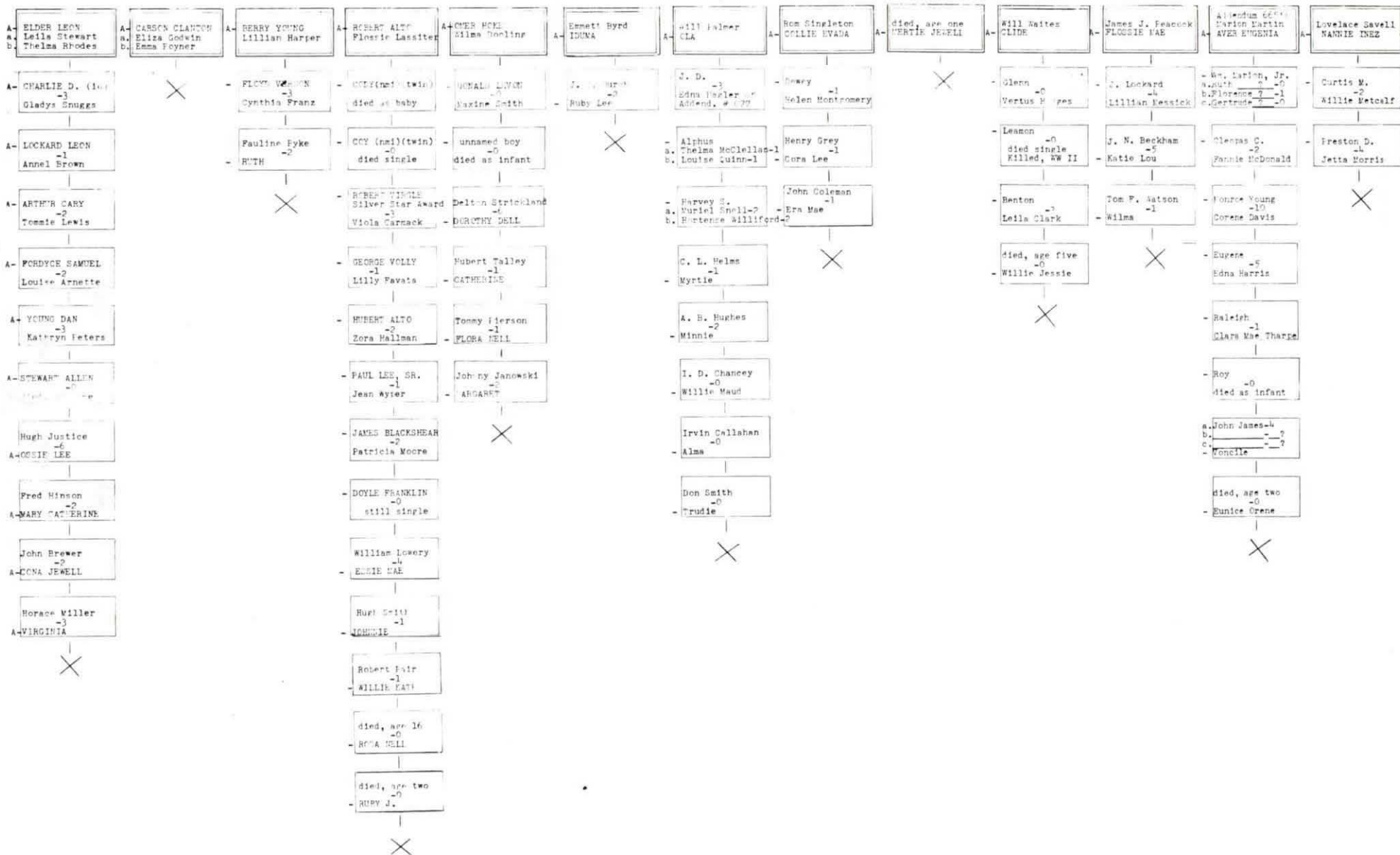
