Annie Penton's parents were George Balkcom and Martha Louise Howell. If George had a middle name, I don't know what it was. Martha Louise was known in the community as "Babe". When she died, many people in the community said that they couldn't ever remember knowing her real name. They had 3 daughters and 2 sons. Both boys died as infants. The girls were Annie, May and Ruth (my Mother). As you probably guessed, I am new to tracing genealogy, and wish that I had taken more interest in the things that Mother told me. I know more about her family (not really very much) than I do about my father's. He was Pliny Osmond Kirkland and also was from Dale County, AL. If you have run across any of his ancestors, I would like to know more about them. His parents were George Minton Kirkland and Arkie (or Arky) Kirkland. She was a Kirkland that married a Kirkland. They had 2 girls, Hattie and Alice and 2 boys, T.T. and Pliny.

I think that when I wrote you, I said that Adus, Jr. died in a bicycle accident. As a teenager, he and his step-father, Marion Penton, were not getting along very well. (Times don't change.) Anyway, Adus, Jr. went to Montgomery to live with Annie's sister, Ruth (my mother). He was in school and had an afternoon job delivering orders for a drug store. Sorry to bug you again, but maybe this will help with your computer problems.

You said that you 486 machine would not run Windows 95. Now I don't claim to be a world class expert, but it is my understanding that Windows 95 will run on a 486, probably even on a 386. HOWEVER, in order for Windows 95 to run on your machine, you will almost certainly have to increase your RAM, probably to at least 16 Megabyte. The more RAM, the faster it will run. You didn't say how large your hard drive is, but with the size of software programs these days, you ought to have at least 500 Megabytes, and hopefully twice that amount (one Gigabyte).

RAM and harddrive upgrades are pretty reasonable these days, and I think that would allow you to use Windows 95 without replacing your entire system.

OBITUARY OF SAMUEL WINDHAM - 1890

Samuel WINDHAM, son of John and Jane WINDHAM, was born in Darlington District, South Carolina, September 5, 1813. During the year 1827 his father and family moved to Alabama and settled in Dale County. January 12, 1837, he married Miss E. WOODHAM, with whom he lived as man and wife till a few months ago, when she was called home on high. Doubtless her death shortened his days. Remarkable to tell, he and she were converted and joined the Church at the same time and lived and almost died together. However, in the course of time he backslid and fell away. In the fall of 1858 he was reclaimed, under the ministry of the writer while he was a local preacher and steward under Rev. Robert SMILIE of The Alabama Conference. That event constituted a bond of affection between him and the writer. From that period on till the day of his death he was a true and faithful member of the church, serving for some time as a steward and class-leader. In fact he was almost the pillar and support of Mt. Zion Church. Although he was not a rich man, he paid as high as \$40 a year for the support of the ministry one or more years, and paid to other claims liberally.

During his last years he was much afflicted-in body and mind, owing to severe misfortunes, but during and amid all he was the same steady, good man. Few men were more solid and strong in convictions and character. He was the sort of metal out of which flowed the pure gold, even gold tried in the fire. Such men as he in other days made martyrs. His sons and daughters; in the main, rise up before and honor him. One son, Rev. T. H. WINDHAM, is a local preacher in the Methodist E. Church, South.

OBITUARY OF SAMUEL WINDHAM - 1890 - continued

Bro. Samuel WINDHAM died at his home, six miles southeast of Ozark, Ala., at midnight, Dec. 8, 1890, aged 77 years, 3 months and 3 days. His death was without a sigh or struggle. Gently he passed from the labors and pains of earth to the rest and happiness of heaven. Often he remarked before death that the thought of death was sweet to his heart. To him "dying was but going home."

He was buried at Mt. Zion Church, a few hundred yards from his home, beside his devoted wife, there to await the resurrection morn.

Last Sunday, second Sunday in December, his funeral sermon was preached by the writer to an attentive and tender audience.

"Elender Dupree Woodham Windham"

Elender Dupree WOODHAM WINDHAM, was born in Darlington District, South Carolina, August 17, 1817, was the daughter of Edward and Sarah WOODHAM early settlers of Dale County. She was married to Samuel WINDHAM in Dale County, Alabama, January 12, 1837, by whom she became the mother of ten children, five boys and five girls, six of whom still live. One of these sons T. H. WINDHAM, is a local preacher in our church. Sister WINDHAM was soundly converted under the ministry of the Rev. J. F. SKIPPER, once a member of the Alabama Conference. She was converted under his first sermon in the fall of 1847, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church South. As a member of the church she was study, calm and uniform. She enjoyed religion and at times became unspeakably happy, and again would become rapturous in delight and would shout the praise of God. She and her husband constituted the main support of the church at Mount Zion. For many years she had been afflicted bodily, and saw much sorrow. She was satisfied with this life and longed for a better country. Knowing that her days were nearly numbered she talked freely and fully in regard to the end of her journey. Two weeks before she died, she said - - - "The end is at hand and the happiest thought of my life is that I am fully ready to die". Surrounded by her family at the old home she died at 2 o'clock A. M. September 5, 1890, age seventy three years and 19 days, having been married fifty three years and a member of the church forty three years. She leaves a sorrowing husband, children and grandchildren, and many relatives and friends to mourn her death. She was buried at Mount Zion, six miles from Ozark. The writer preached the funeral sermon to a large concourse of neighbors and relatives.

