In this newsletter issue you will find a copy of one of our standard family sheets. These contain basic information we collect on the Family Someday, we hope to have such sheets on every Turnage who has ever lived. With them. we will be able to trace the history of any member of the family. Please make xerox copies of the sheet and fill them out on yourself, your parents, your married children; give copies to your brothers, sisters and other relatives and ask them to do the same. You can get old dates from Bibles, tombstones and older relatives. List full names (don't use initials) because a lot of Turnages have the same name. List nicknames and infants who died young. If there are Turnages in your area but you don't know their relationship, give them sheets and ask them to fill them out for us. Fill out sheets on our dead kin using info from tombstones, even if you don't know who they are. We urge you to fill these out and return to us as soon as possible.

PHOTOGRAPHS

Please send us copies of Turnage photos as soon as possible to use in the photo album. If you do not have copies, let us borrow them to use and we will return them when the album is printed. We want the first issue to have as many older pictures as possible. Please include a self-addressed, stamped envelope to return your pictures.

Editorial

The Turnage Family Association is now a chartered agency of the American Family History Institute. The Institute is incorporated by the State of Georgia as a non-profit foundation for the purpose of historical preservation and other programs. This means that we are now assured of having a permanent place in the future. Our goals remain the same: to gather and preserve our Turnage family heritage and to help reunite our family. As an agency of the Institute, this means research will continue for generations and a strong organization will exist long after we are gone to help sponsor our programs.

Robert Earl Woodham, founder and President of the Turnage Family Association, will become a full-time employee of the Institute as president and director of facilities and agencies. The son of Norma Turnage (Mrs. Norma T. Parrish of Columbus, Ga.), Robert Earl has devoted his spare time for more than 25 years to research on our family. His collection of Turnage information is the largest in the nation. 

Turnage Heritage

The Turnage Family has produced more than its share of ministers of the gospel and Marion County, Mississippi's branch of the family is no exception. The New Hope Baptist Church stands as testimony to the religious faith and dedication of the Turnages. In 1872, the neighborhood organized New Hope church under the leadership of Roland R. Turnage and several other members of the Turnage family. Roland, a native of Duplin County, North Carolina, was ordained a Baptist minister by Antioch Baptist Church, to serve as full time minister of New Hope.

New Hope joined Pearl River Baptist Association in 1872 soon after the church was formed. The little country church had a humble beginning with 42 members, including Rev. Roland R. Turnage, G. H. Turnage, Robert Turnage, Alexander Turnage, James Monroe Turnage, Eli N. Turnage, Ann Turnage, Gaberlien Turnage, Amazon Turnage and others. During the first year, 22 people were baptized and a grand total of \$5.00 in contributions was collected. The congregation erected a one-room building seating 500 in 1876. The second church building was constructed in 1895. That year, with 22 new baptisms, the membership reached 200. The story of New Hope is just one of many which illustrate the religious work of the Turnage family. Rev. Roland R. Turnage served his community for many years as a minister. The Marion County branch of Turnages has produced several more ministers since Roland.

An organization was needed but it must be a permanent body that was not just a social club. Such an agency could not be supported solely by a small group from just one family. Thus was born the idea of an organization representing all families.

The Turnage Family Association will be an integral part of the Institute and will be operated by the Institute in the years to come, assuring its continued existence. It will be one of many agencies of the Institute.

As support grows, the Institute will eventually have a professional staff to operate its national library and other programs. We are literally starting from "scratch". Our most urgent need is a headquarters for our library and research center where thousands of records already gathered can be stored safely. We also urgently need typewriters, desks, file cabinets, notebooks, shelves and much more.

Turnages Urged To Help Purchase Copy Machine



Our Turnage Family in America had its origin in England during ancient times. According to the reliable book, "Origins of English Surnames", the modern family names "Turnage", "Turnadge" and "Turnidge" had their origin in the name "Turnditch", a local name from Derbyshire and from "Thornage", a local name from Nottinghamshire. Derby and Nottingham are counties in central England.

Since the vast majority of the people of England and the U.S. could not read nor write prior to the 1900's, names were spelled as they sounded. There is seldom a "correct" way. Different spellings of a single family name have arisen over the centuries.

Our first ancestors in America could not read nor write and most local officials were barely literate. The earliest American records on our family show many spellings, depending on how it was pronounced and the education of local officials writing the record. Most of the first records used "Turnedge"; by the 1730's, it became Turnage. This spelling is used by all the family in America today with the exception of part of the Missouri family and all those in Oregon, who

spell it Turnidge.

A majority of our cousins in England today use Turnage according to telephone books. Turnidge and other spellings are also used. We find both spellings in Canada and Australia, where our cousins from England settled in pioneer days. Turnage also is the most common spelling in Canada and Australia.

In the U.S., dozens of different spellings are found in records dating back to the 160-0's. In the South, we soften our "R"s and as a result, you can end up with names without an R: Tunnage, Tunage, Tonage, Tonnage. Others I have found include Ternage, Turnich, Tarnich, Tarnage, Tarnadge, Turnadg, Tunitch, Ternedge, Turnedge and many more. In the course of 27 years of research on our family, I often play detective and try to spell it every way I can and then look for records under those spellings.

Our family name is an unusual one and compared to many others, we are a "small" family—and sort of special. But the main thing to remember is that regardless of how we spell it, we are all still part of the same family.

We hope with our research, reunions and other efforts to be able to unite our many "branches" into a single Turnage Family once again. Work with us to make this possible.

The Turnage Family Association is now four years old. is time to take count of what we are and what we are trying to do. The Turnage Family Association is a non-profit family club -- the first national organization ever established in America for the Turnage family and descendants (regardless of how you spell the name). We are not, however, just a "club". We were founded with very worthwhile goals and a definite purpose we can all be proud of. (see editorial on page 2)

The Turnage Family Association was founded in 1979 by Robert Earl Woodham, a son of Norma Turnage and grandson of Gordon W. Turnage. Robert Earl has spent most of his adult career as a newspaper and magazine writer and editor. He has spent his spare time for the last 30 years as the Turnage Family Historian, devoting thousands of hours to research on our family and at his own expense has gathered the largest amount of information on the Turnage family ever assembled -- all as a hobby.

Robert Earl's collection has become the Turnage Family National Library and Archives. Our National Library contains thousands of records and copies of historic documents, including records of marriages, deaths, births, census, old deeds, wills, military records, newspaper articles, obituaries, photographs and other kinds of records.

After working on the project for over a year, Robert Earl founded and sponsored the first Turnage Family National Reunion in 1980. This was the first time in history that a nation-wide reunion had ever been held for our family. Robert Earl contacted hundreds of Turnage families all over the country. The Association will continue to sponsor the annual Turnage National Reunion as one of our most important projects.

The "TURNAGE TRIBUNE" is a non-profit family newsletter. It is the first national newsletter ever established in America for the Turnage-Turnidge family. The TRIBUNE is the official publication of the Turnage Family Association; a subscription is included with membership in the Association. The "TURNAGE TRIBUNE" was founded by Robert Earl in 1979 and the first issue was printed in Mar., 1980. We have tried in the past to send a copy to every family we can locate once a year to let them know about the National Reunion. It was a costly lesson but we learned we simply ca nnot afford this.

Editorial

We recently received a letter from a cousin in Texas asking why a second family club had been set up and why there was rivalry instead of unity. He pointed out such a move defeats the real purpose a family club should have: uniting the family and learning about your mutual heritage. We have kept quiet about this too long.

I spent 30 years of hard work researching our Turnage heritage before I decided to form a family club and founded the Turnage Family National Reunion. It took over a year of hard work and personal expense to spread word about the Turnage Family National Reunion. I wrote dozens of letters, printed and mailed a newsletter at my own expense to more than 1,000 Turnage fam-

ilies and made arrangements -- all by myself.

It took only two hours of shenanigans that smelled of foul politics for two sisters to convince a small group of relatives that they would decide what purpose and goals a family club should have. One of the sisters and the man picked to head their club stated very frankly they were not interested in "family history and all that stuff about dead folks." They were interested only in a reunion and they wanted to run it. "If you want all that history stuff, you do

I was blessed out by two of the sisters for renting an outdoor picnic pavilion to meet at instead of a motel convention hall (at my own expense); I was blessed out for not paying to have a banquet for an unknown number of people instead of a family picnic (and paying for it myself too, I guess); I was blessed out for not arranging for volunteers to watch kids at parties (I shut up that criticism with "Will you volunteer?"; of course they didn't); I was damned for not already getting the Association incorporated, I "should have hired a lawyer" (at a cost of several hundred dollars out of my own pocket) or "Do it yourself." I was given pure hell for not having any "entertainment" ready. I pulled out my billfold and offered the last \$6 I had to my name and told the sisters that if this would pay for getting the Association incorporated, pay for a banquet, hire a fancy meeting hall and satisfy their demands enough to stop the bickering so we could get on with a family reunion, then to take it all.

It wasn't. I guess I could have hired a circus to entertain them and spent a fortune on their other stuff (none of which had anything to do with "uniting our Turnage family and learning more about our heritage") but all that wouldn't have stopped their "now that you've got it started, we'll take over" attitude. I read a book on how to organize family clubs and it warned of this kind of divisiveness in most family clubs. Sad but true of ours too.

My treatment at the second national reunion got sorrier. A table holding 30 years of

Turnage family records was actually pulled right from under me!

It mattered not one bit to those carrying out these shenanigans that I volunteered my time and money and we were holding our first Turnage National Reunion because of the love I have for my family. Nor did it matter that I was the one who had spent 30 years of hard work to make it possible. Nor all the self-denial I faced-giving up the comfort of new clothes, new cars, a home, basic medical and dental care, furniture, shoes, vacations and other enjoyments. And who gave a confound if I survived for years on one meal a day--many times just a balogna And who gave a contound I. a sales roundtrip to save \$1.20 bus fare--all so I could spend sandwich; or walked to work 12 miles roundtrip to save \$1.20 bus fare--all so I could spend thousands of dollars of my money to gather our Turnage heritage. My money has been spent to go all over the South to gather information on our family, buy copies of Turnage records, pay go all over the South to gather the south the for a ton of paper, stationery, stationery, but to put records in, plastic sheets to cover them, pens, pencils, note pads; design a family sheet and pay a company to set it into type, pay to print thousands of these sheets, pay for xerox and pay a company to set it into the copies of charge over the sheets, pay for xeroscopies of information and mail it to relatives free of charge over the years; take time off from earning a living in order to devote time to my "family work".

GREENER PASTURES ATTRACTED
PIONEER TURNAGES TO FRONTIER

As we drive across America today, it is hard for us to imagine the sight our Turnage ancestors beheld when they first arrived on the frontier and gazed upon its virgin forests, rich land and crystal waters. The tought stirs our imagination and fills our soul with a hunger to see such an unspoiled sight. Small wonder that pioneer Turnages braved the hardships and dangers of frontier life to claim and possess these bountiful lands. As wonderous as the frontier was, many would never have faced its hard life had they not been forced to seek land to support their growing families or by the fact older lands were worn out quickly by primitive farming methods.