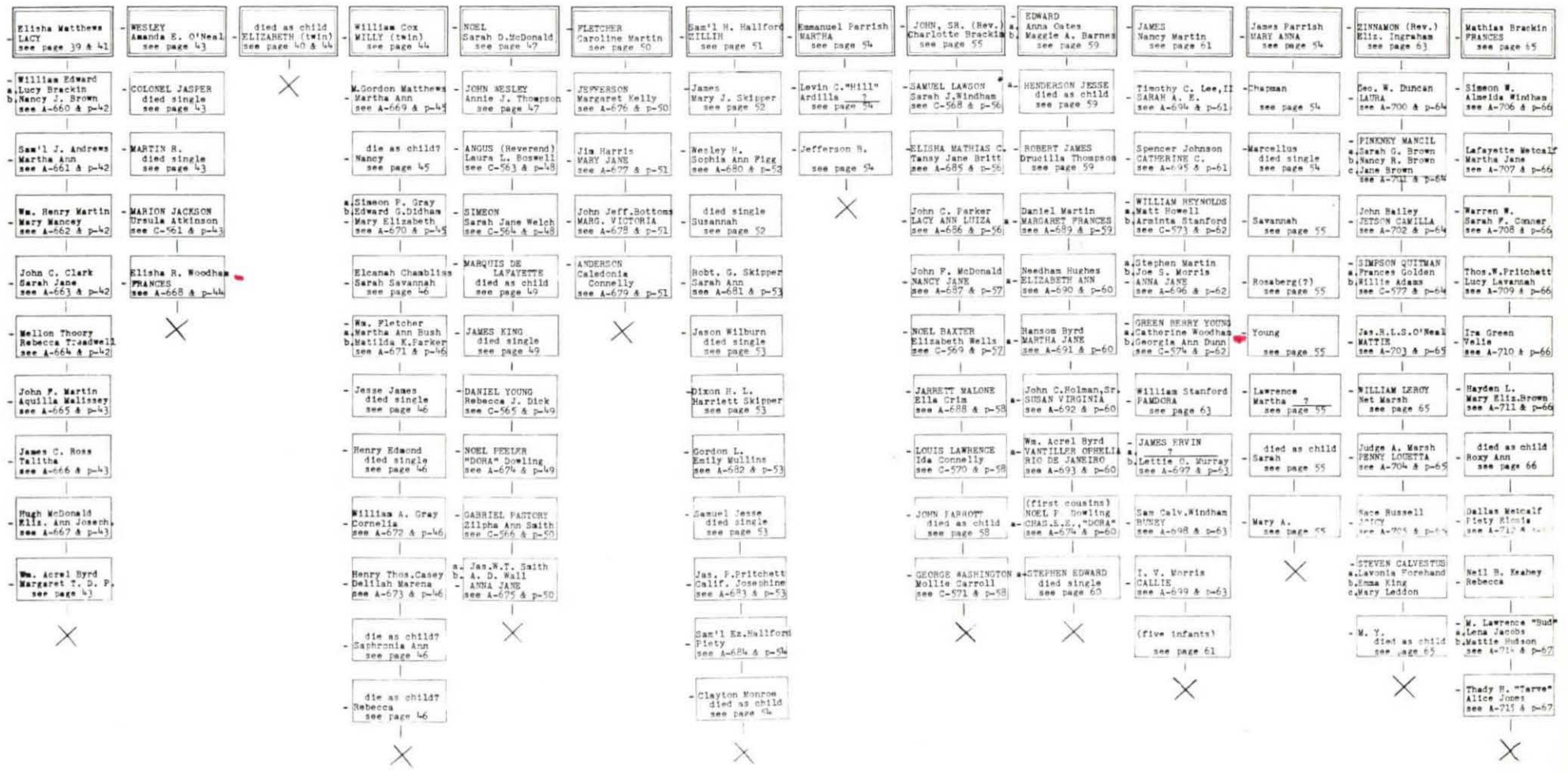