Dear Cousin,

I have your letter in hand today and was glad to hear from you and to learn to a certainty that from your letter I am sure that we have met, but not since we were small boys. I have a faint recollection of the visit to father's house just before leaving Alabama, for Texas. I was something like 15 years old when your father's family left. They had a sale at your father's home in Coffee County. Uncle Anthony was the oldest of the four boys and his boys bore the following names: Harvey, who dies inn service during the Civil War. Thomas, who came to Texas before your father came, and died just a few years ago in Vanzant County. Abner was the rheumatic you spoke of, he died in 1884. Wright who lives at Hartford, Alabama, and is merchandising. Next is S. E. (Shorter) who lives in Ozark and is now serving his second term as Probate Judge of Dale County; Sam comes next, he is a successful farmer living in Daleville, Alabama, next is Henry, who died near Center, Texas two years ago then comes Morgan who lives in Shelby County and there is another one whose name I can't recall, he lives in Shelby County. Uncle Anthony has one daughter living in Center, Texas and has several daughters living in Alabama. Your father came next, and then my father's family consisted of four boys and five girls. The boys were John N, who was killed at Malvin Hill in 1863. Next was James E. WINDHAM who died in 1888, Carm lives at Nacogdoches, and I am at Bronson. Two of my sisters are dead; Rebecca died in 1887, and Sophronia the one that you remember. I am sure as I remember that she spent a week at your father's home just after the close of the Civil War. My oldest sister, Sarah Jane, lives at Ozark and is very old, eighty two, I believe. She married S. L. DOWLING who died last February. The next Eufrassa is living in Graceville, Florida and is quite old and feeble. Rebecca, Eufrassa and Saphronia all married brothers, whose name was LEE. My youngest sister who is just older than myself, Ingram married a man by the name of WOODALL and is living in Dale County farming. Sister DOWLING has three boys living in your state, two of them in Glaston and the other in Grand Cane. They are farming, the oldest one T. L. DOWLING is state senator. Uncle Thomas' family are scattered so badly that I have lost sight of several of them. His oldest son Dallas died in center, Texas last June a year ago. I was with him the last night of his life.

Mary Ann was the daughter of Elizabeth Goodson and John David Pollard. I have been unable to determine where he died. I have a copy of one document, and perhaps the only one, which names Mary Ann and her siblings as children of Elizabeth Pollard, daughter of Thomas Goodson.

Her paternal grandfather was Joshua Pollard. I have a copy of his will, as well as several primary references to him.

Her paternal grandmother was Mary (without notes, I think that's right) Fort, daughter of Elias Fort whose will is at Charleston. I have a copy of the will of an earlier Fort ancestor, as well as the Fort family history but have never sent for that of Elias. I do have a retrieval number for that will somewhere.

Mary Ann's maternal grandfather was, as mentioned, Thomas Goodson. There is a Goodson page several of us contributed to. I will send you the address tonight. The wife of Thomas was named Sarah; no documentation for last name but possibly a Jenkins. I have copies of Baptist minutes which mention Thomas. The Goodson names for our family are right out of Isle of Wight County, VA, including Uzzell.

I am descended from HENRY CLAY DAUGHTRY (my gg-grandfather) who was born in 1844 in Marion Co., GA and died in 1926 at Tennille, Pike Co., AL. His father was EDMOND DAUGHTRY who was born about 1797 in NC according to information he gave in 1850 Marion Co., GA census. We do not know when or where he died because he appeared to have abandoned the family in the mid-1850's while they were still living in GA. My great-aunt has told me she believes he came to AL to Henry or Coffee counties. Whether she was told this by Henry while she was young before he died or gathered that from listening to her elders talk I do not know. HENRY's mother was ELIZABETH MCDANIEL who was born in Chatham Co., NC in 1810 and died Tennille, Pike Co., AL in 1890. HENRY had several brothers and sisters as follows:

William E. Daughtry b.1836 d.unknown m.1854 Sarah Tidd; stayed in Marion Co. after his father left the family and the others moved to AL

The notes for each of person in each of the Family Group Sheets I will be sending you begin with SOI. That is the abbreviation we have used since 1992 to indicate the "Source Of Information." Yes, we are much newer at this than you.

Hopefully, our statement of each "SOI" will facilitate your determining where we obtained each item. In the case of Rhoda A., our source is the personal interview and review of the genealogical records of Helen Ethel Phillips, granddaughter of Mary Elizabeth Woodham b. 13 Sep 1860. Her source was a personal interview with Ruth Naomi McWhorter b. 16 May 1891 in Victory, Carroll, GA, daughter of Adeline Arabella Woodham b. 28 Feb 1868. Ruth Naomi McWhorter is , of course, the niece of Rhoda A. Woodham. Incidentally, it is interesting that you and Helen are both newspaper people. She retired from the Birmingham News. I talked with her this week, and she is delighted to learn of your new information regarding our Woodham family.

We use a couple of pieces of genealogy software - Personal Ancestral File, Release 3.0, and like you, we use Family Tree Maker - version 4.0. One of the documents we will be sending you, in addition to the Family Group Sheets we have, is our knowledge of the descendants of Aris Ambrose Woodham (that is the way his name appears in documents we have been given) and Amanda Melvina Wilson Woodham. Because of the spacing used by FTM, the document print out appears to be much longer than it needs to be. Right now it is a bit over 16 pages, and it too indicates the SOI of the data for each person's birth, death, marriage, etc. Not wanting to keep you waiting, however, since you were so kind to promptly send us information -

Rhoda A. Woodham was born 19 Oct 1850, and died 5 Apr 1930 in Smyrna, Cobb, GA. She married Francis M. Abbott 3 Nov 1870. Children of this union, as reported by the above sources are:

- 1. Amanda Lou Dussie Elizabeth Abbott, b. 9 Mar 1872.
- Sarah R. Abbott b. October 1873 2.
- > About CLARISSA's name. The "Clary" is NOT a family name. This was her > nickname. I am the one who supplied this to everyone else.

We definitely will send the info as both hard copies and the GEDCOM on a floppy. In reviewing the information, I discovered the name and birth date of one cousin is missing. As soon as I can add it, we will generated the necessary reports.

Does your above statement indicate Aris had one or more spouses in addition to Amanda Melvina Wilson? If so, is that information covered in Volume I, or is it available some other way?

It is interesting you went to college near where Aris is buried. One of the colleges I attended was near where you live now. I first attended Huntingdon College in Montgomery, AL. I transferred to Alabama Polytechnic Institute - now called Auburn University - because we planned to go there after Charles returned from Japan. He returned to the U.S. in June of 1955, we married in August, (I had just turned 20 and he was 22) and he started as a freshman in September. I graduated in 1956 and 1958, and he graduated in 1958. We both then matriculated at the University of Mississippi where our first daughter was born, and where he graduated in 1959.

He then taught at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia for three years. Our younger daughter was born there and I was a stay-at-home Mom.

He then matriculated at the University of Virginia to work on his Ph.D., and I worked at the McGuffey Reading Center and then at the University of Virginia Medical School in the Neurology/ Psychiatry Department. Following three years in Charlottesville, we moved to New York in 1965. We both taught at St. Lawrence University - me for a semester and him for thirteen years. After one semester I started working at St. Lawrence Psychiatric Center in Odgensburg - first as a psychologist and later as a treatment team leader.