In many states, land was available free to settlers, or at a small charge. Even the poorest person could become a landowner simply by moving onto vacant land and claiming it. On state lands, the only charge was usually for a survey and sometimes a small registration fee. Federal lands could be had for free or as little as a few cents an acre. It was this offer of free and fertile land which lured our ancestors from their original home along the Chowan River to other frontier areas of North Carolina and still

later, into other states offering free land.

Records of these land grants, homesteads, etc. are one of the most important kind of documents we have left of our early ancestors. We hope to acquire copies of every land grant ever made to a Turnage to become part of our Turnage Family National Library. Among the oldest land grants we have located to date are grants in North Carolina to Laz Turnage for 300 acres and George Turnage for 200 acres. They both applied for these grants on 22 Nov., 1738. Below is a land grant survey for William Turnage (Senior) in Dobbs County, N.C. dated 30 Nov., 1781. It is typical of land grants for this period.

Trail Blazers ... REVIEW

Until now, the only book ever published with a large amount of information on our Turnage family was "The Trail Blazers" ("TTB"), printed in 1935 by Martha Alice Turnidge (Mrs. Alice Hamot). The book contains almost 400 pages, about 100 devoted to the Turnage family, the rest to other families. As the only book available to us in the past, it is indeed unfortunate it contains so many errors and statements based on legend.

However, "TTB" contains about as many errors and speculation as it does hard facts. Many of those who have done more thorough research on our family had hoped TTB would be "laid aside" and remembered only as a collector's item. However, a group of the family headed by two people (who stated very frankly they were not interested in our family history and knew nothing about it) chose to reprint and distribute TTB. Since an effort has been under way for several years to produce a series of books on the Turnages, we question their motives -- especially in view of the fact these books will be based on 30 years research and more accurate information. But their motives for reprinting TTB are another story...

Since TTB will now receive more attention as a result of these new copies and more people will now believe these mistakes, we feel it our duty to point out some of its major faults. First off, we fully understand and appreciate the problems Alice faced in 1931 when she started on the book: very few of the public records we have today were available to her. Indexes were almost unknown. For the vast majority of her information, Alice had to rely on "word of mouth." That was her biggest problem since word of mouth is more often fiction than fact.

Alice spelled her name "Turnidge" and throughout her book, insisted this was the "correct" spelling of our family name. There is no "correct" spelling; actually Turnditch or Turnech would be older (more "correct" ?). Turnidge is just one of the corruptions made long after we settled in America. On page 2 of TTB, the statement is made that the "first Turnidges in America spelled their name as Turnidge until 1727, when through an error in the state records the name was entered in the land grant as Turnage. That eventually led to the change of the name in North and South Carolina."

This is false. In truth, all public records remaining for the period 1711 to 1737 vary but usually show the spelling <u>Turnedge</u> and one signature shows George <u>Turnnedge</u>. Alice quote many records with the spelling "Turnidge"; in fact, when we examine the original documents, we find this not true! A case in point: page 6 cites land grants and census records for John "Turnidge" and others. Again, FALSE! The original land grant to John of Anson County, N.C. shows <u>Turnage</u>--not "Turnidge". The same is true for all the others quoted. Contrary to TTB, the 1790 federal Census does not list Turnidges either. It shows Turnage, Tonnage and Tunnage. TTB also lists Luke and Benjamin "Turnidge" on the 1790 census of Richmond (a city), Virginia. False! The census of Richmond County, North Carolina shows Luke Turnage.

In other words, Alice actually changed the spelling throughout TTB to suit her own spelling. But the reader is led to believe that was the spelling in the original documents.

Several times, TTB states the first Turnage came to America in 1714. More thorough research shows we were here by at least 1711. In spite of citing a few records stating our Turnage family was from England, TTB goes on to say they went to Scotland. Then Alice sends them to Ireland and for the rest of the book talks about our "Scotch-Irish" heritage! This tale about Scotland and Ireland is pure fiction and the only proof offered is simply "According to



A wonderful dream has come true: we are proud to announce the first books ever printed on our Turnage Family. Both the "Turnage Family Photo Al-

bum", Volume I have been printed and mailed to relatives.

The "History" is an introduction to the heritage of our family. Originally intended to be a small booklet (5½" X 8½") of about 50 pages, the publication was greatly expanded in size and number of pages. The end product is a 132 page book, fully indexed, on our Turnage family. It has a short background on our ancestors in England and offers a look at our American ancestors from 1700-1860. The book's emphasis is on Turnages in America during the formative years of the 1700's. It follows the Family from its founding in North Carolina by George Turnedge Junior, to 1860, when Turnages had spread across the South and reached the Pacific coast.

These books are a result of more than 30 years of research by the author and Turnage Family Historian, Robert Earl Woodham. He is the son of Norma Turnage and grandson of Gordon W. Turnage. Robert Earl has devoted thousands of hours and thousands of dollars of his money to family research. What began as a hobby at age 12 has become a "calling" for him: when not at his job

earning a living, he spends the rest of his time on "family work".

Robert Earl does not consider these books as the culmination of his work. On the contrary, numerous books, booklets and family photo albums will be sponsored by the Turnage Family Association in the future. A new volume of the Turnage photo album will be printed every year from now on. This is the only way we can afford to gather and preserve our family pictures.

Robert Earl has spent thousands of dollars of his own money to buy copies of such historic documents and the trips to get them. To replace those records that could be replaced today would cost more than \$250,000 as a con-

servative estimate.

Trail Blazers ... REVIEW

Robert Earl Woodham Turnage Family Historian

(Sixth in a series of reviews on the 1935 book, "The Trail Blazers" by Alice Turnidge Hamot. Continued from last issue of the newsletter, June, 1985)

Wrong! Pg. 44 "Chowan River in Anson County, North Carolina"

The Chowan River is not in Anson County. This river begins in Virginia and then courses through northeastern North Carolina, ending up in Albemarle Sound.

Question! Pg. 45 "A tribute to our Confederate dead:"

The reader may become confused when a record is inserted of a Turnage who served in the American patriot army during the Revolutionary War. This follows several men who served in the Confederate Army; these precede the names of several men who served in the northern army during the War for Southern Independence, as well as the record of Alice's son who served in World War I. With no additional title, a reader might interpret all these men as being "Confederate dead".

Only seven men are listed under "Confederate dead" and three who served in the northern army, in TTB. There were about 110 Turnages who served in

the Confederate States Army and three in the northern army.

"William Turnidge, son of Michial and Sarah Turnidge, was Wrong! Pg. 47

born in North Carolina, Green County ... "

William was not born in Greene County. In fact, by the time Wm. was born, Michael Turnage had been long gone for several years from eastern NC. the short period Alice spent on research, she was not able to gather all the facts and never learned Michael, her direct ancestor, had lived for several years in western North Carolina before moving westward. Wrong! Pg. 50 "... Mary Bell (married King B. Scott)."

"Nimrod Scott married Mary Bell...and left one son, King B. Pg. 51

Scott."

Either she married her son or this is a typographical error.

Wrong! Pg. 55 "Eld. William Turnidge came of the old pioneer stock of the

Regulators of North Carolina."

If William was related to someone who was a Regulator, it must have been through his mother. No Turnage is known to have been living in western NC at the time of the Regulators nor did they participate in this uprising. "Elder John C. Turnidge, (Now spelled Turnage), was clerk Wrong! Pg. 58 of the church ... "

As stated earlier, Martha Alice had a fixation that the way her branch in Oregon spelled the family name was the "right" way. Here again, she makes a quote but actually changes the spelling in the quote. The rule is, when quoting that you always state it "as is". When quoting a document or some-

one else, never change that to suit yourself.

Wrong! Pg. 65 "...left the above county for the territory of Missouri in 1814." On page 47, TTB states William had moved to Missouri "about 1812".

Actually, this is the only mention of Rutherford County, Tennessee that I have found in TTB. I cannot understand why Alice did not write about Michael and his family (including William) living for several years in Tenn. Wrong! Pg. "At the close of the 18th century, the colony, called Upper Louisiana, was transferred to the United States. In 1804 it was retroceded to France, and was sold by that power to the United States."

This is printed in TTB with quotation marks, indicating it is quoted from some source. Whatever source, the information is incorrect. France ceded the Louisiana Territory (including Missouri) to Spain in 1762. Spain returned the Louisiana Terr. to France in 1800. France sold the territory to

the U.S. in 1803.

Editorial —

Every family has its black sheep. However, it is a sad thing when the black sheep use their evil efforts to wreck everything good in a family

and do all in their power to prevent a united family.

Such is the state of affair in our family. A small number of relatives damned the Turnage Family Association from its very beginning and have reviled me in particular—all because I have worked so very hard to create a united family and to gather and preserve our Turnage heritage. I founded the Turnage Family Association in 1979 as a non-profit, national family club for all descendants of our family. I announced a wonderful purpose and set goals we should all be proud of (see page 11 for purpose & goals). In 1980, my lifetime dream came true when I founded the Turnage Family National Reunion.

After spending months of had work and my own money to get a Turnage national reunion established, I went to the first national gathering of our family in history with a wonderful feeling and great expectations. Instead, to my shock, I was belittled and blessed out by Cece Staley and Elmaise Register. They weren't pleased with anything: they could have done it all better, to hear them brag. Cece and Elmaise were determined they were going to run the show and went about pushing petty politics, corrupting our very first family reunion into a political party convention. I busied myself talking "family" and history. Cece and her supporters ended up electing Howard Turnage as president of their group. Howard had not joined nor supported the Association. He announced to me when he arrived "I don't care about all those dead folks. I came here to have a good time." Cece told me the same thing the next year when she asked me to give up the Association and join her group. "We'll run things and you can handle all that history stuff," she said.

From that time on, it has been one constant, carping campaign by Cece and her cohorts to convince relatives that their group is the one to join, while trying their darndest to make the Turnage Family Association and especially Robert Earl look like the bad guys and themselves as the "good guys". To compete with the first newsletter ever published for the Turnage family, Cece started her own and printed it sporadically until she discovered it was a lot of work and then turned it over to someone else. When I announced we would sponsor publication of a booklet on our history and a family photo album, Cece set about to block this worthy project. To distract attention from the books, her group xeroxed part of a book written in 1935 and sold it for \$10; a book which should never have been recirculated be-

cause of all the mistakes.

When so many folks came to the second reunion wanting to know more about their ancestors, Cece and her bunch had to change their tune about family history. She printed a copy of my family sheet (which I personally designed and paid \$45 to have typeset) in her newsletter. They continue to imply that if you want your history preserved, send it to them, not to us. Cece has harped upon the idea that her group is "democratic" and "audited". She certainly has turned that group into a "business": they spend more time on board meetings, elections and appointing committees at their gatherings than they spend on "family". Most folks travel to a reunion to enjoy their family—not to attend board meetings.