October 9, 1919. She, Catherine, was born in Dale County November 21, 1853, to Emma Gray, an Alabamian, and John Robert Woodham. "Bob" Woodham had been born in Darlington District, South Carolina, to Mrs. Sarah Woodham twelve days after the birth of twin brother Edward H., Jr. . . . Sarah was possibly the daughter of DEMPSEY'S Uncle JAMES; see that chapter. GREEN BERRY married Georgia Ann Dunn in 1920. They had no children.)

JAMES'S SIXTH CHILD was born at the Dowling farm west of Hurricane Creek in 1857 and named PAMDORA. The William Stanford that she married was a brother of WILLIAM REYNOLD'S second wife. "PAM" and William went to Limestone County, Texas, near Mexia. They had daughters named Ella, Costella, and Mertie.

JAMES ERVIN was the next child born to Nancy and JAMES. His date of birth was November 30, 1859. He, too, went to Limestone County, Texas. It is thought that he married in Texas; there might have been offspring of this marriage. Later he went to Sabine Parish, Louisiana, where he married Lettie O'Lillian Murray on the third day of November, 1896. None of their four sons left any descendants; see Addendum 697. This JAMES died May 13, 1942; Lettie died December 4, 1956. Both are buried in Coushatta, Louisiana. (Lettie had been born June 1, 1883.)

JAMES'S EIGHTH OFFSPRING was daughter BUNEY. She was about fifty-four years old at the time of her burial, October 5, 1917, in the cemetery in the west edge of Black, Alabama. Twenty years later, her husband, Sam Calvin Windham was buried beside her. Two generations of their progeny are shown in Addendum 698. One son of theirs, Mace, was a Methodist preacher. Grandson Sam W. Windham is an outstanding surgeon in Dothan, Alabama.

JAMES'S LAST CHILD, the ninth of those we know, was born a few months after this forty year old soldier had left for the war. This was the daughter, CALLIE. On January 31, 1885, she married I. V. Morris, a twenty-one-year-old man called "Ivy" by some of his kinsmen. He and Joe Morris, the husband of CALLIE'S sister, were brothers. Their father once lived at Newton, Alabama. (I. V. died in 1933; he and CALLIE are buried in one of the Mt. Pleasant cemeteries near Quincy, Florida. Their four children and four grandchildren are named in Addendum 699.)

The last child of DEMPSEY'S to be born before his large family

left the Jeffries Creek home there in Darlington District was the 1824-born child, MARY ANNA. All the known information concerning her has already been given in a previous section along with her sister MARTHA Parrish. . . . During the six-month-long trip to Dale County, Alabama, the last of DEMPSEY'S seven sons was born, February 2, 1826, in Georgia. Father DEMPSEY remembered his good friends, the Zimmermans, who lived where the turnpike west of Darlington crossed Jeffries Creek, and gave this boy a Christian name that would honor those South Carolinians. . . . Eighty-one years later, this Dowling's children had the name of ZINNAMON engraved on the tombstone placed over his grave, so the author uses this name. (He is buried in Geneva County, Alabama, at the Providence Methodist Church. The year of birth on his headstone is also erroneous. He died May 1, 1907.)

ZINNAMON was also given land by his father, Reverend Dowling. . . . or he had earned enough by the age of fourteen with which to buy it! . . . Such purchases began in 1840, judging by the Dale County Plat Book, and continued through 1853. His home was south of Ozark, probably on the road from DEMPSEY'S to Claybank. The ten children of his, shown on Chart 331, were born there to him and wife Elizabeth Ingraham. (They married November 20, 1848. When she died, over fifty years later, an error was also made on her tombstone wherein she was called Elizabeth Parker. Parker was the maiden name of Elizabeth's mother! Elizabeth died October 29, 1909; she had been born November 7, 1826, in Georgia. She was often called "Betsy"; she was a beautiful brunette in her youth. Her grave may be seen in Friendship Cemetery at the ghost town of Richburg, a mile and a half west of New Brockton, Alabama.)

The year following his marriage to "Betsy", ZINNAMON joined the Methodist Church at "nearby" Claybank. During the time they were putting up the new building, 1852, he was licensed to preach. Many of the Methodist sermons he delivered were from a book of his father's called "Sermons on Several Occasions". They had been compiled by a pretty good authority . . . a man by the name of John Wesley. (This book, published in 1815, is now owned by ZINNAMON'S great-nephew, "Alley" Smith, who lives near Claybank. An inscription, one hundred thirty years old, is in the front in DEMPSEY'S own hand: "Dempsey Dowling- his book, 1829".)