I went back to school and received a doctorate in public administration with a speciality in mental health policy from New York University in New York City. I had followed Charles for the first 22+ years of our marriage, and now had an opportunity for a very sizeable promotion. He agreed to follow me for the remainder of our professional life. Hence, we moved to the area where we now live.

- > down, I decided then to give up my career.

Once again our lives are similar. Knowing our facility was going to close in late 1991, rather than transfer to another, we both took early retirement - me in the spring at age 55 and Charles at the end of October at age 58.

When we moved here we had thought we would move to the Outer Banks of North Carolina when we retired, but we fell in love with this area. We have a couple of acres in a small village south-west of Buffalo, New York. We enjoy gardening - me flowers; Charles vegetables - and we grow apples, pears, grapes, blueberries, raspberries, cherries, filberts, etc. As you can see, we continue to be very much "down-home people."

Charles spends most of his time working in the yard or doing genealogy research. I serve as a volunteer on the Board of a Not-For-Profit which I helped start, and which provides housing for those in need; serve as the Chair of the youth division of the 8th District Garden Club of New York State; have a junior garden club which I started; and quilt. I had a quilt in the Flint, Michigan show last Fall, and I have a wearable art piece which will be

exhibited at the Williamsburg, Virginia quilt show which will be held later this month. I continue to down-hill ski, but Charles had to give that up because of arthritic knees. Our only grandchild lives in Berkeley, California, so I usually make several trips there each year. Fortunately, the Buffalo airport is only 45 minutes away.

Neither of us has worked since 1991. We of course do not have as much discretionary money as we had when we worked, but we also do not have the stress. We have very full and happy lives. The only problem, as Charles says is that we never get a day off to catch up.

I am going to close for now so Charles can print out some of the info he plans to send you. We hope your weather is as great as ours today - a dream day for Feb. -bright sun, no chilling wind - pleasant in all ways. Your newest Cuz,

We've been looking again at 1860 and 1850 census reports. Here we find that Aris' and Amanda's children, as of the July 1860 Upson Ct., GA census were:

- 1. E. Woodham 17 in1860 (- Edward, b. abt 1941 GA)
- 2. W. Woodham 14 (William, b. abt 1844, GA)
- 3. A. Woodham 11 (Amanda M. born abt. 1848, GA)
- 4. R.A. Woodham 9 (Rhoda A. b. Out. 19, 1850, d. Apr 5, 1930, Smyrna, Cobb, GA 5. A.A. Woodham 7 (b. abt 1855)
 - 6. T,C, Woodham 3

The info in the parenthesis is additional info Charles has collected that is not, of course in the census. A. Wilson (Anne) age 80) is also listed as living in the same household.

We know that Aris and Amanda had 2 other children, Mary Elizabeth and Adeline Arabella, who were born after the 1860 census.

The other 3 children in your list can be found in the same 1860 census, living in the home of a Peters family - three households from Aris and Amanda. This includes H. Woodham, age 12, Isabel and J. Woodham, females both age 10. These are your Isabell and Jezebel. We find no mention of either of these three Woodham children or the Peters in the 1850 census. Perhaps Isabell and Jezebel were born in months following the date the 1850 census was taken. However, H. Woodham should have appeared in that he would have been born prior to 1850. We wonder if the wife, Nancy Peters, may have been married to one of Aris' relatives. The 1860 census shows her husband, Levi Peters was born in Georgia, but she was born in SC like so many of the Woodhams. Perhaps the census taker failed to note a change in the state in which the children were born, but there is no indication on the census form that any of the three Woodham or two Peters children were born in Georgia, i.e, there is no change in "State" of birth from the mother to the children. We wonder if following the death of her first husband she married Levi Peters, they had two children in South Carolina, and they moved to be near Aris and Amanda around 1850 given that there youngest child Nancy is 1 year old and appears to have been born in SC.

This seems consistent with the 1860 census form as there is no indication on the 1860 census form that Frances Peters male, age 4 in 1860 and Nancy Peters age 1, 1860 were born in Georgia. Given that all of the children of Aris and Amanda are listed as born in Georgia, we wonder if the Peters family moved to Georgia It is a pure guess, but at least these 2 children are listed with the last name of Peters. We wonder if Frances was not actually a Woodham, true brother of the 3 above listed as Woodham's, but was too young to ask to keep his last name and was reported as a Peters? At an older age he could have used his true father's name and this could be your Francis Peters? This is a pure guess, but if he was a son of Amanda and Aris, he was born after the 1860 census.

We believe that Aris and Amanda only had the 8 children noted above. Our cousin, Helen Peters supplied some of this info from a visit she made to GA some years ago to a descendent of Adeline Arabella - I believe she had an old Bible which listed Rhoda. Our records show that Rhoda married Francis M. Abbott on Nov. 3, 1870. Helen Ethel Philips, granddau. of Mary Eliz., obtained this info from Ruth Naomi McWhorter descendant of Arabell. Rhoda is buried at the Methodist E. Church, Mt. Zion Cemetary near Smyrna, Cobb County, Georgia.

Rhoda and Francis had 2 children that we know of:

Amanda Lou Dussie Elizabeth Abbott, v. 3/9.1872 Sarah R. Abbot, b. Oct.t 1873

There was no Franklin in Mary Eliz's life - unless she married once before she married my great grandfather Bowling. She lived a long life in Talladega AL and she and her husband are buried there - just out of town. I suspect the obit is wrong. All the other info you give us fits with the things we know, so I am sure it must be the same Mary Eliz. Woodham.