With all the money Cece's group has spent and all the time they have wasted criticizing me, what has it really accomplished for the Turnage family? A reunion? That was already accomplished—without their aid. A family newsletter? We already had one when she started hers. Reprinting part of a book? Better to have left it on the bookshelf. With all the nagging and continued damnation of Robert Earl, (continued on page 6)

it cannot but make the decent members of our family wonder WHY? What dark motives would make anyone continually knitpick and try to discredit someone like Robert Earl, who has donated more than 30 years to a hobby of research on the Turnage family. I have survived on one meal a day since 1981, usually two bologna sandwiches, in order to donate every penny I earn to this family "work". I donate more than 60 hours a week to this hobby (besides 40 hours a week at my job). No other person in history can come even close to matching this devotion to our family. Without me, there would have been no Turnage National Reunion, no Turnage Family National Library, no Turnage family newsletter, no Turnage publications. This other bunch certainly haven't produced anyone willing to put out that much effort, time and their own money to do all this. How many others do you know who go hungry so we can have a family reunion, a family newsletter and family research?

Cece and her supporters broke away from us out of pure spite for me personally. A group founded with such a tainted purpose and no worthwhile goals will carry the stigma forever. Their actions hav- done nothing but bring shame upon themselves and created disgust among decent relatives. Think what all that money they have spent trying to copy what we started might have accomplished. Imagine what good they might have done if they weren't so busy trying to discredit my work. When all you can do is gripe and snipe at someone else who is doing the real work and making the real strides for our family, it only raises questions about what kind of devil's work is going on. If that is all they can do, so be it.

The Turnage Family Association was <u>not</u> founded in such a vein but out of love for our family. That is the difference between the two groups in a nutshell. We will continue to work for some real goals and we will continue to accomplish them--regardless of all the spiteful efforts to stop us. I and the membership of the Turnage Family Association invite you to

join with us and work for the Turnage family.

The first annual volume of the "Turnage Family Photo Album" has been printed and mailed to those who ordered them.



Kinchen and Matilda Turnage would be amazed to know of the large number of descendants they fostered. Their progeny now live mainly in North Carolina, Georgia and Florida but include descendants who are scattered Their total numbers several hundred today. throughout America.

Kinchen was the son of Jesse Turnage Sr. and his first wife Frances (m.n. unknown). He was born in 1794 in that part of Dobbs County which later became Greene County, North Carolina. His given name is a family Kinchen grew up in the South when public schools were an unknown benefit and therefore like most other Turnages of the period, was unable to read and write. As a result, his name in public documents can be found spelled numerous ways: Kinchen, Kincheen, Kenchen, Kencheen, Kitchen, etc.

When just a child, Kinchen moved with his father Jesse from Greene Co. to Duplin County, NC where he grew up and lived the remainder of his life. Kinchen married about 1830 to Matilda Rasberry (Rasbury). According to my grandfather Gordon W. Turnage, his grandfather Kinchen lived in Duplin Co. near the community of Deep Run (in adjoining Lenoir Co.).

Kinchen and Matilda had at least 10 children: Emanuel, Zacharian ("Zach"), James, an unknown son, Mary Catherine (Catherine), Caroline, Charles, Buckner Thomas ("Buck"), Frances and William Edward ("Bill").

Kinchen witnessed a deed in Duplin Co. on 9 Apr., 1818 when his uncles Daniel and John Turnage of Greene Co. sold their portion of their brother Zachariah's estate to William Turnage. This is one of the earliest records yet found on Kinchen.

According to family tradition, the oldest child Emanuel ran away from home as a teenager when his father sold his pony. Emanuel settled in Jackson Co., Florida on the Chattahoochee River. He later moved across the river into what is now Seminole County, Georgia. Zacharian moved to Wayne Co. and when Kinchen died, moved back home but after 1870, nothing else is known of Zach.

Very little is known of James. He may have moved to Sampson Co. and had four children. Catherine married Jonas Hill and has seven children: John Emanuel, Rebecca, Julie, James, Jonas Nathan, Nancy and Willie Hill. She and Jonas are buried in the Hill Family Cemetery near Deep Run. Caroline had at least three children: Toy A., Ellen E. and Chancie James Turnage. Caroline died in Greene Co.

Charles enlisted in Company I, 4th North Carolina Volunteer Regiment of the Confederate Army and died in a hospital at Lynchburg, Va. about Jan., He was never married. Buckner T. married Marie C. Mitchell. not yet know of any children.

Sometime in the 1870's, Matilda and her two youngest children Frances and William E. left North Carolina and moved to Southwest Georgia to join her son Emanuel Matilda died there and is buried at the abandoned Cowpen Pond Church Cemetery on the Chattahoochee River in Jackson Co., Fla. She lived with Bill until her death. Kinchen died in the 1860's and his burial place is still unknown.

Frances married a Lewis. They are reportedly buried in the Turnage Family Cemetery in Seminole County. I do not know of any descendants yet.

William E. married Charlotte Anne ("Annie") Crowson. Bill and Annie had seven children: Daisy, Gordon William, Florence, Della Cleveland, Alfred and Genoni. Bill bought a farm near his brother Emanuel in Seminole Co. and lived there until his death during the great flu epidemic of 1918. Most of his 250 acre farm is now covered by Lake Seminole.

Emanuel married three times and had 15 children. His first wife is unknown and she apparently died young after the birth of their second child. He then married Rebecca Sellers. After her death, he married His children included: William J., Susanna, James M., Nancy R. Tyson. Frances Catherine, Mathew, Stallie Ann, Daniel B., Ellen, Luden, Rudolphus D. ("Duff"), Leon, Dicie, Thadie, Rufus R. and Hilliard.



We can learn much from the information on a tombstone: the person's full name (often we know a person only by their nickname), when they lived and their spouse and sometime their children. The dates give us clues to look for other information. We urge you to help us collect cemetery records on our family by visiting cemeteries in your area and copying down tombstone information on all Turnage relatives for us. Info in parentheses () is added by us.

Turnage Heritage

by Robert Earl Woodham Turnage Family Historian

Courthouse records of many kinds offer us a world of information on our Turnage ancestors. Among those records most often overlooked by family researchers are those of various "courts" themselves as opposed to land records (deeds, etc.) and vital statistics (marriages, births and deaths). Throughout our history, there have been many different types of courts in various States. Their duties and names have changed over the years: during the Colonial period and early statehood, North Carolina had a court called the "Court of Common Pleas and Quarter Sessions"; Georgia once had an "Inferior Court"; many states today have a "Superior Court", "State Court" or "County Court". Regardless of the name, records from such courts can provide us wonderful details about our ancestors that we can't find any other place.

Such is the case with Zachariah Turnage (1764-1816). No personal effects of Zach's survive today to tell us about him -- no family Bible, no personal papers, he left no will to tell us who his kinfolks were, etc. Under old English common law, still used by most states, when a person dies without leaving a will, his property is divided among his immediate heirs. was the case of Zach. He had married a widow, Mrs. Theresa ("Treacy") Warren, who was apparently older than he; they never had any children. Upon his death about 1816, Zach's estate, minus his widow's dowery, was divided among his living brothers and sisters and the heirs of his dead brother. Estate records and deeds dividing his property are the best sources today for identifying this particular family. From these records combined with other information from wills, etc., we can piece together who Zach's brothers and sisters were as well as some of his nephews and nieces. Zach's estate was divided into 8 parts, meaning he had 8 brothers and sisters: this tells us that his parents, William Turnage Junior (later became "Senior") and his wife Elizabeth had nine children, counting Zach.

everal of Zach's brothers and sisters and the children of one dead brother sold their share of Zach's property to his brother William Jr.(III) One such deed by Cader Turnage, Nancy (Turnage) Ward, Martha (Turnage) Kornegay, etc. is where they each sold their "one fourth of the eighth part in said lands"; this means they were the children of one of Zach's dead brothers. The dead brother had inherited 1/8 and his four children therefore received \$\frac{1}{2}\$ of 1/8 of the estate. Other deeds in this case also name the husbands of some heirs, again giving us facts we could not learn otherwise. An 1819 deed states: "...viz., Jesse Turnage & Hannah, the sister of Jesse who intermarried with the said Dobson."; the deed was signed by Jesse Turnage and Hannah and her husband Lewis Dobson. A real gold mine of information!

Like Zach, the only records that exist on our other ancestors during the 1700's and early 1800's are rare tidbits we can find in long forgotten court records and a few land records. Only once in a blue moon do we find anything personal on an ancestor, such as this interesting item:

"Wed A.M. after 15 April 1793: Upon motion of Zachariah Turnage, ordered clerk certifie to said Zachariah Turnage that court upon inquiry
into his case do find that the said Zachariah Turnage in a quarrel with
Sanford McLendon in February last had the misfortune to have a part of
both his ears bitten off by said Sanford McLendon & that said Turnage
did not loose his ears by any whatever but by the cause aforesaid."
The above was taken from the Minutes of the Duplin County Court of Common
Pleas & Quarter Sessions.

Our dream is to some day obtain copies of every such piece of information on our ancestors. The problem is, the records are scattered in courthouses throughout the nation. We must visit the courthouses and search the records, then purchase the copies at \$1 to \$5 each. That not only means a great deal of work but a lot of money--which the club doesn't have.



Adjutant General of the California
National Guard. He later became Adj.
General. Major General Turnage returned to active duty in 1979 and served in the Pentagon's reserves affairs office.

Thomas was appointed in 1981 by Reagan to head the Selective Service System, which handles America's military draft registration. He has held that post since then.

As director of the VA, Thomas will be in charge of the \$27 billion a year agency that is in charge of most military veteran's benefits. Among its duties, the agency runs the many VA hospitals across the nation. During his tenure as head of the SSS, Thomas pushed the number of 18-year-olds registered for the draft from a mere one-fourth of those eligible to 97 per cent of men 18 to 25.

Unfortunately, we cannot tell you "who" Thomas is. He may have been born in Montgomery County, Texas but we cannot verify this. We don't know who his parents were; we have never had any word from him.

Just the Beginning

It has been a long time in coming, this beautiful dream. Now it is a reality--we finally have a copying machine!! This edition of your family news-

letter is the first to be printed on our own copier.

Having our own copier is something Robert Earl has worked toward for six years. For those of you who work in offices or own you business, it may not sound like much. But for what it means to the Turnage family now and for generations to come, it is a step as important as that taken by our ancestor when he first set foot upon American soil.

Until now, we simply could not afford to reach all our relatives around the country with newsletters often enough to impress upon them what we are trying to do. As a result, the family club remained small compared to the total number of Turnage relatives. This in turn meant we had very little funds from membership dues to support the family club's activities. It has been a never-ending battle because there is so much to be done in our struggle to reunite the Turnage family after almost 200 years.

To give you an idea of just one effort: it takes us about 30¢ to 50¢ to write a letter (including cost of postage, envelope, paper, family sheets, typewriter ribbons, correction fluid and so forth); to write just one letter to every one of the more than 5,000 Turnage families and descendants in the

country would cost from \$1,500 to \$2,500 or more!

For the majority of folks--those of you who have never done any serious research on our ancestors, it is hard to understand why it can be so expensive. Imagine then, a single courthouse with up to 500 deeds, several hundred birth and death certificates, marriage licenses, wills and estate records. In some courthouses, it costs \$6 to get a copy of a will, \$3 to \$6 for a marriage license, etc. (continued on page 3)

Our long campaign to buy a copying machine has at last come to a wonderful conclusion; we recently bought a small copier that meets our present needs. Our new Canon copier is a desktop model using plain paper. We also purchased a case of toner powder and two cases of paper (\$60 for paper). Total cost, including tax: \$2070.