ZINNAMON'S earnings as a preacher, of course, were small. Therefore, an idea of his major livelihood is gained from such a thing as the

dren died without leaving descendants; see Addendum 695. (Spencer, a year her senior, had probably married CATHARINE after his service in the 4th Florida Cavalry. CATHARINE was buried in Carroll Cemetery in the east edge of Ozark, next to Spencer's parents. They were named Amos and Ester Johnson and had been born in a North Carolina county named Johnson! Spencer and his second wife are buried in Shiloh Cemetery south of Daleville, Alabama.)

JAMES'S FIRST SON was named for the half-brother of Grandpa JOHN whom DEMPSEY had spoken about so often. (The second part of his name was for a nearby Dale farmer.) Little WILLIAM REYNOLDS was born during the California gold-rush, August 15, 1849. In later life many called him "BUD". It was at about the age of twenty-three that this Dowling married "Matt" Howell, daughter of Mary Andrews and John Howell. (Martha Jane and her brother-in-law Stephen Martin were buried on the same day in Ozark's City Cemetery but neither grave is marked. The dates of her birth and death are unknown.)

WILLIAM REYNOLDS Dowling and "Matt" had only one child, born 1873. BUD left this daughter with the Howells for a year or two following mother Matt's death; he went to Texas. By 1882 he had returned to Alabama and married Arminta Stanford . . . Years later, Arminta told her children that by having looked in the family well on the prescribed date of "first Sunday in May", she had seen her future husband's reflection before ever meeting him! (She was the daughter of Jane Hartley and Lafayette Stanford. Her life lasted from October 20, 1860, to August 31, 1937. She and Mr. Dowling are buried in the Pilgrim Home Cemetery on the Dothan-Enterprise highway, near the place he farmed. His children are shown on Chart 573.)

Land was still available for homesteading even in BUD'S lifetime. He claimed his 160 acres by living on it the required period. It lay near the junction of the Little Choctawhatchee and the Choctawhatchee. And it was just before this that WILLIAM REYNOLDS had gone on a Dale County bearhunt . . . The pre-arranged signal with his friends was to be a loud shout if anyone should see the quarry headed toward the other. Sure enough . . . they were not in the backwoods long before BUD heard the yell: "Look out, Dowling!" Almost instantly he saw the bear coming; it was "an old she-bear". He steadied his gun . . . fired one barrel of buckshot . . . and then the other! BUD said he would never forget how afraid he was that this might not be enough,

but the bear dropped before reaching him. The Dowlings had bear-meat for supper!

THE FOURTH CHILD OF JAMES and Nancy's was daughter ANNA JANE, born about 1852. This girl's first marriage was about 1869 to Stephen Martin. It is thought that Stephen was twenty-one at this time and that he was the Dale-County-born son of Benjamin W. and Pheriba Martin, both of whom had been born in South Carolina. Stephen's burial place is mentioned in the above sketch of WILLIAM REYNOLDS. All of ANNA'S children were born of this Martin union; see Addendum 696 . . . Following Stephen Martin's death this Dowling daughter married Joe S. Morris. Joe's brother was probably already married to ANNA'S sister at this time. (ANNA died January 14, 1926, and was buried in Beulah Cemetery north of Dothan. Her un-marked grave is eleven feet north of son Melton M. Martin's tombstone. Mr. Morris is at her side, on the south.)

JAMES NEXT had a baby whom he named GREEN BERRY YOUNG, born March 17, 1855. The youngster never liked the name "Young" and consequently went by the name of "G. B." and GREEN BERRY . . . It had dawned on this child's mind that a war did effect all people when he had watched the difficulty that father JAMES had in "trading some wagon-men out of a sack of salt". These men had made the round trip of over two hundred miles to the Gulf with their large kettles . . . and were in no mood to let so precious a thing as a sack of salt go for a bale of cotton, offered them by JAMES. (Dowling knew that his family would need the precious preservative during his impending military service and talked quite roughly to the traders. He got the salt!)