My father use to speak of her often. (Father: John Bowling McKinney, b. 1911, d. 1993) He greatly admired and loved her . I believe she may have lived in the house with his family for awhile when he was a boy, from things he said --perhaps after her husband died. I am sure she never remarried. My husband, Charles, has lots of stuff to send you. He will include a print of the pic we sent. We have a scanner and have it in our computer. Usually the pics he prints out turn out quite nice. Please let us know how you would like the other things sent - floppy, print copy, gedcom??? He would like to send this week. Is your computer IBM compatible? Also, we would like to order a book or two mentioned in the info we turned up on the internet where we found your E address. Can you please tell us which ones would help us most, considering our connection through Aris and Edward.. My Aunt Willie lived in a house on South St. in Talladega next to the library and my Mother thinks that was the house where Mary Eliz and John kept boarders. These were mostly short term boarders who came into the town by train. John would take his wagon down to meet the train and give passengers rides to their home, which was actually walking distance from town. At the time they lived in this house and had boarders, my grandmother Bea was already married and having children. Some of the younger children were still living at home - Janie was the youngest. When I say Aunt Janie or Aunt Willie these were really my Father's aunts. In our family it was the custom for my siblings and I to call relatives exactly the same thing our parents called them. I hardly knew my Mother's Sister had any name except "Sister" until I was a teenager, and I still call her "Sister". I hope when I reminence I will not confuse you. I'll try not to do that so much, we are excited today that you can confirm for us that Edward and Clarissa were the parents of Aris. Incidentally, World Family Tree CD Rom Vol. 12, pedigree No. 3126 says Clarissa's maiden name was Clary. Thanks again for all your info. We have called several relatives and told them of this connection today, and they can't wait to see the info. You may hear from some of them in the coming weeks, tho few have computers. good day. While reading the 1910 census, Portland, Uriah - 68 is married to Mary E. - 37. His 2nd marriage, her 3rd. They have been married 1 year and she has had 2 children, both are living. His step-daughter is Zula Lee Shiver - 18. He is a mail carrier and they were all born in Alabama. I found the Daughter of Mary (Zula Lee Shiver) married a Tilden Tanton, May 1911.

Uriah and Mary were married 15 feb 1909, in case I forgot and the spelling was Woodnum but probably just a typo. From "Marriages Walton County, Florida 1885-1915." Mary Elizabeth Woodham is buried in Hatcher Cem and as they lived in Portland, 1910, is probably her - Sec. 9, 22 aug 1873 10 apr 1938. Zula Lee & Charles Tilden TAUTON (note correct spelling) are also buried in sec 9. She was born 11 oct 1891.

As you can see my Cousin has solved alot of the mystery of the NOWLING and WOODHAM connection.

The LYDIA question is still unanswered.

I would like to suggest that LYDIA is the daughter of Cynthia WOODHAM by her first husband Hardy MAUND as the listing I have for her shows her as Lydia Levinia (MUNN) WOODHAM. Failing this I am at a loss.

I hope this is of help to you in updating your files.

They are both buried in Talladega County at Bethel Cemetary - just off the highway 77 in the Howell's Cove area. Highway 77 connects Talladega with the interstate between Bham and Atlanta. Beatric Bowling was my grandmother - she was the oldest dau of Mary Eliz - and I remember her well. She was VERY oldfashioned. Wore cotton dresses all made by the same pattern and oldfashioned sunbonnets most of the time. She churned her own milk for butter and cooked on an huge old woodstove. Her sisters that I knew were all very different - not old-fashioned. One Janie, was a beautician in Auburn, Ala. Another in Sylacauga married a Hill - she was Delia and they were rather well-to-do. Her love was gardening and she was very active in Garden Club. There were 7 Sisters and I personally knew Janie, Willie, Delia, Ethel, my grandmother Bee of course and Dora. He is involved with computers and works for a company called Computer Warehouse, specialising in Apple Macs, and located near Richmond, a beautiful part of West London with a fabulous royal park, complete with deer!. I work for a real estate company locally. Paul's father's name is Hugh, his mother's Ann, his brother's Andrew and my mother's name is Kathryn and my father's Gerry, my sister's Gemma.

Anyway, Paul's stomach is groaning and he's liable to go into a cream puff if I don't put some food in it soon so I'm signing off for now.

Dear Robert Earl.

Well, the world is just about the same size as I always thought it was. In marine engineering, for instance, a small mistake was arond the world in less than one day, even before the fax machine was invented! Now we have the internet it just means that communication is faster and cheaper, plus the fact that you have a 'hard copy' around the world so fast it even beats "Superman or Captain Marvel". It seems that the Woodham Family is just about as big as the ship repair world i.e. about 3500 in the states and some 4500 to 5000 in the U.K. and the rest of the world, I'm counting only the Woodham(s) and hyphen whatever. How, may you ask, can I make this statement?, well, I have a CD-ROM from the U.K. with about 42 million names, adresses and telephone numbers on it, it took me an hour or so but a sampling of "Woodham" turned up about 250 in Greater London and only about 400 more in England and Wales with none so far in Scotland. The internet adress for the suppliers is as follows:-http://www.192/pcf98oe.htm with E-mail to:-pcf98sales@i-cd.com. I got the disc with a computer magazine called PC Format, it was the January issue number 78 of this year sold in the states at \$13.95. With your past, you should be able to get one wholesale or free, as "dead returns".

My Maternal Grandfather was Ozwald Morgan, a headmaster of one of the five boys schools in Barry that were all founded around the time that the town started to boom with the coal industry. He had twins M&F one son and two daughters the male twin became the top engineer in the Bomber Command of the RAF, his sister, after the League of Nations and the BBC French section during WWII became chief of the editorial section of translations at the UN in New York before the IMF in Washington D.C. The other son became the sales director of Glaxo, one daughter (my mother Caroline Ellen 1910-1978) was an RN and as the District Nurse for the whole of Barry prior to her marriage in 1939, she was extremely well known, I could not go anywhere or do anything naughty when I was a kid without someone telling me that they knew my Mum!!, a dogs life!. The other sister Jane, worked for "The Oberver" and "The Daily Telegraph", as well as for the BBC until after the War, when she married a chap who became the Editor of "The Farmers Weekly". As an engineer I only used to read and when it came to writing, my spelling was as good as most engineers until WP came along that is; but this programme only does Dutch and I have to get around to getting netscape to give me a free English version at some time!!!. You would not believe the juggling ones brain has to do when the computer deceids to go bi-lingual on you and then some false move or mouse click lands you in french, spanish or even lithuanian!!!!. But I've got used to Dutch/English in tha last 28 years so I don't notice it too much, except when trying to get a reasonable speed on the keyboard, as now, I start to feel my head a bit. Anyway what I meant to say was, that I quite envy you your ability to make money, (even though only a little I expect), with your pen/typewriter/keyboard. As you will probably have noticed, my grammer is not up to a writers' standard, in Dutch my kids and wife say it is non-existant!!!, but then the did not hear me speaking Japanese, Malay, Korean and Tagaalog, when I was sailing in the eastern seas, I did get to Viet-Nam when the war was on, but as the VC were blowing up ships and shooting people, I never got around to learning that language.