The copier was bought as a result of an official fund-raising campaign by the Turnage Family Association. It was a joint project conducted with other families that Robert Earl is related to. A cousin of Robert Earl's daddy, Mrs. Adrian Roper, began the campaign when she donated a used copier (purchased for \$350). Unfortunately, we could not use that copier: it was a "wet copier" using special paper (on rolls) and liquid toner. The copies were too poor for newsletters and historic documents. Adrian became the head of a campaign to raise enough funds to buy a copier. We needed one using plain paper and small enough to carry into courthouses, etc. to copy historic documents.

The Woodham family held auctions at two of their national reunions; relatives donated handmade blankets, quilts, sweaters, dolls, art work, decorative items and other handcrafts to be sold. Adrian and two of her sisters sewed a quilt and sold tickets for it, raising more than \$200.

Many relatives donated money in memory of deceased and living loved ones. This will be a permanent memorial in our Family: these memorials will be permanently recorded and preserved in the Turnage Family National Library.

We want to extend our heartfelt thanks and appreciation to all those Turnage relatives and kinfolks of Robert Earl's daddy who donated their money, handcrafts and energy to this worthwhile effort; your work and prayers will be remembered. What we can now do will effect the Turnage family for generations to come. Your grandchildren will be proud of you.

Key to Future

Give A Family Heirloom

The Turnage Family Association was founded with very wonderful goals, primar ily to reunite our scattered relatives and gather and preserve our heritage. These goals sound simple to most of you. It would be if we were talking of 20 to 30 people or even that many individual households. However, when we speak of "family", we mean all descendants of the first Turnage in America. After almost 200 years, that is a lot of people today—several thousand individual families; every (white) Turnage in America and thousands of others

who descend from Turnage girls make up the Turnage "Family".

Thousands of records on so many relatives can swamp us with tons of information. To gather this information and try to make heads or tails of it is a mammoth task. Turnage Family Historian Robert Earl Woodham, also the founder and head of the Association, donates up to 60 hours a week on family research as a hobby. To do all this, we desperately need some decent "tools" to work with. We lost the only tool we had last year in the midst of our copier campaign when our 35 year old manual typewriter completely broke down. Robert Earl had to take money saved for the copier and buy a used electric typewriter (\$425).

Many relatives have urged us to consider buying a computer, including Turnages and Robert Earl's daddy's family. Mrs. Adrian Roper (cousin of Robert Earl's daddy) who was in charge of the fund-raising campaign for a copier, has urged that when a copier was obtained, fund raising should continue to

buy a computer.

A computer can mean a world of difference in what we might accomplish for the Turnage family. It would cut down tremendously on the amount of hard work; for instance, addressing thousands of family newsletters a year could be done simply and quickly by a computer. It could do this automatically in

a few minutes rather than three days "by hand".

The most important way a computer could help is to store family records. All the information in our Turnage Family National Library can be put into a computer: consider the fact Robert Earl's collection includes tens of thousands of pages. When a relative wanted information on their ancestors, we could simply hit the keys and let a computer "look it up" in seconds and print it. A computer could eliminate most of the tedious work of typing information, addressing newsletters and so forth, thus saving hundreds of hours of work.

All this time and effort now wasted on many tasks would be better spent on contacting relatives around the nation, more research and writing books about the family. We could accomplish a hundred times more for our family

with such a "tool" to work with.

Our need for a computer is not just a whim. This is the space age. Mounds of office work just cannot be done by one person. Today, a computer can

handle the work of a hundred people.

All the records and historic documents we gather will not be worh a hill of beans if that information is not used to write books about the family. Only a few of us could ever find the time or afford to come to Atlanta to visit our Turnage Family National Library. If we can publish books however, these can be made available to relatives throughout the country. Books can also be deposited in local and state libraries so the information can be preserved permanently.

Therefore, at the urging of many of you, we have decided to go ahead with

another fund raiser and buy a computer/printer.

We ask your help in this. Again, we invite your donations to this worthy cause. Please make your donations in memory of a deceased loved one or as a memorial to a living person. Adrian will again be in charge of the campaign. Tell us their full name and how you are related to them.

Turnage Heritage

It has never been an easy task searching for our Turnage ancestors. In all the years I have researched our family, one important lesson I have learned is we cannot accept family "stories" or legends about ancestors three or more generations removed without records.

Finding records and putting together a glimpse of our ancestors requires a lot of real "detective work". For instance, no single record has yet been found telling us who the children were of William Turnage Junior and his wife Elizabeth. He was born in the 1730's or 1740's, probably in Bertie County, NC. William Junior was later known as William "Senior" because he also had a son named William. This fact has confused many people trying to trace our family—not to mention the fact there were other Williams living at the same time. This William Jr. (Sr.) and his family are mentioned often in the book The Trail Blazers; however, much of the story related in that book is wrong because not enough facts were by the author and the known facts were not pieced together correctly with good detective work or research. There are many sources of information on this family. They range from deeds, wills and estate records to state land grants and military records.

One of the best sources of information on who William's children were is the estate records of his son Zachariah ("Zach"). Zach died in 1816 without a will: under the law, his property was divided equally among his brothers and sisters. His wife is identified as Mrs. Theresa Warren, a widow (she received only her dowere for life). Several of his brothers and sisters sold their portions of his estate and these deeds are a gold mine of information for us. They reveal Zach's estate was divided among eight heirs, meaning William Jr. had nine children, counting Zach.

By tracking down all these deeds I can find and identifying each heir, we learn who some of the children were and also who they married. Nancy and Hannah along with their husbands are identified in deeds when they sold their portions. Some of the deeds also tell us that at least two brothers, John and Daniel Hobbs Turnage, stayed in Greene County when most of the family moved to Duplin County. William's son William Junior (III) was named in several deeds, since he bought the portions of his brothers Daniel H., John and Jesse plus his sisters' portions. He also bought land from Cader Turnage and others who had received a ½ part of a one-eighth share: this meant that one brother had died and his part was divided among his children. I have tentatively "identified" this brother as George, based not upon any records saying so but solely by the fact he disappears from records just before Zach died. I cannot find any other Turnage who died at this time or just before who would "fit the bill" as a child of William Jr.

None of these deeds or other records actually names William Jr. (III) as a brother. This is proven in a later document, the will of Hannah Turnage Dobson in which she leaves part of her estate to her "brother Wm. Turnage."

The estate records of Zach include a list of his property sold at public auction and names of each person who bought an item. The names include many close relatives of Zach; some of these people may also be in-laws that I have not yet identified. Among the relatives who bought items were William Turnage (III), Jesse Turnage, John Watkins, Martin Kornegay, Lewis Dobson, Kedar (Cader) Turnage, Jackson Turnage, Thomas Ward, Abraham Kornegay, John Turnage and possibly several others.

When

At one time there were several records on William Jr. ("Sr") and William Jr. (III) in the Pitt Co. courthouse, along with other Turnage records dating back to the 1750's. However, most of the older Turnage records there have disappeared. Some of these deeds were quoted or mentioned in The Trail Blazers. One such deed was made in 1794 by William "Sr." to William Jr., whereby William gave his home and land to his son after his death, upon condition William Jr. support his mother Elizabeth for the rest of her life. This deed establishes the fact there was a William "Senior" (Jr.) and Junior in 1794 and indicates the father was elderly and perhaps nearing death as he thought of his widow's support after he was gone.

The 1790 US Census helps add more information on how many children William Jr. had. William (Jr.) is shown with one other male over age 16 and two males under 16. William Jr. (III) was born ca 1781, so he would be one of the two males under 16 on the census. The census also lists Daniel and George living near each other. Nearby was William and Jesse. Zachariah had already moved to Duplin Co. That leaves John and Josiah ("Joseph", "Joe") who could be the other males over 16 and under 16.

The 1800 Census of North Carolina shows William, William Jr. (III), John and Daniel all living in Greene Co. Zachariah and Jesse were living in Duplin Co. Josiah was living in Craven Co. Here we run into the problem again of more than one person with the same name. Apparently there was another William in Greene Co. who I have not yet identified. Unfortunately, the 1810 Greene Co. Census was destroyed by the British in the War of 1812. This is a major loss of information. William Jr. may have died about 1795. If so, I cannot explain why there is another William on the 1800 Census, showing a male over age 45 and one male between 17 and 26 years of age, along with two females of the same ages. I believe the William in Greene Co. in 1800 to be the same one shown there in the 1820 & 1830 census records. Who his father was is still a mystery. But that is another story ...

In the brief space we have for this article, I tried to show we must use the precious few historical documents we can find to "identify" our ancestors. But we cannot rely upon the records alone nor upon family legends. It is often like a cross-word puzzle: you may find bits and pieces of information which must be put together to establish relationship among the people in those records. In the case of William Jr. above, we learned he had nine children: with this information, we then sought out every other source to identify who they were. Since I have a much large supply of information to rely on than anyone else in the past, it has helped make the task of identification easier.

However, just having records without additional ser-ch and logical deduction will leave you with meanious researingless Innior pieces of paper. The researcher must know such things) as the laws of inheritance at that time to understand the mean ing of a deed whereby some heirs are getting a one-eighth part and others receive a 1/4 part of an eighth portion. You can learn much from a person's estate records: if the person died without a will, their property must be divided equally among their nearest relatives. The county court usually required a complete inventory of property (sometimes including every farm tool, pot and pan, etc.). If an auction was held, remember that folks participating were usually the deceased's closest relatives, friends and neighbors. When you start researching your relatives, don't get discouraged by a lack of specific records telling you

what you want to know--just be careful to put it together right.

Robert Earl has already spent more than \$1,000 of his own money over the course of a few years making copies of family pictures to preserve. By making this a family club project, we can all share the expense and burden of effort in such a task. Working together, we can achieve much more.

Unfortunately, even the family club is still not large enough to pay the hugh expense of \$1,000 to \$2,000 required by offset printing and the printing plates for each picture. Until we can afford such a better method of

printing, we will print the Photo Albums on our own copying machine.

We want to print pictures of all periods -- recent and very old ones. must print the oldest photos we can obtain, of course. These often represent the only picture existing of a person and are thus rare and most important to preserve

A photographic heritage for all generations

We want recent pictures of living people also. PLEASE: for pictures hat are to be printed in the Photo Albums, remember that color photos that are dark will not reproduce well. Color photos should have good, sharp contrast--with a light background. Black and white pictures usually reproduce better.

The photographs you donate for future generations to appreciate will be preserved in the Turnage Family National Library. We hope the Turnage Library will some day be a part of a national library of American family history in Atlanta. If you do not have extra copies of photos for us to keep, we can return your photos after they are printed in the Albums. Please try to make copies for us to keep--especially of very old pictures.

Talk to other relatives and ask them to send us photos also. We

Trail Blazers ... REVIEW

(Seventh in a series of reviews on the 1935 book The Trail Blazers by Alice Turnidge Hamot. Continued from last issue.)