About 1877 GREEN BERRY married Catherine Woodham. The children born to them are shown on Chart 574. Four years later they moved to Section 30 south of Newton, Alabama, and homesteaded land. Dowling was instrumental in founding Mt. Hebron Methodist Church at the crossroads south of his home.

In the late 1880's promoters (for the railroad which was to have its headquarters in nearby "Pinckard") went to GREEN BERRY and asked for a donation of one hundred dollars or a forty of land to help finance the project. Forty acres of land in those days . . . especially the one he gave them . . . was less dear, so Dowling gave them a tract deep in the swamps of nearby Little Choctawhatchee River. At last reports the railroad had still not claimed it! (GREEN BERRY is buried at Mt. Hebron beside wife "Kit". He died April 11, 1924; she died

happy I shouted all over the yard!" . . . This was the third Sunday night in September of 1848.

In 1853 JOHN SENIOR was licensed as a Methodist preacher. Eleven years later Bishop James J. Andrew ordained him as a deacon. . . . and twenty-eight years after that fateful Sunday call, Reverend Dowling became an elder. For a long period JOHN held "every-Wednesday-night-prayer-meetings" in his home on the hill. Neighbors were encouraged to come. One tells of the holes in the edge of the earthen hearth, adjoining the "stick and dirt" chimney, where the constant kneeling of this good Christian had worn them. In 1865, JOHN was pastor of the Big Creek Mission (probably the Dothan area). Six years later he was pastor of the Cerro Gordo Mission. In 1873, he headed the Ozark committee which chose the site for the first Methodist Church built in that town.

JOHN SENIOR'S OLDEST CHILD was the son, SAMUEL LAWSON, born November 3, 1841. This Dowling's marriage to Sarah Jane Windham occurred about the year that he became a mounted infantryman in the company of the 53rd Alabama Partisan Rangers commanded by a cousin, Captain JOHN WESLEY. Corporal "LAWSE" (pronounced "Loss") suffered battle wounds in the terrific fight for Atlanta's defense. He was home on furlough when the war ended. (Wife Jane was born in Alabama on February 22, 1839, to South Carolinians. Mother Elender Dupre was a Woodham, granddaughter of Frederick ~~Est~~, mentioned in the first section of this chapter. Grandfather John Windham, sire of Jane's father Samuel, was in Dale County by 1830.)

SAMUEL LAWSON was a man of diversified talents. In addition to being an outstanding farmer he won election twice as treasurer of Dale County, in the beginning years of this century. An earlier "Southern Star" had bragged about his huge twenty-five horsepower, eight-saw "Centennial" cotton gin that was serving farmers in the Daleville area. This newspaper, in 1884, had reported LAWSE'S contract with the county to bridge Claybank Creek where Crittenden's Mill stood. He was the builder of the first church ever erected in Ozark by the Methodists, 1873.

This man's offspring, shown on Chart 568, were also destined to win fame. Besides JUDSON DAVIE, sketched in a later chapter, there was son TOLBERT LEE who was on the committee which chose the site for Montevallo College. He and brothers HENRY PORTER and MASON MORTON went to Louisiana about the turn of the century where

this triumvirate was the largest landowner in Desoto Parish (until the 1929 crash wiped it out). PORTER served three terms in the Louisiana Senate and was mayor of Grand Cane, Louisiana. Our subject, SAMUEL LAWSON, died January 15, 1919, and was buried in Claybank Cemetery near Ozark, Alabama. Wife Jane died June 15, 1925, and was interred beside him.

JOHN SENIOR'S SECOND SON, ELISHA MATHIAS CONVERSE, has a Southern Cross of Honor at the foot of his Claybank grave. For his birthdate of February 7, 1843, had put him in an excellent age-group for Civil War service. Few people know that the renowned "Dowling's Boarding House", operated after the war by him in Ozark, was a copy of a beautiful Atlanta home which infantryman Dowling had kept admiring as he lay in the trenches of that embattled city. (He was there with the 53rd Alabama Infantry Regiment.) The two-story home was in no-man's land . . . and its replica may now be seen as one of the miniatures in the Grant's Park Cyclorama in Atlanta. "LISHE", as our subject was called, vowed that if he survived the war he would one day have a home like this one!