If you ever saw Barry and the hills which I had to walk up and down twice a day when I was in school, you would most certainly agree with my present choice of domicile!!!!! here I can get on my bike and without too much exertion move myself miles and miles in an afternoon. I use a bike because all the pills I take to keep my reumatism at bay make it dangerous to drive a car, its O.K., Holland has two sets of roads everywhere; one for cars, trucks,vans and motorbikes: with the other for pedal bikes and very low-powered scooters and mo-peds.

Albany W.A. is faily similar to Barry actually, but the hills are not so steep the sea is in the south, but the Sun is in the north which makes it just that bit different. One of the main attractions about Albany are the whales(?) which use the end of the Great Austrailian Bight as a land fall for the route to the Indian ocean breeding grounds, although I have heard that they have a Whale of a time when the sun shines through the water down there.

My Dad was in the RAF as a fitter airframe, that meant thet he had to sew up and patch the planes when they were damaged he never went anywhere except the base at St. Athan, for the whole war, lucky I guess. When he came out in 1945 he went back to his old job of selling ice cream, what a job for the kids if you have five of them!!, we were the envy of the school just after the war, everyone wanted to come over to our place for tea!!!. later he became a town councillor, because he died in office the town named a road after him.

Because of the Maori influence; where it is the custom for all people to be able to recite their ancestors ' names from today right back to the first boat, (this being probably similar to one of Tor Hyerdahls jobs), geneology is a big hit in NZ; so it is quite possible that there is someone doing the same as you out there.

Just read your latest e-mail adressed to George, he is back at his university digs again in Utrecht he is studying International law in three languages there. To contact him direct you will have to use the e-mail adress he gave you on his last mail to you.

Barry <u>Glamorganshire</u> is in Wales. You should have some imformation, as for legal purposes the U.K. is split into two groups, England, Wales and Northern Ireland(ULSTER); and Scotland which has always been different since Haidrian built his Wall to keep the Scots out of England. (that was definately a long time ago, so long in fact, that the norsemen had not yet discovered boat building, and the only true intercontinental travelers were the Inuit and even they did not know who they were).

Anyway, in the 1880's it was proposed to build a docks at Barry to facilitate the shipment of steam coal to the rest of the world. A chap called Samuel Woodham (Sam), with his wife and several sons and I think two daughters, travelled from Somerset(shire), probably Bristol or near there, with their horses wagons and all the usual pioneers' gear to arrive in a very small collection of villages which were to be called Barry, Barry Docks, Barry Island, Cadoxton and Colcot.

There is a picture of Sam at the "Cutting of the Sod" ceremony for "Barry Docks" He was one of the major Hauliers (you would call them Teamsters) at the site moving all sorts and people with his horses and wagons. The family also had a "Horse Bus" route along the bottom road from Cadoxton to Barry 10-12 km(8miles). My Grandfather, William Ernest Woodham died about 1949 or 1950 aged 72yrs. Wether he was born in Barry or not, I don't know. He was,as far as I can remember the youngest son of Sam Woodham and he had four or five brothers one of whom was called Dick, he was the master horseman as well as being the best drinker in town! One of his other brothers went to California in the latter half of the 1800's and has never been heard of again, (by us over here at least!). Another brother, probably the eldest, took over the haulage business which is still going today as far as I know. What happend to the rest is anyones' guess. The son of the Hauliers side became a Stirling millionair after the british railroads were converted to diesel from steam in the 1950's he bought up all the rolling stock and started scrapping it (The high tensile steel axles from the coal trucks, were shipped to Japan, in old "liberty" ships, where they were turned into rankshafts and camshafts for the new automotive industry which was being set up by GM and Catapillar).

Another distant relative in Barry, Fred Woodham who was a Ships' carpenter by trade, apparently jumped ship somwhere in the states to join up with the U.S. Army shortly after the USA joined in the first woirld war, he went to France where he got gassed and then received a pension from the U.S. army until he died in 1947?? He had a son Arthur Woodham B.appx.1929 who served in the Royal Navy from about 1944.(A shoebox full of silver certificates was found after his death!)

William Ernest had two daughters Phylis Mary 1900, and Iris 1905??, and one son William George Edward 1911.

I am the eldest of five: William John, June Elizabeth Caroline 1942, Edward Francis 1943, Janet Mary Christine 1945, and Ernest Oswald Eugene 1947-D.1979 aged 32yrs.

As for the family gallivanting around the world, I was a seagoing Engineer from 1962 up to 1970 and I've

been to Duluth, Houston, San Francisco, Vancouver, Montreal, Halifax(NS) and so many other places that it is easier to say that I havn't been to the South Pole or to Timbuctoo! I also had a girlfriend in Yokohama from '62 to '70 but she died in '70 so I stopped sailing and started to repair ships in Rotterdam, this was one of three places I was prepared to live "on the dock", the others were Vancouver BC, and Albany West Austrailia.

I am retired, have had a triple by-pass, still have my first and only wife, and two children George, and Sasha(Phylis Bertha Caroline Elizabeth Jane Woodham B.13May1980 Breda (NL), We all live in a (US Standard) very small terraced house in a town called MADE in the Province of Noord Brabant Holland(NL). You may have heard of our town, as the double Olympic Gold medal winner Gianne Romme, (speed skating 5 and 10 thousand meters). lives around the corner. He also gave the canuks some problems last month in Calgary!!.

Its' getting late over here Earl, so I'll close down now.

Do you have PowWow?? maybe we gan get a duplex ling set up later?

Dear Robert,

I am absolutely amazed! My Grandmother used to tell me stories of when she was a young girl and stories of her parents and grandparents. I remember her telling me the story of how her Grandmother was married to a man that was shot and murdered before she was actually married to my Grandmother's Grandfather. I believe this would have been Sarah Elizabeth Wiggins Taylor, because I recall her saying they had a daughter together. If I recall correctly, my Grandmother said that her 1st husband was reading his Bible while the baby daughter was on a quilt at his feet. Someone came to the window and fatally shot him.