Wrong! Pg. 70 "This entry was signed by Martin Van Buren."

It was not signed by President Van Buren. A copy of the original document shows clearly that it was signed by a secretary—for the president. The various presidents were much too busy to sign the thousands of homesteads issued by the US over the years. They were signed by secretaries or clerks in the Land Office.

Question? Pg. 74-75 "Elsie May (Pollard), born August 22, 1882."..."Elsie May married Wm. Houston Hamilton, October 15, 1911. A son was born, June 14, 1867, named William. They had two children: Hazel Esta, born July 7, 1913; Roy Houston, born September 9, 1918."

If William was a son of Elsie May, then he couldn't have been born in 1867.

And if she had only two children, who was this William?

Question? Pg. 74-77 There is quite a bit of information here on Pollards, Campbells and others but it is not clear who they are nor how they are related to the Turnages.

Omission. Pg. 77 In the list of children here of Joseph Elijah Turnidge, a daughter, Emily, born in 1870, and son James, b. 1879, are left out.

Question? Pg. 81 Martha Ann Turnidge married Ratio Morrison.

I am not positive of this but Martha Ann's husband may have been Horatio ("Ratio") Morris--not Morrison.

Wrong! Pg. 83 There are several discrepancies in the names of the children of William Asa ("Acy") Turnidge: Chester "Pensen" should be Chester Vincent;

Delma should be Thelma.
Wrong! Pg. 85 "My father, James Calvin Turnidge, descended from gold old

Scotch and Irish stock."

Throughout her book, Alice states and implies the <u>Turnage</u> family is descended from "Scotch" (Scot) and Irish ancestors. Perhaps but for sure, those ancestors were not Turnages. Her father may have had both Scot and Irish or the so-called "Scot-Irish" ancestors but if so, those ancestors were on his mother's side or some other female ancestor. The Turnages were <u>English</u>. I for one am very proud of our English heritage and I have no desire to deny it or replace it with one which was alien to our Turnage ancestors. Wrong! Pg. 85 "...moved to Lawrence County...in 1866. In 1863 he and my mother, Sarah Melvina Pigg, were married at Oregon, Missouri, in said county."

Alice's parents were married 3 June, 1868--not in 1863; and not in "said county" (Lawrence) -- they were married at Oregon, Holt County, Missouri.

NOTE: I have not studied entire sections of the first part of this book, the part supposedly on the Turnage family, since these sections deal with other families that I am not familiar with. One such section of almost 7 pages, 99-105, is on the Morris family, Alice's first husband. If there are errors in these portions of the book, they will not be reported here.

Wrong! Pg. 107 TTB starts naming the children of Jesse Alexander Turnage and his wife Eucebia ("Uceba") Miller then jumps to Helen, Pauline and Glenna-without stating that these are children of William Arthur Turnidge, not Jesse. TTB then manages to include two pages on the history of in-laws all the way back to year 1590. TTB got lost in going so far back on in-laws and failed to finish naming all the children of Jesse.

Wrong! Pg. 107 "William Arthur Turnidge...Married June 22, 1913, Oswego,

He was married in Oswego, Kansas, just across the border from his home in Missouri. There is no Oswego, Oregon (see page 108).
Wrong! Pg. 133 "Martha Elizabeth, daughter of Joseph Warren, and Elizabeth Turnidge, was born December 20, 1842, near Scio, Oregon..."

She was born in Missouri (see page 110) (Continued in next issue)

We consider pictures of our relatives one of the most important things we can preserve on the family. In many cases, there is only one copy of a picture of a Turnage relative. When that person is dead and gone, that picture is all that survives to show us what they looked like. Two or three generations later, that person may have 200 or 300 descendants. Unless these photos are copied, few people will have an idea of what those ancestors looked like.

We are now working on the second volume of the Turnage family photos. It should be ready for mailing out by the end of November so that you can give it as a Christmas gift. You should place your orders for the Photo Album now, to give us an idea of how many copies to print.

We are also working on a second volume of our family's history We hope to have this second book ready by next July in time for the next Turnage National Reunion. More about this in a later newsletter.







Turnage Heritage...

Out to be more fiction than fact. People create legends to fill in unknown gaps of history simply because they are ashamed to admit they know nothing about their family. Some folks are also inclined to cover up known facts or particular relatives who cause them embarrassment.

Alice Turnidge Hamot's 1935 book "The Trail Blazers" and an article which appeared last year in another publication both contained such a legend about the family of Isaac Turnage. The errors appearing in the book may have been created by Isaac himself and told by him to his children. The legend says Isaac and a sister "Savania" were children of Amos Turnage, son of William of Greene County, NC and that Amos went to Coffee County, Alabama and "settled on a large plantation." This is all false.

Isaac was born 3 Apr., 1854 in Columbus, Georgia, son of Henry Turnage and Jane Elizabeth Armstrong. Henry and Elizabeth married in 1847 at Columbus and had at least three children: Mary Ann, Susannah (not "Savania") and Isaac. I cannot find them on the 1850 US Census but they were probably still

in Columbus where they do appear on the 1860 census.

Today, the census is taken every 10 years on just one day; however, early counts required months or even years to complete. People who moved during the census could be counted (or enumerated) twice as in the case of Henry and Elizabeth. The 1860 US Census of Muscogee County provides some very interesting information and also dispels the legend. Henry is shown living with his wife Elizabeth and children in the Shingle Hill District of Columbus in June. He was a carpenter with no real estate and only \$20 in personal property. By 7 June, the census shows Elizabeth living in a different part of town (the Wynnton area) --without Henry. She was listed as a farmer and in addition the her children, three other females were living with her, including Rebecca Turnage (age 26) and Susannah Shofner (age 12). Susannah Shofner was the daughter of Martha Ann Turnage and her husband W. A. Shofner; I do not know who Rebecca was but likely was the sister of Henry.

The reason Henry does not appear at home is because he was in jail. On 16 July, Henry was counted as a prisoner in the Columbus Jail. I do not know why Henry had to go to jail. What happened to the family after this is not yet clear. So from one census record, we dispel the myth of Isaac's father being a plantation owner in Coffee County, Ala. and find instead he was a carpenter

in Columbus, Ga.

Another and older Henry Turnage moved to Columbus from nearby Chattahoochee County during the late 1860's. This other Henry was married several times and had several children. In 1866, a Henry married Frances Willis. Which Henry this was, I cannot prove. However, on the 1870 census, only the older Henry appears in Columbus with his wife Sarah Ann who he married in 1861. It would therefore seem the younger Henry married Frances. This would indicate either a divorce or death of Elizabeth. As for Elizabeth and the children, we know that Isaac eventually reached what is now Camp County, Texas (1870's) and raised a family there (see family sheet). After 1860, I have found no other records on Elizabeth. I have searched all the older cemeteries in Columbus and found the grave of a "Susan" Turnage. Unfortunately, there is only the name on the tombstone and no dates. This could be Susannah. She is buried in a plot which includes Mary Tatum (Mary Ann Turnage?) who also does not have any dates on her tombstone.

Until we can locate Henry on additional records, we will not know for surwhat happened to him. Thus far, I have not found him in the military during the War Between the States (1861-65). I have only a few 1870 census records and have not found Henry on it so far. He apparently left Columbus in the

1860's. Where did he go? Did he have other children?

Time for a Cabinet-Level VA?

WASHINGTON, DC--Our cousin Thomas K. Turnage has already become the first Turnage to hold a high national office. If Congress approves, he may take another giant step up to become a member of the president's Cabinet.

Thomas became Administrator of the Veterans Administration in 1986. The VA is the nation's third largest federal agency, with an annual budget of about \$28 billion and more than 240,000 employees. It operates 172 hospitals, 117 nursing homes, 230 outpatient clinics and 188 readjustment counseling centers. It is the largest federal agency which does not already have Cabinet status.

Cabinet rank for the VA has support many leaders among both Democrats and Republicans. Senator Phil Gramm (R-Tex) stated "Giving the Veterans Administration the status of a Cab-

inet agency is the right thing to do. It is a step consistent with the needs of veterans...It can potentially affect the lives of 79 million citiz ns --almost one out of every three Americans."

However, the Reagan administration and VA have created a lot of enemies in Congress and among veterans; a recent example is the VA's battle to deny health care for alcoholism. In spite of the medical profession's diagnosis of alcoholism as a disease, the VA wants to call it "willful misconduct". The VA won a Supreme Court decision on the matter. Thomas also wants to deny health benefits for veterans who suffered atomic radiation between 1945 and 1962.

Such policies could have bad consequencies on the push to elevate the VA--and Thomas--to the Cabinet.

Turnage National Reunion

The location of our 1988 Turnage Family National Reunion has been shifted from Jackson, Miss. to Eufaula, Alabama.

This move has become necessary due to the prolonged illness of Robert Earl's mother, Norma Turnage Parrish. Norma has been in poor health for some time, since a fall while in the hospital required emergency brain surgery. Robert Earl left his job and moved from Atlanta to Columbus, Ga. in December. Norma entered the hospital again after New Year's and remained for about 10 weeks. She got out for two days and then suffered her first heart attack.

This, plus the fact Robert Earl can no longer afford such an extended trip, has forced us to move this year's National Reunion to the site

of our first reunion in Eufaula.

The reunion will be held Saturday and Sunday, 23 and 24 July. Headquarters will be at the Eufaula Inn (formerly the Holiday Inn) in downtown overlooking beautiful Lake Eufaula. Meetings will be held in the amphitheater on the lake at the Inn.

The Turnage National Reunion was founded in 1980 by Robert Earl Woodham, the Turnage Family Historian. He also founded the Association in 1979.

This will be a good opportunity to meet other relatives as well as to learn about your heritage. We will have thousands of records at the reunion from the family's National Library. Trail Blazers ... REVIEW

Robert Earl Woodham Turnage Family Historian

(Ninth and last in a series of reviews on the book "The Trail Blazers" by Martha Alice Turnidge Hamot; listing mistakes in the book)

Wrong! pg. 164 Paragraph one: "Elder William F. Turnage...died at his home in St. Joseph, Missouri, March 1, 1833."

Make that 1933.

Paragraph two repeats this same information but lists the correct year of 1933. Why this repeat?

Wrong! "He is survived by a wife and four children: Erol, Lenolay, Nolan and William Irvin."

The children should be: Erroll Adrian, Mildred Lenora, Nolan Frederick and William Erwin.

?? "Marriage Bonds of Ray County, Missouri"

Here, only seven selected marriages of six Turnages and one Turnidge are list-

ed, all men, from the 1800's through 1921.

Why only these seven and not others, especially the oldest family marriages in Ray County, dating back to 1823? And why no marriage records of Turnage girls? The listing "J. C. Turnage to Elizabeth Odell..." is puzzling. TTB always lists Jesse Calvin Turnage's wife as Esther Odell (pg 165, for instance). Was Elizabeth her first or middle name?

Wrong! pg 167 "Lulu, second daughter of James Turnage..."
It should be James Turnage's first wife: Josephine Isenhour.

Wrong! After the above sentence about John Clayton Turnage marrying Mary

Isenhour, it then states "No children. Children by first wife..."