LISHE'S wife, Tansy Jane Britt, was the one whose food made their dining table so famous as a commercial stop-over. She and Mr. Dowling celebrated their fiftieth marriage anniversary in their "Atlanta" home, in Ozark, on August 21, 1912. Nearly fifty of their "kissing-kin" were present. Addendum 685 lists the four children of this couple; none left descendants. LISHE'S occupation had been that of mill-operator; in 1899 he was sheriff of Dale County, the county of his birth. Ozark's first telephone system, "Dowling and Hill" was installed by members of his family. LISHE died at the age of eighty-six, January 7, 1929, and was buried beside Tansy Jane at Claybank. She had died December 6, 1919. Her birth had occurred in Randolph County, Georgia, March 20, 1838.

JOHN SENIOR'S FIRST DAUGHTER brightened mother Charlotte's room on the last day of July, 1846; this child was to live eighty-eight years. They named her LACY ANN LUIZA . . . and called her LOU! Little LOU became a young lady and became Mrs. John Calvin Parker. Her two children and three grandchildren are shown in Addendum 686. (Her husband was the son of Amos Parker and had been born July 13, 1849. John C. died at the age of eighty; he and LOU are buried in Claybank Cemetery.)

JOHN SENIOR'S LAST DAUGHTER was the next child, NANCY

JOHN say so much. On September 3, 1873, MARION married Ursula Atkinson. Though he lived only until June 19, 1892, this Dowling made much of the few years' home-life he was to enjoy. Mother Amanda lived in his Henry County, Alabama, home the last years of her life. JASPER BOSWELL, son of MARION, is widely known and loved in Jackson County, Florida, where he has been the family doctor of thousands for nearly fifty years in the town of Alliance. Other children and grandchildren are shown on Chart 561. (MARION and his wife are buried in the Kinsey, Alabama, Baptist Cemetery. Ursula died in 1938. She had been born August 28, 1857, in Dale County to Ursula Eugenia Griffith and William Maldre Atkinson of Green County, Georgia.)

WESLEY'S FOURTH CHILD was a daughter, FRANCES, born four years after MARION'S birth. When she was about eighteen, this only daughter married Elisha R. Woodham, a war-veteran some five to eight years her senior; he was also a resident of Dale County. He had served in the 1st Alabama Infantry Regiment. FRANCES'S offspring are shown in Addendum 668. (Neither the death-dates nor burial-places of Mr. and Mrs. Woodham are known. He was the son of Frederick Woodham, ~~II~~, of Darlington District, South Carolina. It is told that ~~the great-grandfather of that Carolinian, an Englishman named Atha Woodham, II, had served so successfully in the House of Commons that Great Britain's king had sent him to Ireland to supervise "Crown Land". Within five years, however, young Woodham had led an unsuccessful Irish rebellion against his majesty and subsequently fled to the colony of South Carolina.)~~

The year after WESLEY'S two sons were killed, he was involved in an incident of such import that its story was recently repeated in "The Montgomery Advertiser". He was approaching the Choctawhatchee River bridge near Newton, Alabama, on December 3, 1864, when he noticed a half-dozen men of Captain Breare's Confederate Home-Guard ganged around a helpless - looking Dale Countian, named Bill Sketo . . . They were preparing to hang the man, on the charge that he had deserted the Rebels' front-lines. (Sketo had come home, because of his wife's serious illness, but had followed an often-used procedure by having a friend take his place.)

Mr. Dowling warned the self-appointed prosecutors that such a lynching was not right, whereupon they warned him that he "would get the same medicine" if he interfered! Then . . . as Sketo stood on the buggy, the rope tightening around his neck, he prayed: "Forgive

them; forgive them, dear Lord!" Such a display of Christianity by this forlorn foreigner (he was of Spanish birth and prior to the war had preached around Newton) angered the "judge-and-jury" so much, they could stand it no more. They belted the red horse hitched to the buggy and Sketo's body went crashing downward! . . . But the victim was tall; his feet were dragging the ground under the post oak tree. Immediately, guardsman G—— E——, a cripple, grabbed his crutch and scratched dirt from under the gasping man's feet.