I was visiting my boyfriend in California last week when I discovered Carolyn Martin's entry on www.ancestry.com, regarding the Woodham family. I was just playing around on the computer, and it hit me that my Grandmother had told me just a few months before she died, that her Grandfather's name was Aris Woodham. I noticed several Aris Woodhams and couldn't wait to get back home to refer to what I had written down during my conversation with my Grandmother. I am so glad that I wrote that information down, because that was the link between my Grandmother's family with Robert Woodham and his father Aris Woodham. I really wish I could share all of this with my Grandmother because we often enjoyed reviewing things of this nature.

I too have been to the Bethel Cemetary. My Grandmother used to take us there for Sacred Harp Singings while I was growing up. Sacred Harp Singing was a family tradition in the Taylor family. Is this so with the Woodhams? My boyfriend and I went to the Bethel Cemetary last year when I was in Andalusia for my Grandmother's funeral. He was absolutely in awe! He constantly picks on me because of my southern roots, but this particular visit gave him a new respect for those roots. His family is Dutch and he now has the ancestry hunting bug too!

I currently live in Austin, Texas and was transferred here last Sepember. Before that I had lived for a year in Tampa, Florida. In November 96', seven months before my Grandmother passed away, my father brought her to Tampa to visit me. We drove over to Plant City, Florida, which is less than an hour from Tampa, to visit her brother Dozier Wilson Taylor. She spent the day with him while we took my nephew to Busch Gardens. This was the first time she had visited him in 50 years. I'm really glad that she was able to see him before she passed away.

My Grandmother told me that I had met Uncle Dozier and his wife Flora Wiggins as a small child at a family reunion. I don't recall meeting them or any of their family members. When my Grandmother was put in the hospital my father was suppose to call Uncle Dozier and tell him. Well, he didn't. Things weren't going well for my Grandmother so I had made arrangements to leave one particular day for Pensacola, which is about an 8 hour drive from Tampa. I went into work to get things all tied up before I left. Early that morning two ladies and a man came into my office. I was absolutely dumbfounded. One of the women looked just like my Grandmother, but a younger version of her! The resemblance was incredible! The woman who looked like my Grandmother asked if I knew who they were. I said, "Yes, you're Uncle Dozier's family and you've come to tell me that my Grandmother has passed away". I then broke into tears and started crying. The woman looked at me with a puzzled look and said, "No, no, that's not

what we're here for. We just came by to meet you and say hi". She said that my Grandmother had written her a letter and told her where I was and for her to stop in sometime to introduce herself. Boy, did I feel stupid! Talk about making an ass out of yourself! I explained to her what was going on with my Grandmother and then found out that my Dad had forgotten to call them with everything going on. Her name is Gwendolyn Faye Taylor Newberry, she is 61, and is the only daughter of Dozier Wilson Taylor. I still can't believe how much she looks like my Grandmother!

In April 97', Uncle Dozier's family invited me to their family reunion. They were all so nice. My boyfriend and I had been to a wedding in Orlando and stopped off in Plant City, on our way back home to Tampa. His family was so nice. There were at least 50 people there and I had only most recently met Uncle Dozier and his daughter Gwen. They all welcomed me as though they had always known me. Uncle Dozier has a total of 5 children, 4 boys and Gwen. They range in age of 65 to 51. Some of them were kind enough to share stories with me of my Great Grandmother (there Grandmother) Nancy Edna Woodham Taylor. At one moment Uncle Dozier started to Sacred Harp sing. My boyfriend had never heard anything like that and was in shock to say the least!

I went to visit Uncle Dozier after my Grandmother passed away, and went with him and his daughter to a Sacred Harp Singing. He can really hit the high notes! He will be 94 this November and he remembers everything! He told me stories of Sarah Ann Wiggins Woodham and told me the story of when his sister, Eula Lee, died at the age of 8. He was only 6 at the time. Eula Lee is buried in the Bethel Cemetary next to her parents, Nancy Edna Woodham and William John Taylor. An unnamed infant is also buried there. Uncle Dozier also told me the story of that baby's death. It was only 2 month old when it died.

Well, I guess I've rambled on enough. I am usually not this obnoxious, but I'm very excited over finding out all of this information. I can't wait to call my Dad to let him know of my findings!

I'm sorry to hear about your heart attack, and hope that you are doing better.

I have not yet accessed his home page, so I don't know what he has on it.

One of the things that I asked my uncle Glen last week was how he and dad managed to get together in southeast Missouri, while 2 of their sisters were together in Memphis Tennessee and the other sister was in Ft. Walton Beach Florida. The answer relates to the death of Glen's mother, Lilly Leona (Williams) Woodham. She died in childbirth, after Mildred was born. Mildred's twin sister also died in childbirth with Lily Leona. I don't have the date immediately handy, but I have a picture of their headstone somewhere. After Lilly Leonas death, my grandfather (James Layfayette Woodham) sent all of the kids back to Alabama to live with Lilly Leonas parents. According to Glen, grandpa Williams was a mean old codger who mistreated the kids, so dad ran away at an early age, and Glen also ran away, at the age of 8. As Glen put it, he was like an animal just trying to survive. The girls were taken in by various sisters of Lilly Leona, and the boys were on their own. Some years later (the exact history will never be known), dad was in Arkansas working the cotton fields, when he linked up with a man named Stillman. Mr. Stillman went to southeast Missouri and built a cotton gin and bought a lot of land, and dad went with him. A few years after that, Glen wound up in Arkansas, also working the cotton fields, and someone there told him where dad had gone. Glen wrote dad a letter and not too long afterwards Glen went to Southeast Missouri. Dad was sharecropping and working at Stillman's cotton gin at Peach Orchard Missouri. That is where I was born. At that time the town consisted of a cotton gin, a gas station, and a general store. I don't think that there is anything there now.

Dad ultimately bought some land of his own near Malden Missouri where he lived until his death in 1982. I lived there until I went off to college. The family farm is still owned by my stepmother and my brother and sister.

Glen served a long hitch in the US Navy during WW2, then he also settled near Malden Missouri, where he still lives.

Dad's/Glen's sisters stayed with their aunts until sometime in the early 1930s, when James Lafayette Woodham established a homestead somewhere in Arkansas. For reasons that are lost in history, he lost that homestead, and my aunt Billie and aunt Opal headed back to Alabama. On the way they stopped at a boarding house in Memphis Tennessee for one night. The owner offered them both jobs, which they accepted, and they never moved very far from Memphis after that. They both married and raised families, so of which are still located near Memphis.