Was Mary Isenhour not his first wife?

Wrong! pg 170 Remember that in our last issue, we stated we had been told Alice Turnidge Hamot died before her book was completed and someone else actually put her notes together and published her book. As a result, Alice notes were put together in a random way and often do not make any logic. The section beginning on page 170 about Mary Turnidge Shirley is such a case. This section rambles so that it becomes hard to determine even who are the children of Mary.

Our review of the "Trail Blazers" has covered only about the first third of the book. The remaining two-thirds deals with history of the author Alice Turnidge's maternal ancestors, not related to the rest of our Turnage family.

We will not review that portion of her book.

We emphasize this series has been a book review. It is not and never was intended to criticize Alice's monumental efforts. On the contrary, our family is greatly indebted to Alice for her attempt to gather and preserve our Turnage history. Without her, so much would have been lost. She did the best she could with limited resources of information; she had less available to her in the 1930's than we have today. And can you imagine her hardships just to travel across the country in the 1930's—with all those dirt roads! Most of her history came from verbal information. Considering the educational level of elderly relatives during the 1930's, it is little wonder so much of it came out "blurred" to say the least. Our eternal thanks to Alice!

During the last 50 years, the handful of people who have done serious research on our family have quickly discovered this book has numerous mistakes. This review would not have been necessary were it not for the fact another Turnage family club (not connected with the Turnage Family Association) decided to reprint copies of this book.

It should never have been reprinted: now, more people will read it and accept

these mistakes as "fact".

This other group insisted on this at a time when the Association was sponsoring an effort to publish the first complete book ever written solely on our Turnage family. (continued on page 3)

Sadly, this reprint was not an honest attempt to preserve our family history; this was a blatant, spiteful act done to try and prevent publication f books by the Association. They hoped relatives would buy copies of their eprints of this book (no matter how many mistakes!) so fewer would buy the Association's books.

With these other relatives actively opposing our effort, it took us a long time to finally get enough funds to publish our first two books. They were published without their help and in spite of their opposition. Now, the Assocaition is working to publish two more books. As we predicted, these same sad people are again opposing this wonderful project to preserve our

family heritage.

A hundred years from now, if such people can be remembered at all it will not be because they tried to do something constructive for our family. But they will be remembered as "those people" guilty of trying to prevent us from preserving our Turnage heritage. What wonderful things they could have accomplished for our family.

Please forgive me for not writing sooner but I am 83 years old and not able to do much anymore. I am enclosing some material which I would like to be placed in your files. I still have hopes of getting more records.

I would like to place an order for "TURNAGE FAMILY HISTORY, Volume I". I cannot express in words how grateful I am for all the hard work you have done over the years to preserve a record of the Turnage heritage. I realize I haven't shown it in the past but I shall try to make amends in the future.

I believe you, and you alone, may be able to find out which line of. Turnages my great grandfather, William Turnage, B. 1816, came from. If I cannot find this out, my family history will end with him. he not have to be a descendant of William, George or Luke who settled in North Carolina in the early 1700's? My uncle lived in Atlanta about 1906. He wrote my father and said that he met a man there who knew something about our family. He said that his (my uncle) grandfather's name was Leslie. This I cannot verify; besides I have yet to see the name Leslie connected with the 1700 Turnages. Will you please let me know if there is anything you or I can do to try to ascertain this fact.

This I do know. Prior to the Civil War a cotton mill was built

in Columbus, Ga. My great grandfather worked in the building of this mill. Whether he was employed as a laborer, carpenter, brick mason or in some other capacity, I do not know. He and his wife, Rebecca Moody Turnage, migrated to Monticello, Ark. They had two sons, Henry and William Riley, my grandfather. They later moved to Farmerville, La. For a while he was employed there as a jailor. My grandfather was in the Confederate Army during the Civil War. ...

Turnage Heritage...

illiam B. Turnage, a Tennessee pioneer and later a pioneer of Texas, is one of those many puzzles that defies a positive answer so far.

Despite extensive research, we still do not know who the parents of William B. were.

William B. Turnage was born 28 Feb., 1794 in Chesterfield County, South Carolina, according to his tombstone. He and his family moved to Tennessee at an early age, when the state was still a frontier and still homeland of

several Indian nations.

During the War of 1812 (1812-14), William volunteered as a soldier and served in the Tennessee Militia on two different occasions. I haven't discovered yet what military action he actually participated in but most Tennesseans were kept busy in the war fighting the Creeks and other Indian allies of the British. In his old age, William received a veteran's pension.

Thanks to the pension records, we know much more about him. He lived in William County, Maury County, Davidson County, Tipton County and Shelby County in Tennessee before moving to Texas. William was living in Williamson County in 1813; he owed a note to John Atkinson which was due in 1814.

William married Nancy Eskew (Askew ?) in Maury County on 6 Nov., 1827. They had one son, Newton F., born in 1832. Nancy died in the 1830's. William lived in Davidson County and then moved to Tipton County. He married Elizabeth Caroline Hughes there on 6 June, 1843. She had no children.

I have found no records yet to show how William was related to Henry Turnage of Tipton Co. Nor have I be an able to locate William on the 1840 or 1850 US Census. The first census of Texas in 1850 was not very accurate and it could be possible William was in Texas but not counted. William eventually


settled in LaGrange, Fayette County, Texas. He became the jailor there for a while. His brother Walker C. Turnage had lived in Fayette County for several years when William joined him there. Another brother, Zachariah, lived there briefly and served in the Republic of Texas Army.

Zachariah went back to Tennessee, where he died in 1847. In 1854, William petitioned the court to become administrator of Zachariah's estate. Estate records named Zach's heirs (10 brothers and a sister) as: William B., Walker C., Thomas James, Gardner, George Washington, John C., Isaac William, Shelby C., "Sandy" M. (Alexander) and "Beady" (Obediance).

William died 22 Mar., 1879 and is
buried at LaGrange's Old Cemetery.

William Turnage Sr. is the "father" of all the family from Chesterfield Co., SC. However, which one of William Sr.'s children is the father of this Tennessee/Texas branch of our family has yet to be determined. Until we can afford to buy more records from Tennessee, this will remain a mystery for us.

You help us answer these questions when you send in records to preserve.

nother puzzle confronting us also comes from Fayette County, Texas. This county seemed to be a congregating place for "unknown" Turnage relatives. Elisha B. Turnage settled here; so far, I have not been able to discover who his parents were. The first record found on him is a marriage record when he married America E. Wilson in Fayette Co. on 18 Aug., 1861. America died in 1864.

Elisha served as a soldier in Company A and Company F of the 13th Texas

Volunteers during the War Between the States.

He also appears on the Fayette County tax rolls from 1861 through 1866. After that, there are no other records on Elisha in Fayette County. Either he died during the mid-1860's or he moved away to another area. I have not been able to locate him on any US Census records, so as yet, we do not know even when or where he was born.

Several brothers from Tennessee lived in Fayette County, Texas at one time or other: William B., Walker C. and Zachariah. Zach went back to Tennessee and died there. Walker C. had several sons and at least two daughters. I have not been able to discover anything on his children except from census records. I have found no records on them after 1870. Surely, some of Walker's children married and had children?

Shelby C. Turnage, a brother of these three brothers from Tennessee, also settled in Texas. I have never found him on any census record and do not know if he had any children. He served in the Texas War for Independence

as a soldier in the Texas Army.

Another relative who settled in Fayette Co. was William A. Turnage Jr., son of William A. Turnage Sr. and his wife Verlincha T. of Tennessee. William A. Sr. was a son of Henry Turnage of Tipton Co., Tenn., we believe. William A. Jr. died in 1863, leaving an orphan, William Lincoln.

All these Turnages in one frontier Texas county cannot be just "coincidence". t was simply too remote an area for all of them to gather there, unless there was some kind of close kinship. More records from Tennessee may help.

'Family heritage books' content revealed

Well, those shysters who have been selling fake family "heritage" for several years are at it again. In spite of being found guilty in federal court and numerous state courts, these charlatans continue to cheat people who are hun-

gry for some kind of knowledge on their family history.

Starting in the 1960's or early 1970's, a company using the name "Beatrice Bayley, Inc." began selling their "Heritage" book under every family name. Their advertising leads you to believe you are buying a history of your family. Instead, this is one book with a lot of junk information about how you can trace your family history (and do the work yourself). They add a list of names and addresses (which they get from telephone books, city water taps, city directories, etc.) and call it the "Smith Family Heritage Book". Change the list of names to Jones and lo and behold, you have the "Jones Heritage Book"; and so on for every name in the telephone book! They have recently sent out letters trying to sell another book on our Turnage family (the first was in the 1970's).

There is not one single sentence in the entire book on history! Beatrice Bayley Inc. was found guilty of "...untrue, deceptive and misleading solicitation" in violation of court orders. They have been found guilty several times in several state courts. However, they have changed their company name and location and continue to operate this racket. They began in Pennsylvania and when it became too hot for them there, they moved briefly to Ohio. They started up again in Pennsylvania and at last word, had bought out Halbert's of Bath, Ohio and operate from there. Be warned! If you want a "family history"--get one from a family historian, not some profite gring business.

A new series of books

We are now working on two new books about the Turnage family: the second book on our family's history as well as a second family photo album. More than a year ago, the Turnage Family Association sponsored publication of the first books in history ever written solely about our Turnage family.

These books, "Turnage Family History, Volume II" and "Turnage Family Photo Album, Volume II" will be similar in style and size to our first two books. The first books, Volumes I of the "History" and the "Photo Album" were official publications of the Association, as will be our new books. They were written by Robert Earl Woodham, the Turnage Family Historian and son of Norma Turnage. Robert Earl has done more research on our Turnage family than anyone else in history, devoting more than 30 years to his hobby of family history. His professional background as a newspaper and magazine writer and editor has helped him in this hobby tremendously. His collection of Turnage family records gathered from all over the nation is now the Turnage Family National Library.

Publication of these books is a non-profit project. As with the first books, Robert Earl is donating his time and effort to write and prepare the books. When the first books were printed, the price charged (\$10 each) turned out not to be enough to pay the printing costs. Robert Earl donated the additional amount for you. Printing costs have gone up and our original estimate on printing the new books must be revised (those of you who have already ordered copies will still receive your books at that price).

The "Turnage Family History, Volume II" will emphasize our history before 1900. It will contain copies of historic documents gathered from throughout the nation, including copies of old land records, wills, estate records and military service records. The book will also have many family group sheets on individual family groups showing parents, children, dates and locations so you can understand more clearly who is "who".

The new "Photo Album" will have pictures dating from the 1800's up to the present. We urge relatives to send us copies of photos to print in the album; we prefer copies of pictures we can keep. However, if you do not have extra copies we will return your original photos as soon as we get the books printed (please be patient, it will be several months before we can return photos). The Albums are the best way we can afford to preserve our treasured family photos for future generations and at the same time allow everyone in the family to share them. Both books will be about the same size and style as our first two books. Robert Earl will again donate his time and effort on the books. If the Association does have any funds left over after paying the printing costs, this will be used to purchase more family records from throughout the South.