. . . And for years and years . . . even on into the twentieth century . . . that hole remained hollowed out EVEN THOUGH PERSISTENT ATTEMPTS WERE MADE TO FILL IT. TO FORGET IT! . . . The end of the story? . . . One by one the six hangmen died terrible deaths. One was riding a horse one still day when suddenly the limb of a post oak tree crashed down on him, splitting his skull. One was killed by a run-away mule. Still another was killed by lightning. One was found dead in a swamp . . . Today, even the old hanging - tree is gone! But the scar?? . . . It probably remains . . .

The next two children of DEMPSEY'S fourteen, shown on Chart 331, were the twins MILLY and ELIZABETH. After her May 5th birth in 1808 in the Jeffries Creek area of South Carolina ELIZABETH only lived fifteen years, as previously mentioned. Twin MILLY might have married in Georgia during the emigration to Alabama. For it is known that she married in 1826 . . . and that husband William Cox was of Georgia birth. (His mother, Nancy Cox, had moved there from South Carolina prior to William's birth on February 7, 1807. Young William must have borne the Christian Name of his father for in purchasing his first government land in Dale County, ten years after marrying MILLY, he used the name "William Cox, Jr.")

At the time that Dale County "was split down the middle by Captain Arch Justice's broadax" to form the offshoot county of Coffee, MILLY'S husband was the Dale surveyor. It was he who laid off the lots for the new town of Newton. In those days of 1841 there was not a single bridge in the county for this young official to traverse! However, Newton did quickly construct an "academy"; MILLY'S nephew COLONEL JASPER had just finished his course there before getting killed in the war. It was at Newton, laid out by Cox immediately after the war, that the county's first newspaper, "The Southern Star" began publication.

him as a character reference! Two years after this he was on the militia rolls of Alachua County and was co-owner of "The House of Cole and Dowling".

JOSEPH'S first wife, Catherine, had been a member of the Tallahassee Methodist Church. She and sister-in-law LETITIA had joined the church at the same time, May 31, 1840. Catherine was thrown from a buggy and killed, probably between the time she professed Christianity and the time the 1840 census was run. JOSEPH may not have remained in Florida; he could well be the "JOE" Dowling shown on a roll of the 50th Georgia Infantry Regiment. He had been born between 1810 and 1815.

The same roll of men, now in the possession of author Folks Huxford, shows "M" Dowling. Washington archivists were not able to find his Civil War record. This would have been WILLIS'S son, born in 1829, named MADISON. At the age of twenty-one he had worked in Hillsborough County, Florida. Five years later near Wakulla Springs he filed an affidavit of military service against the Indians stating that he had volunteered at St. Marks in August of 1849, receiving a Tallahassee discharge two months later.

WILLIS'S three other children shown on Chart 324 have not been traced. The author has clues indicating that one of the two sons was named JAMES. All the information gained on four generations of WILLIS'S descendants is here.

JAMES'S DAUGHTERS

As mentioned at the beginning of this chapter, JAMES and Mary Boutwell Dowling probably had two little daughters who died young. Reverend DEMPSEY Dowling did not seem to know of them; as he was only six years of age at the time that the census - taker had visited his Uncle JAMES'S home and listed five daughters, it is only natural that DEMPSEY might have failed to mention such first cousins if they died as children while he himself was a child.

Mrs. Beulah Barnet Dowling uncovered no information on POLLIE and LETTIE, except the possibility that LETTIE'S other name was also CHARLOTTE. The author feels that LETTIE was actually the nickname used in place of LETITIA, for this girl's brother WILLIS named a daughter of his LETITIA.

Mrs. Beulah Dowling (just before her death) had also been told that SALLIE, the fifth daughter on Chart 101, married Edward H. Woodham, Sr., in the Jeffries Creek area of South Carolina before moving to Dale County, Alabama, where double-first-cousin DEMPSEY already resided. But a genealogical article in Dale County's "Southern Star" a few years ago by Woodham's great-grandson stating that the Sallie Woodham who died in Dale on January 23, 1865, was a Fields at the time she married Edward H., Sr., leaves the kinship of our SALLIE undecided.