I really regret never having taken the time and trouble to record more of this kind of information when they were all alive, and now it is too late. They are all gone except Glen, and he doesn't know many of the details about the others travels after their mothers death. Glen is also not doing too good health wise. He is 80 years old, and has several problems. I fear that he may not be with us much longer, then we will have lost the last link to his generation.

I hope that this has been of some interest to you, and I hope that you get to feeling better. Stay in touch.

My interest is to provide (forensic) evidence to substantiate the early oral and written Kea family records. Unfortunately, my research concludes that most of the original documented record about our family (prior to the 18th century) can not be verified.

This is not an attempt to discredit the early family records about our Kea ancestors - it is still interesting and somewhat romantic. I remain convinced that the early oral and written records were legitimate and sincere attempts to provide future generations, namely us, a map to rely upon. However, the current information age has mostly replaced the earlier oral age and should provide more comfort about our ancestors.

"Thomas Kea was the son of Robert Kea of old Dobbs County, NC. Thomas Kea married Eleanor Johnson, daughter of James Johnson. The James Johnson family left Lenoir County, NC and went to Darlington County, SC no earlier than 1800. James Johnson, son of James, was born in North Carolina on December 20, 1799. The family did not show in the 1800 census of Lenoir County. Eleanor had four brothers and two sisters, who moved to Kentucky about the time their father died in 1813.

Thomas was deceased by October 20, 1830. On February 28, 1836, there were divisions of the estate made to the children, Curtis Ivey, Mary Ann, Winniford, Nancy, Delila, James, Zachariah, John W., William, Mary Ellerbe, and Thomas. There must have been some problems with the estate, since the settlement took several years."

"The above information furnished from the family records of Garnett Johnson and Beverly Moxley, descendants of the family Johnson."

The evidence currently available provides information about the movements of several families, including the Kea family. Needless to say, these neighboring families ultimately were also related by marriage.

The families <u>Johnson</u>, <u>Kea</u>, <u>Skinner</u>, and <u>Woodham</u> migrations begin in old Dobbs County, NC, in the mid 1700's and leads to Darlington County SC about 1790's. Robert <u>Kea</u> was granted 300 acres in old Dobbs County (Neuse River/Fauling Creek area) dated 14 November 1771. James <u>Johnson</u>, Benjamin <u>Skinner</u>, and Edward <u>Woodham</u>, Sr., already owned property there and were neighbors.

Edward <u>Woodham</u>, Sr., was born in Prince George County, Virginia about 1708. He died about 1784 in the Fauling Creek community, near the Institute Community and town of LaGrange in what is now part of Lenoir County, NC. His son, Edward, Jr. was also born in Prince George County in 1746. Edward, Jr., and his family migrated to SC about 1790's and died in what is now Lee County, SC in August 1820. My mother, Sybil

Bertram <u>Woodham</u> <u>Kea</u>, is a direct descendant, with her gg grandfather Ariss <u>Woodham</u> being born in Dobbs County, NC.

By 1786, Robert <u>Kea</u> had moved to Sampson County, NC. He was appointed to serve as a juror May 11, 1786. There are Sampson County deeds between Robert <u>Kea</u> and others as late as 1794. By 1800, Robert <u>Kea</u> and his family moved to Bladen County, NC.

James <u>Johnson</u> moved from NC to Darlington, South Carolina about 1800. He died in 1813 and his property in North Carolina was distributed in nine parts. One of these nine parts was deeded to Thomas and Leonore <u>Kea</u>. On 7/8/1813 -- "for one hundred dollars...the ninth part of all the lands James <u>Johnson</u> (dec'd), was property of at his death lying in North Carolina situate in Lenior County on Fauling Creek,"-- Thomas <u>Kea</u> and Eleanor <u>Kea</u> deeded their one 9th part to Benjamin <u>Skinner</u> of Darlington, SC. John <u>Johnson</u> and James <u>Johnson</u>, brothers of Eleanor (Lanie), also deeded their parts to Benjamin <u>Skinner</u> of Darlington, SC.

Eventually, several of Benjamin <u>Skinner's</u> sons moved to Webster County, Kentucky with the **Johnson** families about 1815.

Thomas <u>Kea</u> was first found in the US census for Darlington County in 1820. He was not in the 1810 US census. Between 1812 and 1821, Thomas purchased several parcels of land, some belonging to Benjamin <u>Skinner</u>.

- On 1/14/1812, Thomas **Kea** purchased 54 acres on Lynches River from Vincent **Delk**.
- On 2/8/1813, Thomas <u>Kea</u> purchased 85 acres on Sparrow Swamp from Fred <u>Skinner</u>. (originally property of Benjamin <u>Skinner</u>)
- On 7/8/1813, Thomas and Leonore (Lanie) <u>Kea</u> deed one 9th interest to Benjamin <u>Skinner</u>. (above)
- On 3/7/1816, Thomas <u>Kea</u> purchased 35 acres on Sparrow Swamp from Benjamin <u>Skinner</u>.
- On 8/6/1819, Thomas <u>Kea</u> purchased 100 acres on Sparrow Swamp from Benjamin <u>Skinner</u>.
- On 9/27/1821, Thomas <u>Kea</u> purchased 100 acres on Sparrow Swamp from John <u>Phillips</u>.

The Will of Thomas **Kea** is dated <u>8/25/1826</u> and names wife Lanie, Curtis Ivey, James, Zachariah, Mary Ann, Winniford, Nancy, and Delila*.

Delila* <u>Kea</u> was married to the Rev John William Reese <u>Alexander</u>. His mother, Mary <u>Woodham</u>, married John <u>Alexander</u>. She was a daughter of Ariss <u>Woodham</u>. As noted above, Ariss <u>Woodham</u> was also my mother's gg grandfather.

Thomas and Eleanor (Lanie) **Kea** witnessed the Will of Benjamin **Skinner** dated 7/8/1828.

Early Roads and Travel

The first colonial roads were near the Atlantic seacoast. The original colonies were connected by a coastal route and did not stray far from sight of the Atlantic Ocean. Sailing ships remained the primary mode of transportation between the colonies well into the 1750's. Travel to the interior of the Carolinas before 1750 probably followed either the Fall Line Road or the "Kings Highway."