In the future, our books will be available only to Turnage Family Association members who have paid their current year's membership dues. It takes a great deal of research to produce a history book and research requires money. When we founded the Association, some relatives stated quite frankly they were not interested in "all those dead people" nor in contibuting to any kind of research. So if you want to know more about your family, you must help the rest of us pay for it. Therefore, we have set a charge of \$30 on the "History" and \$30 on the "Photo Album" for non-members.

Quality, as well as quantity, suffers as well when there is not enough moisture.

"Usually the hotter the content, which is a part of the fiber in the grass that the animals can't digest," Tucker said.

Mitchell Roberts, superintendent of on-campus research farms with the Mississippi Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station, said the dry weather has made it possi-

ble to cut the winter grasses, but could hurt future cuttings.

"We're OK now, but if it continues to be hot and dry, the growth of our hay crop will slow down, so our next hay cutting will be short," Roberts said.

Kipp Brown, Carroll County agent with MSU's Extension Service, said spring started well for hay, with plenty of rain, but a cold snap around Easter set the grass growth back. The first hay cutting will likely be about a week late because of this delay.

weather, the grasses have really started growing and now we need some moisture," Brown

Rick Simmonds produces hay on about 100 acres in Noxubee County. He usually cuts the first hay of the year the first of June, but this year he'll have to wait until the second week. "The soil is starting to run out of moisture," Simmonds said. "Normally the soil stays pretty wet until July and August, but if we don't get ond cutting.

"With the warm, warm some rain, we'll have to sta irrigating right after we cu the hay."

"Irrigating the grasses costs about \$100 a day in fuel, labor and other expenses," Simmonds said. "All that's going to come of the profit end if we don't get some rain."

Hay producers across the state would like to see a few days of rain at the end of May, then dry weather to allow them to cut and put up the hay. More rain will be needed then to grow the sec-





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

Around two in the morning on Election Day 1992, Bill Clinton wandered back to chat with myself and other reporters sharing his all-night fly-around aboard his campaign plane. The soon-to-be president was in a talkative mood, buoyant with the thrill of anticipated victory and yet sobered by the responsibilities that would soon fall on his all-too-mortal

Clinton had just completed two airport rallies in Texas, which prompted him to recall his youthful days running the 1972 McGovern campaign in the Lone Star State. Clinton's voice suddenly took on an elegiac tone as the narrative shifted to the morning when he drove House Majority Leader Hale Boggs, stumping in Texas for McGovern, to the airport for a flight to Alaska. The tragic death of Ron Brown casts a pall that will not soon be lifted. Words are insufficient balm, and yet they are all any of us have to offer. My naive hope is that his memory will temper a little of the cynicism that so many Americans apply to those men and women who choose to walk along the corridors of power.

Thomas Jefferson observed, "When a man assumes a public trust, he should consider himself public property." In modern times the consequences of becoming "public prop-

intimidations erosion of privacy and, yes, sometimes special prosecutors.

I can think of no public official whom I would describe as saintly, and few who will deserve public statuary. They are, for the most part, flawed humans, with their quirks and foibles, no better and no worse than the voters who elevated them to high office. Yet it would be a tragic mistake to ignore their commitment and their sacrifice - and to sneer at them as ego-mad over-achievers motivated by nothing more than personal glory and financial gain.

Time reporter Jeffrey Birnbaum has written a soon-to-be-published book, Madhouse, that captures, in the words of its subtitle, The Private Turmoil of Working for the President. Birnbaum's canvas is the Clinton White House, but the theme of burnout could equally apply to any Republican administration.

"Work in the White House is nonstop," Birnbaum writes. "It consumes almost every waking hour. Family life falls by the wayside; the first family is the only family that a staffer really has time to serve."

But the real crippler for once star-ry-eyed presidential aides is not exhaustion, but the disillusionment that comes with the realization that governing is a Sisyphusian task and that far-reaching change is a mirage. As Birnbaum puts it, "A White House aide must live each day with the fact of gradual decline and still shoulder the unending self-sacrifice that is the daily staple of the job."

As a political reporter, my daily rounds resemble a before-and-after experiment about the pursuit of power. Despite the president's lead in the polls, a fatalistic fatigue hangs over almost every conversation I have with Clinton aides regarding a second term. In contrast, there is a bantering and bubbly mood to the Dole campaign that suggests Republican operatives have no idea what awaits them if they win.

I have been musing for a while over the circle of loneliness that surrounds the president. So many men and Women whom Clinton liked and trusted in the days before he became president have vanished or been ex-

iled from the inner circle. The Arkansas crowd, his 1992 campaign team and the first generation of White House aides are obvious examples. I can imagine Clinton looking around the table at a White House meeting and saying to himself, "Who are these people?"

A sitting president never acquires

new friends, only new courtiers. The easy bonds of intimacy that Clinton shares with fellow Rhodes scholars like Labor Secretary Robert Reich and Deputy Secretary of State Strobe Talbott cannot be replicated. Even if

they have trained themselves to call him "Mr. President," old friends cannot help thinking of him as "Bill." Not so with new recruits.

That is partly why Brown's death leaves such a void. Brown demonstrated his loyalty as party chairman by rallying Democrats around the nominee in those difficult days in the spring of 1992 when Clinton was running a weak third in the polls behind George Bush and Ross Perot.

Debts like that cannot be forgotten. Nor can they now, sadly enough,

Pilots battled elements, outdated technology

Airfield has just primitive avionics gear

In the final minutes of the flight that claimed the life of Ron Brown and 34 others, the pilots were working as hard as pilots work

But the technology they had to rely upon was tired.

cision approach. But that equipment was useless. To work, the advanced equipment would have had to communicate with equally sophisticated equipment on the ground at Dubrovnik's airport - equipment the airport doesn't have.

The Pentagon says 35 people were on board when the plane crashed. As of Thursday night, 33 bodies had been recovered.

As the pilots descended toward the rocky Croatian coastline, one of them flew the plane - trying to fly straight in gusty winds while descending from 4,000 feet to 2,150 in 10 miles.

The other was likely trying to figure out exactly where they were using a single piece of outdated equipment called a radio magnetic indicator - and a clock.

The radio magnetic indicator, or RMI, was the only navigational aid they could use as they approached the Dubrovnik airport. The war-torn airport has only the most primative avionics, which send out beacons on AM radio bands.

A needle on the RMI would have pointed toward a pair of beacons — picking up one beacon at a time — guiding them to the airport, telling the pilots if they were on course. But by today's standards, which include strong signals that can help a computer land an airplane, the system is archaic.

In fact, Air Force pilots don't have to be able to use the old devices on what's called a nondirectional beacon (NDB) approach to be allowed to fly the T-43, a military conversion of the popular Boeing 737.

"I personally have never flown between two NDB stations," says Lt. Col. Tom Perry,

His T-43 planes are equipped with only one receiver.

Commercial pilots say to fly such an approach - where the pilot must leapfrog from one radio beacon to the next as he approaches the airport - with only one receiver would be illegal in the United States.

"You've got to be able to maintain one (receiver) on the first (beacon) so if you miss the second locator you know where you are," says commercial pilot John Nance, an aviation safety expert. "He's got to be able to pick up both of them to make it a legal approach."

Perry says the T-43 doesn't have two recievers because they are so rarely used, so he teaches Air Force pilots to use one by counting.

In an NDB approach, when a pilot reaches one beacon, and the needle flips from one end of the dial to the other as the plane passes over the transmitter, the pilot dials in the frequency of the next beacon. Then he counts the seconds while watching the air speed to determine how far the plane

If the plane does not pick up the next beacon by the time the pilot estimates it should have based on the air speed and the clock - the pilot would abort, turn back to the other beacon and try again.

But as the ill-fated pilots improvised in bad weather on Wednesday, many things may have affected the reading on their lone instrument.

Static caused by heavy rain, lightning and signals bouncing off mountains can give false readings. Nance says the inac-

curacy of the technology and the close proximity of the mountains "makes this a very shaky approach." To drift off course to the north in that situation means "almost a guarantee hit" into the mountain.

Air Force Gen. Howell Estes says, "If we thought it wasn't a safe approach, we wouldn't allow our aircraft to use it."

Air Force Capt. Les Kodlick, a pilot, said the investigation will look at why the pilots tried to land under conditions prohibited by the published ap-

Brown's death brought an immediate halt to a special prosecutor's investigation into his financial affairs.

U.S. and Croatian pathologists, using flashlights to see through fog and driving rain, Thursday began picking up body parts of those who died when a U.S. military plane crashed in Croatia Wednesday.

The plane, carrying Commerce Secretary Ron Brown, his aides and business executives, slammed into the top of a remote, 2,300-foot mountain while attempting to land.

Pathologists said most of the bodies are so badly burned that they'll need DNA testing to be identified, including Brown's.

Some reports say, however, that Brown's body has been at least tentatively identified. Officials say 35 people were on board and that 33 bodies had been recovered by Thursday.

"It's really hard to recognize them," pathologist Simun Andelinovic told USA TODAY

from the crash site. "It's hard to believe that we could have helped them."

Most bodies show massive head injuries, indicating the severity of the crash, said Andelinovic, chief pathologist at Split, Croatia's Clinical Hospital. A few bodies were strapped in their seats; others had been thrown from the plane.

Body parts, and charred sections of the plane, were scattered over a 100-yard area.

Thursday, rescuers asked for help from the more than 100 U.S., Croatian and French soldiers guarding the area.

And there was no letup in the bad weather. Soldiers said they couldn't see more than 10 feet in front of them.

"The weather is so bad you can't imagine," Andelinovic said. "It's raining all the time.

This weekend, bodies will be transferred to a makeshift morgue at Dubrovnik Airport before being flown home.



Clinton signs farm bill, sees problems ahead

President Clinton signed legislation ending decades of farm policies governing crop prices and subsidies Thursday. The new law could bring revolutionary changes, some lawmakers say.

"This farm bill is the most historic change in American agriculture since the 1930s," said Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., Senate Agriculture Committee chairman. "Production and supply controls will end, and farmers will produce for the market for the first time since the Great Depression."

Now the race is on for the Agriculture Department, which must issue regulations for farmers signing up for the fixed annual payments that will replace traditional subsidies tied to crop prices. The payments will decline each year. Nearly \$6 billion will be spent in "market transition" payments in 1996, \$36 billion over seven years.

Eligible farmers have until Aug. 1 to enroll for the entire

seven years of the new program.

The Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act is a seven-year blueprint for farm policy. The law ends limits on the kinds of crops a farmer can grow and still remain eligible for government subsidies and loans. Policies that required land to be idled in some years to keep surpluses from depressing market prices also are eliminated.

Mike Boehlje, an agricultural economist at Purdue University in Indiana, says farmers are trading a broad federal income safety net and limited market stability for greater

flexibility and access to markets.

Clinton said he reluctantly signed the bill because farmers need to know what agriculture policy they'll be under before they start spring planting or harvesting winter wheat. But he sees trouble ahead. He said as payments shrink, so will the income safety net for farmers, especially if market prices fall. Clinton said he will propose legislation next year to restore the safety net.