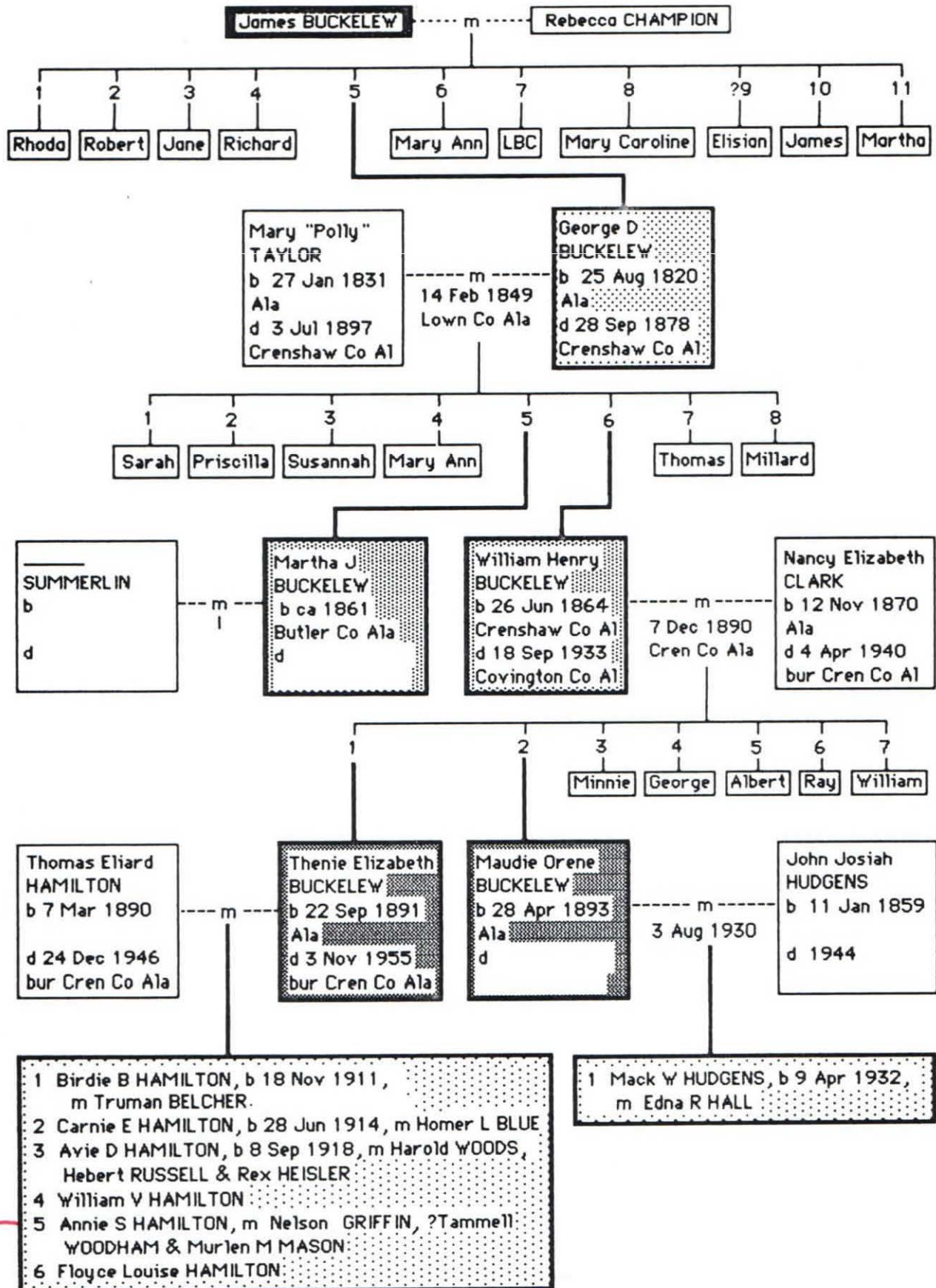