The Fall Line Road (US Highway 1)

The first interior route, about 1735, cut off at Fredericksburg, Virginia from the "King's Highway", ran from Virginia to the Georgia line. US Highway 1 passes through all of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, to Augusta, Georgia. In South Carolina, it runs through Cheraw, Camden, Columbia, and west to Georgia.

The "King's Highway" (US Highway 17)

By 1750 the "King's Highway" was a continuous road that existed for stagecoach or wagon traffic from Boston, Massachusetts to Charleston, SC, but only when the weather was cooperative. By the time of the Revolutionary War, the King's Highway was a road from Maine to Georgia. It was possible to travel about 20-25 miles a day by wagon. The distance between Boston and Charleston would have taken at least two months, about 1,300 miles.

From Norfolk, Virginia, this road follows present day US Highway 58 to Suffolk, Virginia. From Suffolk, it follows NC Highway 32, skirting west to avoid the Dismal Swamp and then south to Edenton, NC. From Edenton to New Bern via US Highway 17, it runs to Wilmington, NC; Georgetown, SC; and Charleston, SC, the colonial capital of South.

Thomas Kea, Chowan County, NC 1721 (From "NC Taxpayers 1679-1790," Vol 2, by Clarence E Ratcliff, 1987) (US Highway 17 runs through Chowan County, NC.)

"Based upon the information provided through Wills, land deeds, marriage records, etc., Thomas Kea is probably the son of Robert Kea and came from North Carolina about 1810-1812. Robert had several children, with one named William. This may be William Thomas, even though our Thomas never used the name William. Robert Kea may have been a son of Thomas Kea of Chowan County NC. Our Thomas may have been named after his grandfather. The research continues!"

"The Legend of William Thomas Key"

'At the age of 19, William quarreled with his father's eldest brother, John Key, a merchant of London who had obtained control of the family's wealth. Thomas wanted to go to Oxford University and was refused by his Uncle John. Great Britain was at war with France and in an effort to be rid of Thomas, obtained a commission for him in the British Navy.

William refused to serve in the British Navy and with anger and bitterness turned his back on his family. He took passage on one of the family's trading vessels and sailed from Gloucester, England to Charleston, South Carolina in late 1810.

After Thomas arrived in Charleston, he made his way to the northern part of South Carolina and settled near Sumter, South Carolina. William Thomas soon allied himself with a Mr. Schonsen, a German emigrant of noble lineage, who had come with a colony of Huguenots to avoid persecution in the old country. Mr. Schonsen had lost a leg in the Battle of Cowpens under Sumter and Marion's command during the Revolutionary War.

In 1811, William Thomas married Mr. Schonsen's daughter, De Laney, and made their home among the Indians and fur traders. They soon prospered by buying and selling furs and gathering rosin for tar that was used to close seams of ships and sailing vessels. The goods were sold to merchants in England.

William Thomas took to politics of South Carolina and the United States. He opposed the institution of slavery and was a non-secessionist. In his later life, he became a planter, raising cotton, rice, and indigo.

William Thomas was a distant relative of Francis Scott Key, the author of our national anthem.

Always mindful of the hurt he received from his Uncle John, he guarded his identity with his family in England. In approximately 1825, he changed the spelling of his name from Key to Kea.

He never returned to England and never mentioned the name of his kinsman that had wronged him. Prior to his death, he did talk with his wife and two of his sons, Zackary and William, and disclosed his English identity with the family left in England.'

"Killed near New Hope, Ga. on Sat., June 4th, 1864, Private A. A. Woodham, of Co. I, 1st Ala. Regt., in the 22nd year of his age; he was struck by a cannon ball just below his right shoulder and instantly killed.

He was a citizen of Dale Co., Ala. and enlisted in the Confederate States service Feb. 24, 1862, went to Pensacola, Fla., and from there to Island No. 10, where he remained during the seige of that place and was then surrendered by Gen.

Marshall on the 7th of April 1862; he was carried from there to Camp Butler, Illinois, where he remained a prisoner until 22nd of Sept. of the same year—was then exchanged and sent to Port Hudson where he was again surrendered by Gen. Gardner on the 8th day of July, 1863, after a seige of 49 days—and was then paroled and went home, where he remained until the 15th of Oct. when he reported to Cahaba, Ala...was in service until the time of his death. (2 paragraphs in eulogy to him)

Mr. Matthews adds the following notes to this Bible:

Thomas A. Kea (Key) was the father of Zachery R. Kea. Tommy D. Kea married Jerusha Hodges in 1897.

Two old news clippings were found in the Bible telling of the deaths of two children: Mary Isabel died Aug. 20th, 1860; Sari Lovelia died March 17th, 1863; both died in Dale Co., Ala. new Echo, at R.E.L.W.'s residence.

Nicy Kea, a daughter of Z. R. Kea, was born April 10, 1856, so she must have been the daughter of Z. R. Kea by a wife previous to his marriage to Eliza Ann Woodham as she was married to R.E.L.W. until c. 1860.

Mr. Matthews explains that this Bible may have been originally owned by R.E.L. Woodham, then by Zachery R. Kea. It subsequent belonged to Tommy D. Kea, then to his sons, Ira, Sydney and Ankea; then to Rosie Ethel Davis.

Thanks for the kind words. Yes, I have a sister and a brother here in Columbus. That is why I moved here from Dothan, to be close to them because I knew I was going to have another heart attack—four years ago. Had my second one just days after moving. This latest one was my third.

My sister keeps in touch and comes by a couple times a week or so. She and one of her daughters are now living with my step-dad across town. Before my heart attack, I would go over to check on him at least twice a week. I still get my mail there (waiting list here on a post office box is about a year so I gave up on that). He came over with my sister the other day and I couldn't help but laugh--here HE was concerned about MY health--after they had sent him home several weeks ago because there was nothing they could do after his latest heart seizure. He had said to me "They sent me home to die." And yet now, he is "checking on me".

You mentioned Ed dying recently. Can you help me get some more info on him to write an obituary for the family newsletter? Need such info as when and where born; wife's full name and when they married; his occupation and where worked; club and church memberships; schools attended; cemetery where buried; names of all survivors and their hometowns.