Brown died Wednesday in a plane crash near Dubrovnik, Croatia. Oklahoma City is still recovering from a April 19, 1995, truck bomb that killed 168 people. Clinton is expected to lay a wreath at the site of the federal building and dedicate a plaque for a new YMCA day care center to help replace the one destroyed inside the federal building.

POLITICAL POLL: President Clinton holds a commanding lead over Republican Bob Dole in Pennsylvania, a key battleground state in this year's election. The Keystone Poll conducted by the Center for Politics and Public Affairs at Millersville University shows that if the election were today. Clinton would beat Dole in Pennsylvania 51%-34%, a 17-point margin. If Ross Perot were to run as an independent, Clinton would still win, but by a narrower 14-point margin: Clinton 41%, Dole 27%, Perot 16%. The statewide poll of 689 registered voters, taken March 30-April 2, has a margin of error of 3.7 percentage points.

A Federal Election Commission report shows a sharp increase for the GOP over 1993, the last off-election year, when Republicans got \$20 million in PAC money and Democrats \$36.6 million.

No staff, no ads – but a lot of drive

Texas candidate stumps by truck

CRANDALL, Texas -Here's the "Victor Morales for Senate" TV ad voters won't see:

A shot of the candidate, alone. "It's been said I have no money," Morales, 46, says. As he speaks, people walk into the frame behind him. "It's been said I have no organization.' More people arrive. "It's been said I have no experience.

"However, I do have the most important thing." The visual punch line: He's surrounded by a throng of supporters.

As political ads go, it would be a model of veracity. A high school government teacher and city councilman, Morales got the most votes in Texas' Democratic Senate primary, 36%, without a lick of political organization or big-time experience. He spent \$8,000 of his savings and \$10,000 in nickeland-dime contributions. In this huge state - 18 million people, 254 counties, 19 television markets and 21 radio markets he didn't run a single ad.

Now he's campaigning the same way in a runoff Tuesday against the second-place finisher, Rep. John Bryant. (Texas requires a runoff if no candidate gets over 50%.) The winner faces an uphill race against Republican Sen. Phil Gramm.


So although Morales has an entire ad campaign written in his head, which he vividly describes over a plate of enchiladas at Carmona's restaurant in nearby Terrell, he's unlikely ever to be able to afford it.

He has crisscrossed Texas in his white 1992 Nissan pickup with a dented driver's door, "Morales '96 U.S. Senate" bumper stickers and 87,000 miles on the odometer. When he started, it was 30,000.

He has no headquarters, other than his home. There's no staff except a few volunteers like Minh Huynh, a former student who stuffs envelopes at the dining table.

But there's a media strategy: as much free press as possible.

Urged on by his students, Morales decided last summer to go after Gramm's job.

"I'm not going against Phil Gramm because he calls himself a conservative. I have conself a conservative. I have conservative views. I'm going against him because he's in it for himself," Morales says as he puts another 150 miles on the truck driving to Longview.

In every town, he went straight to the radio or TV staight to the radio or TV staigh

"It was almost like an experiment: How many votes can I get, driving around?" Then in January he came out on top in a poll on the four-way primary race. "Boom, more publicity."

On March 12, he won the primary. Since then, the passenger's seat of his pickup has been occupied by a stream of national reporters. Sometimes

he gets them to drive.

Will he win the runoff? "I think it's possible," he says. "I wouldn't bet my house."

His assets are an engaging personality, common-man credentials and a gift for speaking.



Commanding a restive audience is a talent he's honed over 17 years in the classroom.

On camera, he can be polished and concise. In front of a crowd, he's folksy yet inspira-tional. "You don't have someone here who can tell you, 'I have plan A, B and C," he tells nursing home administrators in Marshall. "But you do have a man who cannot be bought."

plans and Medicare spending is slim. He says he doesn't have time to study up. "I can't read any plans because I'm driving the truck and answering the phone," he says. Besides, in-cumbents like Bryant, 49, "have experience and they have years in Washington, and what did it do? ... For all their expertise, look at the mess."

If he's short on policy initiatives, Morales does have plenty of opinions. Affirmative action: 'Reform, sure. But it's not time to get rid of it yet." The death penalty: For it, but, "I don't like the way it's meted out... Poor die first." Immigration: "Let's stop the name-calling, and stop saying they take more than they give. . . . My heart does not allow me to shut the door to people who are illegal aliens."

Helping Morales' free-media strategy: His opponents didn't advertise much themselves. Bryant, who raised more than \$500,000, spent most of his media money on direct mail. Spokeswoman Margaret Justus calls it "the sleepiest Senate race on the planet - until we got into the runoff with Victor."

Now, Bryant is attacking Morales for failing to offer specific proposals and neglecting to file Federal Election Commission reports. Morales says campaigning leaves no time.

In the primary, he got huge support from Hispanics despite Bryant's endorsement by Hispanic leaders. "There's a tremendous amount of pride" that a Latino is running, he says.

Some attributed his win to confusion with Attorney General Dan Morales. Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee executive director Don Foley calls it "like having the name Kennedy and running in Massachusetts." But even Justus concedes, "I just don't think the voters are that stupid.'

Morales knows his pickup campaign makes a good story but says, "Give me credit for the work I've done. . . Don't tell me it's just a truck."

As he's heading home on I-20, a white car pulls alongside the truck. One of four young men in it holds up a piece of paper reading: "Are you the Victor Morales?" He gives them a thumbs-up. The guy in the passenger seat mouths "Good luck," and they pull away.

County gets tire disposal state grant

Marion County has received more than \$12,000 through a Commission on Environmental Quality grant to establish a waste tire disposal

The site is planned for the Marion County transfer station, said Marion County Board of Supervisors President Lloyd Irvin Fortenberry. The county will contract with a private company for the disposal of the waste tires.

The board had previously entered negotiations with Enviro of Laurel to transport the waste tires from the transfer station in Foxworth to a state

sanctioned disposal site.

ome voters get shorted By DANA GOWER

Mississippi voters who registered under the National Voter Registration Act - commonly known as "motor voter" - may be surprised to find they will get a substan-tially shorter ballot this November than other voters.

Clerk Joe Herring said this will be the first time separate ballots will be prepared for voters registered to vote in federal, state and local elections, and those registered to vote only for federal offices, including the U.S. President and Congress.

Because the state Legislatire never voted to apply the federal "motor voter" law to state elections, anyone who registered at a driver's license station, health department, Food Stamp office or Welfare department using the federal forms is not registered to vote in state or local elections, Herring said.

Initially, Herring's office contacted all Marion Countians who had registered using the federal forms to let them know they needed to fill out a form at the courthouse or city hall in order to vote in state and local elections.

"It's gotten to the point Marion County Circuit now, though, we've gotten so many (federal registrations) coming in, we couldn't keep up with them," he said. There are probably about 200 people now in that category, Herring said, adding. "It's only going to magnify over the years."

Anyone who is registered on a federal form still has until noon Oct. 5 to register at the courthouse to participate in state and local races during the November general election, he said.

"Anybody who registers here in the office or through a state mail-in can vote in anything," he added.

Preparing separate ballots

for the election was one of the main topics discussed last week during the Mississippi Circuit Clerks Association's annual convention held in Biloxi, Herring said.

"This will be the first time we've ever had this," he said of the separate ballots. "The ballots will have to be different. It will take a concerted effort educating the poll workers" to properly use the separate ballots, he added.

Secretary of State Eric Clark served as keynote speaker during the convention, Herring said.

"He stressed the importance of our association supporting legislation which will put us in compliance" with the fed-eral voter act, he said. Herring said he hopes the Legis-lature will do that during its next session, as long as those already registered under the "motor voter" act will be "grandfathered" in and not

Senate ends board debate

Columbia attorney Thomas McNeese was one of four nominees appointed by Gov. Kirk Fordice to the state College Board which were rejected by a slim vote of 7-6 during a special session of the Senate July 11.

The vote, taken by a Senate debate between the governor's office and the state Legislature which began in March.

"Governor Fordice feels Mississippi lost out on four highly-qualified board members," said Heath Hall, spokesperson for the governor's office. "It is unfortunate

that four senators made this a racial issue and these four nominees were denied on that basis."

Senators Johnny E. Walls, David Jordan and Alice Harden stated in April that although the four nominees "met the statutory requirements and qualifications and were noted to be outstanding sub-committee, has ended a citizens ... we reject the aforedescribed option because the governor has obviously decided not to alter his position with respect to the present nominees being all white men."

The 12-member board presently has two women and two African-American members.

"Our opponents have fought us in court several times to avoid a full Senate vote," Hall said. "They failed.

"However, they used the rules of the Senate to avoid a full Senate vote," he added. They won on Thursday, but in the end we all lose.'

Hall said because all four appointees were rejected by appointees were sub-committee the Senate sub-committee none can be resubmitted.

The governor has not announced any nominees, Hall said







Evan Albert "Beby" Turnage, 66, former National Guard commander

Evan Albert "Beby" Turnage, former three-star general and commander of the Mississippi National Guard, died Saturday at his house in Monticello following a lengthy illness. He was 66.

Turnage attended Copiah-Lincoln Junior College and worked as county engineer in Walthall County.

He entered the U.S. Army and served in North Africa and Europe during World War II. He was awarded the bronze star and purple heart and discharged at the rank of captain.

After leaving the Army, he attended the University of Mississippi and graduated from the Ole Miss Law School.

He came to Monticello in 1949 as an attorney and was elected county attorney for Lawrence County that same year. He was attorney for the Lawrence County Board of Supervisors.

In 1950, he organized and commanded Company "D" 106 Construction Engineers of the 31st Dixie Division of the Mississippi National Guard headquartered in Monticello.

The unit went into active duty in Jan. 16, 1950, and he served as lieutenant colonel. Upon returning to civilian life, he was elected chancery judge of the 13th District Court, a position he held until his appointment as adjutant three-star general of the Mississippi National Guard under former Gov. William Waller, and later acquired the rank of major general.

Upon retirement from the Guard in 1980, he served as a professor at Mississippi College School of Law, where he was instrumental in obtaining accreditation for the school. He served as dean of the law school from 1980 to 1982, when he retired.

Upon retirement, he returned to Monticello and continued his law practice on a limited scale. He served as mayor of Monticello for two four-year terms. He was instrumental in the organization of the South Central Bank and served on the board of directors. He helped establish Lawrence County Insurance and Realty.

He helped the county acquire the Lawrence County Hospital.

Also, he was a member of the Monticello Lions Club, the New Hebron Masonic Lodge, a deacon of the Monticello Baptist Church, and a former Sunday school teacher there, a member of the state Gas and Oil Board, director of the Pearl River Development District, director of the Southern Pine Electric Power Association and served on the board of directors of the First Bank in Monticello, Silver Creek, Brookhaven and McComb.

He is survived by his wife, Ethlyn Dale "Tera" Turnage; son, Thomas Albert Turnage; daughter, Mrs. Lynn Dale Turnage Reynolds of Monticello; sister, Mrs. O.M. Lela Victoria Anderson of Jackson; and three grandchildren.

Services are at 2 p.m. Monday at Monticello Baptist Church, with burial in New Hebron Cemetery.
